A Unique Clock.

Joseph Jenson, a clockmaker of Richfield, Utah, has just completed a remarkable clock which, in addition to striking the hours, halves and quarters and showing the phases of the moon, tells just what time it is in every city in the world. This is done by means of a globe which revolves inside a transparent globular glass. On this glass is marked a line which represents 12 o'clock noon. As the globe revolves this line is always over that part of the world in which it is noon at that time. Other lines represent the hours, and in this way it is easy to get the exact time in any given place.
