SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Q. After I began receiving social security benefits, I returned to work. Will this additional work increase my benefit?

A. The law provides for an automatic annual refiguring of benefits to determine if a beneficiary's earnings after retirement will increase his benefit. If an increase results, the benefit increase will be automatic. You need not take any action of your

What affect is there in my social security benefit if I take it at age 62 rather than waiting until age 65?

A. Your social security benefit, if taken prior to age 65, is reduced by 5/9 of 1% for each month before age 65. At age 62 the benefit reduction is 20%.

Q. I am permitted to earn any amount for the year in which I am age 72. Is that correct?

A. You are permitted to earn any amount beginning the month of the year in which you are 72. Any months of the year in which you are under 72 are still subject to the annual carnings test of \$1,680.00. For more information on the annual earings test, contact your nearest social security office.

Q. I am thinking of retiring but find it very difficult to call at the social security office during their office hours. Can this matter be handled any other way?

A. Yes. Telephone the office at your convenience. Your retirement application will be completed over the telephone and then mailed to you for your signature. Any required proofs can also be returned to the office by mail along with the signed application.

Q. I began receiving my social security benefit at age 62. Is it true that my benefit will be increased when I become 65? A. No. Your benefit will not

be increased when you reach 65. When you filed at age 62, your benefit was permanently reduced. The only exception to this rule is those cases where a beneficiary did not receive a check before age 65 due to working. At age 65 cases are refigured to take into account those months for which no checks were received. In these cases only will an increase re-

sult. Q. I keep reading and hearing that a person should contact his social security office two to three months before he plans to retire. Why is this important?

A. By contacting the office two to three months before retirement, we can start the wheels turning. We can obtain the necessary application and any necessary proofs. We can then process your claim so that when your first retirement check is due it will be on time.

BACKGROUND

OFFICE OF THE CLERK OF THE COURT

The position of Clerk is one of the oldest in Maryland; It was created by the State Constitution in 1650. It is a State Office and the Clerk, who must be bonded, is responsible to the State Comptroller.

The Clerk's office performs a wide variety of administrative duties which help keep the court system operating in orderly fashion.

DEEDS

One of the most important responsibilities of this office, is the accurate preservation of the DEEDS, MORTGAGES and other LEGAL INSTRUMENTS relating to your homes and properties.

OTHER DUTIES

Among the duties of the staff are: to receive and file suits, maintain dockets of the various courts, assign civil cases for trial, record verdicts and judgments of the Courts and issue the writs, or orders of the Court.

LICENSES

In addition, the Clerk's office issues marriage, traders' and liquor licenses, among others. And, as of January 1, 1964, the General Assembly granted the Clerk permission to perform civil marriages.
