## Most Anything At A Glance

Many of us are becoming increasingly alarmed at the number of people who would like to settle here finally going elsewhere to rent or build their homes. The situation is becoming acute and Emmitsburg seems to have a bottleneck. A quick survey will reveal that there is plenty of land here for building but that it is all "tied" up, mostly by "outsiders." Several years ago when the land grab began here it was the hope of all of us that now perhaps our time had come and that building projects would be started. Not so, it turned out, and it is now apparent that the ground was bought principally for speculation purposes, particularly should Mother Seton be canonized. The land still is idle and there is no sign of any activity in the offing. Rumors say owners are asking as high as \$3,000 per lot without water or sewerage. This, my friends, is what is holding Emmitsburg back at the present. It is ringed by large land-owners who apparently are sitting idly by waiting for the "kill". In the meantime it is known that people who were interested in building homes here have gone elsewhere and this sort of thing is doing our community harm. Actually people working right here in Emmitsburg can not purchase a lot in the corporate limits where water and sewerage are available. Find some way of prying lots from these owners and I am certain the Town will begin to grow.

The city election in Frederick this week is undoubtedly a repudiation and a reflection of the present administration of our three County Commissioners. One of the Commissioners decided to toss his hat in the ring. He was a registered Democrat and of course Frederick is predominantly Democratic. It looked like a sure thing until the votes were counted and he was whipped better than two-to-one. This action has to be a repudiation of the work our County Commissioners have done these past four years and I am certain that when the election comes this November there'll be new faces in the Commissioners' chairs. Taxpayers are tired of the extravagance of the super ultra elaborate schools the Commissioners have let the Board of Education construct. No one is opposed to meeting the county's school needs but these extravagant buildings are unnecessary. One Commissioner had the audacity to say that he'd vote for anything the Board of Education asked for. This is sheer nonsense and reflects upon the capability of this man. We believe in better schools, higher salaries for teachers and other benefit which complement a school system but this shameful waste and extravagance of the past four years must cease and the only way to do it is to replace those responsible for it. Come November I am certain the present administration of County Commissioners will feel the wrath of the voters and taxpayers, especially here in Emmitsburg where our school is being moved to another town, thanks to the present Board of County Commissioners. There are now a number of declared candidates for these jobs and the men are well-qualified, including our candidate from Emmitsburg. Let's give them a chance to show their capabilities.

Rumors persist that there will be another candidate for County office from Emmitsburg. The Town has been buzzing all week as to the identity of the office-seeker and in what office he is interested. Efforts to trace out the rumor have proven in vain however and aside from Mr. Flax's candidacy for County Commissioner and Pat McGucken's filing for a Congressional seat, we are at a loss to tell you who the individual is.

## Prof. Etchison To Give Art Lecture At College



W. Richard Etchison, Professor of the History of Art, Mt. St. Mary's College, will give the art lectures to forty members of the Institute in Asian history, this summer at Western Maryland College.

Members of the Institute are teachers from Maryland, the District of Columbia, and Pennsylvania.

Etchison will also give a course in the History of Far Eastern Art in the regular summer session at Western Maryland College.

In the summer of 1964 Etchison was awarded a Ford Foundation Fellowship to attend a Seminar on Southeast Asia held at the University of Michigan. Last summer he was nominated by the Executive Committee of the Six-College Faculty International Studies Program concentrating on China, held at Gettysburg College. The purpose of this program was to compile lecture outlines intended for instructors in a semester course on the significant ideas and institutions of China.

For 14 years Etchison taught English and Fine Arts at the Sidwell Friends School, Washington, D. C. Prior to joining the Mt. St. Mary's College faculty in 1960, Etchison was Chief Lecturer at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts in Richmond. Mr. Etchison is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Pearre Etchison, Frederick.

**Colleges To Appeal Court Decision**

The Maryland Board of Public Works this week, in an unusual step, authorized an appeal to the Supreme Court of a recent Maryland Court of Appeals ruling that state grants for construction of buildings at religious affiliated colleges are unconstitutional.

The state's highest court held illegal construction grants to St. Joseph's of Emmitsburg, Western Maryland and Notre Dame of Baltimore colleges while upholding another to Hood College which had also been challenged.

"It is a landmark decision and should go to the Supreme Court," Comptroller Louis L. Goldstein said.

Treasurer John A. Leukemeyer agreed, saying the ruling of the Court of Appeals could affect grants to every parochial college in the state.

The Board of Public Works, with Gov. Tawes concurring, moved to formally ask the attorney general to appeal. "Any expense will be justified," Goldstein said.

Atty. Gen. Thomas B. Finan already has said he would appeal.

**GOP Landslide For Frederick**

The Republican party, under the leadership of John A. Derr, captured the mayor's chair and three seats on the board of aldermen in the Frederick City election Tuesday.

Derr won the city's top executive post over his Democratic opponent, A. Irvin Renn, by more than two-to-one.

Winning seats on the board of aldermen were incumbents Emmert R. Bowlin and Richard L. Shipley, and a newcomer, Glenmore Rice.

Democrats won three of the seven positions, Louis E. Eichleberger was re-elected city treasurer, and Donald B. Rice and William H. Bartgis won seats on the board of aldermen.

Derr's victory was by a margin of 1,822 votes, the largest plurality ever piled up in a municipal election. Derr garnered 3,394 votes to 1,572 for Renn.

Jones, Catocin Mountain Park, Thurmont, has announced that beginning on June 18 and every Saturday thereafter until September 3, 1966, the Catocin Mountain Park Naturalists will be pleased to present a hiking program to anyone who may be interested. Park visitation has been increasing rapidly and the park is becoming one of the most popular areas in the State for hiking, fishing, picnicking, camping, and nature study. For this reason the park feels that a program of this type, conducting hikes along one of two of the trails and explaining some of the natural features of the park, will not only be an added attraction but a worthwhile venture for those local and traveling visitors who wish to learn about the natural beauty of this area.

Catocin Mountain Park was established in 1935 by the Federal Government as the Catocin Recreation Demonstration Area to show how submarginal farm lands and poorly managed forest lands could be converted into a valuable recreational resource. Although, since then, half of the original area has been deeded to the State of Maryland and the name has been changed to Catocin Mountain Park, the area remains a place of quiet beauty for those

who visit its 5,765 wooded acres.

 Babson's Point Of View On:  
 Inflation And Retirement  
 BABSON PARK, Mass., June 16 — The squeeze of inflation hurts anybody whose income is not rising at least as fast as the cost of living. Workers don't have to worry too much if their pay rates are automatically hiked to any hikes recorded by the consumer price index, as is the case in many union escalator contracts. Salaries for many executives, government employees, and others in favored positions manage to keep up with—or even ahead of—the relentless climb in the cost of retail goods and services.

**Fixed-Income Recipients Are Victims**  
 There are, however, approximately 40 million people in this country who are living on pensions, insured retirement allotments, and other forms of fixed income. Thus far, there is no way for these people—most of them in the senior-citizen bracket—to bargain for income gains to match the rising prices. They don't have to read in the paper that it cost them \$112.50 in April 1966 to buy what cost only \$100 during the consumer-price-index base period of 1957-1959. They have already felt their dollar shrinking.

From April 1965 to April 1966 there was an over-all advance of 2.9% in the nation's cost of living. In terms of the national average, fixed-income people had to pay 6.2% more for food, 3.5% more for medical care, 2.3% more for clothing and its upkeep, and 1.9% more for housing. Families in general felt the upward pressure, of course; but pensioners and retirees of other types had very little chance of upping their income take. They could only cut

back their outlays for their daily needs enough to balance their limited funds against their expenses.  
**Great Society Funds Will Not Help Much**  
 While the White House has asked Congress to place \$3.2 billion more at its disposal for Great Society plans during the next fiscal year than for the current year, fixed-income earners can't expect much help. There have been breakthroughs in health programs, and there may be more of these as time goes by. But this will not give great encouragement to the millions of healthy men and women whose set number of shrinking dollars must somehow continue to take care of their homes and maintenance, food, clothing, transportation, and essential services.  
 Naturally, if price deflation should have its turn, pension-

ers' and retirees' dollars would become worth more. But what are the chances of such a reversal in the near future? An inflationary explosion of runaway proportions would surely be followed by a downward cascade in prices. History tells us that. Yet, the stand-pat attitude taken so far by the government would seem to promise continuation of the semi-contained wage-price upspiral . . . with price inflation not yet ready to give way to deflation.  
**Pressures Still On Upside**  
 Even the shakeout in stocks has not yet been reflected in barometers that could indicate early deflation. Employment is bursting through the roof; unemployment is so low that employers have to bid higher and higher to get new workers. Costs of the Vietnam war are climbing, as are Great Society financial needs. Labor is going all

out for raises and fringe gains during the remainder of this year and 1967. The guidepost of 3.2% annual pay hikes has been bulldozed flat by the unions. Cost pressures are ever upward. So broad was the original concept of the Great Society that some have proposed a compensating system to protect citizens dependent upon a fixed income. About the only way this could be done would be to make up—say, each month or each quarter—the difference between the value of the dollar when a pension or retirement arrangement went into effect and its current depreciated value. The paper work would be so overwhelming and the cost so heavy

that it probably could not pass Congress at this time. But we are certain you will hear much more of this as inflation continues to eat a bigger and bigger share of our senior citizens' income. Meanwhile, pensioners will just have to keep a close eye on their budgets.

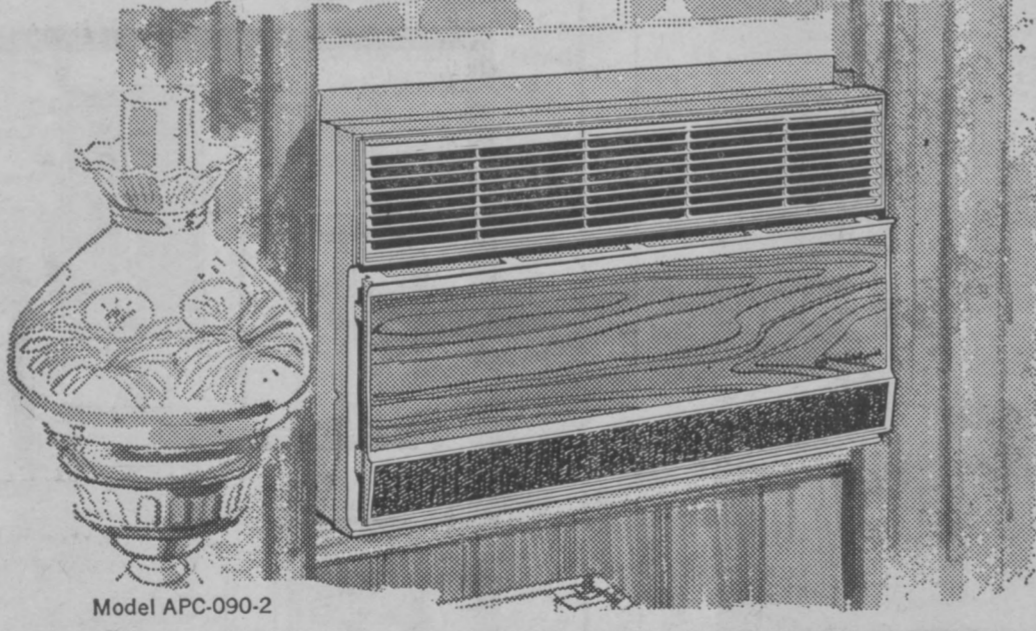

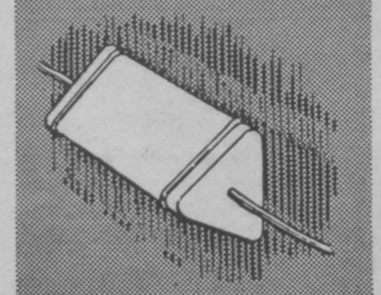

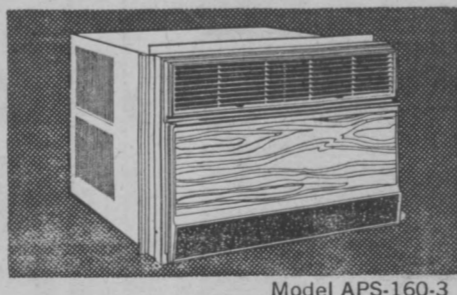

**Many Mount Grads In Service**  
Nearly one-quarter of the 1966 graduating class at Mt. St. Mary's College has chosen to fulfill its military obligations before starting their graduate or professional studies or their chosen careers, according to a survey made by the colleges' placement director, John F. Bailey, B.S. Although 97 members of the class had been accepted for further advanced studies, 15 of these graduates decided on the military as well as 24 of their classmates. Ten graduates who left the campus undecided listed their indecision as caused by the uncertainty of their military status. Six of the latter group had been offered career positions with business or industry. A total of 51 will continue their educational pursuits on a full-time basis in the following areas of concentration: 4 in English; 7, business administration; 2, guidance and counseling; 7, law school; 2, mathematics; 6, medical school; 5 dental school; 4, history; 1, economics; 3, chemistry; 5 biology; 1, physiology; 1, medical technology; 1, veterinarian medicine; 1, public relations; and 1, education of the deaf. Sixty-three graduates have accepted full-time employment in the following categories: 25, teaching; 22, business and industry; and 16, state and federal agencies. Of this number, 31 have indicated they will continue their studies on a part-time basis in the areas of English, history, mathematics, educational guidance and administration, and law. In the area of financial aid the graduates listed two fellowships, 10 assistantships; three scholarships; one internship and one federal grant. **Finan Files Court Brief**

Maryland Attorney General Thomas B. Finan, in conjunction with counsel representing the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Maryland, this week filed a brief in the Supreme Court of the United States, opposing the appeal of Madalyn Murray, the professed atheist, who is seeking to have tax exemptions for churches declared unconstitutional.

Mrs. Murray had filed suit in Baltimore City asking that court to declare as unconstitutional the Maryland laws which permit tax exemptions for churches and houses of worship. The State successfully defended the tax exemptions in that court and before the Maryland Court of Appeals.

In the Supreme Court brief, Mr. Finan noted that it is a proper function for the State Legislature to regard these tax exemptions as a practical exercise of the complete freedom of religion guaranteed under the Constitution to churches and their members.

Mr. Finan argued that such exemptions are, in effect, "an aid to the private right of the individual

ocratic nomination for Governor of Maryland.

"But I am in complete and utter opposition to the provision which takes away the homeowners right to sell or rent the home in which he lives in any way he chooses.

"Before election day, I will amplify my position on State spending and taxation. I will present to you in detail, my views and recommendations on education, roads, racing, increased revenues, mental institutions and the wide variety of problems Maryland faces.

"And so—I present myself to the voters of Maryland—full of confidence, and confident too, that they have confidence in me.

"Together, we can take our wonderful state into the space age with the sure knowledge that we will leave it far better than we found it.

**Social Security Information**

Benefits for divorced women are now available under the amended social security law according to W. S. King, District Manager of the Hagerstown Social Security Office, provided certain conditions are met.

The divorced wife of a retired, deceased or disabled man covered by social security is entitled to either a wife's benefit at age 62 or a widow's benefit at age 60 if she is not currently married and

if she and her former husband were married at least 20 years, and if her former husband at the time he retired, became disabled or died, was providing at least half of her support, or was making substantial contributions toward her support under a written agreement or was required by a court to do so.

A woman already receiving a wife's benefit at the time of divorce will go on getting the benefit if the marriage was in effect for 20 years. If a divorced woman receiving benefits remarries her benefits will end but if that marriage ends by death or divorce her benefits will be resumed.

Payments to a divorced wife will not affect in any way the social security rights of the former husband. He will continue receiving his full retirement or disability check. If he remarries his new wife will receive full wife's benefits. And his remarriage won't affect his former wife's benefits.

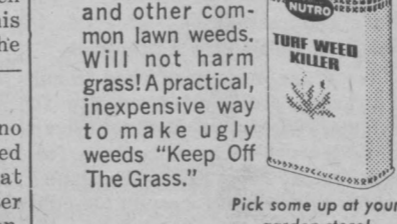

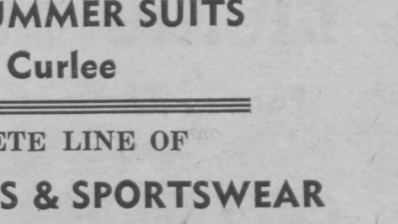
