LOCAL YOUTHS SENTENCED AFTER SERIES OF THEFTS

Two Emmitsburg area youths had planned to rob the bank here last Thursday night but instead they are cooling their heels in the Frederick County jail.

Robert Leroy Crum, 20, and Robert Leroy Carson, 21, who had carefully drawn plans for cracking the Farmers State Bank, were arraigned Thursday before Magistrate Charles D. Gillelan for a long list of thefts.

The pair, each with a record of 12 previous arrests for stealing, and a juvenile, who served eight months in the Maryland Training School, were arrested by Police Chief Robert L. Koontz, and Trooper William G. Morgan of the state police.

Crum and the juvenile were apprehended Sunday a short time after a robbery at Ohler's Tavern, Route 97 east of town.

Four cases of beer stolen from the tavern were found in the car. Upon questioning, Crum and the juvenile admitted a series of burglaries and implicated Carson.

Crum, who has a flare for drawing, showed police the plans he had drafted for robbing the bank. The job had been scheduled for last Thursday night.

The trio told police that they had smashed a window and broke into the Emmitsburg Recreation Center. They took the keys to a soft drink machine from the cash register drawer and stole \$35. They also took a tray containing \$20 in pennies.

The three told police that they had attempted to break into Ireland's Restaurant in Emmitsburg but were frightened off by barking dogs.

Going back 10 months, Crum admitted stealing \$65 after breaking into Bowman's Garage here.

A month ago, Crum said, he stole five gallons of gasoline from Romanus Florence, near town.

Two weeks ago the trio stole a gun from the automobile of Patrick Haley parked at the Fire Hall and sold it at the Negro VFW in Union Bridge, they said.

County Tax Rate Is Increased

Frederick County taxpayers will pay additional taxes when the new bills are received early next year it was decided by the Board of County Commissioners of Frederick County held Tuesday in Frederick. The Board set as the new figure the rate of \$1.70 on the \$100. This is an increase of 16 cents from the \$1.54 rate of last year.

The Board of Education takes a cut of five per cent in the current expense request of \$124,273.05 and \$139,518 was deleted from the request for capital outlay. The total requested was \$5,106,838 for current expenses and the \$139,578 for capital outlay, for a grand total of \$5,246,356.

The amount requested by the C. Burr Artz Library for the establishment of a Bookmobile was deleted. The Health Department which had requested around \$93,000 is allotted \$78,942.

The Board approved an appropriation of \$60,000 toward the operating costs of the Children's Aid Society, which last year had a budget of \$39,683.25. The Frederick County Welfare Department took a reduction, from a requested \$67,913.10 to \$65,751.82.

In setting the tax rate the commissioners pointed out that this is the third increase since 1949 when the rate was set at \$1.34. In 1952 the rate went to \$1.40; in 1956 to \$1.54, and the present increase brings the rate to an all time high of \$1.70.

The commissioners explained their actions on budget requests in a written statement.

"Realizing the impact on the economy, the County Commissioners reluctantly announced an increase in the 1959 tax rate of 16 cents.

"While the first impression will be that this is a substantial increase, the Board notes that the expenses of the departments of the administration have been pared to an irreducible minimum, and that there is no alternative to the increase.

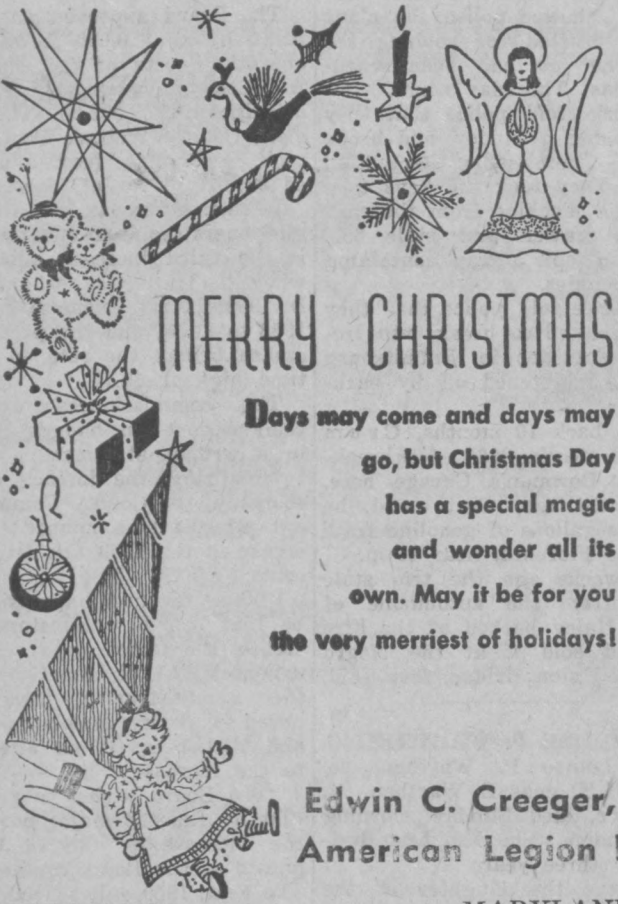

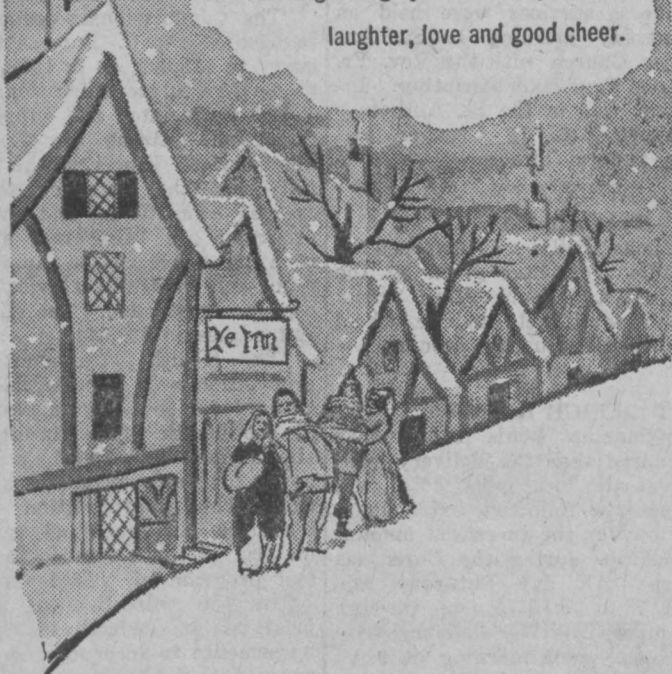

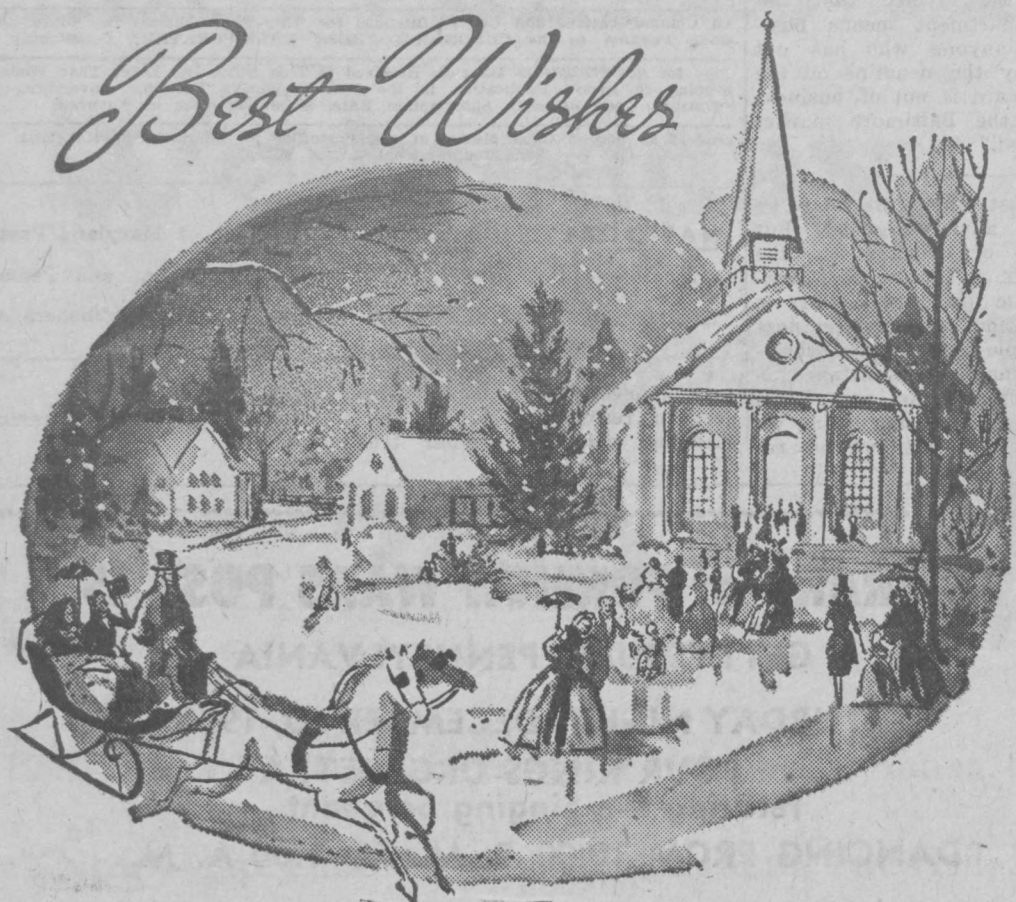

Babson Discusses: How Long Will You Live?

Babson Park, Mass., Dec. 18 —Dr. Robert H. Wilkins of Boston, president of the American Heart Association, predicts that "in ten years or so" the life expectancy of Americans will be 90 years.

Business Will Make Good Gains

If Dr. Wilkins is correct in his forecast, by 1968 we shall have added about 20 years to life expectancy. That should augur well for business over the longer term, but it will mean headaches too. At present our people are collecting nearly \$20,000,000,000 annually in old-age insurance payments, unemployment compensation, veterans' pensions and disability pay, railroad retirement pensions, federal, state and local civil - service pensions, and other government programs.

I am told that the total stake of our people in public and private pension systems of all types amounts to \$80,000,000,000. Investments in private pension plans alone amount to more than \$35,000,000,000 and represent 18% of our entire savings. I forecast that the total investments in all types of public and private pension plans will have jumped to \$165,000,000,000 by 1978, thus assuring steady purchasing power for the pensioners and the disabled.

Effect On Insurance

The life insurance companies have enjoyed continuous improvement in mortality rates for many years now, owing largely to advances in medicine and nutrition as well as to shortening of the work week. Most companies have found their actual mortality experience more favorable than that anticipated in the calculations upon which their premiums were based. Also the life companies have had the advantage of vastly increased investment earnings because of large gains in premium income and the sharp upturn in general business since World War II.

I believe life insurance companies stand to make further spectacular gains as life expectancy is bettered. Those insured by mutual companies should see total premium costs decline as dividends are boosted. Those insured by stock companies should benefit from lower premium rates or increases in coverage at little or no increase from present rates. Longer life expectancy cannot help but enhance the fortunes of the stock companies, of which Aetna and Travelers are the largest.

and death will widen. This will mean additional problems for government and business. Sharp increases in taxes levied upon employers and employees for social security lie ahead. Boosts in contributions of management and employees to private pension plans will be equally stiff.

In addition, I predict that federal, state and local taxes generally will move to new high levels. Some of this increase will be due to higher operating costs. A sizable portion will be due to the need for more facilities and services for the growing sector of our population above the age of 65.

New Boost For Labor

Since I anticipate another marked increase in births in this country, beginning probably about 1965 and continuing for several years, by 1978 we could well have, in a population of 225,000,000, 25,000,000 aged 65 or over and about 75,000,000 under 18. That means we will have fewer workers to support more people than at any other time in our history. Labor will once again be in the saddle, riding high, wide, and handsome. Chemists, physicists, engineers, and other skilled specialists will be in heavy demand.

There is only one method by which business can counteract the disastrous impact of this expected scarcity of manpower. It must make a greater and more effective use of the techniques of automation. Otherwise, there will not be sufficient assurance of earnings to attract needed capital for expansion and for replacement of outmoded plants and equipment. Perhaps the biggest single problem facing management over the next twenty years is manpower and the cost of that manpower. Automation is the only answer I can see. I predict that companies making machines or other equipment designed to cut labor costs will have an unusually bright future.

Dairy Farmers Facing Severe Crack-down By State Health Department Next Month

A number of dairy farmers are being warned by sanitarians of the Baltimore City Health Department that unless ordered corrections in water and sewage systems are completed by January 25 their Baltimore permits will be cancelled. Information on the program, which has been the subject of much discussion among the dairy farmers, was obtained by the Maryland Cooperative Milk Producers, Inc. in an interview with R. E. Gaddis, head of the Health Department Field Force.

The warnings come as a climax to a program instituted by the Health Department back in 1956. All dairymen holding Bal-

timore permits were notified in a letter from Health Commissioner Huntingdon Williams that they would be required to bring their water and sewage systems up to the standards of the U. S. Public Health Service "within a reasonable period." A letter over Dr. Williams' signature mailed last June served as a reminder of the program. To stagger the work load, in July and subsequent months cards were and are still being mailed to producers, giving specified deadlines, the first being January 25. These bear a space for the farmer to report to the County Health sanitarians that his corrections have been made and to ask for a reinspection.

Last week the city sanitarians started checking the returned cards against the list of Baltimore permittees facing the Jan. 25 deadline in each county, and those who have not sent in the cards are being warned.

Every effort has been made to achieve uniformity in the inspections and enforcement of this program and to see that everyone receives the same treatment, says Mr. Gaddis. It was with this in mind that all water and sewage systems are being inspected, even though the Department knows that a number are well above the Public Health Service standards.

"I know that a number of farms have already been certified and that a number of farmers have made the necessary corrections but have not sent their cards in. I also know that a number of cards have been mislaid, since I have been asked for

replacements.

"I do not believe that any appreciable number of permits will be lifted after the January 25 deadline. However, I want to emphasize that we are doing everything in our power to get the word to the farmer that the Health Department means business, and anyone who has not complied by the deadline on the individual card is out of business as far as the Baltimore market is concerned."

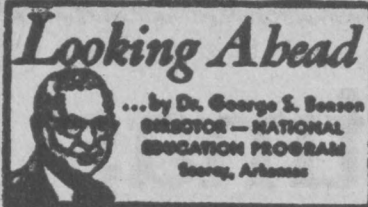

Wherewith shall we be clothed? But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

Among the last words of Christ were these: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Many who picked up this burning torch suffered martyrdom as they preached and taught and believed in the worth and dignity of the human soul and of the primacy of the living God. Of the 2½ billion people on earth in 1958, one third by then counted themselves within the Christian faith.

The Evil
Just a hundred years ago there arose on the world scene the most notorious anti-Christ in history—Karl Marx, author of the Communist Manifesto. He propounded a philosophy directly opposite to that of Christianity. He said there was no God, nor Christ, no Spirit or human soul, no ethics. He proposed to rebuild the world, establishing a "workers' dictatorship" and making atheism its enforced religion. The first task, Marx said, was the total destruction of the present society—its traditions, its ideals, its institutions.

The early disciples of Marx suffered martyrdom for Communism. Their zeal matched that of the early Christians. Communists have been far more zealous in their cause than have latter day Christians. In 50 years they have brought under the power of the Communist dictatorship a

hundred million more people than Christianity has attracted in 2,000 years. Nearly a billion people now live within the Iron Curtained world of Communism. And since the Christmas season one year ago, this evil force has achieved shocking new victories over Christendom, or "the free world."

Our Failure
Where, why, how, have we Christians failed? We haven't had the zeal of the Communists. We haven't been as willing to make sacrifices. We simply haven't matched their dedication. We haven't passed on to a new generation of citizens adequate understanding and proper respect and gratitude for the American heritage. We have not understood the nature of Communism. We have steadfastly refused to accept the facts of its menacing growth.

We can no longer live like we've been living. Either we begin to pay for freedom; either we become worthy of God's great blessings to the fortunate people living under freedom—or we lose it all. One of the highest authorities in America on the scope and growth of world-wide Communism is Richard Arens, director of the House Un-American Activities Investigating Committee. This is what I heard him say just recently:

Plain Facts
"The plain fact is that of the 86 nations in the world today, only one stands in the way of world domination of this force. That nation is the United States of America. And the

Soviet Union and its satellites are and have been at war with the United States. It is a war which has already cost our treasury billions of dollars. It is a war which has cost us already the blood of our youth. It is a total war, a political war, an economic war, a psychological war, a diplomatic war and a global war. It is a war which I cannot in candor characterize in any other way, and maintain my self-respect, except to say that it is a war which we are losing both internationally and domestically at an alarming rate.

Since last Christmas, Communism has managed to at least neutralize if not actually place in the Communist camp a large part of the Middle East; has

made strategic gains in South America, the East Indies, in many areas of Asia, in Scandinavia—and in America. In America, the structure of internal security erected to control Communist subversion has been all but wiped out by Supreme Court decisions. A high Communist leader in America has called this one of "the greatest victories" for Communism.

Will we wake up and act in time? Will we make ourselves worthy, in God's judgment, to be free? Let us dedicate ourselves to this challenging responsibility.

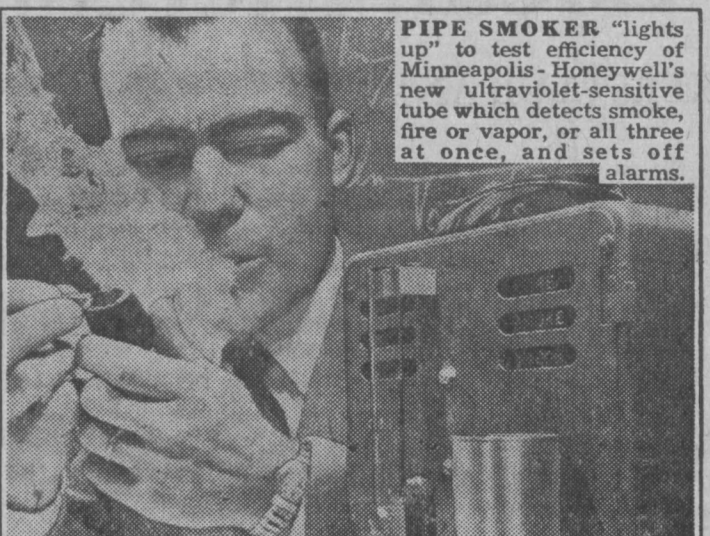

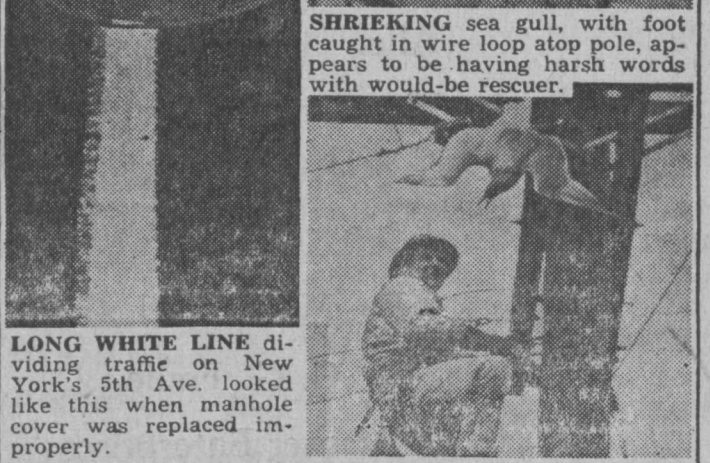

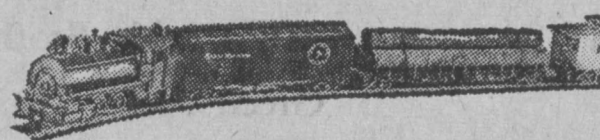

SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

Here's a remark you used to hear often around fishing resorts and boat docks: "And I was caught out after dark..." It isn't said much any more, states Willard Crandall, Boating Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. Now sportsmen stay out or go out after dark on purpose. Modern equipment is making it safe, sensible and practical in an increasing number of cases.

Adequate lights are easily installed in conjunction with generator-fitted electric-starting outboards. There's a stream of electric juice, just like an inboard. Or, for any boat, easy-to-install lights that meet all requirements of law are obtainable, powered by self-contained dry batteries.

Going slow is the key to damage-free night boating. Familiar waters or not, underwater obstructions usually can't be detected at night until it's too late. Floating objects may also go unnoticed. And the boat's exact location, in relation to known channel edges, never seems as certain as in daytime. But, when the boat is moving slowly, a "collision" with even a rock will probably result only in a scratched hull, and there's little possibility of grounding the boat.

Don't worry if shore lines seem reversed or misshaped on your first night run over well-known territory, it's a natural feeling. You'll quickly get adjusted, however. If your boat doesn't have a searchlight, take along a good, strong electric spotlight or flashlight. The latter should be four cells, or up. It's a wonder what this "light on the subject" will do while you're learning night driving. Remember, the lights required by law are to enable other boats to see you. A swinging searchlight, and the like, you use to spot driftwood, navigational obstructions, landmarks and boats. It is not to be used continually, except in difficult situations. The experienced pilot

wants no light shining in his face, or reflecting into his eyes from the water, during night cruising. That way, the pupils of his eyes open the widest, permitting him the best vision. 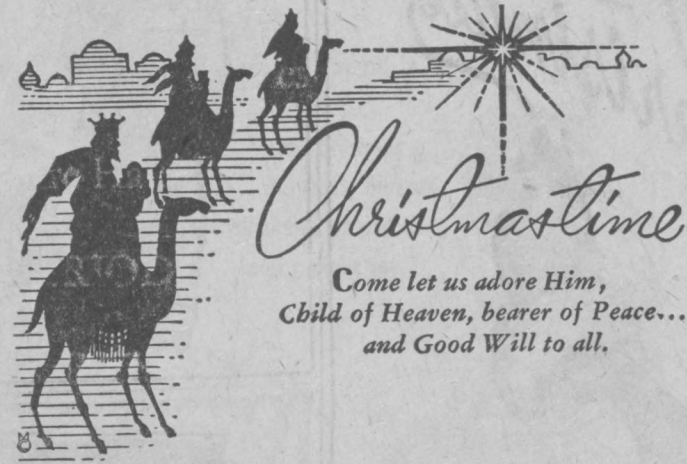

Jim Phelan's faith in starting him for the first time this season by coming through in a big way as the team scored a decisive 82-73 victory over Hofstra College Friday.

The rugged 6-4 freshman from Roselle Park, N. J., came through with 14 points on three for five from the floor and eight for nine from the free throw line. In addition he grabbed five rebounds.

Burt Sheing, Mount veteran, was the hero of the late drive, scoring 10 of the final points for Jim Phelan's dribblers. Four of his points came on successive free throws in the last 36 seconds of play.

The game was close throughout although the Mount led most of the way. Superb foul shooting by the Mount was a big factor in the victory. They landed 26 of 31 free tosses. Fine work off the boards by Jerry Bohlinger and Barry was another key factor.

Sheing regained his shooting eye and dropped in 22 points while Ernie Cage, the smooth freshman, followed with 16.

The Mountaineers will be idle until Wednesday, January 7, when they play at Roanoke in a Mason-Dixon Conference game.

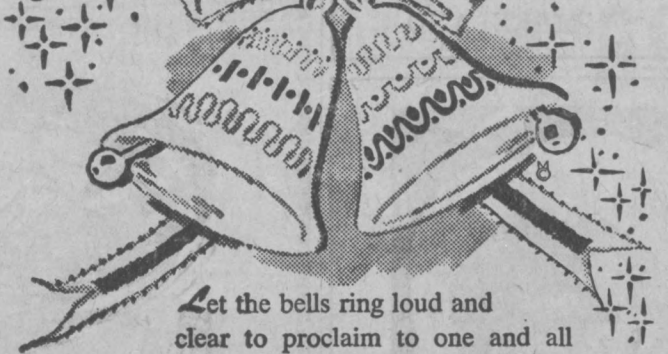

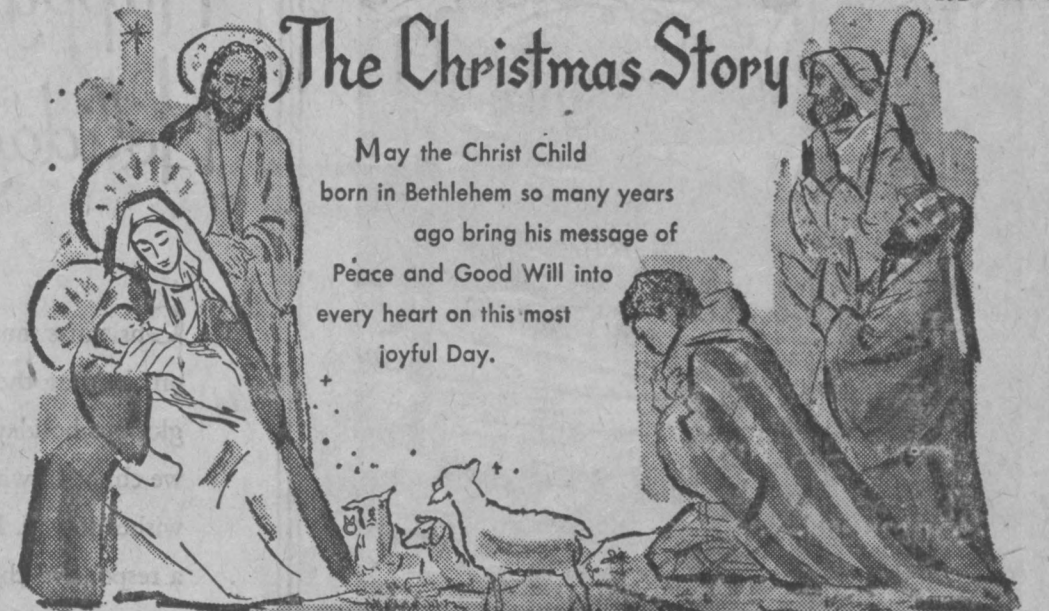

Topper Will Is Probated; Nephews Share

A number of bequests are made by the will of Maurice A. Topper, of Emmitsburg, who died recently. No valuation of the estate was given. A nephew, Jacob E. Baker, who the testator said had stayed with him for many years, is left the farm known as the Jacob I. Topper farm, which was purchased from William E. Troxell. Mr. Topper made these bequests with the understanding that if there was insufficient money in

the estate to meet them in full, each would be reduced proportionately. St. Euphemia's School, Emmitsburg, \$250; to be used to purchase books for needy parochial school children; St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Emmitsburg, \$250; Society of the Propagation of the Faith, \$1000; St. Joseph's Church for masses, \$100; St. Joseph's Church for Jacob I. Topper family, \$100; National Shrine of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Washington,

\$100; Roy E. Baker, nephew, \$500. Each of the nieces and nephews except those mentioned in other parts of the will and also excepting Donald Topper and Frank J. Baker who the testator said were remembered with a jointly-held bond, is left \$10. The executor is directed to sell all securities and personal property to pay the legacies. The testator said personal property on the farm had been purchased by Jacob E. Baker or given to him prior to the execution of the will. Any residue is bequeathed to a

niece, Caroline R. Baker, and nephews, Roy E. and Jacob E. Baker in equal shares. The testator requests that Jacob Baker, provide his sister, Caroline, with a home on the farm so long as she shall own it. Jacob Baker is named executor with commission allowance of 10 per cent. The will is dated August 21, 1951.
