



These "sowers of the seed" can always be relied upon to give by reading to them in their own tongue from the printed book.

Most romantic and thrilling are the experiences of those men who receive from headquarters in New York by steamer big consignments of Bibles, to be taken into the far interior of strange lands. The experiences of Messrs. Beaud and Turner in the Philippines alone would fill a volume of varied adventure. Night and day they travel, and are almost impassable swamps in clumsy carts, and barely escaped drowning more than once while descending swift rapids on rudely built rafts.
