

Ed Montgomery, reporter on the San Francisco Examiner, infiltrated the revolutionary underground and saw some activities that the American public is most reluctant to believe: "A forerunner to a proposed nationwide Revolutionary Party, The Revolutionary Union (RU) membership is comprised of a select group of Marxist-Maoist leaders from within the underground Red Guard, the Students for a Democratic Society, The Resistance, Progressive Labor Party, and similar Communist dominated groups (such as the Black Panther Party). "There are chapters in Palo

Alto, San Francisco and Berkeley. Classes are conducted regularly in revolutionary tactics, guerrilla warfare and sabotage. Training sessions in the use of rifles, handguns and automatic weapons are held periodically in a canyon behind Half Moon Bay and in the East Bay hills. Heading up the RU is Prof. H. Bruce Franklin of Stanford, an avowed Marxist-Maoist revolutionary who co-founded the lo-cal Red Guard." Pushing Up "The Time"

My staff and I for years have been reading the Communist press. We get the U. S. Communist publications, the Cuban Granma, the Maoist Chinese underground papers, and the various communications of Soviet Russia to their cadres of revolutionaries throughout the world. In the last six months the entire world Communist apparatus has clearly evidenced a belief that the "Time" for a revotionary strike within America is swiftly approaching. The size of the far-flung armed revolutionary forces, and the failure of U. S. security agencies to deal with them, has excited the expectations of the Communists and their allies. Eldridge Cleaver and his comrades in the Black Panther Party, openly working to mobilize a mammoth revolutionary army to seize control of the nation, now have an urgent slogan: "Seize the Time!" Every issue of the Black Panther newspaper carries ever-more strident

calls to arm. Black Pancher Party officials openly claim an armed following of millions. With their weekly newspaper they are emotionally agitating all who can be reached, and its circulation is spreading through-out the "inner city" areas of the nation.






