Chief Justice Will Be Mount Graduation Speaker



Earl Warren, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, will deliver the commencement address at the 159th Commencement Exercises to be held at Mount Saint Mary's College, on Wednesday, June 7, at 10:30 a.m.

Chief Justice Warren, a native of California, will receive an honorary doctor of laws degree from the college for his long years of public service. He has been Chief Justice since 1953 and prior to that served as Governor of California from 1943-1953. Other offices which he has held included that of Attorney General of California, District Attorney for Alameda County, and Deputy City Attorney for Oakland. He also has held minor posts and served with distinction in World War I.

Warren has been honored by several other colleges and universities including his alma mater, the University of California, from which he received an honorary degree.

He also has been cited by several foreign countries including Great Britain, Sweden, France, Italy, the Netherlands, and Luxembourg.

His Eminence Lawrence Cardinal Shehan, Archbishop of Baltimore and president of the college, ex officio, will confer the honor.

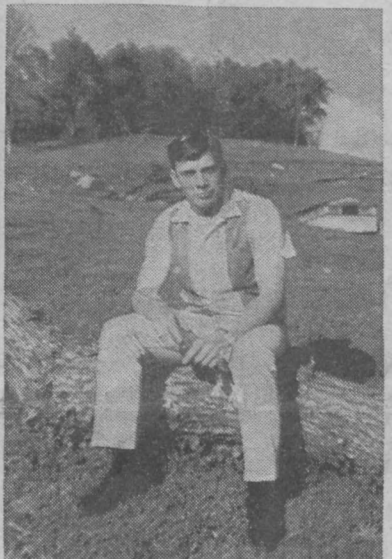
Miss Gay Chillemi, Baltimore soprano, will give their traditional concert at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday.

TOWN BOARD ORGANIZES; MAYOR NAMES AIDES

The Town Council organized Monday night at the first regular meeting held since the recent election. All members of the Board were present, including the newly-elected Commissioner, J. Ralph McDonnell, who had previously been sworn into office by the new trial magistrate, Ralph F. Ireland.

Mayor Guy A. Baker, Jr., announced the following appointments: Mrs. Yonnie Baker, Town Clerk; W. E. Law, Police Chief, and Quinn F. Topper, treasurer.

Harry Swomley, area farmer, was present and lodged a complaint concerning odor emanating from the local sewerage plant located near his property. Clarence E. Hahn also was present and requested installation of a new water service line to a house he owns on West Main St.

A discussion was held on the recent increase of rent of the house owned by the Town located at No. 2 Reservoir. No action was taken pending a 60-day study of the matter.

Council announced the following standing committees to serve for this term of office: Mayor Guy A. Baker, public safety; Quinn F. Topper, property and finance; Clarence P. Wachter, water system; Samuel C. Hays, sewerage system; Ralph McDonnell, streets.

Commissioner Hays gave a detailed report on the water system and offered several suggestions which he thought might improve operation of the system. His suggestions are now being studied by the town engineers. Consideration was given to Form-stoning the front of the Town Office but to date no contract has been let. A request by the Sportsmen's Club to erect a permanent bandstand on the carnival grounds was tabled because no representatives of the group were present to explain the details involved.

In other action taken during the meeting a \$50 donation to the Little League was authorized and it was agreed to have Washington Street surveyed before any grading or laying of roadway was begun. A new water line to the Waynesboro Road section is still under discussion and two plans are being considered. One would take the shortest course following Rt. 97 while the other route would be a bit more circuitous threading its way out the Mountain Road.

In the future, Council ordered all fire hydrants to be flushed at night to allow settling time before heavy drawing of water in the mornings.

Commissioner Hays discussed the installation of sewer overflow controls in Emmitt Gardens and stated he did not think that a previously selected area was proper and conducive to good operation. In an effort to keep public grounds tidied Council ordered its work crew to keep mowed the Little League Field, the Playground area and the Community Field.

Chief Law's monthly report to the Council showed 13 motor vehicle arrests; nine warnings issued, two accidents in Town investigated and four assists with the State Police on accidents. He reported. The town's two traffic signal systems not functioning properly and also suggested the erection of No U-Turn signs on East and West Main Streets. Chief Law also recommended to the Council that a system of licensing and inspection for bicycles be placed in effect here.

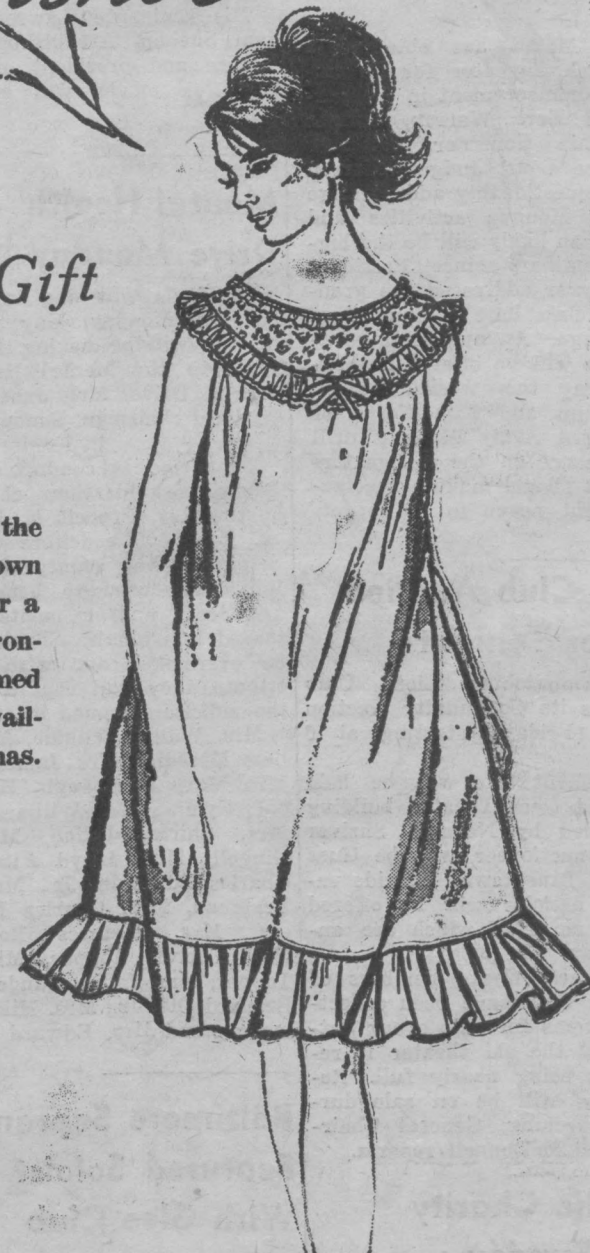

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Spring is summer job hunting season for many high school and college students. Students who will be taking a job for the first time and will need a social security number were urged by W. S. King, Social Security District Manager, to apply now and avoid the June rush.

By applying now, the student will avoid unnecessary delay. In late May and June the number of applications for social security cards is four to five times greater than in the other months of the year and some delays occur. Since employers need to see a new employee's social security card before he goes on duty, getting the card late could cause a delay in starting work, and result in missing good job opportunity.

King concluded by advising students not to wait until school is out to apply for their social security numbers. Applications may be obtained from the Hagerstown Social Security District Office located at 59 North Cannon Avenue or from most post offices.
