College Launches \$10 Million Drive

The Emmitsburg chapter of St. Joseph College Alumnae Association held its development campaign kick-off meeting on Sunday at Dubois Hall on the campus. Sister Denise Eby, D.C., chairman of the Dept. of Science and Mathematics addressed the group of alumnae volunteers spearheading the drive in the surrounding counties. St. Joseph's Development Program, approved by the Board of Trustees and Board of Lay Advisors in 1963, aims to raise \$12 million in the next 10 years for campus expansion and academic development. The first phase of the campaign, scheduled to end in March 1966, will offer memorial opportunities to alumnae, parents, friends, and select corporate groups.

Sister Denise explained the college's multi-million dollar development program and its role in the projected growth and expansion of the Emmitsburg area. The Master Plan calls for the construction of several new buildings to accommodate an enrollment by 1975 of 1,000 students, double the present student cen-

sus. Kelley Hall, a priority project, was opened in 1964 as a residence for 150 students. The basic science building is nearing completion and occupancy is expected by next semester. A library to replace the present century-old, over-crowded facility is presently under consideration. The Master Plan also includes additional residence halls, a liberal arts building, student union and dining hall, and an enlarged physical education center. The college also seeks funds to strengthen its plans for faculty development, expansion of academic programs, and increased student aid.

Mrs. Thomas Arcidiacono, '45, of Hagerstown, the Emmitsburg chapter campaign chairman, presided at the meeting and introduced the area's campaign leaders. Miss Anne M. Rogers, '25, Frederick, and Mrs. John L. Cunningham, Emmitsburg, will assist Mrs. Arcidiacono as co-chairmen. Alumnae volunteers include, for the Emmitsburg area, Miss Julia H. Court Rules For Thurmont School

Unless the Town of Emmitsburg appeals a ruling by the Frederick County Circuit Court delivered this week, work will commence immediately on a new consolidated school in Thurmont which would accommodate students from Emmitsburg and Thurmont.

The Circuit Court ruled in favor of the Frederick County School Board against a court injunction filed by citizens of Emmitsburg and the Town Council, despite the wishes of a majority of citizens of both the towns to locate the school half way between the two communities. Unless the Town of Emmitsburg goes to the State Appellate Court in Annapolis, the issue will be dead.

Circuit Judges Patrick M. Schnauffer and Ralph G. Shure have ruled against the protesting group, which had filed suit against the county school board and the county commissioners in an attempt to stop the work.

Dr. John L. Carnochan, superintendent of schools, said he has ordered the school architects, Burket, Tilghman, and Nelson, Silver Spring, to proceed immediately with the plans for the \$2 million school.

The Emmitsburg group has admitted the consolidated school is needed but objected to the site chosen in Thurmont. They felt the school should be built half-way between the two north county towns.

Samuel W. Barrick, county attorney, and Charles U. Price, attorney for the school board, filed demurrers with the court, claiming the county commissioners are not allowed by law to select school sites and that no factual evidence of "unreasonable and arbitrary conduct" by the school board was presented in the suit.

The judges said in sustaining the demurrers:

"The bill of complaint says that for several years the Frederick County School Board felt it would be advantageous to construct a consolidated high school for Emmitsburg and Thurmont and approved the land known as the Jamison-Wivell property for the school."

"The County Commissioner asked the board to renegotiate the purchase price of this land, saying they considered the price was excessive, but instead the Board of Education decided to purchase the Staub site which was approved by the County Commissioners."

VOTER REGISTRATION HERE SATURDAY

The Frederick County Board of Election Supervisors has authorized the first county-wide voter registration in this area in three years beginning Oct. 30.

The registration is in keeping with two bills passed at the last session of the Maryland Legislature, Senator John A. Derr and Delegate Charles E. Collins sponsored the bills.

The law provides for this registration in addition to the regular registration hours at the board of election supervisors' office in Winchester Hall, Frederick, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

James F. Messersmith, Republican registrar for the county, said the Oct. 30 registration will be for those persons in the Emmitsburg, Creagerstown, Havers and Thurmont election districts.

Quinn F. Topper Vice President Of Frederick Bank

Announcement has been made by the Farmers & Mechanics National Bank, Frederick, that Quinn F. Topper has been elected a vice president of that banking establishment, replacing the late George L. Wilhide, on the board.

Mr. Topper is chairman of the Advisory Board of the Farmers State Bank Branch Office in Emmitsburg and has served as a director with this bank since 1932, making him the oldest member of the board in length of service. Topper, in addition to his banking interests, is interested in civic affairs and is a member of the Town Council. Topper's appointment was announced by the bank's president, Benjamin F. Shuff, of Frederick.

"An appeal was noted to the State Board of Education but they at first refused to consider the case," the court says.

The court heard the complaint on April 9 and agreed that the State Board of Education had merely passed an order on the appeal of the case saying that no issue had been presented and that the complainants had a right to have their case presented to the state board.

The State Board of Education met on May 26 and decided that "the action of the Frederick County Board of Education concerning the consolidation of the Thurmont and Emmitsburg high schools and in the selection of a site for this consolidated school had been correct."

The court noted in its decision that all parties to the case had stipulated that the decision of the State Board of Education should be considered a part of the court record in this case.

The Judges noted the state law provides that county school boards "shall have the power to divide counties into school districts, with the approval of the state superintendent of schools, shall have the power to purchase grounds, school sites and buildings and to sell them and to rent, repair, improve and construct all school buildings."

Therefore, they decided that the Frederick County Board of Education acted according to the state law in this case and added, "There is no evidence in the bill of complaint that they acted illegally, arbitrarily or in a discriminatory manner," and "in the absence of this evidence the court is bound to presume that the board performed its duties in a lawful manner."

"Since the matter was appealed to the State Board of Education and the parties stipulated that the court may consider its decision," the court also explains, "The intent of the state law that the State Board of Education shall decide all controversies and that its decisions shall be final, unless it exercises this discretion with a fraudulent or corrupt intent or abuses a breach of trust."

"That is certainly not the situation in the present case and therefore the court is of the opinion that the Frederick County Board of Education acted according to its statutory powers and that the State Board of Education acted in the same manner in the appeal of this case," Judges Schnauffer and Shure said.

Registration will be held at the Fire Hall in Emmitsburg from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Oct. 30. Registration will be held at the same times Nov. 6 at the Thurmont Fire Hall.

The county-wide registration will continue Nov. 13 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Woodsboro Fire Hall for persons residing in the Woodsboro, Creagerstown and Johnsville election districts.

These are the only districts scheduled at this time, Messersmith said, because the holiday season will soon follow. Eventually, he said, all of this county's 26 election districts will be covered.

Persons eligible to register to vote are those residents of Frederick County who are 21 years or older, and those people who are 20 years of age, but who will be 21 before Nov. 8, 1966.

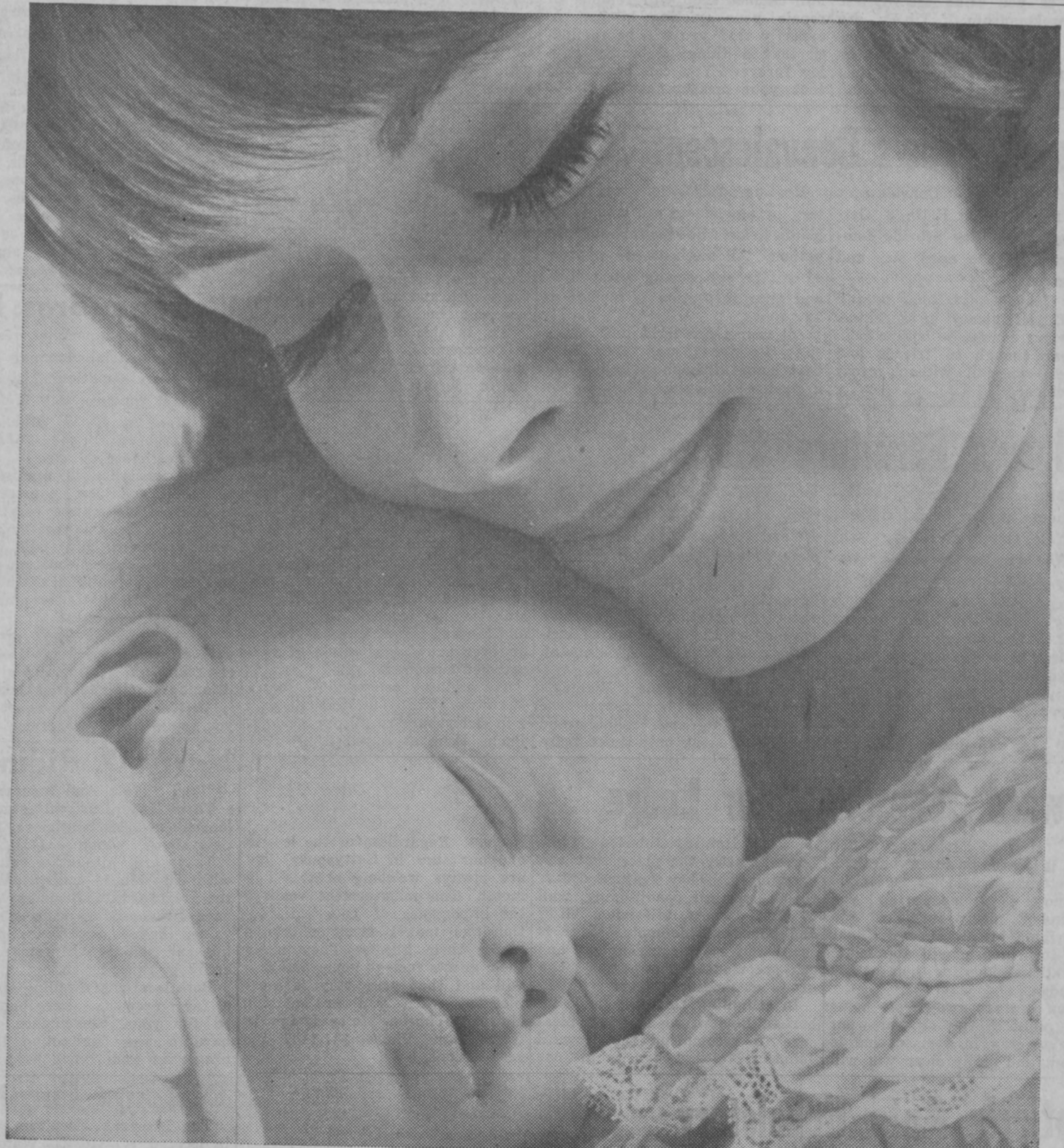

SEAT BELTS ARE LIFE SAVERS

Seven persons were killed and twenty-one were seriously injured in highway accidents investigated by the State Police last week. None of those killed or injured was using a seat belt although they were available in six cases. Investigators are of the opinion that four lives would have been saved and fifteen serious injuries lessened had those involved in the accidents been wearing seat belts.

"The continued reluctance of many motorists to equip their cars with seat belts is very discouraging," commented Colonel Carey Jarman, Superintendent of the State Police, "but it is even more difficult to understand why readily available seat belts so often are not used.

"The fact that seat belts do save lives and reduce serious injury is proved repeatedly day in and day out. All motorists would do well to take full advantage of this inexpensive, easily used safety device."

A total of twenty persons were killed on Maryland highways last week according to the weekly survey of the State Police. Seven of those killed were drivers; eight were passengers; and five were pedestrians. Alcohol was a contributing factor in five of the deaths; speed in ten; and "driver error" was present in all but two of the fatalities.

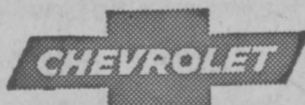
