## Most Anything At A Glance

With the Primary Election just a few days off it is high time that we here in Emmitsburg gave deep consideration to electing the candidates whom we feel will do the best job in public office. Among this large group of candidates seeking state and county offices we have two local men interested in getting elected. It has been about half a century since Emmitsburg has had representatives in elected County or State offices and the results of this lack of representation are very evident. Now is the opportunity to gain back some of the ground we have lost. So, my dear friends, when you go to the polls Tuesday I hope you give our local candidates, J. Norman Flax and Robert G. Muench a vote of confidence.

Now that the long hot summer (and I don't mean the television show) is fast slipping away, one can breathe a sigh of relief as the season goes into the record books, one that will be long remembered. This area, which normally received better than 40 inches of rain annually, to date shows an anemic 17.86 inches. This is just about a third of the normal rainfall but of course this figure represents a little better than eight months. Add this drought to the heat, and we come up to an extremely dry and hot summer season. For 57 days the temperature was over 90 degrees and brother that is hot for this area. Air-conditioning merchants reported a record number of sales.

The Grim Reaper claimed 661 lives over the Labor Day weekend. This record exceeds last year's by exactly 200. This manifests the total disregard of the motoring public of safety warnings issued by every state, the press and even announcements from church altars and pulpits. In our very own little community here three accidents were reported. Multiply this small figure by several thousand other towns and communities and you have a real slaughter on your hands. As yet no one has come up with the answer to the prevention of this type of killing. Governor's have threatened to lift licenses of violators and still the number of fatal accidents increases by leaps and bounds. As I have said many times before, the safest place you can be on a holiday is in your own home. Travel at other times and you have a better chance of survival.

## 30,000 VOTERS READY FOR TUESDAY ELECTION

Frederick County's voter registration rolls have swelled by more than 1,000 names in the past year, with nearly half of the increase coming in the last two weeks of registration.

Final figures listing the number of newly registered voters, as of the close of registration Aug. 15, were made available by the Board of Election Supervisors.

The board listed 30,817 voters as eligible to participate in the Sept. 13 primary election, compared to 29,736 eligible voters on the same date in 1965.

As of Aug. 1 this year, 30,335 voters were registered. More than 200 of the 482 who registered in the final two weeks did so on the final day.

The Democratic party, which has traditionally held about a 3-2 majority over the Republican party, registered the greatest gain for the year—729 new Democrats against 358 new Republicans. Registered Democrats now total 17,628, Republicans 12,479.

The ranks of the independent voters—those who decline to affiliate with either party—dropped from 716 last year to 709 at present. The county's lone Socialist—a voter in precinct six in Frederick City—remained alone.

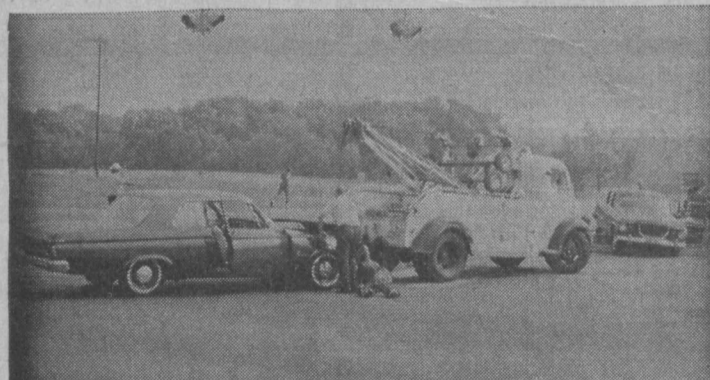

The Emmitsburg Democratic Central Committee met in regular session at the Fire Hall Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. Chairman Clarence E. Hahn presided over the meeting.

The group went on record as officially endorsing the Finan-Burch-Goldstein ticket in the coming primary election Tuesday, Sept. 13. ## None Injured In Crash Here

Two cars collided Monday evening, Sept. 5 at approximately 6:15 p.m. at the intersection of State Route 806 and Annandale Road near Mt. St. Mary's College about a mile and a half south of Emmitsburg.

The accident, investigated by Maryland State Police, occurred when a 1966 Ford Falcon, driven by Otto A. Tokar, 55, and owned by Mrs. Ann G. Roger, Emmitsburg, was proceeding south on Rt. 806, was struck by a 1957 Chevrolet sedan owned and operated by Bert Lucas Hall, R1, Emmitsburg. The Hall vehicle stopped at the stop sign at the intersection, proceeded onto Rt. 806 and struck the Roger vehicle.

Hall was charged with failing to keep to the right of the center of the road. Damage to the Roger vehicle was estimated at \$450 and the Hall machine \$270. No one was reported injured in the mishap which was investigated by Trooper McBride.

## Over 17,000 Students In School

A record number of 17,171 children began the school year in Frederick County public schools Tuesday with 1,964 students attending the new Governor Thomas Johnson High School.

A spokesman for the Board of Education said that the enrollment represented an increase of more than 200 students over last year's opening day figures.

From the first day of school until the official enrollment count is taken at the end of September, an additional 275 to 300 children are expected to register for classes, the school official said.

Of this total first-day enrollment, 9,957 students are attending county schools while 7,214 children are attending schools in Frederick City.

There are 9,325 children attending elementary schools in grades one through six, and 7,846 children in secondary schools or grades seven through 12.

Governor Thomas Johnson High School opened its doors for the first time without a hitch.

Karl S. Manviller, principal, said, "Everything has run smoothly so far. I don't anticipate any problems."

In other parts of the county, schools reported no problems. Carroll Manor said more students registered than had been anticipated.

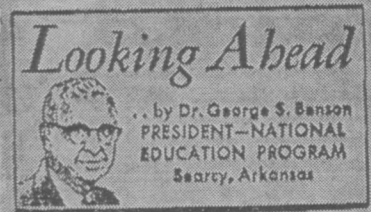

**Cuba Becomes World Headquarters For Red Conquest**  
The Committee on the Judiciary of the United States Senate has just published a document that ought to shock the American people into a massive demand for all-out action against the expanding Communist menace throughout the world and particularly in the Western Hemisphere. The facts reported in the document have been given very little if any attention by

the American press, and both the White House and the Congress (except for the Senate Judiciary Committee) are remaining disturbingly silent. The document is entitled: "The Tricontinental Conference of African, Asian, and Latin American Peoples." It contains 156 pages of reportage on the most important international meeting of Communist officialdom held in the Western Hemisphere. The report is so vitally important to the security of our nation that we shall devote a number of columns to it. At least 10,000-000 Americans should write one of their Senators for a copy; then they could help bring its contents to the attention of our other 170,000,000 citizens. To Conquer The U.S.A.  
The Red conference was held

in the Hall of the Ambassadors of the Habana Libre Hotel, Havana. The purpose was to further the international planning and plotting and Communist teamwork for the conquering of the United States and establishment of Red domination over the world. There were 83 Communist delegations from countries on three continents. And the Soviet delegation of 40 was the largest and obviously the ruling hierarchy of the strategy meeting. Here are some summarized facts as reported by the U. S. Senate committee:

"The public posture of international Communism since the fictitious burial of the Communist International has been that it does not engage in subversion or violence. At the Havana Conference, all pretense of non-intervention in the affairs of other nations was dropped, and the delegates, under Moscow leadership, openly committed themselves to the overthrow by violence of all those governments which do not meet with their approval.

**Official Recognition As Headquarters**  
"The Conference established a Communist-dominated general headquarters to support, direct, intensify, and coordinate guerrilla operations in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.

"It gave Communism a subversive leverage surpassing anything it has heretofore possessed. Bringing into the Conference fold militant leftist and nationalist movements from many countries (which, while themselves not Communist, share the antipathy of the Communists toward the West and towards the United

States, and support the Communist-backed 'wars of national liberation'.

"Havana was selected as the headquarters for international subversion and guerrilla operations, thus making a de facto situation de jure in international Communist circles (By this terminology, the Committee is saying that World Communism now officially makes Red Cuba the international headquarters for subversion and guerrilla warfare). Soviets In Command

"Immediately following the Conference, the Latin American delegations met and after reviewing the briefs of 'revolutionary tactics and strategy,' unanimously voted to establish a parallel regional organization, to be known as the Latin American Solidarity Organization (O-LAS), with its permanent headquarters in Havana.

"Moscow elbowed the Chinese Communists out of the No. 1 position to emerge as the undisputed controlling force in the new international apparatus of subversion.

"Castro who has heretofore sought to straddle the fence between Moscow and Peking, has now openly aligned himself with Moscow.

"The actions taken by the Conference point to the immediate and massive intensification of terrorism and guerilla activity throughout the Americas, as well as in Asia and Africa.

"The Communist were able to get the varied leftwing and radical-nationalist participants in

the conference to designate United States 'imperialism' as enemy number one in every continent."

**GETTYSBURG COLLEGE RECEIVES \$5,000 GRANT**

President Carl Arnold Hanson announced this week that Gettysburg College has been named to receive a \$5000 Federal grant for the purchase of library materials in response to an application filed by the college with the U. S. Office of Education last May under the provisions of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

Title II of the Act provides for strengthening the college and university libraries of the country through three types of grants; but appropriations totalling \$10,000,000 were made for only one type in the fiscal year which closed June 30.

**Medicare Handbook  
Now Available**

Your Medicare Handbook which

answers most questions about the new Social Security Health Insurance Program was recently mailed to over 19 million persons

covered by the program.

The Handbook was specifically designed to assist beneficiaries in understanding the full scope of the Medicare program. Contained in the booklet is a form, SSA-1490—Request for Payment, which can be used to assign medical insurance payments directly to the physician under the medical insurance benefits provisions, or claim reimbursement at the rate of 80 per cent of reasonable charges for doctor bills after a deductible of \$50.00 each year.

According to W. S. King, the Social Security Administration district manager in Hagerstown, "more than 75 per cent of the questions normally directed to the Social Security offices in this region can be answered by referring to Your Medicare Handbook."

In addition to explaining the various provisions of the Medicare program, the Handbook also contains a number of sample questions

and answers most of those commonly asked by health insurance beneficiaries.

Effective July 1, 1966, the Medicare program provides both hospital and medical insurance protection to persons age 65 or over. Under the Hospital Insurance provisions, payments are provided to help pay for most hospital expenses, diagnostic services, skilled nursing care, and other services in an extended care facility after hospitalization. The Health Insurance program does not reimburse individuals for the cost of drugs.

The Medical Insurance provisions help pay the bills for doctors' services and for a number of other medical items and services not covered under the Hospital Insurance provisions.

Additional copies of the booklet, Your Medicare Handbook, are available at your local Social Security Administration district office.

**Corn Support  
Prices Announced**

The price support loan rate for the 1966 corn crop will be \$1.17 per bushel in all Maryland counties, James M. Voss, Chairman, Maryland Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, has announced. This loan rate, plus a 30-cents-per-bushel special price support payment, gives a total price support rate of \$1.47 per bushel for 1966-crop corn in Maryland.

The Chairman reminded growers that price support on the 1966 crop of corn will be available only to farmers participating in the 1966 feed grain program. The total price support for 1966 will include not only loans and purchases but also the price support pay-

ment of 30 cents per bushel on the normal production of the individual farm's 1966 planted corn acreage.

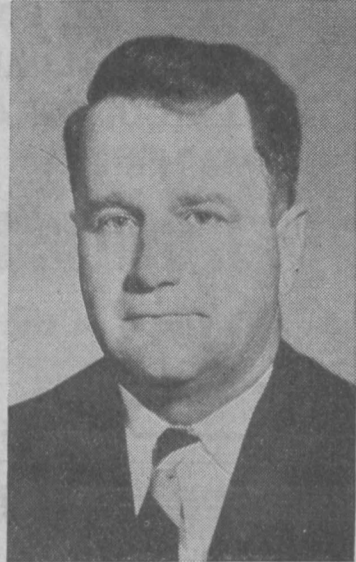
Mr. Voss also pointed out that this year's program is similar to last year's in that all the 1966 production of corn from participating farms can be put under the price support loan.

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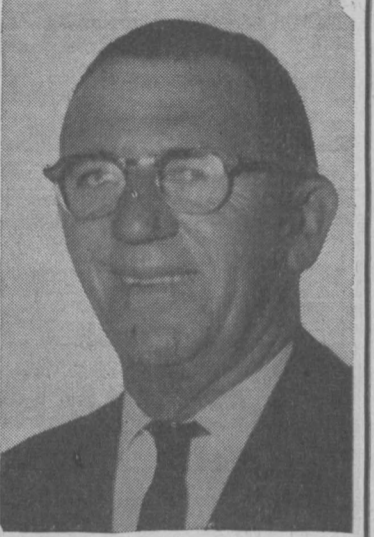

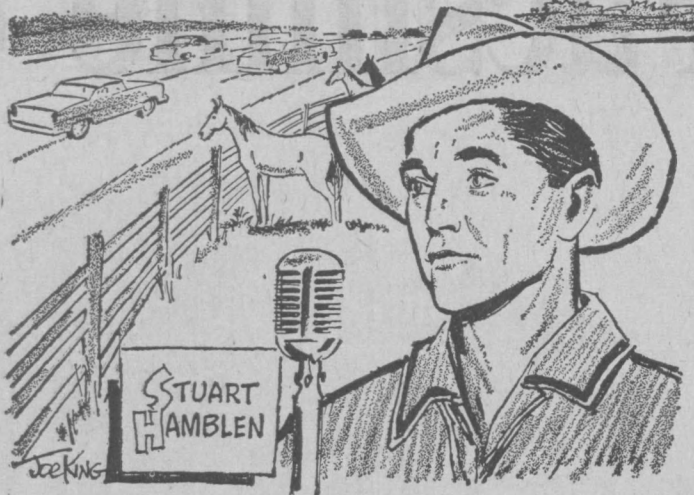

**SPORTS AFIELD**

By Ted Kosting

When a hemorrhage fever was raging in South America several years ago—a mysterious fever that was raring up in areas many miles apart—the American Museum of Natural History sent a team of scientists into eastern Bolivia, where the victims seemed to be concentrated at the time. The fever had occurred previously in Junin, Argentina, 1,800 miles from the current outbreak. There were 600 cases in Bolivia, with at least one person in five dying, so states Jack Denton Scott, Roving Editor of Sports Afield Magazine.

Believing the virus to be carried by an animal rather than a mosquito or some other insect, the scientists set out on their complicated mission in a houseboat, sailing slowly along the Rio Itenez, which flows along the northern border of Bolivia. Although it took months, and was involved and hazardous adventure, the mission was a success. For blood samples to be taken, the suspected animals had to be captured alive. Many animals and months later, the men from the museum discovered that mice were the carriers of the disease. A concentrated roden control program solved the problem. It could not have been done without American-manufactured live traps.

When leptospirosis broke out among a few dairy herds in Pennsylvania, drying up the cows' milk

and discoloring what remained, the School of Veterinary Medicine of the University of Pennsylvania, working with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the National Institute of Health and the Pennsylvania Game Commission, went to work to discover the cause. With the trapping of 1400 suspected specimens of wildlife, leptospirosis organisms were discovered in mice, skunks, rats, opossums, woodchucks, raccoons, muskrats and foxes. A live trap was used so that proper blood specimens could be taken from the carrier animals.

When a fifth rabid animal was found in Malibu, California, early in 1964, the county health department began trapping wild animals that might have begun the outbreak of the dread disease. Their main weapon of defense and research: the live trap. Within a few days they discovered that skunks were the culprits.

American two-door live traps were also used at the Virus Research Center in Poona, India, to discover what caused debilitating Kysanur Forest disease. After the live trapping of many animals and birds, it was found that it was caused by a tick carried by small forest creatures.

**A REMINDER**

All registered voters in Maryland—and this includes independent or unaffiliated citizens as well as Democrats and Republicans—will have the opportunity in the September primary to register their approval of a call for a convention to consider the revision and modernization of the State Constitution.

This is a nonpartisan matter which merits indorsement by all citizens. A vote in favor of a convention does not bind a voter to accept changes in the Constitution, which may in later months be discussed and submitted for public approval. But a resounding vote for a convention call, will be a sign of public interest, and will encourage the many citizens already engaged in the preliminary phases of a study of the Constitution to push ahead with this important task.

It is unusual to have a public question of this nature on the ballot in a primary election. Moreover, the ballot in the primary will be unusually long. It thus is all the more necessary for voters to keep reminding themselves that the question will be there, and should be approved.

**WOMEN'S HEALTH**

Sex Education Starts At Ten  
Many boys and girls 10 years old and older are unaware of the

male's role in procreation and get most of their sex information from the locker room and gutter. To break this barrier of silence and ignorance, courses on sex and family life education are now included in the curriculum in 69 public

schools in Flint, Mich., and the surrounding county, George Chamis, Ph.D., coordinator of the family-life education program, told Women's Medical News Service at a recent conference.

The course is introduced at the fifth-grade level, he said, to pre-adolescents who are about to enter the rapid and confusing period of sexual development. Specially trained family-life instructors meet with boys and girls separately to give them factual information on the male and female reproductive systems and how conception takes place. Each learns not only about his own body but about the opposite sex's as well.

Two or three times during the school year the boys and girls are taught jointly. "Having by this time acquired a factual and acceptable vocabulary, the youngsters are by and large relaxed and unembarrassed at these co-ed meetings," according to Dr. Chamis.

Before the course begins, parents attend an orientation meeting where the objectives and content are spelled out in great detail. Parents are shown the visual aids and other materials their children will be seeing and working with. "The program has thus far met with an enthusiastic response, despite the diversity of religious, so-

cial, and economic backgrounds," Dr. Chamis noted.

**Adolescent Sexuality**

Although reproductive biology continues to be part of the course for eighth graders, these adolescent youngsters are also given information on matters of immediate concern to them. Masturbation, the sex drive, venereal diseases are all discussed frankly with the teachers taking their cues from the young people's questions and comments as to where the course emphasis is to be placed.

On the tenth-grade level, the discussion centers around dating, the responsibilities of boy-girl relationships, the differences between male and female sex drives, premarital sex and its implications for individuals, for families, and for society as a whole.

"Our objective is not to preach to the youngsters, not to try to hand them ready-made solutions to all the problems facing them," Dr. Chamis observed. "Rather we try to open a dialogue, to stimulate serious examination of moral and ethical considerations that will help these youngsters make responsible decisions in this vital area of their lives."

Twelfth graders, many of whom marry within a short time after graduation, may take a full semester's course, for credit, on marriage and family living. For those who do not take this course, regular discussions continue to be held on all aspects of human sexuality. "The only subject we are forbidden by state law to discuss is contraception," Dr. Chamis noted. When contraception is raised by the students they are referred to community agencies, physicians, and ministers for guidance.

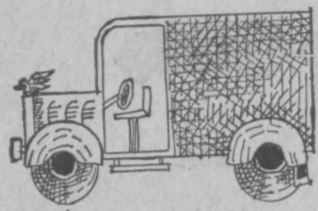

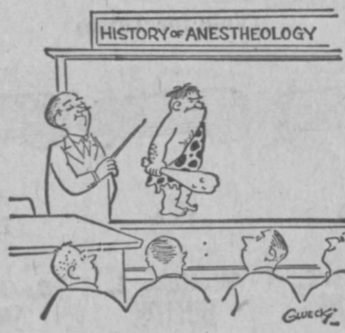

## Mahoney To Seek More State Police

George P. Mahoney, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor and his running mate for Attorney General, Ernest N. Cory, Jr., have spent a busy week

campaigning. Over this past weekend they were in Prince George's County, Ocean City and Timonium. In a policy statement, Mr. Mahoney stated that one of the most effective ways to cut down on the tragically high number of traffic deaths is to increase the size of the State Police. "The personnel of the Maryland State Police,

who bear the brunt of the traffic law enforcement responsibility, has not kept pace with the jumps in mileage of roads and the constantly increasing rise in the use of motor vehicles. Never in this half of the twentieth century has the size of the State Police force been sufficient for the job. It is woefully inadequate now, and the annual personnel increases are mere tokens of the need.

"I have heard the objection that a substantial part of the state police appropriations come from Road Commissions Funds, from highway use taxes, and that big increases for the State Police cut down on road construction. I am anxious as the next to see more good roads built—and by using efficient business methods, I will see that they are built—but not as stages for this carnival of carnage. A State Police force of realistic proportions—based on the best obtainable advice—will be one of the first major goals of my administration."

Also this week, Mr. Mahoney promised to "launch an immediate offensive to reverse the present trend of lawlessness and disrespect for the law within the state."

In a statement on taxes, Mr. Mahoney said that it is time to take a "long hard look at state spending to determine how much of our tax dollars can be saved by the rigid application of business methods." Mr. Mahoney cautioned the voters to ask themselves who is better equipped to bring some order out of the biggest business in Maryland—the State itself—a businessman who has been doing it for years or a lawyer. Mr. Mahoney said that of the five principal candidates for governor Democrats and Republicans—four are lawyers. Only one, George P. Mahoney is a businessman.

BABSON PARK, Mass., Sept. 8.—Although there are some clouds on the horizon, right now we Americans are riding the crest of the biggest wave of prosperity ever enjoyed by any people in the history of the world. Today more Americans are better fed, better dressed, better educated, and more financially inde-

pendent than ever before. Consumer Balance Sheet  
 At a recent date the total assets of Americans were estimated at a whopping \$2,245 billion. Roughly two-thirds of this amount consisted of current assets, including \$651 billion in corporate stocks and bonds. Fixed assets comprised the remaining one-third, and of these more than \$500 billion represented investments in home ownership.

On the debit side, the total liabilities of Americans were estimated to be \$280 billion. These included current liabilities of \$82 billion and mortgage debt of \$198 billion. Subtracting these total liabilities from total assets leaves us with \$1,965 billion. This is the net worth of American consumers.

**Climbing Personal Income**  
 Of course, such a favorable consumer balance sheet could not be drawn up if it were not for the fact that we have been able to achieve such a rapid rise in personal income over the past

several years. Personal income just recently was at an annual rate of \$579.7 billion. Ten years ago, it was at an annual rate of \$332.2 billion, giving us an increase for the decade of an astounding 74.5%.

The rise in income reflects the growth which has taken place in the economy. There has been a tremendous advance in number of people employed and in total of salaries and wages. But there has also been a sizable increase in interest and dividend payments because of the larger sums invested and the generally higher rates of return now prevailing. In addition, there has been a big boost in government payments for veterans' aid, pensions, social security, and medicare.

**High-Cost Economy**  
 The asset-to-debt position of consumers as a whole looks so encouraging on paper it tends to make us overlook the fact that installment credit outstanding is also at record dollar levels. The income picture, too, looks fine,—but it tends to make us overconfident. The truth is that our economy has undoubtedly expanded too fast for its own good. The net effect of so much demand-pull all at once has been to create a cost-push that could prove very dangerous if not curbed.

We are prosperous at the moment, but it is a high-cost economy that we have developed and break-even points for both business and individuals are working still higher. In addition to the rapid drift toward socialism in government and the consequent growing dependence of the people upon government, there is an alarming tendency for younger Americans to overspend and to go sharply into debt. These trends we cannot stop, but we can insulate ourselves against them.

**What To Do**  
 If you are under 50, do not neglect to invest in life insurance. Do this before, and in preference to, buying stocks. Then build up a savings account and keep it built up. Work your own job or in your own business that by developing

your own resources you can obtain a degree of financial independence. Above all, be wary of debt of any kind . . . and of extending too much credit to your customers if you have a business.

Don't be too eager to make a fast buck,—in or out of the stock market. Most people simply do not possess sufficient training, experience, time, and/or patience to make a success of trading in the stock market. When you decide to invest your hard-earned cash in securities, make sure you buy into sound, growing industries and companies. If you do this, time and the expansion

of the economy over the years will work in your favor. And don't forget that our net worth as individuals is not measured in value of our intangible assets alone. It is measured also in terms of the value of our intangible assets,—such as integrity, prudence, intelligence, imagination . . . and perseverance once we have chosen our goals.

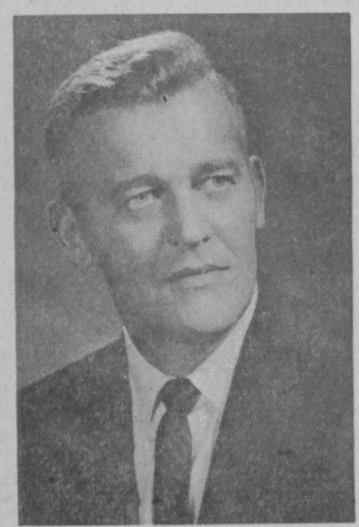

**Consider Before Cutting Down On Salt**

Concern over salt in reference to water belly in turkeys and wet droppings of laying hens may easily be exaggerated in the minds of poultrymen.

This is the conviction of Hobart R. Halloran of the Halloran Research Farm, Inc., Modesto, California, who is quoted as follows:

"Take out the salt! This statement is often heard in the feed industry. It is frequently made by those who should know better. Salt is the first thing many people think of if the droppings are wet or if there is water belly in a few turkeys."

"The individuals who make this type of statement overlook the requirements of chickens (and other animals) for sodium and chloride ions. Eliminating the salt may result in more severe problems than the original diagnosis indicates."

"A few turkey poulters having water belly does not mean that it is a flock problem, nor does it mean that the condition is caused by salt in the feed. The presence of wet droppings under Leghorn cages does not mean that there is too much salt in the feed."

"In two field cases, we have seen a high cannibalism level in Leghorn layers receiving feed with no added salt. Canni-

balism was lower after adding salt. This may not be a direct cause and effect, of course, but leads one to wonder whether it is good business to deny layers the needed sodium and chloride ions."

"There is recent proof of the need of added chloride ions in high efficiency practical broiler rations. Drs. Ousterhout and Bruins of the Quaker Oats Research Laboratory reported on this at the Federation meetings in April. They found that performance was improved 5-10% with the addition of 0.15-0.25% chloride in the form of sodium, potassium, or ammonium salts or mixtures of these."

"They pointed out that commercial fish meals contain only from 0.20% to as high as 2.4% chlorides. This means that 5% fish meal will only supply from 0.01-0.12% chloride ion. We suggest that the feed formulator think about these ingredient variations before taking out the salt."

This comes from an investigator of long experience, whose advice deserves respectful attention.

**Question:** Why is constant access to salt emphasized for broat prevention?

**Answer:** Because if cattle or sheep should seriously crave salt, and then eat a lot of it, a subsequent heavy water intake may trigger or aggravate broat. In Australia it has been found that a deficiency of minerals including trace minerals, reduces the secretion of saliva, the mucin of which is needed to prevent frothy broat.

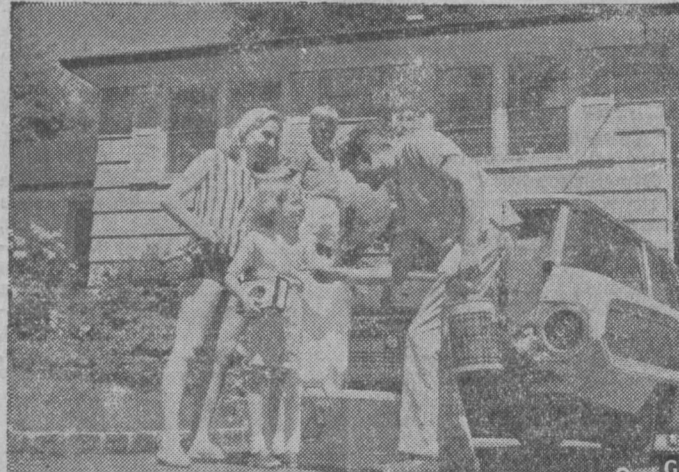

HOW TO HAVE A SAFE HOLIDAY WEEKEND



The time for horseplay—and planning—is before the drive begins. It's wise to have enough books and toys in the car to keep the children happy, and some cigars to help Dad relax while driving.

Whether you'll stay close to home or drive long distances over holiday weekends this year, these tips may help you increase your safety and make the trip more enjoyable, too.

1. Borrow tricks from professional drivers. Watch not only the car in front, but also the car ahead of that one. Watching the left front wheels of oncoming cars can help you anticipate surprise turns before the other guy swerves into your lane.

2. Seek wide-open spaces. The old rule of one car length for every 10 miles of speed is okay on city streets and ordinary roads—but stretch it on high-speed highways, where rear-end collisions are a common hazard.

3. Check often for tire cuts and bruises. Though nylon tire cord isn't damaged by water penetrating into cuts and bruises, other fibers are easily affected if the rubber coating is cut. Check for cuts every time you check tire pressure.

4. Keep in mind driving comfort. To combat frayed nerves which can result from highway motoring, frequent restbreaks are good. One good way to help Dad relax while driving is to keep a package of cigars in the glove compartment for him. The sense of well-being that comes with smoking a good cigar can contribute to his driving enjoyment. A back rest, gloves and a good pair of sunglasses may also add to the driver's comfort.

5. Always give the right of way—especially if the other driver's wrong. If he's at fault, he's probably a faulty driver—and the best place for a faulty driver is out of your way!

6. Use your seat belts. If you don't have them, get some—but accept only those certified as meeting the safety standards of the Society of Automotive Engineers. Fasten your seat belt even when only going around the corner. Two-thirds of fatal accidents occur within 25 miles of home.
