### Another Look At Petroleum

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., October 7, 1971—Petroleum issues have been lacking in vitality for some time, even while the general market was still making some net progress (before the reassessment phase that took over for the better part of September.) This weakness in oils has been caused by a number of domestic and international events. The petroleum companies with substantial foreign interests have been particularly hard hit.

Natural gas producers had been attracting investor buying interest on the strength of more realistic rate-setting decisions, but even these issues have lost some of their luster since the establishment of the emergency wage-price freeze. It is difficult to segregate oil and gas stocks per se since these two resources are found in similar geological formations, with one well often producing both. Rambunctious OPEC Group

The major foreign oil-producing nations—having tasted success in negotiations over recent years, especially where there have been aggressive regimes such as now exist in Libya, Indonesia, and Venezuela—have become increasingly militant in their defiance against the international oil companies operating in these oil-fertile lands. To strengthen their bargaining power even further, eleven of these nations—banded together as the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC)—have taken a more demanding position on a broad front.

Meeting in Vienna last July, the group formed committees to blueprint plans for an outright ownership share in existing oil concessions. An interest of 20% appears to be the initial objective. The date for reporting back was set for September 22, but the urgency of OPEC's position was highlighted when the date was advanced to August 27.

Results will probably not be known for some time. As the dollar faltered during the summer, OPEC expressed further concern since oil revenues to member nations are largely in dollars. In addition to possible compensation for current revaluation, negotiations for an adjusting index tied to world inflation may come under consideration. Negotiations will undoubtedly be prolonged, and it is more than possible OPEC will prevail in most of its demands.

**The Freeze**  
Some of President Nixon's economic controls will also have an effect on the industry, depending on the final degree of implementation. For instance, natural gas rates are apparently frozen, but if this turns out to be a deterrent to exploration and production, an exception could be granted. Natural gas firms have been making progress supplywise with incentive from pre-freeze hikes.

In other areas of the program, while the 10% surcharge does not affect crude oil imports, the OPEC discussions have kept stocks of the international on depressed levels. On the home front, relief from the gasoline price wars is possible, although prices are now pegged by the freeze at somewhat unsatisfactory quotes. Domestic crude prices are also frozen, but present levels are not regarded as too unrealistic and can be tolerated, at least for a time.

But—the Founding Fathers—also drew a sharp line of demarcation between church and state. The lessons and tragedies of the old world were not forgotten in the new. However, despite the question of "this and that" America was founded and built upon a firm foundation of "this nation under God". Through the "dark years" a supreme faith

brought forth the surrender at Yorktown and the establishment, under the Constitution, of a new nation. 98. In memory of Mary E. Wachter, wife of Denton E. Wachter, born April 19, 1859, died February 5, 1941.  
9. Edward Ohler—Died July 22, 1958.  
10. Helen (Ohler) Valentine—Died August 15, 1953.  
Note: The wife of Elmer Valentine. Both Helen (Ohler) Valentine and her husband, are interred at Mt. Tabor Lutheran Churchyard at Rocky Ridge, Maryland.  
On a slip of paper, included in the Bible records, is the following pertaining to the Ohler family:

Children of Thomas (3) and Catharine Ohler:  
Merry R. (4) Ohler was born November 27th, 1819.  
Elizabeth A. (4) Ohler Morrison was born November 19, 1820.

Esther (4) Ohler was born April 1, 1828.

## Rev. Mulligan Named Priest's Superior

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# LOOKING AHEAD

### Press "Prerogatives" And Limitations

Article I of the Bill of Rights (amendments written into the Constitution by Congress in 1789 and ratified by sufficient states to make them a part of the Constitution on December 15, 1791) says "Congress shall make no laws respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

This amendment clearly provides that there shall be no law abridging (curtailing) freedom of speech and press. "Speech," in this connotation, means the spoken word, and "Press" means the printed word. Laws have evolved out of this Constitutional framework, as members of the Constitutional Convention intended, to apply legal safeguards around these basic freedoms. The laws given an individual, a group, or an organization (business, professional or otherwise) the "right" to free speech and free press—equally. They do not confer on any individual, group or organization any special "right." Thus newspapers, magazines, television, radio stations, and book

publishers, have the same rights and are subject to the same limitation on free speech—written or spoken—as you and I; no more and no less. **Shown Special Courtesies**

The "prerogatives" of the press have grown up, without benefit of legal sanction, in an evolving free society. A newspaperman has no more legal right to sit in a special U. S. Senate gallery than any other citizen. He sits in a special "Press Gallery" in the Senate chamber, going and coming as he pleases, through the courtesy of the Senate which makes its own rules. The public generally, respectful of the citizen - owned-and-operated news gathering and news reporting organizations, extends the same courtesy wherever news reporters work.

In my experience in journalism, I have known Governors and other public officials to "bar" a certain reporter or all employees of a particular newspaper from attending press conferences. There is no law which would force such a public official to provide "news" to a news agency. It is traditional to extend the courtesy to "the press" but not mandatory. The courtesy is founded on the assumed integrity of "the press."

"Bad Apples" Too  
And like any other business

or profession, including politics, journalism has its "bad apples." Press integrity requires that a reporter, newspaper or television station report news correctly, honestly, fairly and without bias. It is a demanding requirement, sometimes terribly difficult to fulfill; but a free press is obligated to do no less. This is the responsibility, of course, which justifies "freedom of the press" and any special prerogatives. Any segment of the press that rejects the responsibility or abuses the freedom that goes with it is not fit to enjoy the prerogatives that have been granted the press by our society.

It is against this background perspective on "freedom of the press" that Joseph Keeley wrote his book, *The Left-Leaning Antenna*, which spotlights some of the "bad apples" in our journalism of today. Here is one of the most powerful revelations in Keeley's well-written, thoroughly-documented 320-page book: **Slanted War "News"**

"Because of its war coverage, NBC ran afoul not of Spiro Agnew but of a majority of its affiliated stations. *Variety*, for May 27, 1970, reported that in a closed meeting of NBC affiliates held May 21 in New York, 60 per cent of the stations by a hand vote declared the network news coverage was biased.

### FCC Lists Musical Oct. 9 On Campus

Frederick Community College opens its theatrical year with the musical, *The Diary of Adam & Eve*, based on the story by Mark Twain. Performed professionally by the Repertory Theatre of America, Alpha-Omega Players, this Broadway comedy may be seen free of charge Saturday, October 9, at 8 p.m. in the Field House on the FCC campus.

"Specifically," said *Variety*, "the 60% majority was accusing the network news division of being slanted in favor of the Vietnam War, torn America apart. Frank Shakespeare, one time CBS news executive, was against the war in Vietnam." He came across five soldiers who had been in the field fighting for two days in Vietnam recently as "dead tired, exhausted, and scared to death." When a newly-commissioned second lieutenant ordered them back into action, they refused. Shakespeare reports that on his return to the U. S., he saw the incident dramatized on two major network news shows.

"Both of these programs," he said, "indicated that perhaps the American Army was refusing to fight... That could not have been further from the truth and it was totally misleading the American public."

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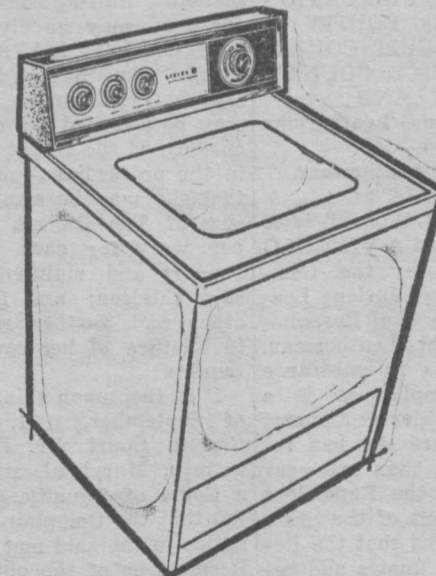


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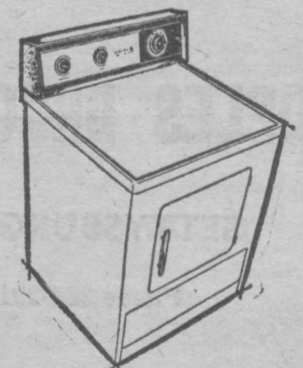
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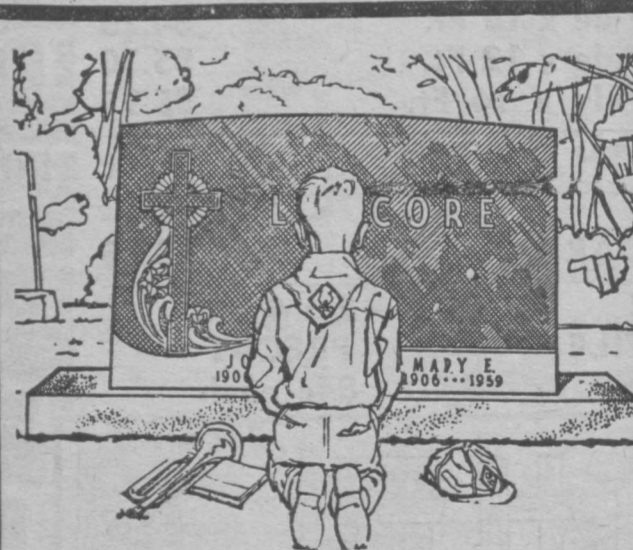
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**Brute Auxiliary Has Regular Meeting**

Veterans Administration home loan activities set a 14 year record high in FY 1971 with 25,000 GI loans guaranteed in the one month of June.

**FHA LOANS NEARLY \$8 MILLION IN DISTRICT**  
Farmers Home Administration fiscal year 1971 loan programs totalled \$7.8 million for Maryland's Sixth Congressional District, according to Rep. Goodloe Byron.

Based on statistics released from FHA, Byron said 356 grants and loans were made in Western Maryland including \$500,000 in farm operating and ownership loans, \$4.9 million in home loans and \$2.4 million in development of water and waste disposal systems.

The county by county tabulations shows Garrett County receiving 40 grants-loans for \$1.1 million; Allegany County, 41 grants-loans for \$1.6 million; Washington County, 94 grants-loans for \$1.5 million; Frederick County, 79 grants-loans for \$1.2 million; Carroll County, 88 grants-loans for \$2.1 million; and Baltimore County, 14 grants-loans for \$250,000.

Veterans in training under the GI Bill this year totalled 1,585,000. This VA program showed a 31% increase over 1970, the highest rate since 1952.
