Bizet's Carmen, will be presented at St. Joseph College on May 2 by members of the music and drama departments of Catholic University. This is the first full-scale opera ever performed on the stage of the St. Joseph dePaul Auditorium.

The CU players, directed by Joseph Lewis, will perform "Carmen" in English, using the opera-comique version. Opera-comique, for which Bizet originally wrote Carmen, consists in a combination of operatic and spoken dialogue.

Mary D. Kable, R.N., M.S.N., has just completed the first session of a cancer nursing project cosponsored by The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston and the Southern Regional Education Board.

Miss Kable is coordinator of Medical-Surgical Nursing at St. Joseph College.

The project, a three-year training course offered in one and two week sessions throughout the year, is designed to improve the nursing care for cancer patients throughout the South.

Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute is one of the three largest cancer institutes in this country. Nurses participating in the project are nursing personnel from hospitals drawn from both administrative settings and faculty members from hospital settings and faculty members from baccalaureate and higher degree nursing schools across the South.

So be sure not to miss "The Thread That Runs So True" for a night of total enjoyment and never-ending laughter. The play will be presented to-night and Saturday at the local high school.

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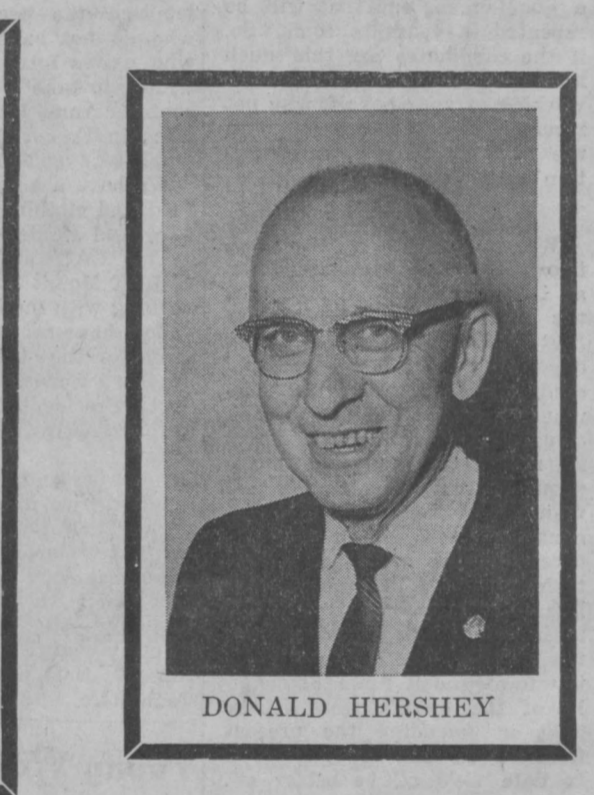

The Crazy "Smith" Family
A deeply probing examination of the Federal Budget for the 1968-69 fiscal year—\$186.1 billion, as submitted by President Johnson—would convince a family breadwinner that the financial affairs of our national government are being administered not by the hard rule of common sense but by the uncontrollable rule of political expedi-

cy. Any mature head of a family would reject the Budget as utterly unsound. It is based on the untenable proposition that you can have your cake and eat it too, the "Guns and Butter" doctrine.

If they were to be applied to the average American family, the rules used in the Federal budget-making and the stewardship of our national government would create the following situation:
A Sad Satire

The Smiths, with Papa's income at \$10,000, have been spending above income each year—on borrowed money. Papa's bank debt now is \$25,000, at an interest of 1500 (6%).

One son, GI Joe, is in the hospital with a terrifying malady of baffling nature. The doctors cannot promise a cure. The hospital bill is running \$1,600 a year and increasing surgery

costs are likely to be necessary, and all this probably will go on for years.

There is a Muskovite fissure in the rock strata beneath the house, undermining the entire property and posing great physical danger; and the only, un-easy "protection" against total destruction by earth-fault to both property and family is an insurance policy costing in premiums, \$4,000 a year.

The Smiths have nothing in the bank. They live from hand to mouth, but on a lavish scale. They have a hired girl, whose wages go up this year. She washes the dishes and cleans the house for Mrs. Smith, who is a very active social worker, constantly helping the "problem families" of the community. In fact, the Smiths have decided this year to hire a cook, so Mrs. Smith can have time enough for further uplifting work—such as, for instance, the teaching of dress-making to the women of some families whose breadwinners have left and refuse to support their wives and numerous children.

Join the "Now" Set
The Smiths this year are boosting their contributions to charitable organizations. And Mrs. Smith hopes to create some

new organizations this year, and start each of them off with a personal founders gift.

Their daughter Jane will be sent to an exclusive and expensive "finishing" school, and in June the Smiths will lay out the cash for a big church wedding, a champagne reception and a fancy trousseau. Jane's young man is unemployed and can't buy the engagement ring so Mrs. Smith has ordered a two-carat solitaire which mother and dad will pay out on the installment plan. This ring purchase, incidentally, is preventing the son in the hospital from getting plasma treatments recommended by the doctors—plasma is too expensive, Mrs. Smith decided.

The Smith's standard of living is constantly rising. Groceries are costing more, and the family is entertaining more. Jane's college expenses are increasing, and this year she must have a new sports car, an item which will add to Papa's debt.

The Philosophical View
Smith looks at it all this way:

"Well, I don't know much about family financing, or living on a budget. But it's wonderful to know that each month I can go down to the bank and

arrange a bigger total loan, to help pay some of the bills and to spend on the new things which we simply could not have if we had to be restricted only to my income. I don't guess we'll veer pay off the loan. But so what?"

"Our son GI Joe is critically ill and may die, and his hospital bills are a big expense, along with our hired help at home, insurance against that awful danger beneath our house (sometimes we can't sleep, thinking of it; once in a while it rumbles down there and the house shakes pretty wildly), and all the other expenses, like Jane's new car purchase, her sorority and college fees, and all the other things..."

"Well, I look at it like this: You only live once! Why worry? As long as the bank keeps lending us enough to meet our expanding expenses, we've got it made!"

This family's banker must be crazy, too! And what about the bankers who are keeping the Federal Government in elegant style and high society while our sons, nearly 600,000 of them are locked in desperate warfare with an implacable advancing enemy. These bankers include you and me.

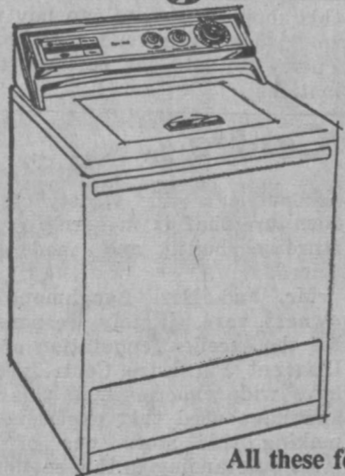

D.M.V. REPORT

Financial Protection For The Motorist

Under the Maryland Financial Responsibility Law, drivers and owners involved in reportable motor vehicle accidents (property damages in excess of \$100 or personal injury) must present evidence of financial responsibility, whether at fault or not, unless their vehicle was legally parked at time of the accident. Reports must be filed with the Department of Motor Vehicles within 15 days of the accident.

According to Motor Vehicle Commissioner John R. Jewell "the purpose of the Maryland Financial Responsibility Law is to protect the public from the reckless operation of motor vehicles by irresponsible persons and to guarantee to motorists that they will be compensated for injuries and property damages suffered from the negligence of uninsured vehicle owners."

Reports coming to DMV are routed to the Financial Responsibility Section where they are matched according to accident involvement. Insured motorists are required to submit an SR-21 insurance certificate with their accident report. This certification attests to their financial responsibility and thereby closes the file insofar as their financial responsibility is concerned.

Uninsured motorists have other alternatives which may be taken to avoid suspension of driving privileges and vehicle registration. These include releases from parties receiving damages or injuries, or the posting of required collateral security with this Department.

As the facts are assembled on each accident, additional information or reports may be requested by DMV's Financial Responsibility Section. The process of matching the accident reports and all pertinent information from everyone involved in an accident, continues until the file is complete with sufficient data to make decisions on damage claims.

Should the suspension become effective, due to unsatisfied claims for damages or injuries or because the uninsured motorist was un-

able to post adequate collateral with DMV, investigators are then dispatched to pick up the operator's driving license, vehicle tags and registration card.

Once suspended, it is necessary for a motorist to first, obtain releases from all persons suffering personal injury or property damages as a result of the accident involving his vehicle and second, to file an SR-22 insurance certificate (proof of financial responsibility) before he can be considered for reinstatement.

SR-22 insurance coverages must be maintained for a full 36 month

period. Suspensions are permanently posted on the driver's record and vehicle registration privileges are flagged to prevent renewal during the suspension period.

Accident records are maintained for at least three years by the Department's Financial Responsibility Section which gathers data on approximately 200,000 cases annually. Seventy-four employees, including a chief and assistant chief, are required to maintain the mass of statistics which are meticulously recorded and filed for ready reference.



The Maryland Department of Game and Inland Fish will release a weekly fishing report beginning this month, according to Marvin Myers of the Division of Information and Extension.

The releases will be made available to the press, TV and radio stations and interested organizations. The report, as in past years, will include water conditions, popular fishing areas and suggestions as to the best baits and lures to be used.

Maryland Game and Inland Fish Department Wildlife Officers thru-out the state will report area fishing conditions weekly to the Department's radio and TV section. According to Myers, the weekly fishing reports will continue thru-out the summer and early fall.

Among the radio stations cooperating in broadcasting the reports are WTRR, Westminster and WTHU, Thurmont.

Wildlife Management Division of the Department of Game and Inland Fish is interested in the answer to this question also.

To determine the number of stocked trout caught by fishermen a creel census will be conducted on two designated trout streams this year.

The census will be taken thru-out the entire stocking schedule. The two trout streams involved are Big Hunting Creek in Frederick County from April through June 2 and Severn Run in Anne Arundel County from April 15 through May 12.

During this period, fishermen will be sampled statistically. The information gathered will then be expanded to provide an indication of the total number of trout caught by fishermen in each stream.

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BABSON'S POINT OF VIEW

Cash Registers To Jingle This Summer
BABSON PARK, Mass., April 25—Now that Easter is over and taxpayers have—or ought to have—paid up what they

owed Uncle Sam on last year's earnings, one of the big questions is: How freely will consumers spend this summer?

Current Economic Status
Upon the ultimate answer to that question quite a good deal hangs. We are now in the eighth year of a cyclical expansion which has chalked up a \$300-billion increase in Gross National Product. But the business community's confidence in the outlook is dampened by a sizable number of uncertainties—political, military, and economic.

While industrial production just hasn't made the long strides earlier forecast by some observers, with a strong boost from inflation GNP has roared ahead at near-record speed. However, uncertainties—especially concerning possible government tax moves and the imposition of wage and price controls—have added a note of caution.

Personal Income
Yet very much on the plus side in any assessment of the situation is the extremely high level of employment which promises to be well maintained over the near term at least. Unemployment is being held to 4% of the total labor force...

about as close to minimum as we can expect.

Perhaps the biggest plus of all is personal income. Already at a record high it continues to move smartly upward. The increases being registered reflect gains in several parts of the economy, including advances in wages and salaries, in business and professional income, in rental returns, as well as in dividend and interest payments.

Living Costs, Savings, Purchasing Power
How much money people have available for discretionary purchasing depends in large measure on what it costs them to obtain the necessities of life: food, clothing, and shelter. Living costs go on climbing relentlessly. At the end of February, latest month for which complete figures are available, consumer prices were 3.7% above a year earlier—at a record 119% of the 1957-59 average.

But how much money is available for spending depends also on the amounts stashed away in people's socks. And since the middle of last year, savings have risen sharply, climbing to very high levels. This increase in total savings and in the share of income allocated to savings is the consumer's answer to rising prices and higher interest rates.

Boosts in total personal income and in income after taxes have, for some time, been outpacing increases in living costs. As a result, a majority of the nation's consumers are in a favorable buying position even though many people have not shared fully in the broad income gains achieved nationally.

Consumer Attitudes
People use their purchasing power in two ways. Either they buy goods and services, or they buy financial assets (savings). Their choice is limited by their income and/or their ability to obtain credit, as well as by the cost of that credit. Purchasing decisions are governed also by a balancing of the benefits and the costs of what is to be bought.

How will consumers react this summer? Since uncertainty begets caution and restraint, our guess is that by and large consumers will continue to buy more freely than last year. But spending decisions will be further influenced by price and tax developments, other government moves here and abroad, our commitment in Vietnam, and by business and employment conditions prevailing in local areas. While profligate spending may



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
