That dandy little rain which began Tuesday night and continued through Wednesday brought us over an inch and a half of much needed precipitation. Statistics, provided by Mrs. Paul Beale, local weather observer, indicate the year has been abnormally dry so far. In February little more than a half inch of rain fell as compared to a norm of between two and three inches. March was closer to normal with three incehs, however, April began on the dry side and up until Wednesday we had only half an inch of Total "precip" precipitation. for April to date is two inches, about two below the normal downfall.

The books are closed, all the candidates in and the balloting is about to commence. I am referring, of course, to our Town Election which will be held Tuesday. This year's registration has been very good with quite a number of new voters on the books. This year's crop of candidates for office is about the largest I have ever seen. We can't put our finger on what stimulated this year's interest in the election but we feel it is a good omen, one that will be repeated in years to come. So, if the candidates are this much interested in taking office and working in your behalf, why not return this interest and go to the polls Tuesday in reciprocation?
