Highly abnormal weather existed here this week and damage to fruit trees and other early crops is expected to be extremely heavy in this area. As a matter of fact weather records were broken here two straight days as the mercury dipped into the low thirties and freezing was reported in several instances. In other areas throughout the country, except in the South, severe damage to gardens and fruit trees was reported as the mercury dropped into the 20's and it will no doubt destroy untold number of tons of fruits and vegetables. This abnormal weather undoubtedly will result in even higher costs of these fruits and vegetables this year.

Integration in the South is by no means solved as was indicated last week when Alabama put a Charlie McCarthy lady into the Democratic driver's seat for Governor. Mrs. Wallace will take over from her husband, the present Governor who was ineligible for re-election but who in all probability will act as Governor if his wife is elected and the chances are excellent she will be victorious. Analysts say the "white" vote put her election over. This is indicative that integration of the two races there is far from a solution.

Baltimore appears slated for a rough time this year as racial factions plan numerous major demonstrations in that city. National figures have indicated they will be on the scene guiding the demonstrations. Let us hope they can remain peaceful but these things sometimes become very serious and get out of hand. We have read of these demonstrations in other major cities and far off places but the thought of having one right in our home state, just 50 miles away, gives one real food for thought. We are not opposed to peaceful demonstrations but we'll breathe a sigh of relief when Baltimore sees the end of



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


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Our Draft Policy Is Sound

The great strength of the American system of government is its dependence not upon men but upon law. The so-called "civil disobedience" against the Selective Service (draft) law is as challenging to the American system as any other kind of insurrection. Young men who burn their draft cards are defying the authority of law. Some claim their defiance is not a rebellion against the authority of law but against the U. S. war

policy in Viet Nam. Their actions are none the less damaging.

They have a right to protest

but not to defy the law. And the right to protest carries with it the responsibility of patriotism, loyalty to country. There are some young people (and adults) among the protesters who do not appear to be sincerely motivated and who do appear to be acting in concert with the enemy in Viet Nam, the Communists. They have led sincere young people to join them in demonstrations which have "given comfort" to the Communist enemy; and, even more farreaching, have contributed to the creation in our nation of disrespect for the rule of law. **Duped By Agitators**

The misinformed and uninformed youth of America who are led by agitators toward cultivating disrespect for law have not been adequately educated or trained in their homes and schools. Since most of the antidraft demonstrators are of college age, and most of the demonstrations originate on college campuses, a heavy responsibility is placed on college presidents and faculties as well as on par-

The most recent agitation has been against draft policies which give at least temporary exemption to college students who rank high in scholarship. This is a sound policy, advantageous on the whole to the entire nation, and it should be supported publicly by college authorities. Wherever it is not supported, the draft card burners and allied demonstrators are being aided by the atmosphere thus created

on the campuses. Old Policy Shortsighted

Intelligent improvements have been made in the draft policies since World War II. I was president of Harding College thruout the war. As manpower became a larger and larger requirement of the armed services, the draft law was applied more strictly. Sometimes I saw young men drafted who were pre-med students or highly skilled in chemistry, electronics, or in some other field-men in training for the very skills which the army needed most.

Frequently such men being drafted into fighting ranks were timid and not good soldier material. Had they been permitted to complete their specialized training in college, they would have contributed far more to the armed services, and later, helped to fill the nation's expanding need for additional doctors, technicians and professional people. Need For Higher Skills Expanding

Now, 20 years later, it requires far greater and more widespread skills to support the front-line fighting forces-with modern logistics, supplies, mobile first-aid, medical services, intelligence, and so forth. In attempting to permit young men making good grades to stay in college, it appears to me that General Lewis B. Hershey, draft director, and those working with him are simply adopting a program which will make the most valuable use of the men available. It should also be stimulating to students with good minds but who aren't putting forth their best efforts scholastically.

The college men who are making good grades and getting the necessary training to fill the more vital roles are the ones, good judgment decrees, who should remain in college-so long as draft requirements can be filled with those who have less chance of mastering the highly technical skills so much needed. This isn't an exercise in partiality. It simply is an exercise of good judgment in manpower allocation in a struggle to which we should be applying our greatest wisdom in an effort to win and to do the least damage to our country. It should have the support of the American people and particularly our college authorities.

Prepare Manual On Federal Aid

The Maryland State Planning Department has recently prepared a manual that describes more than two-hundred Federal aid programs which are available to State and ocal governments.

James J. O'Donnell, the State Planning Director, said that the manual was prepared as a guide to help towns and communities take advantage of the various Federal grants and loans. Federal aid has tripled during the past ten years, and the Bureau of Budget estimates that about \$13 pillion will be available to the states in 1966.

The manual contains programs on agriculture, natural resources, commerce and labor, transportation, housing and community development, disaster relief and national defense, and health, education and welfare. The purpose of

each program, the legal basis, the method of distribution, matching provisions and eligibility requirements are listed. Copies of the manual are now being distributed to agencies, towns, and county commissions throughout Maryland.

The manual has been prepared in loose-leaf form so that as new programs are enacted by Congress, they can be prepared in supplement form and the manual can be kept up to date. Mr. O'Donnell said that a member of the Planning Department staff, Mr. Dennis Alessi, is now working with Federal officials in connection with current legislation of the 89th Congress, and that this informa-tion will be made available as soon as possible.

Within the next few days the House of Representatives will be considering a bill which could cripple one of the nation's most vital industries, cause a substantial increase in the already zooming cost of living, and have a serious effect on the state of our native of the state tional defense and space efforts.

H.R. 10027, which its supporters like to call the "common situs" bill but which by any other name is a secondary boycott bill, appears headed for early action.

The bill, if passed, will permit unions involved in a dispute with a single contractor to shut down entire construction sites even though the other contractors working on the site, and there can be as many as a hundred on a large project, have nothing whatever to do with the dispute

In recent years the construction industry has been plagued by work stoppages, many of which have been caused by petty differ-ences between unions and contractors resulting in serious harm to the economy.

The construction industry employs more than 15% of the total American labor force and it accounts for more than 15% of the gross national product. Thus anything which has adverse effects upon this industry is bound to have adverse effects upon our national economy.

If the bill is passed, the new strike power it grants to the Building Trades Unions will most surely be used, thereby bringing about a massive increase in work stoppages.

Defense and public construction sites such as hospitals and schools will be the primary victim in this expected new wave of strikes.


If the American people will let their objections be made known to their Congressmen, there might still be a chance to prevent this very unwise piece of special interest legislation from becoming the law of the land.

Babson's Point Of View On: 'Moonlighting" In The Job Picture

BABSON PARK, Mass., May 12-According to government figures for the most recent years of record, some 5.2% of all employed workers have been holding more



This is known in labor circles as "moonlighting", a word that may per-

haps still hold unpleasant implications such as taking jobs on the sly at sub-union rates, robbing the needy jobless of a chance to work.

Moonlighting Now More Respectable

Today, however, multiple jobholding seems often more a necessity than a sign of greed. Almost half of the moonlighters are family men between the ages of 25 and 44 in need of additional income to raise their living standards. There are clear indications that the typical moonlighter either does not make enough money at his regular employment to take care of his family as he wishes, or

else he has only a part-time job as his chief source of income. An extra position is sometimes

the only way out. There is another interesting angle that shows up in the government figures. Very few of the dual jobholders do their moonlighting in their base - job field. They are much more likely to reach for a part-time berth, say, in the services, retail trade, or agriculture. Few employed in manufacturing seem interested in the same line. In some instances, young men use their moonlighting experience to learn a new trade, - one that they intend to make their regular career when they are ready for it. Where Dual Jobs

Are Most Common About 8% of agricultural workers hold extra jobs, compared with only 5% of the labor force in other pursuits. The high rate of moonlighting in the farm areas is due in large measure to the seasonal aspect of most of the occupations. The same thing applies in the construction industry, where pay rates may be high but projects often last for irregular periods.

On the nonagricultural side, the greatest rate of multiple job-holding occurs in public administration, with special emphasis on the post office department. Education services and transportation are also high on the list. It is, of course, easy to see why teachers frequently seek outside employment. Not only do they have considerable spans of vacation time, but in many localities annual salaries in education are well below those in other lines.

Women Low On Two-Time List

Almost six times as many men go in for moonlighting as women. This is not surprising in view of the fact that most housewives have their homes and children to care for, and many husbands would prefer that their wives not take any outside work at all,-let alone two separate jobs. Actually, a busy wife and mother might be said to be moonlighting if she takes even one part-time job outside the home, since she already has a

full-time housekeeping stint.

Where multiple jobholding shows up most commonly among women is in the case of widows, divorcees, and those separated from their husbands. Just about one-third of all female moonlighters are in these categories. This is natural, since they have often had to assume the type of responsibility that usually falls to the husband. Household bills must be paid, children must be reared and educated. It should be noted, too, that about 50% of all women holding more than one job work only part of the time on each.

Higher Living Costs Mean More Moonlighting

It is our opinion that there is probably considerably more dual jobholding than appears in the government tables. The steady climb in consumer prices has undoubtedly caused a lot of people to latch on to outside work that would be difficult to catch in a survey sampling. With creeping price inflation showing no signs of slowing down and with taxes also looking upward, living standards for many families will be less easy to maintain. More multiple jobholding is almost inevitable. And it may well spread to groups who have never before engaged in moonlighting on any regular scale.




