> Glacial Formations. A somewhat original line of thought has just been expressed by Sir Martin Conway before the Royal Geographical society, England, in regard to glacial formations. He declared that as long as a flowing body of land ice is contained within definite watersheds and mountain ranges it is a glacier and not an ice sheet, while the juxtaposition of no matter how many glaciers does not form an ice sheet, but merely a glacial area. Again, the old theory of glaciers excavating their beds to any considerable extent is practically abandoned. Its supporters naturally considered that the an extraordinarily powerful excavator. It is now known, however, that moving land ice did not operate upon its bed; but, beyond polishing the surface of the rock it covered and cutting down convex excrescences, had mainly a conservative effect upon it. In the case of a country like the interior of Greenland, buried wholly under ice, the buried land surface is being modeled to a very slight degree; but, on the other hand, in the case of a glacial region, where mountains rise above the mean level, and where rock faces are exposed to the rapid denudation of all snowy regions, great developments of surface formation are going forward. Briefly, under an ice sheet the forces acting on the land surface are conservative, while in the case of a glacial region the acting forces are formative. - Chicago
