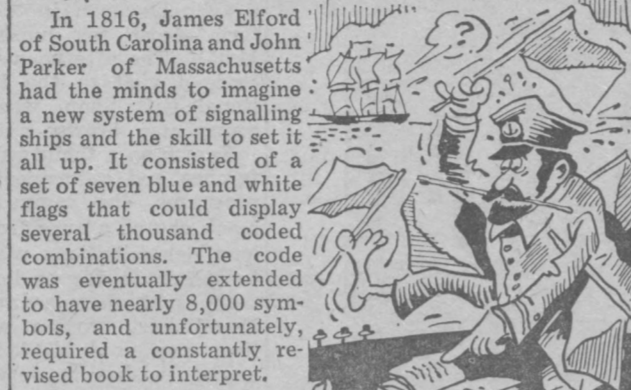
TAX—Q & A

If possible, try to stop every hour or two to enable the dog to get out and exercise a bit. Select the place carefully and keep him under control.

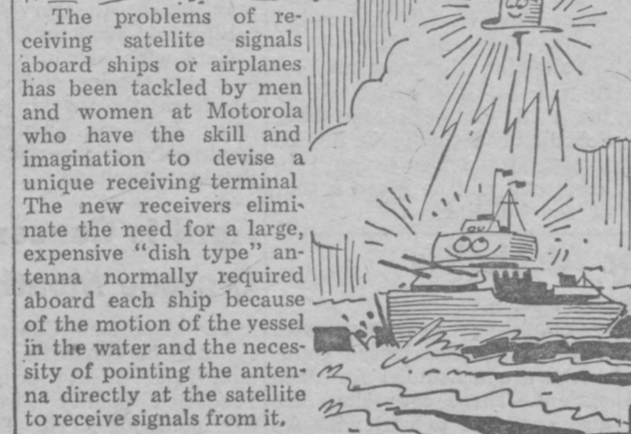
Q. Which kinds of unemployment benefits are taxable and which are not?

ARE YOU VULNERABLE TO LOSS?
If your house were to burn down today, could you afford to replace it with one of like quality?

On the same day, which insurance men today refer to as "Catastrophe '74," the "Smiths" of Mack, Ohio lost their home to the rampaging storms.

Q. I received a back-pay award from my employer as a result of a suit. Is this amount taxable?
A. Yes. It would have been taxable income if you had received the money as a part of your regular paycheck.

Q. I just took a new job in another town. Can I deduct the cost of looking for a house in the area of my new job?
A. If you moved to a new residence because you went to work for a new employer or transferred to a new place of work, you may be able to deduct the reasonable costs of the move.

Beall Urges End Of SS Earnings Limit

Senator J. Glenn Beall, Jr. (R-Md.), calling for reform of the Social Security system, has proposed an increase in the amount a person may earn before losing Social Security benefits.

Beall, who is ranking Republican on the Senate Subcommittee on Aging and a member of the Special Committee on Aging, asks that senior citizens be allowed to earn up to \$5100 annually without being penalized by a reduction in benefits.

While the Maryland Senator states that, eventually, he would like to see us abolish altogether the earnings limitations, Beall feels that his proposal to approximately double the limit will encourage senior citizens to remain active in the community and help them better bear the hardships of inflation.

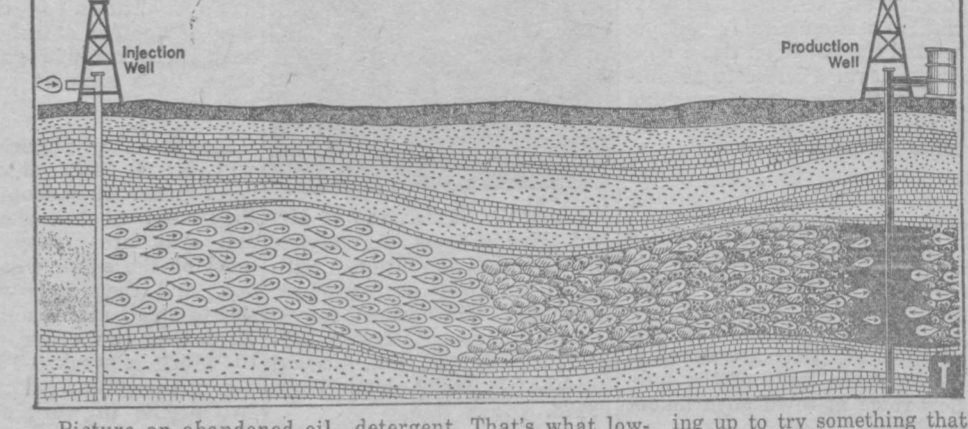

Q. How long do I have to keep my tax records on file?
A. Your records must be retained as long as their contents may be material in the administration of any Internal Revenue law.

Q. Is the interest I received with my tax refund in 1974 subject to income tax?
A. Yes. If you receive a tax refund that includes interest on the amount refunded, the interest must be included in your gross income in the year received.

New Products Buoy Electronic Instruments

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., April 3, 1975—While softer foreign demand and lower capital spending in the U. S. are being reflected in the current performance for most of the test and measuring instrumentation and analytical instruments, both of these sectors are expected to improve gradually over the next year or two.

Electronic instruments are used for the testing and measuring of components and equipment, analyzing electronic signals, waveforms, and circuits. This is the largest segment of the instrumentation fields, with analytical instruments making up a much smaller group.

SAVING OUR OIL

Every time you fill your gasoline tank, or pay a home oil heating bill, you think back to how inexpensive oil used to be.

Skyrocketing oil costs are also reflected in your electric bill. During the past year and a half, the price for a barrel of residual oil—the fuel that is used to power many of the nation's fossil fuel generating stations—has increased as much as five times in some areas of the country.

But many electric utilities are cutting their dependence on this costly foreign source of fuel. A survey by the National Electrical Manufacturers Association discloses that 37 percent of all electric generating capacity added by utilities in 1974 was nuclear powered.

Last year's contribution to nuclear energy brought America's nuclear generating capacity to nearly 40,000 megawatts—a megawatt is a million watts. If that amount of power were generated by oil-fired generators, it would take a million barrels of oil per day to do the job.

The fuel costs of a nuclear plant are about one-tenth those of a similar-

sized oil-fired unit, NEMA's Project Daybreak Committee says, and aside from being economically sound, nuclear plants are clean and they are safe.

According to NEMA, nuclear plants in operation throughout the United States already have the equivalent of two centuries of clean, trouble-free operation, with not even one incident causing public injury of any kind.

The Insurance Information Institute describes this as an "extraordinary safety record." And the insurance companies that provide liability coverage of nuclear plants have returned 70 percent of the premiums paid by utilities.

That's an expression of their confidence in the safety of nuclear installations.

With money-saving and energy-saving two of the biggest problems facing consumers this year, a panel of experts was recently called together to advise "How to Buy Clothes in 1975."

Vincent Monte-Sano, president of the New York Couture Business Council, advised, "The key to buying clothes today is quality—at all price levels. Turn the garment inside out, look at how the edges are finished, how wide the seams are, whether there are missed stitches. Of course, it must fit properly, and today make sure it's easy to care for."

Price alone does not determine a bargain, the authorities agreed at the New York conference. "If it's top quality for that particular item and it works for your way of living, you'll get good wear out of it. That makes it a bargain," said Carrie Donovan, senior fashion editor of Harper's Bazaar.

From the energy-saving standpoint, Sally Martinez, of the Federal Energy Administration, pointed out that washability should be a prime consideration. "And cold water laundering should be the rule, to save both energy and money. Most people don't realize the expense of hot water for laundering," she said.

Mr. Monte-Sano revealed that his organization had recently asked apparel manufacturers to stress the energy-saving importance of cold water laundering on garment labels. "We also pointed out," he said, "that today's washable fabrics, most of which are synthetics or blends, should never be washed in hot water any way—a fact that some consumers still don't realize."

A key question for the panel was: do the economy and energy problems of 1975 mean a cutback in fashion taste? Absolutely not, the panel agreed. As Miss Donovan put it, "Any woman who has taste can put herself together attractively today—at any price level."

can add or take off to adjust our comfort—in the home and the office—rather than trying to change the room climate by raising the heat or turning on the air conditioner.

Stanley Love, president of Joseph Love clothes for children, had some advice for buying children's clothes in 1975. "Select garments made of machine-washable synthetics that need no ironing," he urged. "The best news for mothers is today's polyester knits. They wear beautifully, and when you combine them with Cold Power laundering and no-ironing, you have a great money- and energy-saving formula."

Panelist Stan Herman, the Coty Award-winning designer, advised consumers to pay attention to the care labels on the clothes they buy. "More clothes are damaged simply because they are not cleaned according to label instructions."
