The chilly breezes of late fall and winter may be the cause of driving the fair-weather fishermen to follow the warm-water species of fish to a milder climate, but do not be misled by the false belief that ocean fishing has temporarily ceased along the coast of the northern Atlantic states.

With the first word that the frostfish and ling have arrived inshore, hundreds of fishermen swarm to the piers and beaches from miles around.

Fishing for frostfish is customarily good until about January, then it starts to taper off, only to pick up again in the latter portion of February.

Cod are reported to grow to a tremendous size. A monster of 211 1/4 pounds, more than six feet long, was caught on a line trawl off the Massachusetts coast in 1895.

The important thing to remember is that there is plenty of salt-water fishing action in the north, in the winter. All it takes is the proper rig, plenty of warm clothing and the desire to hook into a big one.

Prescription For Penelope

Penelope was waiting in the doctor's office to hear the results of all the tests she'd been through. She lit one cigarette after another. Heart disease? Cancer? TB? Maybe some rare disease?

At last it was her turn. The doctor was writing on a prescription pad as he greeted her sternly: "Penelope, I've given you a complete check-up and find no organic trouble. But the symptoms you've had since your husband has been away in the service call for strong measures. I'm sending you to the hospital. Here

are your instructions." Penelope took the prescription with trembling fingers. This is what she read: "Volunteer work, the harder the better, to be taken at least three times a week. Mrs. John Doe, Director of Volunteer Services, Jones Hospital."

Now, years later, Penelope laughs when she recalls how quickly her vague symptoms disappeared when she began to help others much worse off than herself. She found that her community was full of jobs—in health and welfare organizations, hospitals, schools, civic groups—jobs that needed to be done by people like her with time on their hands.

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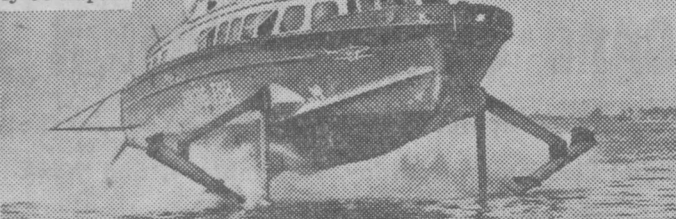

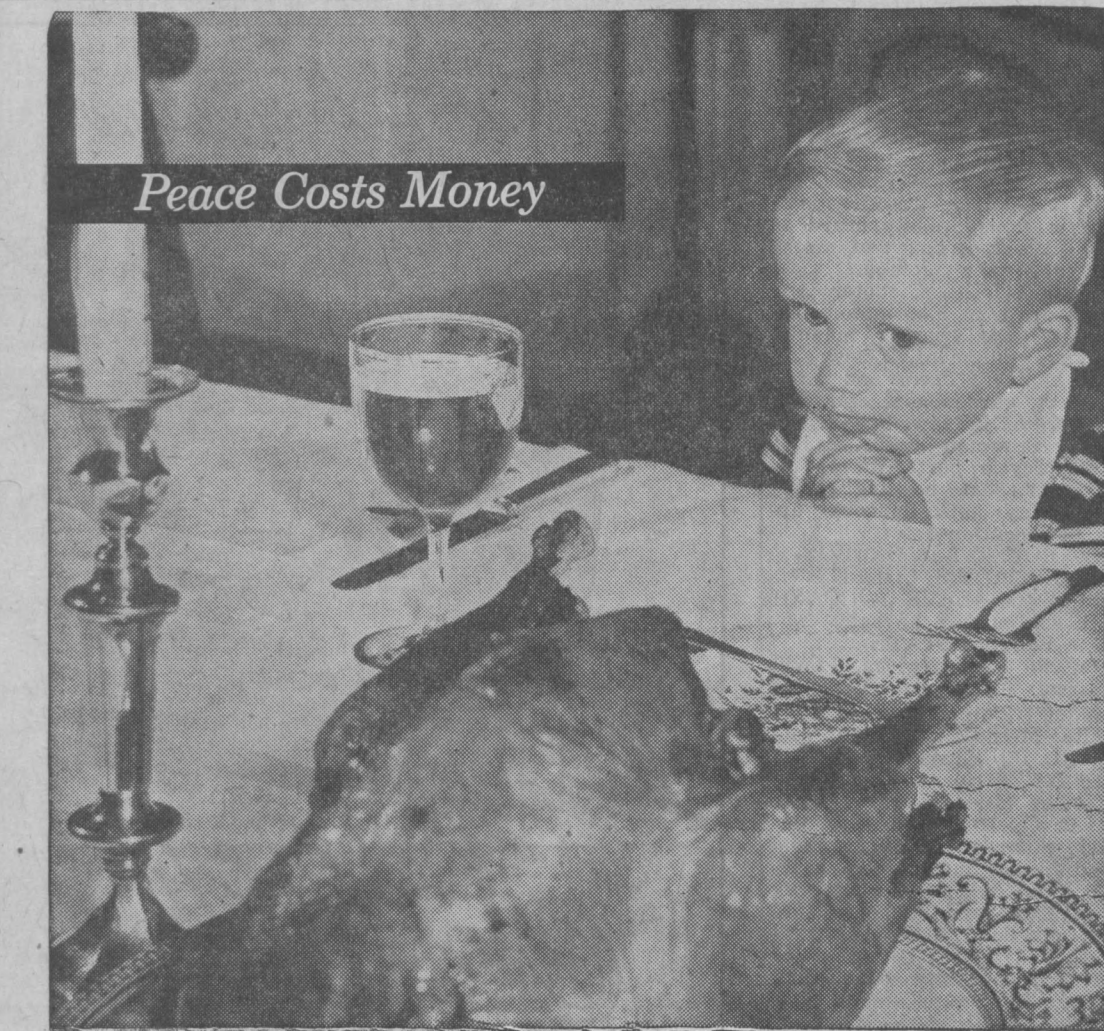

How to Get 16 Ounces To A Pound

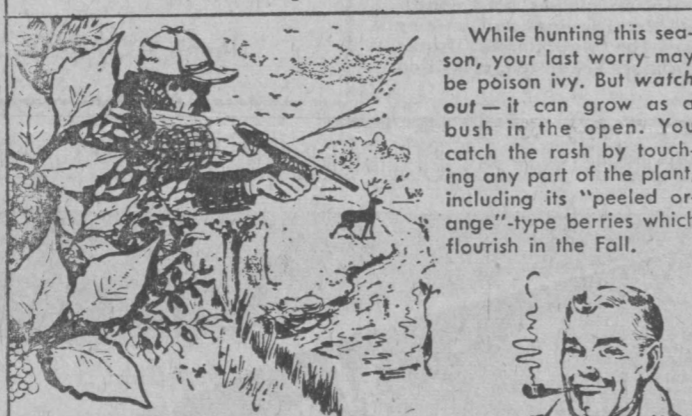


A store can package a 5-lb. or 10-lb. paper sack of potatoes that in a few days will weigh ounces less. The explanation: evaporation.

Tests were made on potatoes shipped in 10-1 lb. paper bags. Over a transit of a little over a week they lost 4 oz. per 10-lb. bag. What is more, in the drying out, the potatoes also suffered some loss of flavor and texture. A new film package made of Bakelite polyethylene provides maximum weight-retention and freshness, according to recent tests evaluated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Test findings show that after two weeks of storage at average temperature, potatoes packed in this seamless poly-

ethylene film were all top quality and of firm texture—while paper-packed potatoes came out shriveled, spongy and discolored. Americans purchased almost 17 billion lbs. of potatoes in 1956 at an average retail price of 5.7 cents per lb. A saving of 0.4 ounces per pound, or some 425 million pounds in all, could have been possible had polyethylene film packages been utilized in packaging the national potato crop. Are you getting your full 16 ounces for every pound of potatoes you buy?

Out of Season: You're Not Always Safe—From Poison Ivy



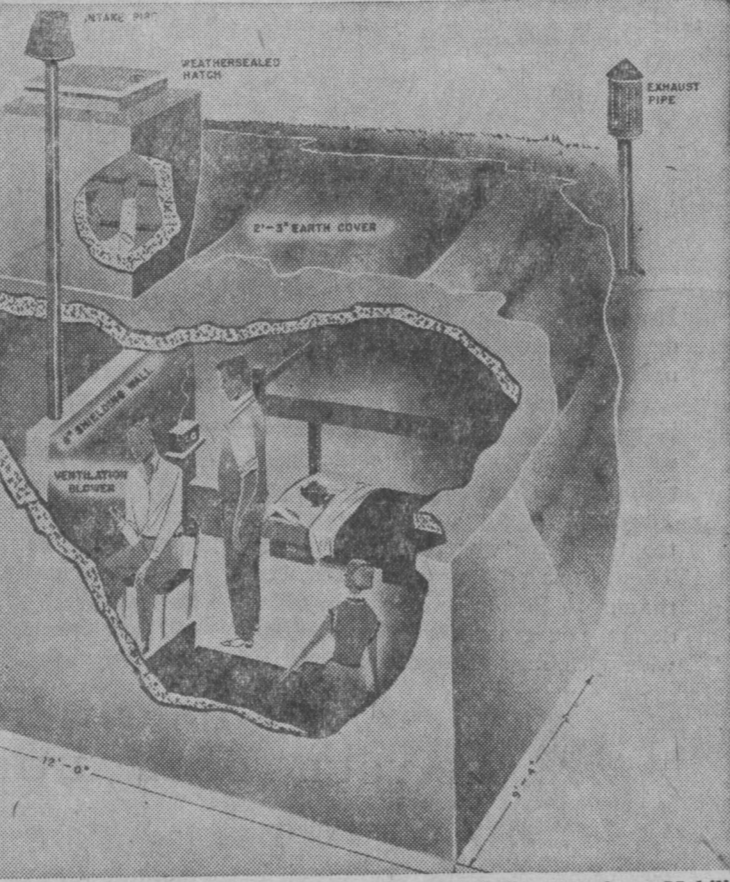
Wood for the fireplace can also bring poison ivy woes. The plant, in vine form, often clings to trees and logs. When burned, poisonous oils vaporize—can give you the annoying itch. Even when dead, the striated, long-fibered vine is still a threat.

While hunting this season, your last worry may be poison ivy. But watch out—it can grow as a bush in the open. You catch the rash by touching any part of the plant, including its 'peeled orange'-type berries which flourish in the fall.



Easiest way to get poison ivy in Autumn is when gathering leaves in your yard. Those from the noxious plant mingle with others; bring 'trouble' on touch. Best way to avoid poison ivy, (or poison oak), is to immunize—Aqua-Ivy Tablets taken over a six-week period keep you safe 'in season' or out. K

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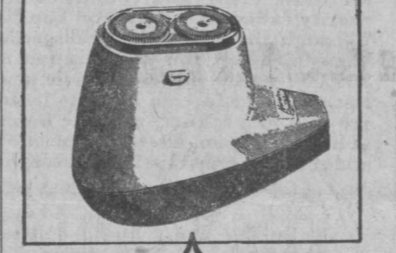

Free Diabetes Tests Scheduled

Residents of the entire State of Maryland will be able to get a free medical test for diabetes during the annual Diabetes Detection Week beginning on Monday, November 16, by contacting their local pharmacist. This annual program sponsored jointly by the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland, Local Medical Societies, the Maryland State Pharmaceutical Society and the Maryland Dietetic Society, anticipates that hundreds of unknown diabetics will be discovered during this period. In at least two counties in the State, Talbot and Wicomico, local County Medical Societies plan to conduct free urine and blood tests. In Salisbury, these tests will be held on November 19 and 20 from

Elaborate sketches, drawn to scale include distance of water to the area, types of equipment necessary for any emergency, placement of equipment and the route the company will take to the area should fire break out. Preplanning has become the 'new look' in fire protection.

A joint announcement of this endeavor was made by Dr. J. Sheldon Eastland, President of the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty; Dr. Huntington Williams, City Health Commissioner; and Dr. Perry F. Prather, Director of the State Department of Health. In making the announcement, the doctors emphasized that modern medical discoveries have made possible the control of the disease providing it is discovered before serious and potentially fatal complications develop. family physician is the best preventive measure, it was announced, but the free testing kits, and free tests, are designed to help some of the nearly 25,000 citizens of Maryland who are unaware that they have this ailment. The Supreme Court—Our Master?

In the opinion of some of the best informed and most highly respected legal minds in our nation, one of the gravest dangers to our traditional American way of life and all the great blessings it has made possible for generations of Americans, is the present seeming determination of the United

States Supreme Court to break away from its historic function and become a maker of laws and a destroyer of laws to suit the whims of its nine justices. This was one of the points made by Senator John McClellan in a recent speech warning the American people that our nation is moving toward disaster.

Senator McClellan was not basing his challenge of recent Supreme Court actions on the integration decision and subsequent rulings in this matter. That was but a small part of the Senator's concern. His concern was founded on the whole attitude of the high court which, in the opinion of noted constitutional authorities, has set about to break down the

historic concept of states' rights, to circumvent the power of Congress, and to perhaps even bring to an end the judicial doctrine of established precedents on which our judicial functions have been based for 169 years.

Exercising Law-Making Powers

The people of America need to be reminded—and Senator McClellan was reminding them—that if the Supreme Court can arbitrarily make laws itself, then we are at the mercy of the whims of nine men and no longer protected in our property, person and liberty by a government of law conceived and brought into being by the Constitution. It is important that all citizens know what the nation's foremost judicial authorities think about the present Supreme Court. For instance, the Chief Justice of the 48 State Supreme Courts have overwhelmingly approved a statement sounding a clear alarm over recent U. S. Supreme Court actions.

Their statement said: "We are not alone in our view that the Supreme Court, in many cases arising under the Fourteenth Amendment, has assumed what seem to us primarily legislative (law-making) powers..

Wielding Dominant Power

"We do not believe that either the framers of the original Constitution or the possibly somewhat less gifted draftsmen of the Fourteenth Amendment ever contemplated that the Supreme Court would, or should, have the almost unlimited policy-making powers which it now exercises. It is strange, indeed, to reflect that under a Constitution which provides for a system of checks and balances and of distribution of power between national and state governments, one branch of one government—the Supreme Court—should attain the immense, and in many respects, dominant, power which it now wields.."

Chief Justice John R. Dethmers of Michigan declared the Supreme Court's recent actions overshadowed all other concerns. Judge Learned Hand, one of America's most distinguished jurists, recently retired as presiding justice of the Court of Appeals in New York, has challenged the law-making Supreme Court. He said he has "never been able to understand" on what basis other than "a coup de main" (meaning arbitrary usurpation of power) the Supreme Court adopted the view that it may actually legislate (make laws).

What To Do?
David Lawrence, columnist of the New York Herald-Tribune and editor of U. S. News & World Report, asserted that in a recent decision the Supreme Court "astonished many of the lawyers of the nation by breaking three historic precedents in judicial procedure." Lawrence said, "Anything can happen now, for the Supreme Court has set up what Judge Learned

Hand has described as a 'third legislative chamber.'"

What can be done? What can a citizen do? Senator McClellan noted that he tried to get Congress to pass a law establishing the judicial acceptance of states' rights in the case of the Communist Steve Nelson whose conviction by a Pennsylvania jury the high court overruled—saying states had no jurisdiction. The bill was overwhelmingly approved in the House. Communist-inspired mail flooded Washington. The bill was killed in the Senate by one vote. He said that if citizens had been sufficiently informed and had contacted their Senators, the bill would have passed—offsetting some of the Court's damage to our internal security. That's the challenge to the citizens. Get the facts and then become active in law-making by contacting your rep-

resentatives in all legislative bodies. American freedom and prosperity are at stake.

85000 Acres Of State Land In Reserve

Farmers in Maryland have offered 82,000 acres of land in the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank for 1959, according to Julius P. Parran, Chairman of the Maryland Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

First priority, Mr. Parran stated, will go to farmers who had land in both the Conservation Reserve and Acreage Reserve in 1958 and now want to add land to the Conservation Reserve Acreage. Second priority will go to those farmers offering all of the eligible acreage in the program. Third priority will go to farmers offering land at the lowest percentage of the farm rental figure. Should ties occur within these priority groups, Mr. Parran advised they will be broken by a public drawing.

Inspection of acreage offered is now under way to determine by measurement the exact area involved and if all of the acreage offered is eligible to take part. As soon as these determinations have been made contracts will be prepared and offered to farmers.

Babson Discusses Detroit's Sacred Cow—Your Automobile

En Route Home, Nov. 13— I have been thinking on my homeward journey as to what

will be the deciding factor with regard to 1959 prosperity. I have concluded it will be the automobile. Do you really like the car you are driving, or are you completely fed up with the gaudy, hungry monster?

In this inflated economy where dollars disappear all too quickly, do you really like to sacrifice gas mileage for all those horses under the hood? Have you yet gotten used to cracking your skull and bruising your knees every time you try to get in or out of a modern Detroit creation? How many sets of plugs and points, how many mufflers and automatic transmissions, has your garageman installed?

Before I go further, let me say that the above questions are not mine. I am simply echoing countless numbers of car owners who have come within earshot. One irate owner of half a dozen cars of the same popular make, purchased during the last dozen years, recently responded as follows to a piece of company promotional literature expounding joys of station wagon living: After enumerating the many things that happened to his new car within the first five months of ownership, he said, in part, "My family has never had the money to take any of the fantastic trips outlined in your brochure. All our money has gone into trying to keep our new car running . . ."

Why People Are Not Buying Cars

Detroit has searched for all manner of reasons why recent models are not selling. I believe the answer to its poor sales record is as glaringly obvious as the chrome on its current models: (1) Detroit designers must be living in tall ivory towers, way up in the clouds. What they are producing is what they think people ought to want, not what they actually want. (2) The consumer is fed up with shoddy materials that just don't hold up under normal driving conditions. (3) Detroit workmanship, compared with what comes out of Europe, is generally slipshod and slapdash. (4) The high cost of living demands a less expensive car to purchase, a more economical car to drive, and a car fashioned to house comfortably the taller bodies our well-fed civilization produces.

A check of dealers in the New England area uncovers the fact that one popular make of car has lost sale after sale to its customers because those customers feel so uncomfortable behind the wheel, and in certain models because they dislike riding with their knees under their chins in the back seat. This matter of failing to

build cars to fit people is more serious than you may think. I am sure that any reliable doctor of physiology worthy of his reputation will tell you that riding with your knees under your chin is a cause of fatigue, that this kind of positioning restricts blood circulation, causes numbness and makes one's responses slower. I am wondering if a lot of riding in such a cramped fashion could ultimately cause circulatory problems.

Small Cars A Must In Our Economy


Sure, U. S. car sales soared until most recent years, and for two very good reasons: (1) In post-World-War-II America the auto became a necessary means of transportation to suburbia rather than a Sunday afternoon plaything. (2) The only cars available in numbers until recently were American makes. Therefore, as the population increased and suburbia developed, more and more American cars were sold.

Gradually, however, millions of new home owners have found that home ownership, while very much worth while, costs money. They have found, too, that their large families consume ever larger quantities of food; and that the older children get the more expensive they become to clothe and educate. And father and mother, looking for ways to balance the budget, have begun to realize that it does not make economic sense for each of them to push a hungry gas buggy across the landscape. European manufacturers, with an insight into this problem which Detroit seems to lack (with the exception of one manufacturer), have come to the family's rescue with reliable, economical, well-made, although not always comfortable, transportation. I predict a rash of small cars from American manufacturers in the early sixties. To hasten that day, write the president, sales manager, or marketing manager of the company that makes your car. Tell him what you like and don't like about your car.

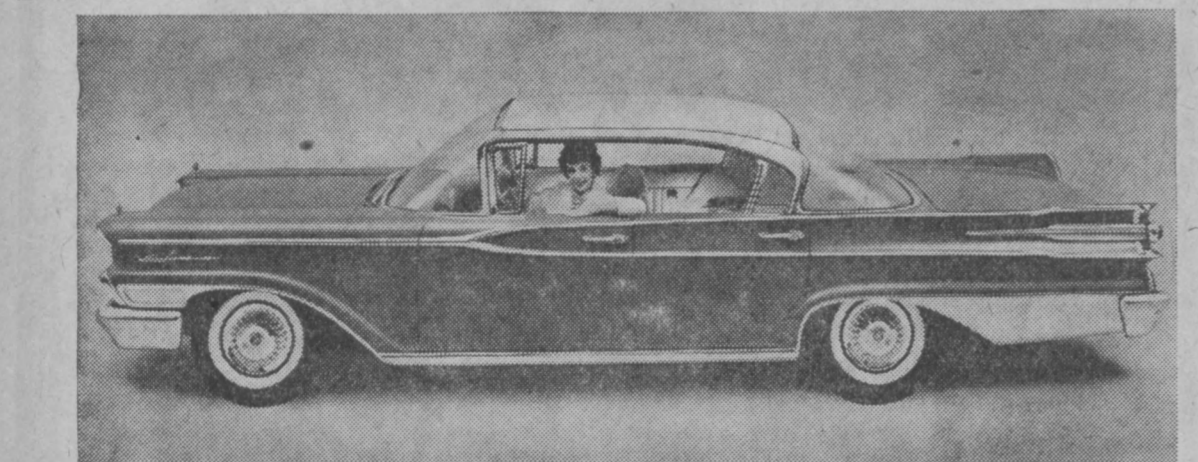

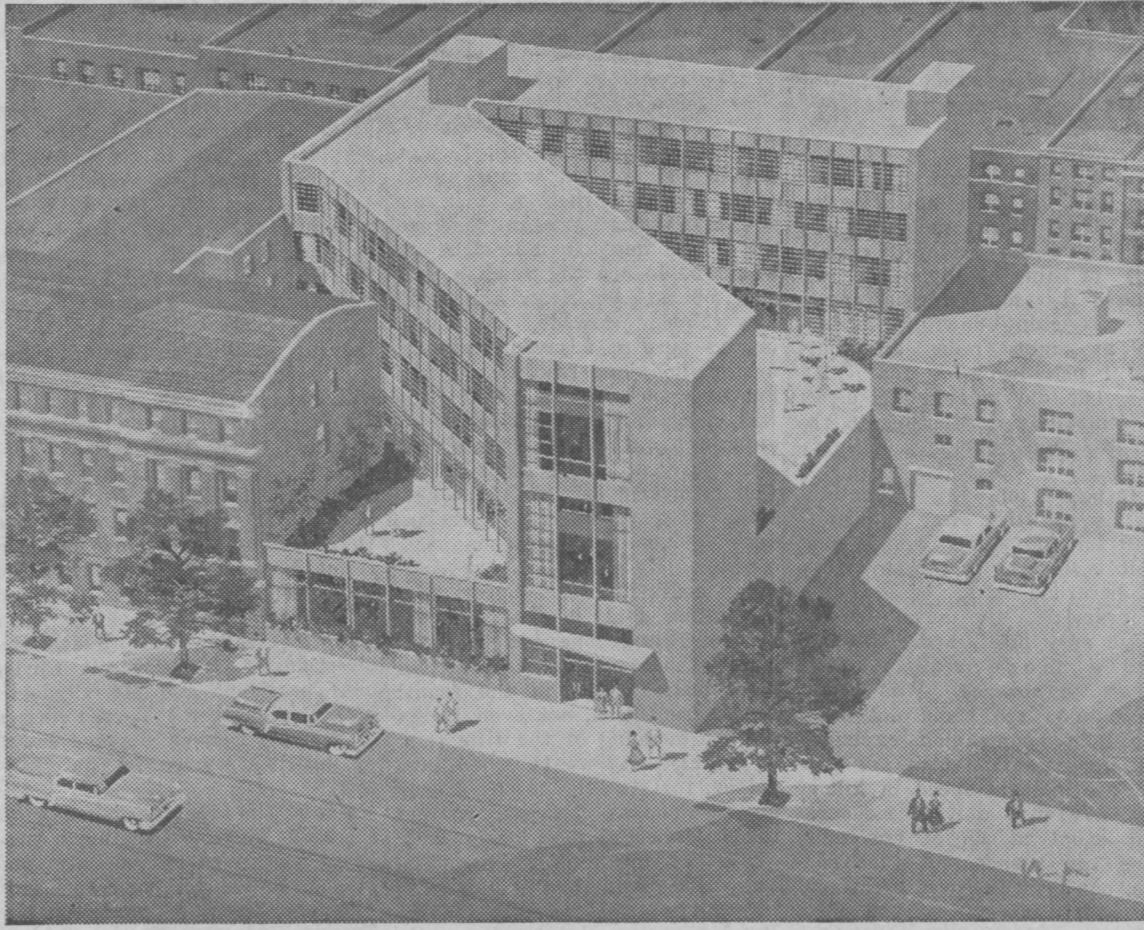

Social Security Rule Explained

People under age 72 receiving social security benefits will not be eligible for all their checks in a year if they have earnings of more than \$1200, according to W. S. King, social security dis-

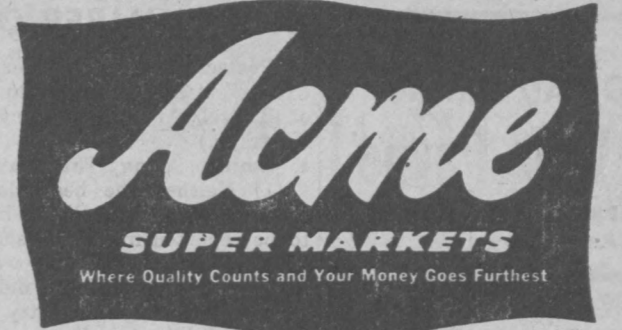
trict manager in Hagerstown. These are beneficiaries who are either working for wages of more than \$100 a month or are rendering substantial services in self-employment. They should immediately report this to the Social Security Administration. In this way benefits can be withheld while a person is working and will avoid the necessity of re-funding benefits or having them withheld later when a person is not working, Mr. King noted.

If earnings did amount to more than \$1200 in the year, it will be necessary to file an annual report of these earnings by April 15 of the following year. Failure to do so may result in a loss of additional benefits. The information furnished on this annual report will be used by the Social Security Administration to make all necessary adjustments in the number of benefit checks properly due.

BE FIT TO SPEAK

Solomon John Mattar, keeper of the garden tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, where Jesus was buried and rose from the dead, recently visited our International Headquarters in Tulsa.

While addressing our office staff, he said, "You know, dear friends, we can easily speak about the Lord Jesus, but it is another thing to be fit to speak. My prayer and the prayer of my wife every morning in the garden tomb is that the Lord will make us fit to be witnesses in this place or any other place."

He gave three things as being especially necessary to be fit to speak the name of the living Son of the living God:

- Compassion.
- Consecration.
- Service.

This incident illustrates the famous keeper's own fitness to witness for Jesus Christ anywhere, including one of the holiest places in the Holy Land, the garden tomb.

About 10,000 people a year visit the tomb. They usually come in small groups, sometimes only one or two at a time. On each occasion, Mr. Mattar takes them first to Golgotha Hill where he begins the narrative of the crucifixion and death of our Saviour.

Then they proceed to the sepulcher, which really consists of five tombs, only one of which was ever completed.

One day five elderly ladies came into the tomb. They were well-dressed and well-to-do. They were polite and conservative. They did not speak or smile while the keeper related the beautiful story of Mary

Magdelene and the disciples who came with precious oil to anoint the body of Jesus only to learn that he had risen.

The keeper observed his listeners as he spoke. They appeared unmoved, even by the story of the tender meeting of Jesus and Mary, and he began to feel very sorry for them.

"Something came into my throat," Mr. Mattar said, "and I couldn't speak so good, and so my tears began to come down because they were getting along in age, yet, they did not appear interested in the things of God."

When the elderly ladies saw the falling tears of the tomb keeper, they were stirred. That is why compassion is so important. They knew the keeper's tears were not only for the story he was telling, but also for each one of them personally.

They knew that the keeper was consecrated in the service of his Lord and Saviour, but when they saw his compassion, they were moved. It was the compassion of Jesus which had drawn Mary Magdalene, and it was her compassion at the tomb which drew Jesus back to her.

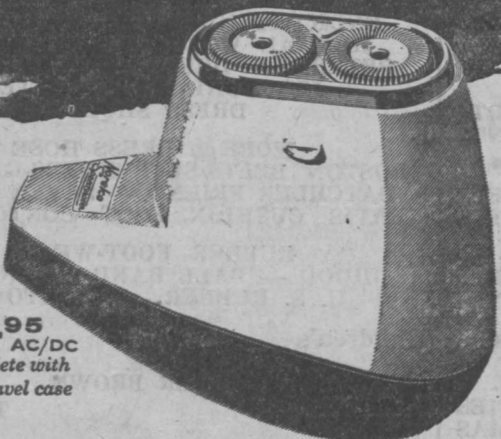
One of the ladies said, "We were moved because you were moved, and we feel we can never forget this experience in the tomb."

4. Smiles Along The Way

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quaint American way of putting force into a question that was illustrated by the vigorous old gentleman on the seat beside him when he inquired, "Why the h— are you in such a hurry?" —at least he paid no attention to it. Then it was that from my seat behind the driver I caught sight of the speedometer, and changed to something stronger. We were going down the mountain at eighty miles an hour! Was I petrified with fear? Almost, but did manage to direct my companion's attention to the indicator and mummur, "Eighty miles!"

"Suspense on the Mountain-side" is the title first suggested itself for the story, and I must admit I thought it rather catchy but discarded it as misleadingly melodramatic, the suspense being so very brief, and chose instead a more realistic title: "Where Ignorance Was Not Bliss." You see I did not know until my companion explained that the American cars for foreign use indicate speed in kilometers, a French unit of measurement equal to .62 of our mile. After my suspenseful few seconds, our driver's speed of around fifty miles an hour seemed quite moderate and even a reason for smiling.

(2) And there was the encounter with the gentlemanly but very insistent Cario merchant who had stationed himself outside our hotel in the hope of inducing some of the tourist-guests to visit his new bazaar and was still waiting when our small group returned there about 11:30 p. m. The others, a little ahead of me and perhaps more sure that they had had enough for one day, hurried into the Semiramis, but I, wanting some small gifts from Egypt which I had not taken the opportunity to look for earlier, listened uncertainly to his eloquent description of the wonderful things to be found at the Seti Bazaar "just around the corner," considered a visit, considered also the lateness of the hour and the vagueness of the Seti's location, and decided, "It's too late—time to go to bed."

There seemed to be a considerable mixture of feelings, but not lack of respect, in his quick retort, "You remind me of my grandmother."

It happens that this Postscript has another one attached to it, to report that early next morning, in the interval between breakfast and the start of the second day's sightseeing, the persistent, perhaps anxious proprietor of the new bazaar reappeared, and I accompanied him, not exactly "just around the corner" but also across a large Esso Service Station and a wide avenue—to find a small shop almost filled with people (salespeople, not customers, apparently the proprietor's family except Grandmother). And I really enjoyed being able to find also enough small gift articles to save the head of the firm from a total loss on his advertising effort.

(3) The third and last of these small extras in lighter vein that I am here recalling is laid in Barcelona and Baltimore, the first part both inside and outside of a "movie" house along the Ram-

blas and the second in the Central Pratt Library; the times, the day of our second stop at Barcelona before taking off for New York, and several months later, "But," again, "the story."

What actually happened was that I got into the wrong movie after deciding that a pleasant and interesting way to conclude this "free day" in Barcelona would be to see the Spanish version of an American film starring Marlon Brando, and making as sure as I could, knowing no Spanish and the ticket girl knowing no English, that this was the film I would see if I entered at once, as it was just about to start. So I entered, and found myself in a pitch-dark place where a picture that had been going on for some time continued to go on, to my complete confusion, except for the realization that it was not the Marlon Brando one but the other one that was also advertised on a large poster in the front! But there I was, not even knowing the meaning of the title (and if I had it would not have helped, for I would not have seen any connection between it and the complicated plot, being later given its meaning to be "The Lady Has Not Died"), nor who was the hero and who the villain! But this time ignorance really did make for amusement!

However, what seems to me the most amusing part of this little story is what has to do with the title of the picture I did not see. I had no idea what that meant either—and could get no convincing help on it even from the Spanish people themselves; they just looked puzzled and said, repeating the words: "Ellos y Ellas—that's 'He's and She's,'" and altho I had seen only a few of Brando's pictures I felt sure there was none with that name.

So the mystery of the title remained unsolved but not forgotten; and months later when I was again in Baltimore and visiting the library I brought it up; and in that inspiring atmosphere, presto, the solution: "Guys and Dolls," of course. But is it any wonder the Spaniards didn't get it?

5. A Concluding Coincidence

There was no thought in my mind of Mediterranean Cruise or traveling in general when I recently started to go thru one of several old scrapbooks, looking for suggestions that might help an entertainment committee. Then there it was, copied on a card and placed in this book many years ago—one of the Cheerful Cherub's verses that had especially pleased me:

Of the only human race.
