If there are errors, they are likely to be found in tabulating the work of the enumerators, rather than in actual field work, and this is an easy question to determine. As the pay of the enumerators depended on a percapita system, it is not reasonable to suppose that they would slight the work and thus reduce their pay.

It is also entirely ridiculous to assume that the population must be in a certain fixed ratio to the registered vote, or the vote polled, and that one ratio of this kind should apply throughout a state, in all counties alike. It would be strange, indeed, should the enumerators appointed by a state or municipality, succeed in materially increasing the population of any division, by legitimate methods, over the figures arrived at by appointees of the general government.
