

Beall Urges End Of SS Earnings Limit

Senator J. Glenn Beall, Jr. (R-Md.), calling for reform of the Social Security system, has proposed an increase in the amount a person may earn before losing Social Security

Beall, who is ranking Republican on the Senate Subcommittee on Aging and a member of the Special Committee on Aging, asks that senior citizens be allowed to earn up to \$5100 annually without being penalized by a reduction in benefits. Present law state that an individual will forfeit one dillar in benefits for every two dollars earned over the current limit of \$2520 per

While the Maryland Senator states that, eventually, he would "like to see us abolish altogether the earnings limitations", Beall feels that his proposal to approximately double the limit will encuorage senior citizens to remain active in the community and help them better bear the hardships of inflation.

Concluding his remarks on the floor of the Senate, Beall added, "I strongly believe that seniors citizens, for the most part, want to remain active contributing members of the community for as long as possible. America's 20 million senior citizens are largely responsible for the unprecedented wealth and power that our Nation has achieved and I believe that we should not exclude them from actively participating in the economic affairs of our Nation."

DESSERT TREAT-FRENCH COUNTRY PUDDING

Place baguette cubes and chestnuts into shallow well-greased 2-quart casserole. Beat eggs with sugar, vanilla, milk and cream. Pour mixture evenly over bread. Place apple slices in pretty pattern over pudding. Sprinkle sugar mixture over apples. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) for 40 to 45 minutes or until center of pudding is firm to the touch. Serve warm with Armagnac brandy sauce. To prepare sauce: Combine 2 tablespoons cornstarch with 1/4 cup sugar. Stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 2 cups milk. Cook over low heat stirring constantly until sauce bubbles and thickens. Stir in 2 teaspoons grated orange rind and 1/4 cup Armagnac.



Sauerbraten—A German Contribution

In the three centuries since the first German immigrants arrived in America, several other waves have followed. Germans settled first in Pennsylvania, then in North Carolina, kotas, Kansas and Texas. They brought with them their culture and cuisine. High on the list of favorite German foods which have been added to the American melting pot is the sweet-sour pot roast known as Sauerbraten. In the version here, the gravy is thickened with Argo corn starch, a readily available ingredient which replaces potato flour or cookie crumbs.

Sauerbraten

1 cup red wine vinegar 12 peppercorns

2 cups water

1/2 cup dark corn syrup

2 cups chopped celery

4 bay leaves

1 cup chopped carrot

1 teaspoon salt 5 pounds beef rump roast

2 cups beef stock or bouillon 1 medium onion, sliced

Sauerbraten Gravy (below)

Bring to boil vinegar, water, corn syrup, celery, carrot, onion, peppercorns, bay leaves and salt; cool. Place meat in large deep crock, or enamel or stainless steel pot. Add marinade; cover. Marinate in refrigerator 5 to 7 days, turning occasionally. Remove meat; reserve marinade. Dry meat thoroughly. Beginning with fatty side, brown meat slowly. Drain off excess fat. Add 1 cup of the beef stock and the marinade. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat 2 hours or until tender, adding remaining beef stock as needed. Remove meat to hot platter. Prepare gravy. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

Sauerbraten Gravy: Strain stock and vegetables through food mill or sieve. Return to skillet. Add ½ cup dark corn syrup, 1 teaspoon ground ginger and ⅓ teaspoon ground cloves. Stir together 6 tablespoons Argo corn starch and 6 tablespoons water. Stir into stock mixture. Stirring constantly, bring to full boil and boil 1 minute. Makes about 5 cups gravy.



How To Carve A Leg Of Lamb

It is not difficult to do a professional carving job. Try, the following technique on your next leg of lamb. You'll find the results especially pleasing and easy to get with an electric slicing knife such as the General Electric model shown below.



end to your right and thinner, less meaty section facing you.



3. Turn and rest on cut surface. The thick meaty section is upright with the shank pointing up. Begin carving from shank end down to leg bone in parallel slices 1/8" to 3/8" thick.



2. Insert carving fork in large end of leg and carve two or three lengthwise slices from thin side parallel to length of leg.



4. Release slices by running knife under slices along leg bone. To carve thin side. turn lamb and slice parallel to leg bone.





be a hazardous by-product of this misuse. If electrical equip-ment is damaged or handled in

an unsafe manner, a situation may arise in which electric current could leak into a per-

son. This can result in electro-cution, if the quantity of leak-

age current is sufficient. It

a flow of electricity is diverted from its intended path to ground. This irregularity is termed a "ground fault." A person touching a supply cord

exceeds what is normally anticipated in the appliances served, whether because of ground fault or "short circuit,"

a fuse or circuit breaker will generally cut off the supply of current. However, the magni-

tude of a dangerous ground fault may be lower than nor-mal current, and, thus, not trip

fuses or circuit breakers. A supplementary protective device is available that can

sense only ground fault cur-rent. This device is called a "ground fault circuit interrup-

ter" (GFCI). A GFCI will re-

spond to a ground fault current as low as 5/1000 of an ampere,

This type of GFCI (pictured left) may be installed in certain

outlet boxes in place of an ordinary receptacle (right). with metal objects, such as pipes, faucets, or drains, which lead to earth ground. Skin moisture significantly reduces the skin's capacity to resist electric current. Thus, outlets serving outdoor locations, particularly around patios or swimming pools, should be outfitted with GFCI's. In fact, GFCI protection for outdoor receptacles, bathrooms and swimming pools is called for in the 1975 edition of the National Electrical Code (NEC). This Code provides installation requirements that are widely implemented by various local electrical inspection author-

It should be emphasized, however, that the installation of this automatic shock protection GFCI should not take the place of caution and good housekeeping with respect to the care of your appliances and their cords. Worn cords should always be replaced as soon as they are detected, and appliances which have been dropped or abused should be checked

for damage.

Remember that GFCI's detect ground fault, but do not provide protection against many other types of electrical mishaps, such as a short circuit

or a stalled motor. Fuses or circuit breakers detect these situations. It is also important to understand that there is no device known to provide protection against the shock hazard presented by personal contact with both sides of a 120 volt circuit. (Making contact with both wires of a two-wire electrical cord where the insulation has deteriorated is a notable example of this.)

GFCI's are now available for connection to a variety of house wiring circuits, ranging from units intended for branch circuits powering many receptacles, to units intended for the protection of a single outlet including the aforementioned "plug-in" type). Circuit break-ers with built-in GFCI's are available, and may be pur-chased for less than \$50.00.

Whatever type of unit you consider, remember to look for the ones which have been tested and evaluated for safety by Underwriters Laboratories Inc., a not-for-profit organization engaged in testing electrical products for more than eighty years. Look for the UL mark on the GFCI-it is your assurance that the design of the de-vice has met nationally recog-

nized requirements.



2 tsp. grated lemon rind.

PALACINKY

2 eggs 1 cup milk 1 cup flour 3 tbsp. sugar pinch of salt

Beat eggs. Add milk, soft flour, sugar, salt. Add to egg mixture and beat thoroughly. Fold in lemon rind. Batter should be of very thin consistency. Add additional milk if necessary. Cover 6-inch frying pan with small amount of butter. Drop enough batter (about 2 tablespoons) into pan to thinly cover surface and fry over medium low heat, turning once, until light brown on both sides. Traditionally served with apricot jam, or fresh fruit, raisins, cottage cheese, with sprinkling of confectioners' sugar on top.

You may find yourself using one term the traveler should know, although admittedly the Czech language is difficult to master. It's "Dobrou Chut," the Czech equivalent of "Bon Appetit."
