## MOIST BLACK CAKE

4 squares chocolate, 1/2 cup shortening, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda, 1/2 cup sour milk, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 cups flour, dash of salt.

Place chocolate, shortening, and sugar in mixing bowl. Add boiling water and stir until well blended. Add soda dissolved in milk, then add eggs and vanilla, add flour sifted with salt and beat until smooth. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes.

King, District Manager, announced this week.

These "extended care" benefits became payable beginning January 1, 1967, for services furnished in skilled nursing homes or other institutions that have met medicare quality standards.

A person 65 or over who receives care in an approved extended care facility on or after January 1, 1967, will start to have his bills paid if:

(1) He has had a hospital stay of at least 3 days, ending July 1, 1966, or later;

(2) He entered the extended care facility within 14 days of his hospital discharge; and

(3) He is still in need of continuing skilled nursing care.

Under the hospital insurance

part of medicare, payment can be made for up to 100 days of extended care, starting January 1, with medicare paying the full cost of the first 20 days and all but \$5 a day for the remaining 80 days. The extended care benefit is not a general nursing home benefit, King pointed out, and will not pay for stays that are primarily custodial or residential. The benefit is payable for convalescent care for recently hospitalized elderly people who still need skilled nursing care round the clock for the condition that required their hospitalization. For many, it will pay for needed care until they recover to the point that they can be cared for at home.

Copies of the new leaflet, with more detailed information as to what extended care services are covered by medicare, how the benefits are paid, and under what conditions, are available free at all social security district offices. The Hagerstown office is located at 59 North Cannon Avenue.

(4) Support the community band.

(5) Investigate the possibility and the means necessary for a town swimming pool or recreational field.

(6) An education program for adults, and school dropouts in home management, child care, nutrition, mother's assistant, family relationships and pre-marital and marital counselling, etc.

(7) Concern for the low-economic level of the community.

(8) The problem of alcoholism and the lack of cooperation and support of law enforcement.

(9) Foster a visiting program.

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**WOMEN'S HEALTH**

 Future Brighter For Mothers, Infants  
 NEW YORK—Scientists, gazing not into crystal balls but into laboratories round the world, predicted at a recent meeting on birth defects that the following life-saving advances might become practical within the next few years:  
 Medical and surgical treatment of unborn babies. Methods have been devised which enable physicians to detect some life-threatening abnormalities affecting the unborn. In medical centers in this country and abroad several infants have been partially removed from the uterus, treated, then returned to the uterus. A small number of babies—and all the mothers—survived the extraordinary treatment. As the technique improves, so will the number of survivors, the scientists believe.  
 Anti-Rh-disease vaccine. A vaccine to prevent the development of the dreaded Rh blood disease

in children has been developed and tested successfully on several hundred women. When a woman gives birth some of the infant's red blood cells may enter the mother's circulation. If she is Rh-negative and the baby Rh-positive, her body produces antibodies against the baby's cells. During a subsequent pregnancy, these antibodies may attack the blood of the unborn fetus causing the disease. The new vaccine, given within 48 hours of the birth of the first child, prevents the development of the antibodies. Thus, Rh-disease is prevented. While still being tested physicians predict its general use within a few years.  
 Rubella immunity test, vaccine by 1970's. Rubella, or German measles, is generally a mild disease. However, when it strikes a woman in the early months of pregnancy, it may cause irreparable damage to the unborn baby. A new, apparently safe, three-hour test to detect rubella immunity has been developed recently, as has a vaccine to prevent the disease. Both are expected to be ready for general

use in the 1970's, about the time the next cyclic outbreak of the disease is expected. The last epidemic occurred in the U. S. in 1963-1964, leaving a desolate trail of damaged children.  
 Vaccine or not, a leading physician at the birth defects meeting urged that communities undertake a massive family planning campaign if a rubella outbreak occurs. With the highly effective pill and IUD, the physician noted, women can postpone their pregnancies until such time as the epidemic is stemmed—avoiding a lifetime of tragedy.

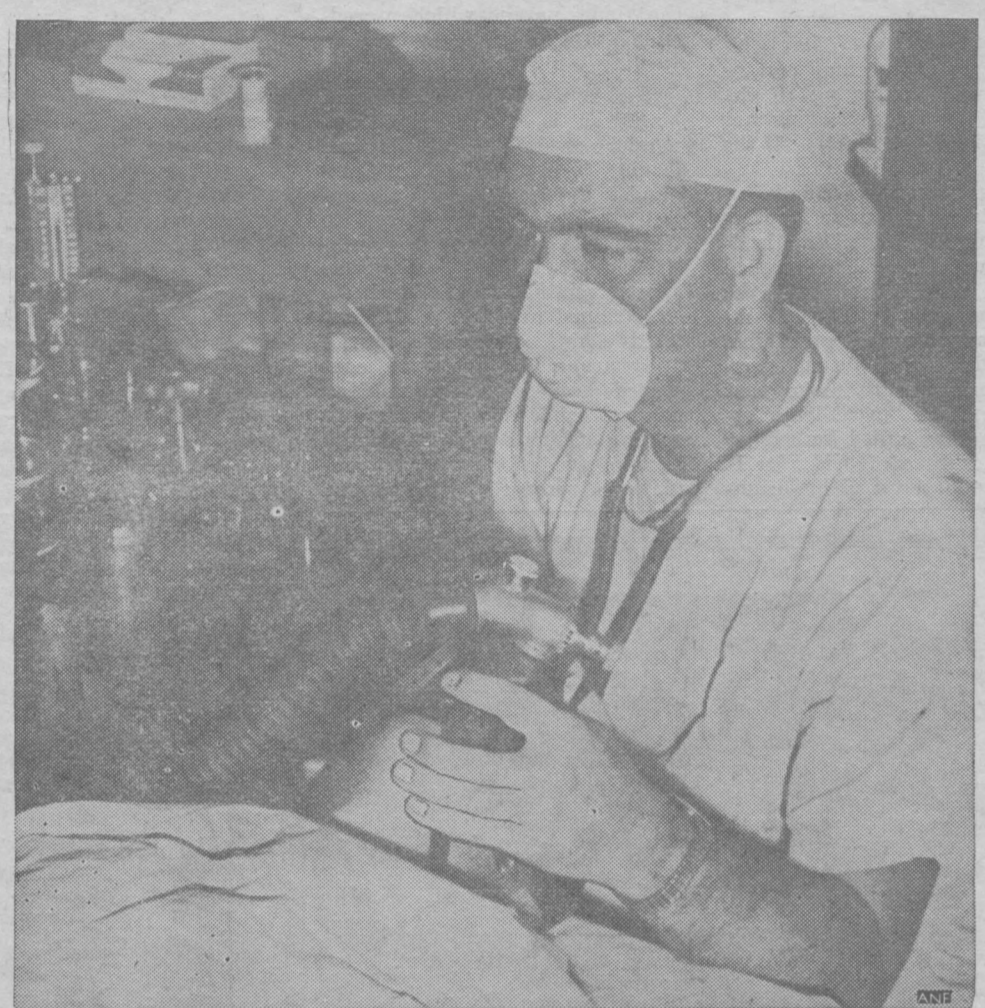

**Dietetic Candies Upset Toddlers' Tummies**  
 NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Mothers, beware that in the effort to prevent cavities in your youngsters' teeth, you don't inadvertently cause them to have runny tummies. A pediatrician from the Yale-New Haven Hospital reported in the "New England Journal of Medicine" that children between 20 and 36 months of age developed diarrhea within two to five hours after they had eaten dietetic mints. Another physician reported that one of his adult male patients also developed gastro-intestinal complaints after eating 'sugarless' candy.

**Four Checks For Cancer Detection**  
 NEW YORK—Earlier detection and treatment are the roads to cancer survival—and that's why the American Cancer Society urges the following regular, routine physical examination. Annual chest x-ray; annual rectal examination, since three out of four of those who develop rectal cancer could be saved with early detection; annual breast examination by a physician, plus monthly self-examination; annual pelvic examination with Papanicolaou test.

**YOUR PERSONAL HEALTH**

**Colleges And The Pill**  
 Although debate still rages over whether or not college health services should prescribe the pill for students who request contraceptive help, almost half have resolved the debate. Forty-five per cent now prescribe the pill, but not for all coeds, and mostly not for unmarried ones.  
 These findings, based on a national survey of 315 member institutions of the American College

Health Association, were reported recently by Dr. Lewis Barbato, director of the Student Health Service at the University of Denver.  
 The majority of the colleges, 55 per cent, do not prescribe the pill at all, said Dr. Barbato. Of the 141 colleges that do, just over a quarter prescribe them only for married women students. Another eight per cent prescribe them for single women who show intent to marry in the near future. Acceptable evidence would include either a premarital examination report or a marriage lic-

ense. In 23 colleges (7 per cent) the health service will prescribe the pill only for medical reasons. One such is for the relief of distressing menstrual problems. Only 13 colleges—or 4 per cent—will prescribe for single, unmarried women. Some of these however, require written parental approval for unmarried minors.  
**Reasons For Stand**  
 Dr. Barbato reported that college health services not prescribing the contraceptive felt that this was not an appropriate function of the service for two main reasons: One is that prescription might imply approval by the authorities of premarital sex; the other is that women on the pill should have careful continued supervision by a physician—a responsibility which college health services cannot assume. Most physicians recommend either a six-month or annual check-up.  
 Those prescribing the pill reportedly felt that it should be handled in the same way as other drugs are. Only 19 colleges had written policies covering contraceptives.  
**Panelists Disagree**  
 In a panel discussion of the report, physicians differed among themselves on the wisdom of prescribing contraceptives on campus. Maintaining that "a physician's duty is to help people, not to judge them," Dr. Abram Goldstein, professor at the Stanford Medical School, observed that doctors should not "attempt to enforce a

code of morality by the threat of pregnancy." Contraception, he maintained, is an "integral part of medical practice and the physician must be free to exercise his best judgment, within the law, on the patient's behalf."  
 He noted that it might be appropriate, when an unmarried woman asks for contraceptives, to try to influence her toward "a more chaste pattern of behavior," if he believes that is in accord with her own moral standards. For others, where indicated, he might suggest psychiatric or other help. In still other instances, he might conclude that premarital sex, for the individual concerned, is "an appropriate, mature response consistent with her moral standards."  
 Taking another position, Dr. Beatrice Hamburg, psychiatrist in Stanford's Child Psychiatry Clinic, maintained that "taking the pill appears to be easy because it lacks any immediate relationship with the sexual act. But this does not mean taking the pill is without emotional strain or consequences."  
 The physicians agreed that an across-the-board, routine prescription of the contraceptive pill should be avoided.  
 In the decade from 1953 to 1963, U. S. Mint figures show, annual coinage of pennies was increased by 1.4 billion; of dimes by 316 million; of quarters by 121 million and of half dollars by 61 million.

**Post Office Seeking Summer Employees**

The Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington and Frederick Counties, Maryland, Room 204 Post Office Bldg., Hagerstown, Md., announced this week that the Civil Service commission is accepting applications until February 9, 1967 for Summer Jobs in Post Offices throughout the United States, under Announcement 405 B. No experience is required. Applicants must either be 18 years of age or be graduated from high school before receiving a Summer appointment. High school seniors are eligible to apply.  
 All applicants will be scheduled for a written test which will require approximately one hour. Persons who passed the examination for Post Office Summer Jobs for 1966 need not take the written test again unless they wish to improve their score. However, those who wish to compete on the basis of their 1966 test scores must file an application under this new announcement.  
 Applicants who pass the written test will be required to indicate two Post Offices in their State of permanent residence at which they will accept a Summer Job. Students away from their homes attending school may apply to take the exam at an exam point near their school and may be considered for Post Offices in their home State.

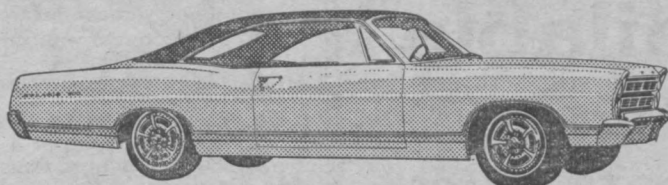
Wet weather and rough feedlots are the two conditions that contribute most to foot rot problems in cattle. Technically, foot rot is called *pododermatitis*. Whatever you call it, it is a common condition. It seldom causes death. However, losses still can be high because of lost weight from animals that become lame and are unwilling to move about and eat. Breeding can be impaired and cow's milk production lowered.  
 The foot rot bacteria usually enters through cuts, abrasions or cracks in the soft skin of the foot between the toes. The infection may spread upward into the claw. Lameness is usually the first symptom you'll see. It may be slight or so bad that the animals are unable to stand. They'll lose weight rapidly because they don't eat. The condition can spread through the whole herd.  
 Accurate diagnosis should be made by a local veterinarian. Science has made important progress in fighting this problem. But prevention is the key to fighting foot rot.  
 Broad-range antibiotics have provided the best health protection tool for farmers. Regular use of an antibiotic supplement like Aureomycin has been proved effective in stopping foot rot according to livestock scientists and agricultural college researchers.  
 Aureomycin can be administered in feed supplements or in a Crumbles form on top of feed. Good sanitation helps prevent the problem, too. Cleanup of wet, soggy feedlots and attention to regular barn sanitation will help eliminate the causes of foot rot.  
 In modern farming, prevention of problems is an economical and sound management practice that pays off at market time.

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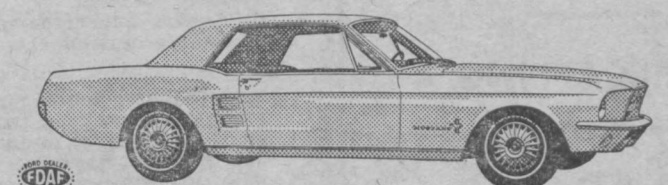

#### People Prosper On Profits

We have arrived again at one of those periods in American history when the people, particularly those who take an active interest in the economic and governmental affairs of our country, need to be reminded of the role of profits in the nation's welfare and progress. Persons who wish to destroy our prosperous nation, and well-meaning citizens who do not understand the economics of American capitalism, have spoken out for new "taxes on profits" to curtail the Government-made inflation that has been cutting into the living standard of every family in the country.

The Socialists and Communists who, with their identities concealed, have been talking up new, additional "taxes on profits" have a very definite objective—the breakdown of the American business system. The uninformed citizens and political leaders who have joined with them unwittingly, think that additional taxes on profits would

be the quickest and easiest way to solve the very critical fiscal and monetary crisis in our Government. This is the wrong solution.

#### Taxes Near Limit

Profits are already being taxed—not only business profits but also personal profits—to very near the limit of our system's capacity. Every family in America will suffer the burden if additional taxes are applied to any segment of our profit system: business, personal income profit, or what have you.

The American economic system, which has produced a living standard at least twice as abundant as any other system known to the world, is not a textbook system. It just grew up naturally, out of natural laws—fitting itself into human nature, as an instrument for progress, through the wonderful play of freedom. Essentially it is a form of capitalism. But it received the name "capitalism" not because it followed a textbook blueprint of 19th Century theoretical writers, but because, when it grew up out of newly established freedom of this New World, in the 18th Century, its basic economic principles were seen to be those of capitalism. The fact that it is capitalism doesn't make it work. It works because it is the natural means for advancing the production of

wealth and assuring the most equitable distribution of that wealth among a free people.

#### Our Motor Of Production

The American economic system has three inter-related and indispensable ingredients: (1) private ownership of property; (2) the competitive market; and (3) the profit incentive. Every time throughout our nation's history that Government has acted in some manner to interfere with or curtail the natural forward thrust of either of these three motors driving our economic system the action has carried with it the danger of "killing the motor." Such actions in the past sometimes have "installed" the motor.

Profit incentive is the fuel of every forward business action and creator of wealth, as well as a basic motivator in all human behavior. Profit incentive in America already is terribly burdened by the most extravagant Federal government program in history and correspondingly back-breaking taxes. We need in Washington, in January 1967, not talk of ever bigger budgets and new taxes, but the wielding of history's biggest Axe!

#### Needed: Axe On Spending

With the cost of living soaring, and with our armies locked in a punishing and expensive stalemate war in Viet Nam, what's needed in Washington is common sense and courage—a reduction of from \$30 to \$40 billion in present Federal spending programs and governmental expenses. Our profit-stimulated productive system can only continue to support the world's best living standard and way of life if we increase, rather than curtail, its incentives. In the decisive weeks ahead, as important judgements and decisions are debated in Washington affecting the health and future of our economic system (as well as our national security), we intend to discuss in detail what makes the American system tick, what parts are played by private ownership, the competitive market, and the profit incentive.

Karl Marx set out to kill the motor of capitalism throughout the world. His prescription was Government (or "Social") own-

ership of all facilities of production and distribution, abolition of market competition through Government price-wage fixing, and abolition of the profit incentive. We mustn't do the Communists' work for them here. Our national security and continued prosperity require a

strengthening of the unmatched productive elements in our American system.

### Tempting Hot Breads

Brush melted butter in bottom of an 8-inch cake pan. Add preserves. Arrange rolls, overlapping, in a ring. Bake at 375° for 15 minutes. Turn out onto a plate. Drizzle with frosting from refrigerated roll package, if desired. Serve immediately. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

#### Fruit Flipovers

- 2 packages refrigerated flaky biscuits
- Strawberry, apricot or peach preserves or apple butter

Separate and roll each biscuit on a floured surface into a thin circle. Place a tablespoon of preserves in center of circle. Fold dough in half, pinching the edges together and sealing with a fork. Place on a greased cookie sheet and bake at 450° for 10 minutes. Dust with powdered sugar; serve immediately. 20 Flipovers.
