Most Anything At A Glance

This week brought at least one day of the much-needed rain we've all been looking for. Unfortunately, it came a little too late for most of the farmers' crops. It also did not amount to much, from what I understand; at least it was not enough to take the restrictions off water use. So don't get those garden hoses out just yet.

In less than a week it will be time for all you voters to get out to the polls and cast your ballots in the Primary Election. As I have noted before the election will be held at the New School. There are a number of candidates running for several of the offices in the County, so you will have a wide selection of men and women to choose from. Make it a point to show your interest in the issues facing our county and state by getting on down to vote on Tuesday, September 10. If you don't vote, you don't count.

I hear that one of the issues facing the county commissioners has received quite a play in the past couple of weeks. An editorial on the area bridges which appeared in this paper a couple of weeks ago led to an article in the Gettysburg Times and an editorial in the Frederick News-Post. Perhaps if more issues were given such coverage the county officials would begin to pay some attention to our neck of the woods. Adding with the bridge situation we have many other problems which are often given less attention than they deserve. For example, the roads around here are in bad need of repair, our water and sewer situation could use some additional help from the county, crime in our growing community should be looked into and reduced in some way. These are all things that, if I am not mistaken, the county could lend a hand in. Maybe when we get those two extra commissioners on the board some things will begin to happen.

The three letters E-P-A have gained a new interest in recent times. What with all the regulations and restrictions this Environmental Protection Agency has placed on small towns such as ours, development of any sort has become not only a more costly but also a more involved and complicated operation. According to a recent statement by Robert Ryan, director of the office of legislation of EPA, things are looking worse rather than better. He said, "No criticism of EPA would be complete without a few words about our regulations, which in the past have been mind-boggling in complexity. In the face of a clear instruction from the Congress in the clean water amendments of 1972 to do away with red tape and follow formalisms, we came out with some regulations so complex that they could only be understood by the authors." You'd think that someone in government has enough knowledge to formulate rules and regulations that can be understood by the people that have to use them.

Today no one can build a home without suffering an inquisitorial interview with land-use planners. The most basic property rights can be abrogated by what amounts to no more than a local clique "serving" behind the shield of state or federal law. These planners are so interested in conserving our wide open spaces that if many of them had their way nothing would change. Then in a few years we could all enjoy the great, green pastures as we rode down the out-dated roadways or camped from place to place in search of a site where building would be permitted. Even in the field of health, there are those planners who would like to dump stiff regulations on medicine in the name of "protecting the common good." The former president of the AMA has commented that a

Demo Candidates Express Views

Candidates for state and county offices who attended the Democratic Candidates' Night, sponsored by the Emmitsburg Democratic Central Committee last week, commented on various issues which will face elected officials in the next few years.

The following are comments made by some of the Democratic candidates who spoke at the meeting:

House of Delegates:
Michael Binko: "I can't tell you if I'm a conservative or a liberal, and I'm surely not too much middle of the road. . . I'm curious, and I believe that curiosity on the part of an elected official is one of the most important ingredients he can take."
Arthur Caple: "Public service is always at issue and at stake whenever we consider public office. My responsibility to you, the people, would be a responsive, honest and sincere approach to any questions, concerns or issues that would be of interest to any citizen regardless of where they live."

K. Grady Caple: "I believe the most important issue facing the American people today is credibility of their elected officials at all levels. . . I'm interested in good government, I promise to hear and represent the people with honesty and integrity and attempt to restore a morality and conscience in government."
Raymond Corbin: "My slogan is 'Let's take the tricks out of politics'. . . No man can go over there and straighten this thing up in one year or one term, it's going to take long hard work for whoever gets there."

Robert Neal: "I'm the only candidate that ever comes over to Emmitsburg on a daily basis to work. . . This district is not only a fairly large proportion of the state of Maryland, but it should be, as I suppose, the fairest part of Maryland."
Mary Sharon: "I'm deeply concerned about citizens getting involved in education and in government. . . One of the chief concerns that I find with the residents of Emmitsburg and Creagerstown districts, and it's understandable, is the fact that you have been neglected up in this end of the county."

County Treasurer:
Charlotte Yarrall Kerrigan: "My platform has always been 'experience counts,' to that I have added honesty."
Sheriff:
Donald Barnes: "I see a great need and a great challenge in the Frederick County sheriff's department. . . Law has come a long way. . . The sheriff's department's position hasn't changed since it came over. . . I think it's time in Frederick County that we get behind somebody that can make it an assisting law enforcement office."

William Shepley: "The biggest issue in the whole election is still one thing, that's open, honest and responsive government, electing people that have guts enough to work 100 per cent for you. . . My platform has been law and order. To have law and order consists of four things: You've got to have a good political system. . . you've got to have a good social system. . . you've got to have a good economic system, and a good law enforcement system. I'm willing to . . . dedicate myself 100 per cent, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week."

State Central Committee:
Frederick Bower: "The Democratic State Central Committee provides the leadership for the partisan Democratic politics in Frederick County. . . I didn't say the power. . . I said the leadership. Power comes from the people."
Clarence Jewell III: "The people in this country have apathy and distrust now. They don't believe in their leaders. We need responsive leadership and we need an involved electorate."
George Pasley: "I'm the youngest candidate for office in Frederick County. A lot of my friends say that political parties have no purpose. . . I think that's wrong. I think if we work together we can prove that the political parties can serve a useful purpose in Frederick County."

Odette Reeder: "There is a place in politics for more women and I think that we can contribute a lot. We Democrats need to stick together. We need the wisdom of the

Old Guard, the vitality of the New Guard, and the common sense of the Middle Guard."
Thomas Slater: "I think there are three things you should consider when you choose the members of the Central Committee. . . experience. . . a platform, what is the candidate saying about the issues. . . and. . . elect people who would work."

Andrew Stanscoff: "It's very important not to trade our heritage, our freedom, for a 'pot of lentils.' I'm talking about all the miasms of modern things that we're being offered."
County Commissioners: While Richard Berger: "While I advocate growth to a degree, there's no way in the world we can keep from it. As long as there's a continued population we will continue to have growth."
Sanford Blum: "I'm aware that you have two policemen. . . as county commissioner I've recommended several plans if I am elected to reduce crime by providing more police in the communities."

Richard Curtis: "May I rebuke you or at least gently rebuke some of you people who have been born and raised here through many, many generations. . . We all have allowed things to happen to this county in the last four or five years that. . . bother me deeply. . . All of our other social problems spring up from (the land use issue)."
Lawrence Dorsey: "The next board of county commissioners will be faced with management of a \$30 million business, this is big business. . . I believe that only by working together with open minds and communication with each other and by respecting each other can we have a better Frederick County."

Robert Gary: "We want planned growth. . . we want to be able to provide services adequate to that growth; I think we're getting into trouble now as far as services are concerned with the growth we've had."
Jack Hyden, Jr.: "We've got to keep the County, its beauty and historic past, always in our minds. Also we have to plan this growth. . . we must have proper schools, the proper services, the proper recreation areas. We've got to plan it."
Barry Lucey: "There is no doubt in my mind that land use is the most important issue that the next board of county commissioners is going to have to grapple with. . . Private rights versus public rights are going to come more into focus in the next few years."
Gordon Simms: "The four major issues in the campaign. . . are planned growth versus non-growth. . . care for the elderly. . . your educational system. . . and. . . wage and earning power in this county."
Edgar Virts, Jr.: "When I am confronted with the problems in Frederick County I feel a little bit like a mosquito in a nudist camp. . . I know what to do but I just don't know where to start."

Other candidates who spoke at the meeting, but who were not quoted above, were: Bruce L. Welch, candidate for Congress, District 6; George Flickinger, John Georgantis, Crummell Jacobs, and Richard Stetely, all candidates for Sheriff; Wilbur Ford, Jr., James Murphy, Austin Powell, and George Weatherholt, all candidates for State Central Committee; Sterling Bollinger, Jr., John M. Crum, Daniel Poole, and Howard Wachter, all candidates for County Commissioner; Thomas Eichelberger, candidate for Register of Wills; Robert Rothenhaefer, candidate for State Attorney; Pauline Garber, candidate for Clerk of Court; Wallace Hutton, candidate for the State Senate from the Third District; and C. Clifton Virts and Galen Clagett, candidates for the House of Delegates from District 3-B.

The primary election will take place Tuesday, September 10, in Emmitsburg, the voting will be held at the new school. Persons who need transportation to the polls may call 447-2000 or 447-6209.

Traffic Safety Week has been proclaimed in Frederick County from September 9th through September 15th.

The Young Adults of Thurmont are interested in the safety of all and are trying to make a point that it is up to each one to obey the laws of the highway, not only when someone is watching.

Over the Labor Day holiday, Frederick County had no traffic fatalities. There were some minor accidents and minor injuries over the vacation weekend. The reason for this good record was: gas shortage; lower speed limits, and being aware of the following:

1. Vehicle in good condition.
2. Use Seat Belts—fatalities are cut 20% when seat belts are used.
3. Look with caution—back with care.
4. Keep back a safe distance from the car ahead.
5. Signal intentions when moving from parking position or when changing lanes.
6. Be sure it is safe before crossing an intersection.
7. Don't take chances when passing.
8. Use every precaution when stopped on highway for any cause.
9. Keep your Temper in traffic.
10. Remember Pedestrians
11. No Alcohol—alcohol is a factor in more than half of all traffic deaths.
12. Obey Speed Limits—Speeding is involved in 30% of the accidents.

One of the most tragic aspects of traffic death is the fact that practically everyone of the accidents could have been avoided. In each case a little more leeway for possible trouble, a little more consideration, a little more sober sensible driving could prevent accidents.

Community Show Set For Next Week

The 18th annual Thurmont and Emmitsburg Community Show will be held on Friday, Sept. 13, Saturday, Sept. 14, and Sunday, Sept. 15, at Catoctin High School in Thurmont.

Residents from the Catoctin High School area may enter their exhibits on Thursday evening, Sept. 12, from 6 to 9 p.m., and on Friday morning, Sept. 13, from 8 to 11:30 a.m., at Catoctin High School. Only exhibits grown or made by the exhibitor shall be eligible for a prize. One entry per person is permitted in each class. Ribbons and prize money amounting to \$1200.00 will be given to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners. Departments are: fresh fruits,

fresh vegetables, canned fruits, canned vegetables, jellies and preserves, pickles, laked products, mats, sewing (crocheting, needlework, embroidery and knitting) flowers, corn, small grains and seeds, hay, nuts, poultry, eggs, arts and crafts, home products, miscellaneous and youth dept.

The show opens to the public on Friday, Sept. 13, at 6 p.m. At 8 p.m., a variety program will be presented in the high school auditorium. A special feature this year will be the introduction of the officers of the Maryland State Grange by State Master William Burrell. The Maryland State Grange is celebrating its centennial year.

Highlighting the entertainment will be the presentation of the FFA Chapter Sweetheart and Community Farm Queen. National Grange Master John W. Scott, will announce the queen.

A cake sale will be held in the auditorium at 9 p.m. and the 1st Catoctin Area FFA Alumni Beef Sale will be held at 9:30 p.m. in the agriculture department in Friday.

Also from 9 to 11 p.m., a dance will be held in the school cafeteria, with music by "Fire and Rain" from Waynesboro.

Saturday, Sept. 14, the show opens at 10 a.m. At 10:30 a.m., a pet show will be held in back of Catoctin High. Entries will be accepted from any resident in the Catoctin School Area. Judges will be Sandy Barrett, Ray Toms and Gary Jagow.

At 11:30 a.m., a bicycle rodeo will be held in the backlot at the school. Thurmont Police Chief Herman Shook, and Emmitsburg Police Chief Henry Filler, and Carlos Englar, will be officials for the rodeo.

All bicycles and tricycles must be furnished by the contestants. Immediately following will be the pie eating and greased pig contests.

From 12 noon to 7 p.m. an old time steam festival will take place on the Catoctin school grounds. Activities will begin at 1 p.m. with threshing a load of wheat pulled by a team of horses owned by Harry "Skip" Lewis of Woodsboro. James Hesson, of Smithsburg with his threshing machine and 1923 Frick Eclipse steam engine (weighing 12 tons) will be threshing wheat at 1 p.m., 3 p.m., and 6 p.m. Straw will be baled by an old Ann Arbor wire baler. Old farm tractors, antique cars, gasoline engines, horse equipment and horses, will be on display.

At 3 p.m., a roast turkey supper will be served in the Catoctin High School cafeteria by the Thurmont Grange. Adults \$3.00, children (under 12) \$1.50.

At 7:30 p.m., the Westminster Municipal Band will present a band concert in the school auditorium. No admission will be charged.

Crafts, quilts, and antiques will be displayed by local exhibitors. These items will be for sale during the show.

On Sunday, September 15, the show opens at 12 noon. The Emmitsburg Grange will serve a chicken bar-b-que starting at 12 noon. Adults \$2.75, children (under 12) \$1.50.

Steam engine and threshing demonstrations will be given at 1:30 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. Other activities will be held during the afternoon. Music will be furnished by Alban Little at the organ. A silver offering will be accepted and door prizes will be drawn during the three day show. Exhibits may be claimed after 5 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 15.

Farewell Party For Fr. King Held

A farewell party for Rev. John F. King, C.M., pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Emmitsburg, was held recently in the parish grove.

A large crowd of community leaders, parishioners, relatives and friends turned out to honor Father King who departed this week for a new assignment in Miami, Florida.

Father King came to St. Joseph's in 1967 as assistant pastor and has served as pastor since 1968. Earlier assignments for the Vincentian Fathers (Congregation of the Mission) took Father King to the Panama Canal Zone, Canada, and many points in the eastern United States.

A native of Pennsylvania, the son of the late John F. and Minnie Davis King, Father King was ordained from Mary Immaculate Seminary, Northampton, Pennsylvania, in 1942.

The farewell party was hosted by the Parish Council with Council President Philip Topper as emcee. Among the gifts presented to Father King was an album containing photographs of families in the parish. Refreshments were arranged by the Ladies of the Sodality, chaired by Mrs. Helen Brown.

Father King's new address is: St. Vincent de Paul Rectory, 2000 N.W. 103rd St., Miami, Florida 33147.

St. Joseph's Parish in Emmitsburg is one of the oldest in the Baltimore Archdiocese, dating back to 1793. It was served in the beginning by missionary priests. The first resident pastor, who arrived in 1805, was the French emigre priest, Rev. John Dubois. During his five-year tenure, Father Dubois founded Mount St. Mary's College and welcomed Mother Seton and her little band of sisters to the valley.

Vincentian priests have administered the parish continuously since 1852. The coming of the Congregation of the Mission to Emmitsburg was prompted by the union of Mother Seton's sisters with the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul in Paris and Vincentian priests continue to serve as spiritual directors for the sisters whose provincial house is nearby.

The building which today houses St. Joseph's Church was dedicated in 1842. A solid brick structure in the Italian Renaissance style, the church was completely redecorated in 1956 and has since seen the addition of a public address system and air conditioning. A new roof was recently installed under Father King's administration.

Rev. Harry T. Kuhn, C.M., is the new pastor of the 400-family parish.

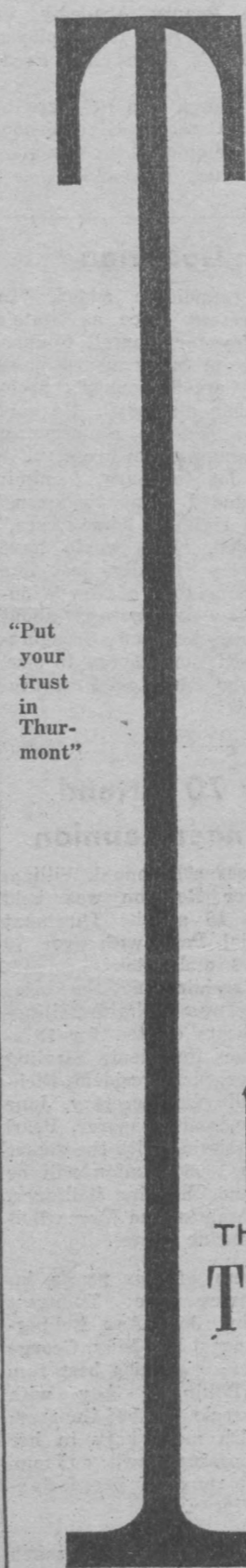

FREDERICK COUNTY BACKGROUNDS

The Eyster (Eister-Oyster)
Family

"Life has loveliness to sell,
All beautiful and splendid
things—
Blue waves whitened on a

Before referring to the records of the Trinity Lutheran church, of Taneytown, Maryland, for data regarding the Eyster (Oyster-Eister) fami-

ly, a visit to old Elias Lutheran and Reformed will prove most enlightening. With the exception of the one marked grave in Tom's Creek churchyard, the early members of the Eyster clan are interred in this burial ground. Of course it is quite possible that some Eysters are buried in the now famous Monocacy graveyard for they undoubtedly chase into Maryland from York County, Pennsylvania, with the Monocacy settlers.

Andrew Eyster, silversmith and clock maker, was the second of the family, in Emmitsburg, to be mentioned in the

records, and the next oldest, in point of birth, to be interred in the old churchyard. Jacob Oyster (or Eyster), who was born in 1761 and died in 1825, was the first.

Andrew Eyster was twice married—first to Mary Winter and second, to Lavinia —?—. One son, John Thomas Eyster, was born to the first union. The large stone in the family burial plot was erected by John Thomas Eyster to the memory of his mother and although he himself is not buried here, his name and the dates of his birth and death are included

in the inscription—as follows:

3. In memory of Mary Margaret Winter, wife of Andrew Eyster, born September 4, 1801, died February 10, 1833. John Thomas Eyster, son of Andrew and Mary Margaret Eyster, born January 23, 1833, died May 7, 1921.

The family name of the second wife of Andrew Eyster is not known, but her given name was "Lavinia" and to this union several children were born—as follows:

- 1. Baptized—Samuel Huston Eyster—son of Andrew and Lavinia Eyster—born February 21, 1942—baptized July 3, 1842.
- 2. Baptized—Emma Scott Eyster—daughter of Andrew and Lavinia Eyster—born August 13, 1844—baptized November 3, 1844.
- 3. Baptized—George Edgar Taylor Eyster—son of Andrew and Lavinia Eyster—born September 23, 1847—baptized January 9, 1848.
- 4. Baptized—Hall Webster Eyster—son of Andrew and Lavinia Eyster—born June 24, 1851—baptized August 31, 1851.

In 1851, the Elias Lutheran congregation of Emmitsburg, Maryland, under the pastorate of the Rev. Solomon Sentman, severed its ties with Trinity congregation of Taneytown, and became an independent congregation. From that date on all records pertaining to the people of the Elias congregation, are included in Book #1 of that church. No additional baptisms pertaining to the family of Andrew Eyster are to be found therein.

Quite early in the history of Emmitsburg, a craftsman, by the name of "Bachman" (his given name is unknown), a silversmith and clock maker, came to Emmitsburg from the vicinity of the present town of Waynesboro, Franklin County, Pennsylvania, and "set up shop" to practice both of his crafts. Among his apprentices was young Andrew Eyster. In 1833 when the master returned to Franklin County it was Andrew Eyster who took over the business established by the man under whom he had learned his trades. It is known that this Andrew Eyster made many wall and mantle clocks, as well as one grandfather's clock, that are now collector's items. The grandfather's clock is now the property of the National Bank of Myersville, Maryland. They purchased it at auction within recent years. There may have been other clocks, of the same period and style, but, if so, their present whereabouts is unknown.

A long and fruitful discussion could be had regarding

the work of Andrew Eyster as a silversmith. No known specimens of his work are known to exist at the present time. The old communion silver of Elias Church could be attributed to his master, Bachman, although he could have been assisted in the manufacture by his apprentices. It is a "toss-up" and no definite answer can be given.

In the Eyster family plot in Elias churchyard the following members of the family are interred, in addition to those already listed:

- 4. In memory of Andrew Eyster, died April 19, 1872, aged 72 years.
- 5. In memory of Lavinia Eyster, wife of Andrew Eyster, died August 9, 1869, aged 60 years.
- 6. In memory of Ellen C. Eyster, died September 23, 1881, aged 11 years.

Note: It is not known, the present time, to just which branch of the Eyster family tree Ellen C. Eyster belongs. In addition to the people listed above, a little daughter of Hall Webster Eyster at his wife, Mary Eyster, is interred here but the marker her grave is broken and part of the inscription is missing so a complete reading cannot be given.

Rust and corrosion are common enemies of outdoor equipment. Here are a few hints to follow for easy care:

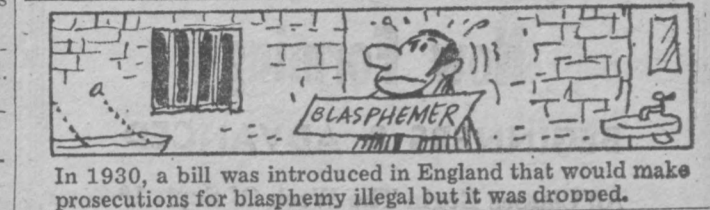


