Baltimore Newspapers and the Presidential Contest.

A question of considerable political importance is the position the various Baltimore newspapers will assume in the coming Presidential contest. When we realize that Maryland is a debatable ground, and that the four leading newspapers are about as uncertain in their political predilections as the state, the placing of Maryland in either column, as a sure thing, is unwarranted.

The Sun, as everybody knows, is normally democratic; but its support of Bryan, even minus the Chicago platform, would be a generous dose to swallow, while with the Chicago platform money plank as an issue, it is pretty safe to count the Sun as against the ticket, for even its violent opposition to McKinley and the administration would likely take position, in its estimation, as the lesser evil.

The American, as a thick-and-thin republican journal, does not exist. Very many, indeed, smile at the assertion that it is representative republican, as it is no doubt claims, and pin but little faith to its utterances as a leader in shaping republican politics. If it is an ardent supporter of President McKinley and the administration, there are at least a great many who cannot see it in that light.

The Herald and News do not pretend to hold any party affiliation; still, the former is generally credited with republican, and the latter with democratic, tendencies, and both are ably edited and influential. The News, especially, is a recognized power in local politics, second to none in the city, and can likely wield its power to practically the same extent, in the coming contest. The Herald, with its large out-of-town circulation, also has a following worth consideration in the contest for the electoral votes of the state.

Baltimore, it must be said, while possessing excellent newspapers, does not have a single great party paper. Cincinnati, Boston and St. Louis, cities of about the same class as Baltimore, are far ahead with papers of great circulation; a fact, however, which has nothing to do with the present subject. As the situation now presents itself, Maryland is a doubtful state, especially until the parties have lined-up, and the city papers adopted their course for the campaign.

A New Political Situation.

Only a few years ago, when the tariff question was the leading issue between the democratic and republican parties, England was generally understood to favor democratic success because of the free trade policy being favorable to the English manufacturing interests. Now, the situation is changed. England, under the gold standard, along with the republican party, and undoubtedly stood ready to form an alliance with the present administration, had it been necessary, in the recent war with Spain.

While there would naturally be a strong bond of sympathy, in time of trouble, between the two great English speaking nations, aside from any political considerations whatever, still there seems to be in evidence, now, strained relations, so to speak, between the democratic party and England. The Boer sympathizers, for instance, are more fully represented within the democratic leaders and newspapers than by the opposite side, and there are other signs with the same leaning that the careful observer cannot fail to note.

There does not seem to be anything in this change of sentiment that stands for anything permanent, or for any important bearing on future events, but it is rather valuable as an illustration of the radical change that may take place, within a short time, in the relations between parties and nations. Some may no doubt see, in this instance, a closer union between England and America, as well as between north and south, both brought about by practically the same causes.

The only way in which this change can effect the coming National contest will rest in the agitation of the subject of expansion, and as there may be, on that account, desertions from the two great parties. Which of the two will be the loser, on this account, is decidedly problematical—that the loss will not be wholly on one side, is a foregone conclusion. Of course, this is assuming that English influence would side with the administration's course in its recent foreign policy.

An anti-campaign argument against the re-election of McKinley is the strongly asserted claim that he has, against all precedent and propriety, entered into some sort of private alliance with England, and all the friendly expressions of both powers made on public occasions within the past two years, are cited in support of this claim. There is a vast difference, however, between National friendliness and an "Entangling alliance," and it is extremely probable that the change of England's favor from certain democratic principles, not now issues, to certain republican principles, now live issues, is responsible for the charges of an alliance.

Prize Giving in Schools.

The following paragraphs, from an editorial in a recent issue of the Baltimore Sun, will bear careful consideration, as it undoubtedly applies with force and truthfulness to the system of school prize giving: "These are the days of lamentation in colleges and schools throughout the land because of the awards made of prizes offered to successful students. The principle upon which prizes are offered is entirely proper and yet in practice the end aimed at is seldom achieved. It is assumed that when prizes are offered students will be encouraged to do the best work of which they are capable and that the prize will go to the most deserving. But this theory fails to take into account some of the weaknesses of human nature. It fails to consider the possible existence of a teacher who is prejudiced and of pupils who work solely for the prize and who may neglect educational opportunities that they may fulfill the terms of the competition and thus advance themselves ahead of others who are neglected. The principle upon which prizes are offered to study the conditions of prize winning, but in all other respects have excelled.

"It is an easy matter for a teacher disposed to favoritism or unduly prejudiced to advance one pupil or retard another and thus to determine the award of prizes by an imperial committee. It is still easier for the pupils themselves to prepare themselves for prize-winning by giving special attention to the studies that are known to bear the most weight in the contest, and to neglect the others. Thus the offering of prizes, always made with the idea that it stimulates honest effort on the part of the pupils to excel, very often acts in a contrary way and limits the usefulness of a school by directing the thoughts of teachers and pupils in the wrong channel. Prize winning is not the end and aim of education."

Even were prizes always properly bestowed, it is questionable whether they do not cause more harm than good, through deep disappointments and a certain power of discouragement to those who worked faithfully, but failed to secure them. Prizes and degrees do not always represent actual merit; the latter, especially, may be had—as from a factory or store-house—by almost any person who goes through the form of special preparation and examination, and follows it up with the required financial stipulation.

National Conventions.

The national convention is as crude an instrument for the purpose of making nominations as can well be conceived. Like the original idea of the Electoral College, the conception was reasonable, but the result is wretched. The convention was intended for a deliberative body, and it is undoubtedly, in theory at least, both a democratic and a representative institution, but it does not deliberate; it yells and obeys. In the early days of its history there was some appearance of independence among the delegates. There were discussion, contention and intrigue, but there was real politics when the slavery issue entered into and divided both parties. The first convention was held in 1832, and Jackson was nominated by the democrats by acclamation. Twelve years afterward there was a struggle between Van Buren and Cass, and Polk carried off the nomination on the ninth ballot. Cass and Buchanan contended against each other in 1848, and Cass won on the fourth ballot. Again the two were competitors in 1852, and the convention compromised on Pierce on the 49th ballot. It required 17 ballots to nominate Buchanan in 1856, his competitors being Pierce, Cass and Douglas. Fremont was nominated the same year by the republicans on the first ballot. The party was too young to have bred factions.

In 1860 the democratic Convention met first at Charleston, S. C. The contestants for the nomination were Douglas, Illinois; Hunter, Virginia; Guthrie, Kentucky; Johnson, Georgia; Dickinson, New York; Lane, Oregon; Jefferson Davis, Mississippi; Toucey, Connecticut, and Pierce, New Hampshire. The contest between the Douglas and extreme southern delegates was fierce. Fifty-seven ballots were taken, and there was no choice. The convention adjourned to Baltimore, where Breckinridge appeared as a candidate. Douglas was nominated. A secession followed, and a second convention put Breckinridge in the field. In the same year Lincoln was nominated by the republicans at Chicago on the third ballot, his competitors having been Seward, New York; Chase, Ohio; Bates, Missouri; Dayton, New Jersey, and McLean, Ohio. The next strenuous contest for a nomination took place in the democratic Convention of 1868, which was held in Tammany Hall, New York City. The favorite candidate at first was Pendleton familiarly called by his followers "Gentleman George." His followers from Cincinnati wore long linen dusters, and on their breasts were pinned imitation greenbacks, the greenback theory having made its appearance in politics. It was a long fight. Many candidates were in the field. Among them were General Hancock, Governor Hendricks and Andrew Johnson. Horatio Seymour presided, and, after repeatedly refusing the nomination, was finally prevailed upon to accept after 21 fruitless ballots had been cast.

lot, when it went up to 308, 71 short of a majority. Then the opposition united on Governor Hayes, of Ohio, and he was nominated on the seventh ballot. There was also a contention in the republican convention of 1880 between Grant, whose forces were led by Conkling, and Blaine. The Blaine men finally threw their votes to Garfield, who was nominated on the 26th ballot. Blaine was nominated in 1884, on the fourth ballot, and in 1888 Harrison won against Sherman on the eighth ballot, being aided by those who had been voting for Greeham, Allison, Depew and others. In 1892 and 1896 the candidates of the republican party were nominated on the first ballot. Mr. Bryan was nominated in 1896, on the fifth ballot. There was no issue of policy. The silver men and the populist democrats controlled the convention, and the only issue was a personal one between Bryan and Bland. The convention system is now at its lowest estate, but it has never been a worthy political instrument. Not since the war has the nomination been the result of the deliberations of the delegates. As a rule, the convention has been a howling mob controlled by another howling mob in the galleries, or its work has been cut out for it in advance, as it has been this year in both parties, by a leader or a group of leaders.

The Cuban Election. If any special inference is to be drawn from the first popular election held in the Island of Cuba, it is that the Cubans are favorable to the idea of an independent government. This conclusion might at least be deduced from the face of the returns of the election in Havana, where the Nationalist party won in the Mayoralty contest by a poll of 19,073 votes to 6,724 cast for the independent candidate, who was supposed to represent the general combined opposition. When the facts of the situation are analyzed, however, it will be seen that the election of Saturday really possesses little value as an indicator of the sentiment of the whole people upon the question of independence or annexation. The voting population of Havana is approximately 60,000. Only 30,000 of this number took enough interest to register, and the vote cast for the successful candidate was 2,000 less than half the registered vote and less than one fourth the entire voting population. It appears that a very large citizenship—fully one-half, in fact—is simply holding aloof and making no immediate affiliation with any party. The National party was the only one that conducted an aggressive, vote-seeking campaign, and it is understood that they captured almost the entire floating and irresponsible class of voters.—Balt. Herald.

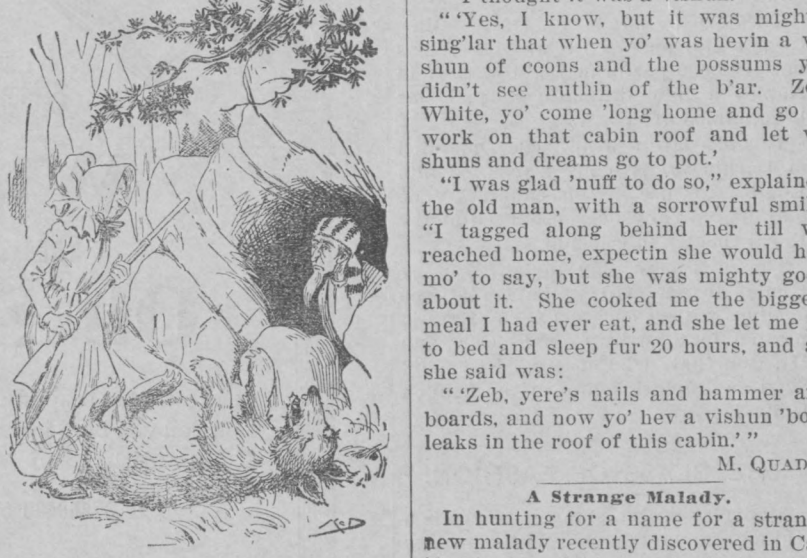
