Dramatic Program September 9th

The Bicentennial Dramatic Events Program sponsored by the Maryland Committee for the Humanities and Public Policy and Mount St. Mary's College will take place Tuesday, September 9, 7:30 p.m. at the St. Joseph's High School auditorium.

The Dramatic Events Committee will attempt to cover the past 200 years of history in the Emmitsburg area: from the beginning conflicts with the Indians and the early settlers to the immigrants who settled the area. The naming of the town and the famed Hockensmith Tavern will be exciting scenes. The actors will endeavor to stage the setting for the Revolution when four companies were enlisted in Frederick County, for in Emmitsburg the quota of lusty patriots assembled. Before intermission the actors will stage a series of typical town scenes during the early 1800's.

In 1853 the town was visited by the dreaded Cholera Epidemic. Our players will give a short informative skit on the Epidemic and the Great Emmitsburg Fire that swept the town in 1863. After the fire the Dread Civil War broke out, and a field hospital scene will point out the awful destruction of our country.

President Wilson's visit to Emmitsburg will be portrayed with the meeting of his second wife, with some reflections on the town scene. The Committee plans a pageant-type wrap up of the whole evening featuring soldiers, flappers, the Charleston and the Bicentennial featuring period costumes, beards and wooden nickels. We hope you will enjoy our glance into Emmitsburg's past. Our heritage is precious and should be preserved for all generations to enjoy.

Mount Saint Mary's Opened September 4

Mount Saint Mary's College, will begin the 1975-76 academic year on Thursday, September 4, with the largest enrollment in its 167 year history, according to Bernard S. Kaliss, academic dean. The total undergraduate enrollment will be 1,259 students according to pre-registration data with the Mount's largest freshman class, totaling 357. This year's increase in enrollment will also see an increase in the number of women to 420.

Twenty-five nurses have enrolled in the Mount's new degree completion program for nurses, the bachelor of science degree in professional arts.

Additional dormitory space has been completed on campus increasing the campus housing from approximately 825 to over 900 spaces. In addition to the first year students enrolling, Guy A. Baker, Jr., registrar, stated that nearly 120 students have transferred with advanced standing from other two-year and four-year institutions.

Freshmen will begin registration on Thursday, September 4, at 9:30 a.m. in the Memorial Gym. Upperclassmen will arrive for registration on Saturday, September 6, and classes will begin for all students on Monday, September 8.

The frosh will be subjected to an intensive orientation program including meetings with student and departmental advisors, members of the Dean of Students staff, social events, and a bus trip to Washington, D. C. on Saturday.

Three New Faculty At Saint Mary's

Mount Saint Mary's College, has added three new faculty members for the coming year, it was announced by the Academic Dean, Bernard Kaliss. The new instructors are Dr. Kenneth L. Eshleman in political science and Mr. David L. Schindler in philosophy and as a lecturer in the new M.B.A. program at the Mount is Charles J. Pineno.

Dr. Eshleman is a native of Harrisonburg, Virginia, and received his doctoral degree in government from the University of Virginia in 1975. His previous teaching experience includes positions with the Richmond Public Schools and the Menomonee Schools as well as at Susquehanna University. He is a member of the American Political Science Association. He is married to the former Myrna J. Brennan, Newton, Kansas, a registered nurse, and has two young daughters.

Mr. Schindler from Grand Rapids, Michigan, is a Ph.D. candidate at the Claremont Graduate School, Claremont, Ca. He holds his Bachelor's degree and Master of Arts in philosophy from Gonzaga University. He has served as a lecturer at Loyola University of Los Angeles and at the School of Theology at Claremont. He is a member of the American Academy of Religion and the American Catholic Philosophical Association. He is married to the former Stella M. Modrijan, Kenosha, Wisc., and the Schindlers have three children.

Mr. Pineno will lecture in the new M.B.A. program. He holds his bachelor's degree from Penn State and his M.B.A. from the University of Scranton. He is currently on the faculty of Gettysburg College and is a candidate for the doctorate at Penn State. He is married to the former Ruth Yuzensky, of Kingston, Pa., and they have one daughter.

This year's theme "Patriotism on Parade" will center around America's Bicentennial. During the program representatives of the civic organizations will have a flag presentation. Catoctin High School Band will play patriotic music. Recognition will be given to four bicentennial farms. 
Items Needed For Program

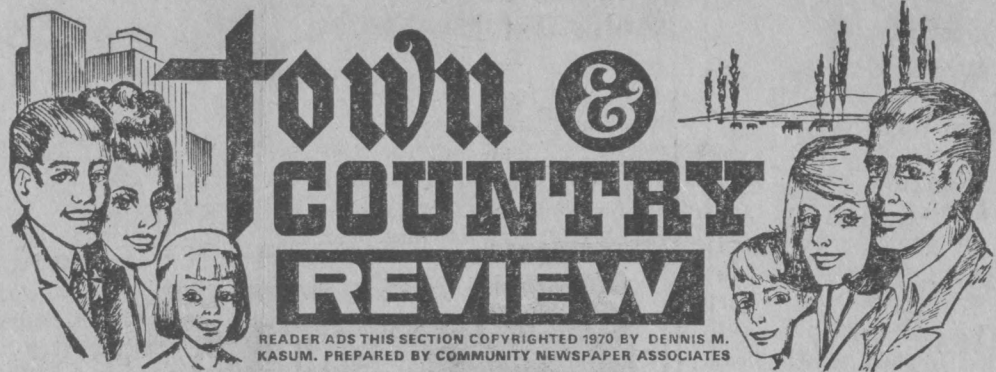

This regular column serves as another vehicle to keep in touch with all segments of my constituency. It is an open invitation for you to question me on issues, let me assist you with your problems, request information or comment on whatever happens to be on your mind. Letters should be sent to me, c/o U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515. While space is obviously limited for printing all replies, I shall make every effort to answer each person who contacts me.

The following questions were typical of the kind asked of me in recent weeks —

Who do I contact for information on Presidential Sports Award materials?

Adults interested in earning the Presidential Sports Award in any of 38 sports can obtain Qualifying Standards and Personal Log Books free of charge by writing to: Presidential Sports Award, P. O. Box 129, Radio City Station, New York, N. Y. 10019. Colleges, athletic clubs, military installations, YMCAs, YWCAs, recreation and park departments and other groups may obtain these materials in quantity, plus colorful display posters from the same address.

How do you feel about the proposal for sending nuclear reactors to the Mid-East?

I do not support the idea of nuclear sales to foreign nations because there are too many risks and uncertainties involved. Fears of weapons production and terrorist attacks, questions about the stability of recipient foreign governments, and the need to cut back on foreign aid are just a few

reasons for my stand. Does the government publish any publications on how to conserve on car fuel?

In light of the nation-wide effort to conserve energy, the General Services Administration has published a new energy conservation bulletin entitled, "Tips for Conserving Gasoline." The pamphlet includes a gas mileage checklist for your car. You may obtain a free copy of this helpful and informative booklet by writing Consumer Information, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

Do you have any information on the Veterans Health Bill that Congress approved last year?

Copies of Public Law 93-82, "Veterans' Health Care Expansion Act", may be ordered from my office in Washington.

Why did the Environmental Protection Agency extend the final deadline for complying with established auto emission standards?

The EPA decision was based upon evidence that the catalytic converter — the present device used to reduce automobile emissions — accelerated the production and emission of certain pollutants which pose a greater hazard to public health than the emissions the converter was designed to control.

We have been told that Medicare will not pay for the costs involved in hiring someone to take care of my husband at home. Please explain.

Medicare does not cover custodial care. Care is considered custodial when it is primarily for the purpose of meeting personal needs and could be provided by persons without professional skills or training.

Business And Stock Market

Cosmetics-Toiletries Earnings Pick Up

By Babson's Reports Inc., Wellesley Hills, Mass., September 4, 1975. Last year was not one of the better years for the cosmetics-toiletries industry. Skyrocketing inflation and mounting unemployment led to a reduction in consumer spending which was in turn reflected in inventory cutbacks by wholesalers and retailers. Sharply higher prices for packaging and raw materials plus materials shortages further pared industry profits for 1974 as a whole.

Most firms chalked up some improvement in the first two quarters of this year, however. And with the economy starting to turn around, 1975 is shaping up as a recovery year for the industry. The recovery is being helped along by the cost-cutting and efficiency programs that have become very much the order of the day.

Long-Term Growth Prospects Favorable

Looking ahead, a number of factors point toward healthy future growth for the cosmetics-toiletries field. Among these are an increasing population with a greater preponderance of younger people who are significant buyers of such products, the rising per-capita consumption, and a greater number of working women, who spend more on

cosmetics than nonworking women. There is, too, a continuing flow of new products which should help stimulate demand, while another plus factor is further exploitation of foreign markets. It should also be noted that men are becoming less inhibited about using toiletries, and substantial additional gains in this area are likely.

Some Current Problems

Every industry has some problem areas, and the cosmetics-toiletries line is no exception. One of the major concerns is probably increased government regulation. Beginning in 1975, cosmetics makers must label ingredients on all products, and it has been estimated that this will cost about \$100 million for the industry as a whole. Attracting considerable publicity of late is the effect of aerosol sprays on human health. A government task force recently declared that fluoro-carbon gas — one of the propellants widely used in spray cans — should be banned by January 1978 unless somebody can conclusively disprove the theory that the gas depletes ozone from the stratosphere. Raw materials shortages and high prices have plagued the industry in recent years, but lately there has been some improvement.

Beauty Business Should Continue To Prosper

While the cosmetics-toiletries industry will probably continue to be subject to criticism in regard to the safety, quality, and usefulness of its products as well as its expensive packaging and its advertising, long-term expansion is not likely to be seriously affected. As long as consumers seek products that give them an appearance of health and well-being, the beauty business should continue to do well.

The number of companies in this industry has shrunk over the past ten years or so, and further shrinkage is more than likely in the future. This will find it steadily more difficult to come about as smaller concerns cope with the costly and increasingly more complex government regulations as well as the gigantic advertising budgets of the industry leaders.

How to Prepare Barbecued Chicken — If your family enjoys chicken, here's the secret to top quality barbecued chicken. Mrs. Ruth Buck, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at The Pennsylvania State University, recommends long, slow cooking. That means between one and one-fourth to one and one-half hours. For barbecuing, choose young, well meated birds that weigh about two pounds. Have the butcher split or quarter them and place on the grill, skin side up and close together. Baste the pieces with barbecue sauce at once. A pastry brush works well for basting. Turn the birds every 5 or 6 minutes and don't spare the sauce each turn. A good indication of a properly cooked bird is a drumstick that turns easily.

Beneficiary of Detente

While our Secretary of State begins a new phase of the policy of "Detente," the Soviet Union has announced what it has accomplished during 1974, what the official Soviet Survey calls "The year of Detente." It was also called "the year during which the Brezhnev doctrine of relaxation and international understanding made considerable progress."

All people agree that the Communist world made progress and the free world suffered losses during 1974. "The year of Detente." Let's take a look at map changes which were in the final stages in 1974. The fall of South Vietnam Cambodia, Laos and the changed attitude of Thailand in South East Asia has opened that entire continent to communist aggression. Portugal, the first NATO country is now in the hands of a communist military government, despite the overwhelming vote of the Portuguese people to the contrary. Greece, once a stalwart free world ally is angry with the United States, and Turkey, an enemy of Russia for many centuries, are now allied with America and granted Soviet naval ships the rights to Turkish waters without getting prior approval.

Trouble in Europe And The Near East
In the Middle East, the Soviet Survey gloats over the fact that the western world did not make any gains from the latest Arab-Israeli war and that its position was not improved in the least. In Europe, the survey says: "There is the strengthening of the union of left-wing forces in France, Italy and Spain and the strengthening of the union of the left-wing of the British Labor Party."

As for the Western Hemisphere, the Soviet Survey regards 1974 as an excellent vintage for communism in the backyard of the U.S.A.: "It is impossible to halt the revolutionary process in Latin America. Opportunities exist for a broad counter-offensive of the Democratic Socialist forces. This will have consequences not only for North America and Australia, but for the rest of the World."

In addition to the actual geography which has now come

under communist domination during this latest era of "Detente," there are many other benefits accruing to the Communist world. Our own State Department is insisting that the Panama Canal be given to an illegal, Marxist military dictator and that Fidel Castro now should be recognized and extended the dignity and economic assistance of the free world.

But that is not all "Detente" has meant to the Communist world. Red China has replaced the Chinese government of Taiwan in the United Nations, and the Soviet Union has received by the shipload, the technological, economic and financial know-how and assistance of the free world in developing industrial and natural resources. We are sharing our space technology in the Apollo-Soyuz project. Great benefits are accruing from Detente . . . all to the Soviet Union and the Communist world.

How does the official Soviet Survey, view all that has happened in 1974, the year they call the "Year of Detente?" Listen: "Is the world shifting toward the left spontaneously by itself? Of course not. It is being moved forward by quite definite class and political forces. The shift we see is primarily the result of a conscious policy of the community of socialist countries of the consistent struggle of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union of its Leninist Central Committee of the Communist Worker's Parties."

The Beginning of "Detente"
While "Detente" was disastrous for the free world in 1974, it was probably equally bad in previous years. It all began at Yalta in February of 1945 with these words spoken by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to an objecting U. S. Ambassador William C. Bullitt: "I have a hunch that Stalin . . . does not want anything but security for his country, and I think that if I give him everything I possibly can and ask nothing from him in return, he won't try to annex anything and he will work with me for a world of peace and harmony." (Memoirs, William C. Bullitt.) There is no doubt that "Detente" has been beneficial . . . but only to the Communist

world. We can now see that President Roosevelt did not understand Stalin at all. Is it possible that our President and the Secretary of State understand current Russian officials no better?

Congress is considering several bills that will require the United States to adopt the metric system within the next few years. That's why it makes good sense for consumers to learn how it works, says Mrs. Wilson.

The woman who sews can already buy sewing aids that show both inches and centimeters. These aids include cutting boards, sleeve and hem guides, measuring tapes and stitching guides on sewing machines.

Patterns with metric information concerning body measurements, seam allowances, fabric requirements and cutting layouts are also on the market, says Mrs. Wilson. A new system of metric clothing sizes is also being considered.

Survey Shows Health Programs Are Required

A report researched at The Pennsylvania State University indicates that one in every nine children in the state comes from a family with an income below the poverty line. The findings may show a need for special services programs to aid the children, who often receive inadequate food and poor medical attention during their early, formative years, says Dr. J. Patrick Madden, professor of agricultural economics at Penn State.

The report, "Children in Pennsylvania," is designed to help state and local officials locate and identify children with special needs. A major problem for children born into poverty is poor health care, and special programs include increased numbers of medical facilities accessible to poor families, school lunch or breakfast supplements, or health care counseling.

In 1970 about 237,000 families in the state had incomes below the official Census Bureau poverty line. Three out of every five of these poor families had children under 18.

Philadelphia County has the largest number of poor families with children, nearly 39,000 families, in nine counties more than 15 percent of the children live in poverty. These counties are Fayette, Greene, Philadelphia, Fulton, Sullivan, Huntingdon, Clearfield, Potter, and Tioga.

The 75-page report is based on research compiled by Dr. Madden and Dr. C. Shannon Stokes, associate professor of rural sociology. The project is funded, in part, under a contract with the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare. Copies of the state summary, at \$5.00 each, are available from "Children in Pennsylvania," P. O. How To Save On The Costs Of Clothing

Clothing prices are expected to climb this year. But consumers are resisting price increases, explains Mrs. Ruth Ann Wilson, Extension clothing and textiles specialist at The Pennsylvania State University.

Instead of paying higher prices, Mrs. Wilson says people are bargain hunting and choosing lower price lines. Longer lasting clothing, good quality fabrics, and conservative styles do keep higher price lines selling, however.

Retailers, too, are responding to the high cost of textiles. You can expect to find a smaller selection of styles in your favorite store. And there is more emphasis on private brands.

Other cost-cutting methods include early markdowns of slow moving goods and promotion of "irregular" items such as sheets and towels.

In response to the consumer's interest in more durable clothing, retailers are showing simpler items—slacks and jeans, "leisure" suits for men, and more practical clothing for women, points out the Extension specialist.

What more can you do to cut costs? Plan necessary purchases carefully, shop wisely for durable items that are appropriate, repair, alter, or recycle present clothing to extend its use, and shop the thrift stores.

If you have clothing you no longer can wear, consider giving it away. Thrift shops depend on good quality donations. And fewer people are giving things away now.

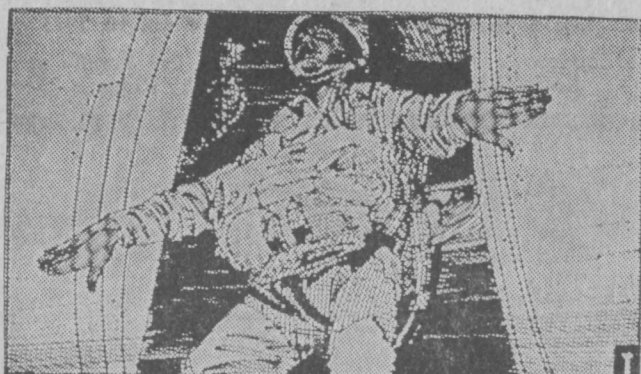

Offers Hints On Purchasing Used Washer

Students are tight these days, so you may find the idea of buying a used washer and dryer more appealing than buying a new one, says Catherine Love, Extension consumer specialist at The Pennsylvania State University.

If you're looking for a used washer or dryer, check with an appliance dealer for reconditioned or trade-in machines. You can also look through the classified ads or follow garage sales.

However, an appliance dealer is most likely to offer a warranty; he may also provide a delivery and installation service. But check to find out what services he offers and whether repair parts will be available for the model you are buying.

If you buy from a private party, jot down the model and serial numbers. Write or call the manufacturer to find the age of the appliance and the availability of re-

placement parts. If the parts are being phased out, the Extension specialist suggests you look for another machine.

Signs of leakage, excessive wear or rust on the machine's frame are signs to watch out for. Ask the owner to run the machine; listen for abnormal sounds like growls and grinds that could indicate worn parts.

Check the hoses, cords, and external finish; they should all be in reasonable condition. The timer should run through all the cycles and stop when the cycle is finished.

Before you buy a used washer or dryer, compare the features of the used one with a new model. Can the machine handle the kinds of fabrics and the size load you'll be putting in?

Ask if there is an instruction manual that comes with the machine. If not, Miss Love suggests writing the manufacturer for a copy. When writing, remember to include the model and serial number in your letter.
