There are a number of major factors or trouble sources facing the Nation today as we draw near the time for selecting new representatives to our various legislative branches. 

Preparing Your Child For School

Going to school for the first time is an exciting adventure for any child. If he has had proper preparation, both emotional and physical, school will continue to be a pleasant experience to which he will look

school will continue to be a pleasant experience to which he will look forward every day.

A positive attitude toward school on the part of parents is essential if the child is to approach it as a desirable thing. This proper attitude should be expressed over a period of time, and not just in the last few months before school starts. An early check with

the last few months before school starts. An early check with school authorities will reveal the many ways there are to interest your child in school.

The emotional preparation is almost entirely up to the parents. Physical preparation, however, is required by school authorities just prior to start of school. This usually consists of a fairly thorough physical, vaccination against small pox and injections of Toxoids against diptheria, whooping cough and tetanus. It is because of this widespread attention to health that we have so few epidemic illnesses in our few epidemic illnesses in our

Practically all children have been to a doctor long before preparation for school is started, preparation for school is started, so this visit need not cause undue difficulty. The child can be examined by the family physician, a pediatrician or the school doctor. Since it is required by most schools, it is best to prepare in advance a medical record of this child for the school doctor, listing especially contagious diseases he may have had and the dates of his vaccination and injections. A check with the family doctor will give you this infor-

jections. A check with the family doctor will give you this information. Most schools give a medical history form for this to be filled in by the parents at home.

A pre-school examination will record height, weight, condition of the eyes, teeth, heart and, in some instances, a blood and urine examination. Tests will be made for resistance to tuberculosis and diphtheria. All children must have a smallpox vaccination and have a smallpox vaccination and in many schools booster shots for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus are strongly recom-mended.

If some deficiency is found in this pre-school examination, proper medical treatment will be (© 1958 Schering Corporation)

prescribed. It may be that a visit to the dentist is necessary. Or the to the dentist is necessary. Or the child needs glasses. Or his diet may not be adequate, causing listlessness and indifference. These things caught early enough and corrected can have a definite bearing on not only the child's attitude, but on his

grades.
But this pre-school examination does not end the need for constant checking by your doctor. It is a good practice to have every child, regardless of age, examined before school starts, for it may be that while bearing for it may be that while he did not need glasses the year before, a condition calling for glasses could have developed during the summer. And the teeth, many times the culprit causing other illnesses, should be examined. Most schools demand yearly ex-aminations by the school doctor or a report from the family phy-

It is not uncommon for such examinations to reveal that some inadequacy at school, such as low grades or bad behavior, is actually caused by an unseen physical disturbance. These obstacles can be avoided by proper medical

The family automobile, once relegated to the men for use and care, has definitely come into the woman's to wash and clean the car. Of course. the ideal is to have everybody help. Everyone should certainly know as much as he can about the care and handling of the car, beginning with safe driving habits.

Among the latest road hazards is turnpike driving. One of the great dangers of traveling for a length of time at high speeds over straight roads is "road hypnosis". Safety experts suggest a variety of ideas to keep from being lulled to death. Remove the shoe from your right foot so that the gas pedal vibrates the foot as you travel. Sit on a piece of plywood or hardboard. Play the radio, but not too heavy a diet of soft music. Make periodic coffee stops.

Keeping the car clean inside and out helps prolong its life and beauty. Don't use too harsh a detergent on the paint finish-and wash the car in a shady area. Road tar can be removed by rubbing it with lard. Let it stand a few seconds, then rub off.

To prolong the life and maintain top efficiency of the radiator in your car, scale formed by water evaporation should be removed regularly. Frequent changes with soft water help. For a complete descaling, dissolve a can of household lye in five gallons of water. Empty the radiator and fill with this solution. Drain after five hours of engine operation. An important caution: do not use your car are made of aluminum.

Another cost factor is savings on fuel. The thick insulation keeps heat inside in winter as effectively as it keeps heat out-

For quite a number of years, commercial growers ended their peach season with Elberta as the oriental moth moved into the late variety orchards, and did much damage. The later variemuch quality anyway. However, with the development of DDT and with the coming of such vaglow, Constitution, Lizzie, etc., extended.

Evaluation of these varieties is not yet completed. Their adaptation to the home planting may had not been used. be practical, if the home gardener will not neglect any of the necessary later sprays.

Some commercial growers, especially those with local trade or roadside market outlets are looking for some good late variety peaches, and also for some earlier varieties for the beginning of the season. For this very early season, the Redwin, a white variety, and Dixired and Erly-Red-Fre are helping fill the early market needs in this section. 


