varieties true to name is to buy good stock and top work it. Northern Spy apple, Kieffer pear and Lombard plum make good stocks. Graft the next year or set buds during the summer of the varieties wanted. Such trees will come into bearing earlier than trees worked in the nursery. Peaches, cherries and grapes are more difficult to work, and not so much is to be gained by this method as with the kinds mentioned. Trees and plants grown in a stiff, heavy loam or clay produce many short, fine roots, while those grown on light soil have fewer roots, which are longer and larger. When buying, remember this and get trees grown on soil somewhat similar to your own.


