



The Necessity for a Powerful American Navy.

How to Make White Lountain Cake. Four eggs, 2 cups sugar, a half cup butter, a cup milk and 4 teaspoonfuls of good baking powder. Make the dark part by using the yolks of the eggs and a half of above mixture, using burned almonds for flavoring if liked. For the light part use the whites of eggs and half of mixture with vanilla to flavor.

How to Make Artichokes a la Poulette. Wash and peel 2 pounds of artichokes. Put them in slightly salted boiled water and cook until tender. Then drain on a sieve. Put a tablespoonful of butter in a saucepan and when melted stir in a teaspoonful of flour. Add a pint of rich milk, half a teaspoonful of salt, a teaspoonful of parsley and half a teaspoonful of sugar. Let cook 2 minutes. Whisk 2 eggs in 2 tablespecufuls of milk and stir them in the boiling sauce. Throw in the artichokes, add the juice of half a lemon and let simmer 3 minutes longer. Pour into the serving dish, dust over with one-third saltspoonful of pepper and serve hot.

How to Cook Stuffed Eggplant.

Cut the eggplant in two, scrape out all the inside, put in a saucepan with a little minced ham. Cover with water and boil until soft. Drain off water. utes.
