We promised in our last that we Blaxten. would say something in relation to the pea and its connection with farm rations. We have wished several times over that we had not made that promise, for we fear that we have an element on our hands. We find, in reading up on the pea, that there are many ways of using it. In the first place, we learn that it is a leguminous plant, rich in nitrogen, which is the dearest of all plant foods, and that it has the power of taking that essential element from the air—the atmosphere being about four-fifths nitrogen—and then again its roots penetrate deeply into the soil and take up plant food that the roots of other plants would

not reach.

The Canada pea is the earliest sown, generally with oats as a forage crop, and fed out to cattle during the summer in connection with pasture, in order to keep the cattle from falling off in milk, or flesh, as the case may be, when the pasture gets short: and that which is not used in that way is usually made into hay; this, so far as early an late, are said to keep up a

A new rate book has been issued to Carroll county insurance agents, which specifically rates nearly every building, in all the towns and many of the yillages, in the county. The rates adopted seem to be as nearly equitable as it is possible to get them, and the work of the agents is thereby much reduced and simplified.

Under the system now in force, "rate cutting" is practically impossible, as all agents are under agreement, with penalty attached, not to deviate from the published rates; and besides, all their business must go through the hands of an inspector, or stamp clerk, before going to the various companies. This applies only to companies doing business on the Stock


