Home Cooling Can Improve Your Welfare

Central air conditioning in the home is so important to the economy, health, and general welfare of the average family today that it is becoming a practical necessity rather than the luxury it once was.

Pretty broad statement? Perhaps, but it's a statement being made more and more often today by leading figures in government, education, and industry. Here are two main reasons why:

1. Lower costs of installing and operating home cooling systems. Years of research by engineers and technicians have resulted in a combination of insulation and modern air conditioning equipment that puts central air conditioning well within the reach of the average family.
2. Improved health and general welfare. Air conditioning filters and dehumidifies air in a house constantly. This cleaner, fresher air results in fewer allergies, colds and heat rashes, and better dispositions, better appetites, restful nights, more efficiency, less fatigue, and scores of other advantages that keep a family feeling better and in closer harmony.

Why is air conditioning less costly now than it was a few years ago? The answer is research. For example, it was discovered that insulation in thick enough quantities so effectively blocks the penetration of heat from outside that smaller, and therefore less costly, equipment does the same job for which big, expensive equipment once was needed.

Recommendations as a result of the research are 6 inches of mineral wool insulation in ceilings, a minimum of 3 inches in walls, and 2 inches in floors over crawl spaces and other unheated areas, and 2 inches around the edges of a concrete slab foundation. These insulation thicknesses, plus advances in equipment design, also make hot weather operation of the cooling system far less costly.

Another cost factor is savings on fuel. The thick insulation keeps heat inside in winter as effectively as it keeps heat outside.

Some other health and welfare advantages are: easier housekeeping, healthier house plants, longer-lasting cut flowers, and happier pets.

Teenage youngsters even stay home more often on hot evenings.

New Safety For Hunters



TO BE SEEN, not hurt. That's the credo of wise hunters this year who will be wearing the new Air Force "safety yellow" which, according to tests, is four to five times better than any other color in perception. And, subject as they are to hard wear and all kinds of weather, it's important that the yellow in these garments retain its depth and strength for life. STILL DOWN TO EARTH

Labor and related expenses per loaf of bread to the baker "have just about tripled since 1945," according to a report released by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the United States Department of Agriculture. The price of retail bread, however, is up only 35% in that period.

The report titled, "The Marketing and Transportation Situation" showed that between 1948 and 1957 the average price of bread has increased from 13.9c per pound to 18.8c per pound. The farmer's share of this price received for ingredients—flour, shortening, sugar—declined from 3.4c to 3.2c.

"Increases in wages and salaries (paid by the baker), since they are the largest part of the (baker's) expense, accounted for the major growth in the baker-wholesale margin," the report states. "Between 1951 and 1957, average hourly earnings for bakery employees rose from \$1.43 to \$1.92. Indirect labor payments in the form of fringe benefits and social security taxes also made advances and in 1957 probably amounted to more than five times the 1945 level."

"Combined costs of advertising and promotion and of bakery products bought for resale are more than three times what they were in 1945," the report continued. "It appears that packaging and wrapping materials also have risen in about the same proportion. Delivery expense, other than wages and salary, has more than doubled and



other items have shown gains of 100 per cent or more.

"Profits of six leading baking companies declined from approximately 4% of sales in 1947 and 1948 to 2.3 per cent of sales in 1956 and 1957.

Commenting on the report, E. E. Kelley, Jr., President of the American Bakers Association, said the information was not particularly news to the baker. "We are fully aware of the climbing costs of operations," he said, adding that "bakers deserve considerable credit for holding the price increase in bread to a smaller percentage than the increase in costs of operation."

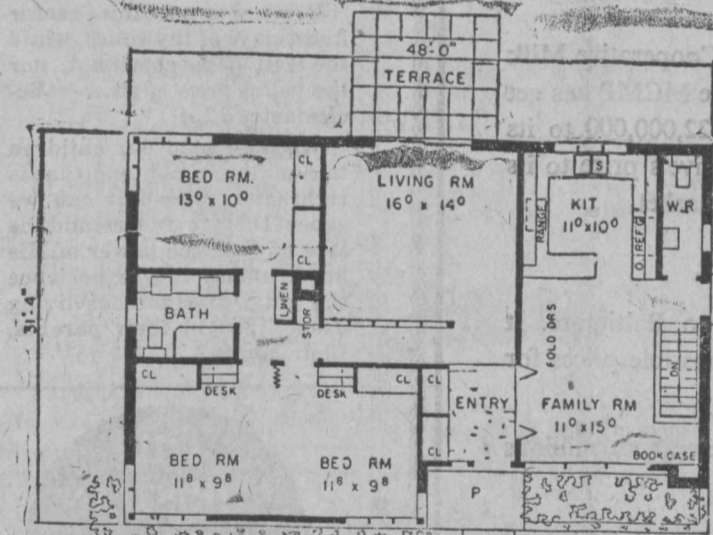

The main entry permits access to the kitchen, family room or the living room and bedroom wing without traveling through any other room in the house. This entry has two generous closets for coat storage.

The kitchen, family room is to the right of the entry. There is a convenient washroom off the kitchen next to the side door. The family room has generous windows facing the street and there is a bookcase on one side with cabinet below for storage of hobby equipment. Tropical Treats

You'll love this fluffy, flaked coconut and banana recipe—and here are more easy-to-make ideas using these two wonderful "go-togethers!"

1. Vary the Coconut Mint Banana recipe by substituting 2 tablespoons of lemon juice for the jelly... serve with orange cornstarch sauce.
2. Slice 3 ripe bananas with 12 quartered stewed figs, a dash of lemon juice and sugar to sweeten. Sprinkle with flaked coconut and bake in hot oven 12 to 15 minutes until lightly browned. Delicious as an accompaniment for meat or poultry.
3. Make a banana split using cottage cheese mixed with flaked coconut. Top with whipped cream or sour cream or vanilla-yogurt.

American Education Challenged

When the United States Army found that most of the American GI's captured and held prisoner by the Communists in the Korean War had succumbed to some degree to Communist indoctrination, it set about to analyze the cause. Major William E. Mayer, one of the Army's top psychiatrists in charge of the study, got the answer from the prisoners-of-war themselves—in Tokyo after their release.

In recent months several national publications including LIFE Magazine, have carried, some of the story. There has just come to my attention a well-documented book presenting much more of the story. It is important to every parent and teacher; in fact, to every citizen. Its title is Bending The Twig, and its publisher is The Heritage Foundation, Chicago.

The book's author is Colonel Augustin G. Rudd, who distinguished himself as an officer in both World War I and World War II. His interest in the educational situation began a number of years ago when his own children came home from school with ideas and materials which he felt were harmful to the American citizen and the future of individual freedom.

Encouraging Signs

Colonel Rudd's book comes at a time when there are many encouraging signs in the field of education. With documentation his book shows how the Communists took over the 11,000 member Teachers Union in New York City and used it to further the aims of international Communism. Those aims can best be achieved in America after our children's respect for American principles and institutions has been undermined. And that's exactly the condition of mind that the Communist brain-washers in Korea found so prevalent among our GI's who represented all categories of American citizens. This showed that the deficiency in education was widespread.

We have a tremendous job to do in American education. We must place more emphasis on courses with genuine substance. We must improve scientific training for those of our youth who are capable. But basic in any educational program, beginning at the 8th grade, must be an intelligent,

dynamic program explaining our freedom system, how it works, its great comparative advantages and its potential for the future. Until we have installed such a program in all schools and entrusted it to

teachers who appreciate our system, we will not be safe from internal decay due to "Creeping Socialism" or the external danger of the growing military might of world Communism.

Gas Tax Refunds Can Be Claimed

Taxpayers have until September 30 to file claims for refund of Federal excise taxes on certain gasoline purchases from July 1, 1957 to June 30, 1958, Irving Machiz, Acting District Director of Internal Revenue announced today. Mr. Machiz said farmers who purchased gasoline during that time for use on the farm are entitled to refund of the full 3 cents a gallon tax by filing Form 2240.

Other taxpayers, he said, who purchased gasoline for nonhighway use may claim refund of 1 cent a gallon by filing Form 843. Mr. Machiz said taxpayers who file by mail must have their claims postmarked no later than September 30.
