"Fourteen thousand more letters poured into the post office at Wilkesbarre as the day's contribution to the endless chain business started by Van Kirk and Robbins, and suspended Thursday by order of the postal authorities bending an investigation. Friday morning the two proprietors left for Washington to explain their business. They are confident they will be allowed to continue. It is estimated that the mail of Thursday and Friday contains about \$15,000, and that it will increase during the next several days until the news of the suspension overtakes the rapidly whirling chain. Meanwhile the postoffice employes at Wilkesbarre are stacking the letters in boxes in one corner of the postoffice, and if the congestion is not relieved within a week there will hardly be room for the regular business. PUBLIC LOCAL LAW. CHAPTER 37.

AN ACT to authorize and empower the Burgess and Commissioners of Taneytown, Maryland, to purchase a lot of land in said town and erect thereon a building or buildings, for Fire and municipal purposes, and to levy a special tax on the taxable property within the Corporate Limits of Taneytown, to pay the same.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Burgess and Commissioners of Taneytown, Maryland, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to purchase a lot of land in said town, and erect thereon a building or buildings for fire and municipal purposes; provided the cost of the same shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars.

five thousand dollars.

Section 2. And be it further enacted, That the said Burgess and Commissioners be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to borrow the sum of five thousand dollars for the purposes aforesaid, and execute the note of said corporation for said sum of money and interest thereon, and to secure the same by mortgage. money and interest thereon, and to secure the same by mortgage.

Section 3. And be it further enacted, That the said Burgess and Commissioners be, and they are hereby authorized and empowered to levy annually a special tax not to exceed twelve cents on each one hundred dollars worth of taxable property within the corporate limits of said town, and the proceeds therefrom to be applied to the payment of the interest on said debt, and the balance to be paid upon the principal, provided, that when said debt and the interest thereon have been fully paid, then said special tax shall cease. at rock bottom prices. Section 4. And be it further enacted, That before this Act shall take effect it shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said Taneytown for their approval or rejection at the next annual election for officers in said Taneytown, and should the same be rejected by a majority of said qualified voters, then this Act shall be null and void, otherwise to be and remain in full force and effect.

Section 4. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.
