







SPAIN MUST PAY.

Philippines may be taken to Pay Cost of War.

NO DIFFICULTY IN PROSPECT.

Washington, Nov. 1.—While the cabinet at its meeting today gave little attention to the peace negotiations at Paris, there is no longer any doubt as to the general purpose of this government to retain the entire Philippine archipelago.

At the time the protocol was signed the United States did not hold and has not since acquired any part of the Philippine Islands outside of Manila city and harbor.

The belief still prevails among the majority of the cabinet that the Spaniards will accept the terms laid down by the United States, and that whatever of delay occurs before the result is reached will be chargeable only to the purpose of the Spaniards to secure the best possible terms.

If the Paris conference should fail, all that would be imposed upon our government as an immediate duty would be to take complete military possession of the Philippines.
