Highly abnormal weather existed here this week and damage to fruit trees and other early crops is expected to be extremely heavy in this area. As a matter of fact weather records were broken here two straight days as the mercury dipped into the low thirties and freezing was reported in several instances. In other areas throughout the country, except in the South, severe damage to gardens and fruit trees was reported as the mercury dropped into the 20's and it will no doubt destroy untold number of tons of fruits and vegetables. This abnormal weather undoubtedly will result in even higher costs of these fruits and vegetables this year.

Integration in the South is by no means solved as was indicated last week when Alabama put a Charlie McCarthy lady into the Democratic driver's seat for Governor. We are not opposed to peaceful demonstrations but we'll breathe a sigh of relief when Baltimore sees the end of them.

Bernard S. Kaliss New Prexy Of Profs. Assn.



Bernard S. Kaliss, M.A., assistant professor of English and Journalism at Mount Saint Mary's College, has been elected to the presidency of the college's chapter of the American Association of University Professors. Kaliss, who is a charter member of the chapter, previously held the post for several years at its inception.

Kaliss, a native of Waterbury, Conn., is an honor graduate, summa cum laude, of the Mount class of 1951 and of Fordham University where he received his master's degree in 1955. He is currently a candidate for the doctorate at New York University.

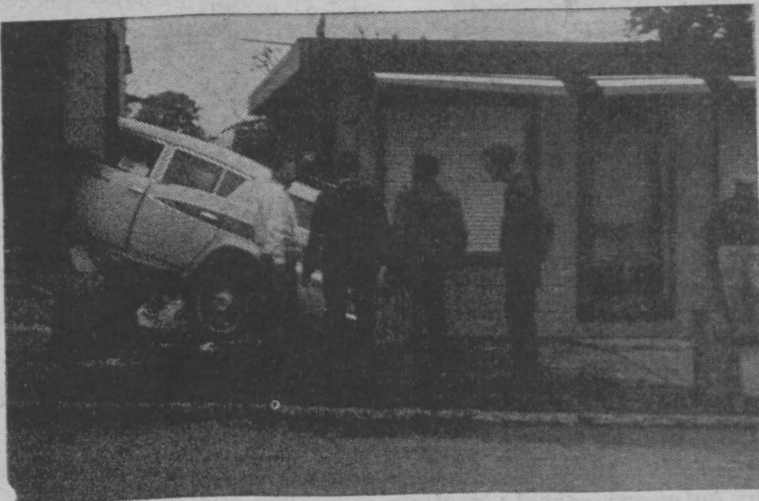

Kaliss is also the college's representative to the Fulbright Committee for the State of Maryland and international moderator for Catholic colleges and universities of Lambda Iota Tau.

Other officers elected were: vice president, John W. Richards, Ph.D., professor of physics and chairman of the science department; secretary and editor of the chapter's periodical, "Colloquia," J. D. Broussard, Ph.D., assistant professor of philosophy and chairman of that department; and treasurer, George E. Winnes, M.A., instructor in philosophy.

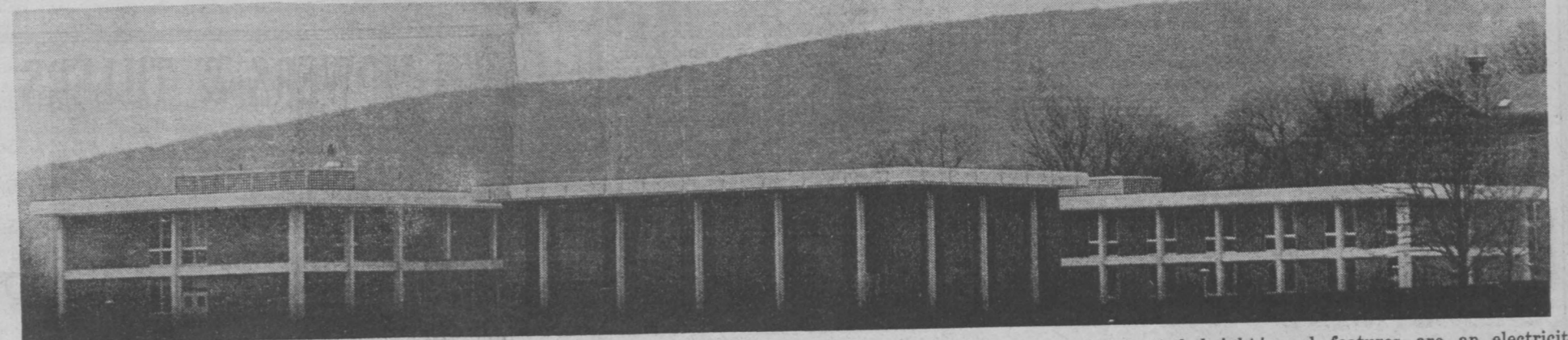
Unwelcome Visitor!

Saint Joseph College To Dedicate Science Building Sunday



On Sunday, May 15, St. Joseph College will hold the formal dedication of the recently completed basic science building, the Dodd Science Center. Lawrence Cardinal Shehan, Archbishop of Baltimore, will preside at the dedicatory convocation beginning at 3 p.m. in DePaul Auditorium on campus.

Dr. Heinz Specht, Chief of the Office of International Research, National Institute of Health, will deliver the main address. Master of ceremonies for the afternoon's events will be Dr. Vernon Bavrina, Associate Superintendent of the Baltimore City Public Schools, and a member of the college's Board of Lay Advisors.

Following the program in DePaul Auditorium, Cardinal Shehan will officiate at the blessing and

placing of the cornerstone at the building site, and afterward bless the interior of the building. The program concludes with Open House and tours of the new facility.

Sister Rosemary Pfaff, D.C., college president, in announcing the formal opening said, "Our new science building has been named the Dodd Science Center in memory of the Very Rev. Francis J. Dodd, C.M., president of St. Joseph College from 1944 to 1953. Imbued with the spirit of our founder, Blessed Elizabeth Ann Seton, Fr. Dodd's administration reflected his concern for the growth and prosperity of the academic community, and marked a new era of faculty and student benefits. The science center was

a priority project of the plans for future campus expansion initiated by Fr. Dodd."

Located at the southeast section of the campus on former farm land, the 3-winged structure was erected at a cost of \$1,900,000. A priority project of the college's 10 year Master Plan, it houses the departments of chemistry, biology, physics, mathematics, and nursing. The 3-level building follows the contemporary trend in architectural honesty, revealing its concrete supporting frame and using it as contrast to the red-brick exterior surfaces. Although modern in concept, the building carries out the feeling of the St. Joseph campus through the use of brick, the principal building material. The lecture hall wing ex-

presses an uninterrupted height equivalent to the main structure. Its interior combines an epoxy terrazzo floor with colorful seats and harmonizing lighting and ceiling structure patterns. It has a seating capacity of 252, and is equipped for audio-visual presentations and future closed-circuit TV.

Within the science building, interior finishes are applied directly to the masonry, thus eliminating almost all plaster. Another feature, is the use of wood laboratory equipment, visually warmer than metal and well-coordinated in finish and design.

All classrooms, laboratories, seminar rooms, and offices are air-conditioned and equipped with individual temperature controls. Un-

usual features are an electricity laboratory, two optics labs, and two isotope labs. Provisions have been made to render the building adaptable for extension and additions if future needs demand.

Designed by Faulkner, Kingsbury & Stenhouse, Washington, D. C. architects, and built by the Consolidated Engineering Co. of Baltimore, the Dodd Science Center was begun in January 1965, and opened for classes in January 1966.

The public is invited to tour the science center from 4 to 6 p.m. on Sunday, May 15. Also on display in the main lobby at that time will be a "Self Portrait" by General Dwight Eisenhower which will be formally presented and unveiled by Mrs. Eisenhower earlier in the day.

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WOMEN'S HEALTH

Excessive Height
Readily Controlled
Many a young girl's dream of

becoming a long-stemmed American beauty has turned into a nightmare when she found herself growing too tall, towering above boys and girls her own age. Averting this heartbreak is now possible, according to Dr. Robert

B. Greenblatt, chairman of the department of endocrinology at the Medical College of Georgia. Dr. Greenblatt told physicians attending a recent medical symposium on the adolescent girl that over a five-year period he had successfully slowed the growth of 40 young girls who showed unmistakable signs that they would be unusually tall women unless steps were taken. For an average of about two years the physician treated the girls with various hormones, keeping the youngsters under close observation during that entire period. The therapy hastened the closure of the growing ends of the bones, thus slowing their growth.

Such treatment is best begun, the doctor noted, when girls of only 11 and 12 have already reached a height of 5 feet 5 or more and have one parent who is 6 feet tall. One X-ray will show whether growth will continue or whether it is substantially over. Of course, this treatment may not be suitable for all girls, and may not be effective for some.

lion bagging 19 million doves annually. It was also computed that it takes an average of five shots for a good man with a gun to down one dove, and often twice that many for the ordinary shotgunner.

The dove is not only first on the shooter's list, but first in many ways. "He's the most deceptive bird that flies," asserts Jack Denton Scott, Roving Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. Having the greatest range of any game bird, the dove is the only one to breed in all our 48 adjacent states.

NOTE: Naturally, many underweight as well as overweight women experience normal pregnancies and childbirth.

Lead is the important element in dove shooting. Those slender streaks are traveling faster than most realize, and they dart and swerve, like a broken-field runner in football. A natural swing with them, leading by a gun length and following through, will often get a bird. But not always.

Pairs of "meek" little mourning doves have been known to drive away blue jays and robins, sparrows and grackles so that the female can lay her eggs in their nests. They are also persistent; if a nest is destroyed, or squirrels or coons get their eggs, they will immediately build or confiscate another nest and start all over again. Some normally brood five times a year and, when they run into tough luck, twice that often.

Pap Smear Essential For Women In Twenties
Since the sooner cervical cancer is detected the greater the chance it can be treated successfully, three University of Miami School of Medicine physicians recommend that "Pap" smears be made part of the regular check-up of women in their twenties, as well as in older women.

Dr. Dennis Cavanagh and associates reported in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association that almost 30 per cent of young women in their twenties whose Pap smears indicated abnormality proved to have cancer of the cervix. The doctors wrote that the truer incidence was probably closer to 40 per cent since many women with suspicious smears failed to return for additional checking.

Every year about 14,000 women die of this form of cancer. Yet such deaths could be reduced drastically, according to the American Cancer Society, by widespread use of the Pap test for early detection.

Underweight Complicates Pregnancy And Delivery

Many women know that being grossly overweight can complicate pregnancy and childbirth. But not so many are aware that being seriously underweight can also bring complications. A woman who is 20 to 40 per cent underweight for her age and height before becoming pregnant is more likely to experience pregnancy and delivery complications than women of normal weight, Drs. Faxwell Schram and Mansour Raji reported in a recent issue of the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology. The physicians are affiliated with Coney Island Hospital.

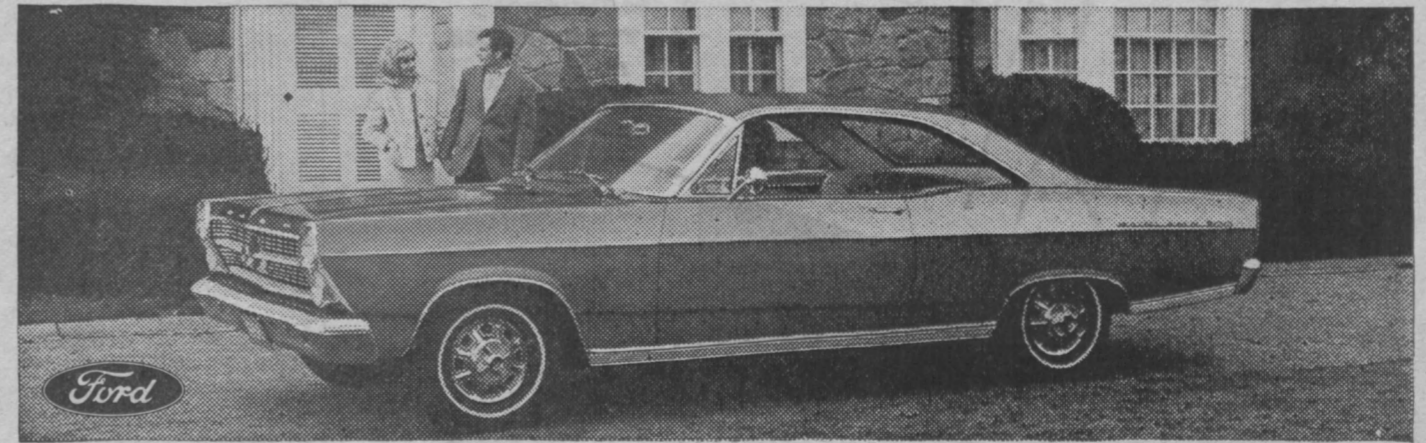

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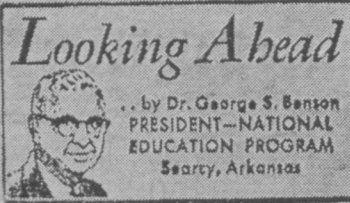
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Our Draft Policy Is Sound
The great strength of the American system of government is its dependence not upon men but upon law. The so-called "civil disobedience" against the Selective Service (draft) law is as challenging to the American system as any other kind of insurrection. Young men who burn their draft cards are defying the authority of law. Some claim their defiance is not a rebellion against the authority of law but against the U. S. war

policy in Viet Nam. Their actions are none the less damaging. They have a right to protest but not to defy the law. And the right to protest carries with it the responsibility of patriotism, loyalty to country. There are some young people (and adults) among the protesters who do not appear to be sincerely motivated and who do appear to be acting in concert with the enemy in Viet Nam, the Communists. They have led sincere young people to join them in demonstrations which have "given comfort" to the Communist enemy; and, even more far-reaching, have contributed to the creation in our nation of disrespect for the rule of law.
Duped By Agitators
The misinformed and uninformed youth of America who

are led by agitators toward cultivating disrespect for law have not been adequately educated or trained in their homes and schools. Since most of the anti-draft demonstrators are of college age, and most of the demonstrations originate on college campuses, a heavy responsibility is placed on college presidents and faculties as well as on parents. The most recent agitation has been against draft policies which give at least temporary exemption to college students who rank high in scholarship. This is a sound policy, advantageous to the whole to the entire nation, and it should be supported publicly by college authorities. Wherever it is not supported, the draft card burners and allied demonstrators are being aided by the atmosphere thus created

on the campuses.
Old Policy Shortighted
Intelligent improvements have been made in the draft policies since World War II. I was president of Harding College throughout the war. As manpower became a larger and larger requirement of the armed services, the draft law was applied more strictly. Sometimes I saw young men drafted who were pre-med students or highly skilled in chemistry, electronics, or in some other field—men in training for the very skills which the army needed most. Frequently such men being drafted into fighting ranks were timid and not good soldier material. Had they been permitted to complete their specialized training in college, they would have contributed far more to the armed services, and later, helped to fill the nation's expanding need for additional doctors, technicians and professional people.
Need For Higher Skills Expanding
Now, 20 years later, it requires far greater and more widespread skills to support the front-line fighting forces—with modern logistics, supplies, mobile first-aid, medical services, intelligence, and so forth. In attempting to permit young men making good grades to stay in college, it appears to me that General Lewis B. Hershey, draft director, and those working with him are simply adopting a program which will make the most valuable use of the men available. It should also be stimulating to students with good minds but who aren't putting forth their best efforts scholastically.

The college men who are making good grades and getting the necessary training to fill the more vital roles are the ones, good judgment decrees, who should remain in college—so long as draft requirements can be filled with those who have less chance of mastering the highly technical skills so much needed. This isn't an exercise in partiality. It simply is an exercise of good judgment in manpower allocation in a struggle to which we should be applying our greatest wisdom in an effort to win and to do the least damage to our country. It should have the support of the American people and particularly our college authorities.

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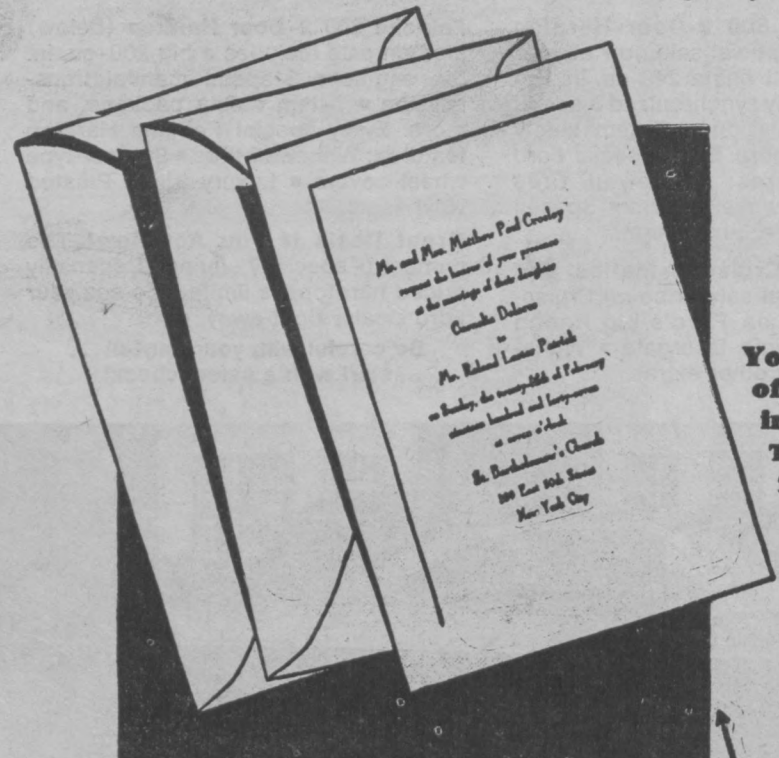

UP TO NO GOOD!
Within the next few days the House of Representatives will be considering a bill which could cripple one of the nation's most vital industries, cause a substantial increase in the already zooming cost of living, and have a serious effect on the state of our national defense and space efforts.
H.R. 10027, which its supporters like to call the "common situs" bill but which by any other name is a secondary boycott bill, appears headed for early action.
It is hard to understand why.
The bill, if passed, will permit unions involved in a dispute with a single contractor to shut down entire construction sites even though the other contractors working on the site, and there can be as many as a hundred on a large project, have nothing whatever to do with the dispute.
In recent years the construction industry has been plagued by work stoppages, many of which have been caused by petty differences between unions and contractors resulting in serious harm to the economy.
The construction industry employs more than 15% of the total American labor force and it accounts for more than 15% of the gross national product. Thus anything which has adverse effects upon this industry is bound to have adverse effects upon our national economy.
If the bill is passed, the new strike power it grants to the Building Trades Unions will most surely be used, thereby bringing about a massive increase in work stoppages.
Defense and public construction sites such as hospitals and schools will be the primary victim in this expected new wave of strikes.
If the American people will let their objections be made known to their Congressmen, there might still be a chance to prevent this very unwise piece of special interest legislation from becoming the law of the land.

Capsize

I get more and more letters about sod. Where can I get it? Is it hard to lay? How much does it cost? There's no doubt that this interest in buying "instant" lawn has increased tremendously just in the past two or three years.

The availability of sod varies a great deal. In places close to commercial sod farms it is sold by the yard at most garden centers and even by the big stores. Or you can call a nursery and have them deliver and install a whole lawn. In other parts of the country it may still be hard to come by. But the business is expanding rapidly.

Is sod easy to lay? Yes, you can easily carpet or repair a small

area yourself. Doing a whole lawn at once might well call for some assistance. Prices don't vary too much. But since you're making an investment that might last a lifetime, you should judge by the quality of the turf, not by the price.

Much in demand is the new Windsor sod, not only for its rich color but because of its resistance of heat and drought and disease. You can find out if it is available in your neighborhood by writing to Scotts in Marysville, Ohio. These are the people who develop-

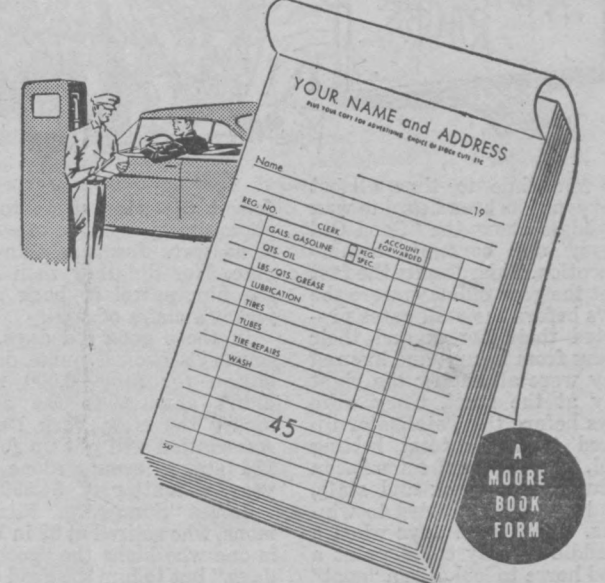

Good Old Days?

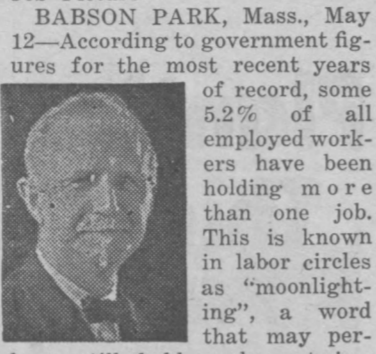

Babson's Point of View On: "Moonlighting" In The Job Picture



BABSON PARK, Mass., May 12—According to government figures for the most recent years of record, some 5.2% of all employed workers have been holding more than one job. This is known in labor circles as "moonlighting," a word that may per-

haps still hold unpleasant implications such as taking jobs on the sly at sub-union rates, robbing the needy jobless of a chance to work. Moonlighting Now More Respectable Today, however, multiple jobholding seems often more a necessity than a sign of greed. Almost half of the moonlighters are family men between the ages of 25 and 44 in need of additional income to raise their living standards. There are clear indications that the typical moonlighter either does not make enough money at his regular employment to take care of his family as he wishes, or

else he has only a part-time job as his chief source of income. An extra position is sometimes the only way out.

There is another interesting angle that shows up in the government figures. Very few of the dual jobholders do their moonlighting in their base-job field. They are much more likely to reach for a part-time berth, say, in the services, retail trade, or agriculture. Few employed in manufacturing seem interested in the same line. In some instances, young men use their moonlighting experience to learn a new trade,—one that they intend to make their regular career when they are ready for it.

Where Dual Jobs Are Most Common About 8% of agricultural workers hold extra jobs, compared with only 5% of the labor force in other pursuits. The high rate of moonlighting in the farm areas is due in large measure to the seasonal aspect of most of the occupations. The same thing applies in the construction industry, where pay rates may be high but projects often last for irregular periods.

On the nonagricultural side, the greatest rate of multiple jobholding occurs in public administration, with special emphasis on the post office department. Education services and transportation are also high on the list. It is, of course, easy to see why teachers frequently seek outside employment. Not only do they have considerable spans of vacation time, but in many localities annual salaries in education are well below those in other lines. **Women Low On Two-Time List**

Almost six times as many men go in for moonlighting as women. This is not surprising in view of the fact that most housewives have their homes and children to care for, and many husbands would prefer that their wives not take any outside work at all,—let alone two separate jobs. Actually, a busy wife and mother might be said to be moonlighting if she takes even one part-time job outside the home, since she already has a full-time housekeeping stint.

Where multiple jobholding shows up most commonly among women is in the case of widows, divorcees, and those separated from their husbands. Just about one-third of all female moonlighters are in these categories. This is natural, since they have often had to assume the type of responsibility that usually falls to the husband. Household bills must be paid, children must be reared and educated. It should be noted, too, that about 50% of all women holding more than one job work only part of the time on each.

Higher Living Costs Mean More Moonlighting

It is our opinion that there is probably considerably more dual jobholding than appears in the government tables. The steady climb in consumer prices has undoubtedly caused a lot of people to latch on to outside work that would be difficult to catch in a survey sampling. With creeping price inflation showing no signs of slowing down and with taxes also looking upward, living standards for many families will be less easy to maintain. More multiple jobholding is almost inevitable. And it may well spread to groups who have never before engaged in moonlighting on any regular scale.

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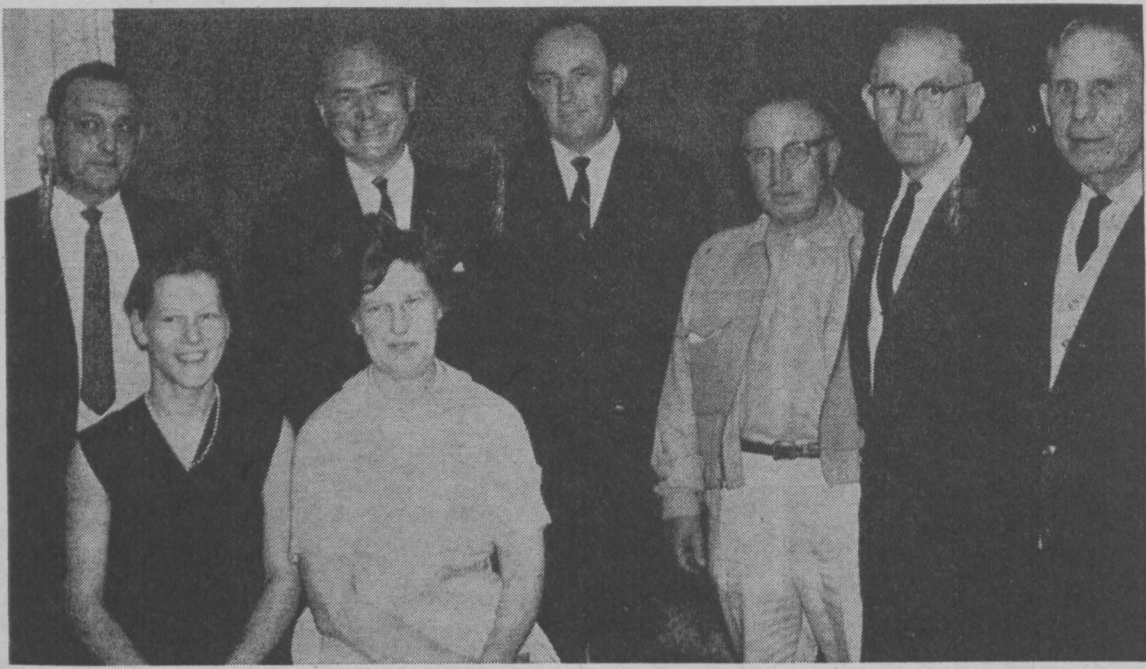
