#### MARYLAND MILK INCOME.

New York, Jan .- Maryland's position in the dairy industry is vividly depicted in a new handbook issued by the Milk Industry Foundation. According to the book, milk facts, 202,-000 cows valued at \$12,322,000 produced \$18,305,000 in cash farm milk income for Maryland farmers in 1939. Production of farm milk in the state for the year totaled 407,000,000

The United States is one of ranking milk using nations in the world with per capita consumption of fluid milk totaling 153 quarts a year. Milk and its products comprise 25 percent of the 1500 pounds of the principal foods consumed each year by the average American.

Fluid or fresh milk for cities and villages providing the farmer's highest cash return, accounts for 29.9 per cent of the country's yearly production. Creamery butter takes 31.6

However, as a safeguard another bill will be introduced (probably be-fore the publication of this column) that changes only the provisions relating to Carroll County. As this matter is of considerable importance to Carroll County the progress of this bill will be noted and commented up-

Each year in Maryland hundreds

of children have been injured and several have died from accidents resulting from the use of fireworks. Permanent blindness and disfigurement is a frequent result of these accidents. In 1940, around the time of the Fourth of July, over 350 fire works injuries requiring hospitalizatien or doctors treatment were reported. It is impossible to estimate how many injuries were unreported. As this condition exists each year it is obvious that we urgently need some law to regulate and control the

use and sale of fireworks. Many other States have enacted laws prohibiting the sale of dangerous fireworks and have thereby reduced the number of serious accidents resulting from their use by children. A similar measure was proposed to the 1939 Session of the Maryland Legislature but after being passed in the House by a small majority it was killed in the Senate by

a single vote. The same bill has again been introduced and with the continued support of individuals, clubs and organizations interested in the welfare of our children, and in prevention of blindness, the prospects for the en-actment of the fireworks bill are excellent. The passage of this Bill will assure the material reduction of the "Fourth of July Casualty List" throughout the State.

The opposition to the Fireworks Bill comes from the manufacturers of fireworks and from a few store-keepers who reap a profit from the sale of fireworks at considerable cost to the safety of our children. The same measure that has been

coming back year after year to abolish the "whipping post" as a means of punishment for brutal wife beating has been again brought forth. It met defeat in the House by a vote of 53 to 47. Though regarded by some as a cruel and inhuman form of punishment the whipping post has been effective as a deterrent to brutality on the part of some husbands.

zling headlights.
"The Maryland Traffic Safety Committee believes the majority of mo-torists do not realize," said Mr. Metzer, "That, on the average, it re-quires about four times the interval for the human eye to return to normal that it does to blind it temporarily by a glare. This means that the victim of dazzling headlights not only drives his car blindly for the period of expectage but for a considerable period. posure but for a considerable period after he has passed the oncoming driver. Glaring headlights are also annoying and confusing to pedes-

trians exposed to them." And this raises the important question—What is a "glaring" headlight?

#### Phosphorus for Cattle

A large amount of phosphorus is used by every dairy animal in its lifetime of usefulness. A 1,000pound cow has about 50 pounds of bones, a large part of which is phosphorus. In milk, a food high in both calcium and phosphorus is produced. Of the combined amount of these minerals needed for milk production, the phosphorus is about 45 per cent; in other words, the phosphorus requirement is about fourfifts of the calcium requirement.



# Iodine Alone Aid in Many Goiter Cases

was too far advanced to obtain successful results. Today, while practically every hospital has one or a number of surgeons skilled in this operation, it is known that many cases can be successfully treated by X-rays and still others are relieved of their symptoms by rest and medicine.

There are, of course, certain cases in which operation should be per-

formed as pointed out by Drs. Walter Redisch, New York, and William H. Perloff, Philadelphia, in Endocrinology.

1. Those cases in which there is mechanical pressure present, aside from the regular symptoms of severe goi-

2. Cases in which Dr. Barton one or more nodules or lumps can be felt, firmer than the remainder of the gland.

3. Those cases in which other forms of treatment such as rest and iodine have failed.

4. Wherever there is immediate danger from heart and blood-vessel disturbances.

#### Record of Results.

In recording the results obtained by use of iodine alone, Drs. Redisch and Perloff state that iodine causes a great improvement in some patients, has no effect in others, and makes still others worse. By using sodium iodide with the pure iodine, instead of potassium iodide, results showed about 10 per cent of the cases completely and permanently cured, 40 per cent free of symptoms so long as iodine is used, and almost 50 per cent "almost" free of symptoms, but with some signs and symptoms still present.

The thought then is that while many cases must undergo surgery, and others treatment by X-ray, there are many other cases in which iodine alone, or iodine with rest, brings relief of symptoms.

#### Dizziness Often Due to Allergy

A MONG your friends and acquaintances you likely have a number who are sensitive or allergic to various foods. They will tell you that a certain food brings on an attack of hives or an upset stomach or an attack of asthma, or a head cold. The eating of foods to which one is sensitive is now believed to be the cause of attacks of dizziness that were formerly blamed on the liver. Just as foods inflame the lining of nose, throat and bronchial tubes, the lining of the stomach and the surface of the skin, so can they cause an inflammation of the inner ear, thickening the lining, upsetting the balancing canals and so causing dizziness.

Dr. L. H. Criep, Pittsburgh, in Pennsylvania Medical Journal, Harrisburg, states that the number of cases of dizziness due to allergy is greater than suspected. That allergy causes swelling and puffiness of the inner ear, just as it causes swelling and puffiness of the skin, lining of nose and other parts, is logical or reasonable particularly when all the other conditions found in allergy are present in these cases, such as family history of allergy and other allergic symptoms (asthma, hay fever, eczema and the like) and the tests for allergy are positive.

Dizziness (vertigo) due to allergy may be the only symptom present or there may be other symptoms such as deafness, ringing in the ears (one or both sides), and stomach upsets.

Dr. Criep points out that similar symptoms—loss of hearing, ringing in ears, dizziness, headache-may be due to tumors, infections, poisoning and bleeding into inner ear, so that all these conditions should be considered and searched for, before blaming the symptoms on allergy. If none of these conditions is present, it is reasonable to believe that allergy may be the cause.

#### QUESTION BOX

Q.—Is high blood pressure dangerous to anyone getting a stroke? A. — The family physician who knows the patient's condition best after a stroke or after each stroke gives the patient a complete rest in bed for some weeks. He is then allowed to take a certain amount of exercise according to his condition. He is given small meals four times a day instead of the usual three. The physician may give medicine to give relief of symptoms.

SWINE DISEASE SPREAD FEARED

Erysipelas Presents a New Threat in U.S.

Throughout the ages, one of the first and most certain results of war has been a marked increase in the contagious disease of live stock.

One serious animal disease, for example gained entry here before the war, and has already caused serious losses to live stock producers in a number of states. This plague is known as Swine Erysipelas—a name which is probably more familiar to most American farmers than the disease itself.

Today, serious outbreaks of Erysipelas are gaining in frequency in many states. Naturally, the greatest losses have occurred in the swine raising sections of the Middle West, but according to the American Foundation for Animal Health, the disease has now been recognized in at least 39 states.

Swine Erysipelas is caused by a specific bacterial organism. swine, this organism or germ may cause several different types of the disease varying from the very acute blood-poisoning type, to the slowly developing chronic type characterized by lameness, enlarged joints, and sometimes by inflamed or dead areas of the skin. In its more acute forms, the symptoms may resemble those of hog cholera and laboratory examinations by a veterinarian are frequently required in differentiating

the two diseases.

The fact that Erysipelas and Cholera symptoms are often very much alike is undoubtedly an important factor in the recent spread of the former disease in this country. If veterinary diagnosis is not made, and the disease is allowed to run its course, many farmers conclude that their hogs have recovered from an attack of cholera, when as a matter of fact the animals have been suffering from Erysipelas. This is a very serious error in view of the fact that it has been definitely proved that animals that have recovered from an attack of the disease may carry the causative germ in their body tissues for rela-

tively long periods.

The first point for every farmer to remember is that Erysipelas often resembles hog cholera. Guesswork is a poor substitute for accurate diagnosis when either of these dangerous diseases is involved. finally, an effective treatment for Erysipelas is now available and should be used whenever the disease is indicated, not only to help save the infected hogs, but to help prevent further spread of the disease in this country.

# Aptitude Tests Aid Army Spirit

Contentment of Trainee Is Deemed Essential for Efficiency.

WASHINGTON.—A corps of specially trained army interviewers has questioned the first contingent of trainees called to service under the conscription act. Their object was to place the new soldier in a position that will increase army efficiency.

This group of men, charged with properly classifying trainees, consisted of both commissioned and non-commissioned officers. Many of the interviewers, especially National Guard and reserve officers, were personnel managers in private in-

To heighten efficiency of the army and keep the personnel satisfied with army life these men classified trainees according to their private occupations or special qualifications.

The trainee underwent his first classification test immediately upon arrival at the reception center to which he was sent after induction. At that time he received the army general classification test which classifies him according to his general capacity to learn.

His grade on this test helped the interviewer form an estimate of his probable skill and adaptability.

#### Tests Not Formal.

This interview was not a stiff, formal question-and-answer proceed-The officer with whom he talked sought to put the new man at ease and to enjoy more of a casual chat with him, for this interview was an all-important point in final classification of the trainee.

The information he gave about himself-his occupation, hobbies, favorite sport, knowledge of foreign languages, musical or theatrical talent, education and skill in his chosen vocation-was recorded on what is known as a soldier's qualification card, a record that will follow him everywhere he goes in the army.

If the trainee exaggerated and attempted to pull the wool over the eyes of the interviewer in hopes of getting a soft job and was caught by the interviewer he probably was sent to a trade-tester, whose job is to ascertain a man's skill.

Interviewers pay close attention to hobbies and vocations that the trainee might have wished to follow. for the army has learned that from this system the man may be more proficient and, likewise, of more value to the army.

#### Classification Made.

When the interview was over the trainee returned to his group and the card went to an expert classifier, who, after studying it and consulting a list of civilian and military occupations, decided where the trainee should be sent.

The classifier's opinion goes before the chief classifier, who sent the card to a coding section.

After the cards have been arranged in alphabetical order men with given classification lected from the group quickly by a punch-card system which the army is instituting.

If a man becomes skilled in his occupation while in the army that. fact will be noted on his card.

#### THE CHRISTIAN'S ATTITUDE TOWARD POSSESSIONS

LESSON TEXT—Luke 16:10-15, 19-23.
GOLDEN TEXT—Ye cannot serve God and mammon.—Luke 16:13.

"In the service" is an expression much used today. Every community has young men in the service of their country. But they are not the only "service men," for the fact is that every man and woman serves under some authority. Our lesson today reminds us that our attitude toward our possessions determines both character and destiny. We decide whether they shall rule us or we shall rule them.

I. Who Is Your Master-God or Gold? You Decide! (vv. 10-15).

The decision here is of the "either -or" variety. "Ye cannot serve God and mammon" (which means "riches").

Money itself is neither good nor bad. It is the use to which it is put that determines whether it is to bless or to destroy. Rightly gained and rightly used, money is an honor to the man who has it, and will, through him, become a means of blessing. On the other hand, money which controls a man will blast his own soul and those of others round

Who decides which it shall be? You-and you alone. Here we come to the central truth of the matter. 'He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much" (v. We generally read that as though it said, "He that is now faithful in a little will later have an opportunity to be faithful in much. That may be true, but what Jesus said here was that he "is faithful in much."

The point is that the man who is faithful in the much shows that life attitude by being faithful in the little. That is, only the man who is right in the great matter of his relationship with God will be the ruler over his possessions for the glory of God and the good of his fellow man.

Someone may say, "I don't believe that." Well, you are in bad company (see vv. 14, 15). The Pharisees, who loved money, who were self-righteous, and whose attitude was an abomination in the sight of God, derided the words of Jesus.

If you don't like that kind of companions, I invite you to come over on God's side.

II. Where Will You Spend Eternity? Your Life Decides (vv. 19-23). Our life beyond the grave is determined by our life on this side of death. Yes, we know that eternal life is a gift of God received by faith in Christ as Saviour, quite apart from our own works or our merit. But let us not forget that

this means far more than uttering a few words of profession or going through a formula.

The man who really turns to Christ in saving faith becomes a new oreature; he is born again (I Pet. 1:23). That means that he walks "in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4). And thus his life in this world determines both by decision for Christ and daily living for Him that he will, like Lazarus, be received into eternal blessedness,

Sad to say, the opposite is also true. Living as the rich man did, for self, will bring judgment in the world to come. There is no indication that he was especially wicked, but only that he loved his money, revelled in the flamboyant display of his wealth (v. 19), and had no thought for others (v. 21). Here again, the point is that these out-ward deeds were the expression of a heart attitude against God.

Death came to both of these men. It will come to all of us, unless the Lord returns to take us to Himself. It is not a pleasant matter to think of death, but only the unintelligent will fail to recognize the coming of that day. When it comes, it may be too late to make any real life decisions. Now is the acceptable time. Today is the day of salvation.

The verses immediately following our lesson in chapter 16 indicate that the decision of men concerning their relationship to God is not dependent on the miraculous, but on moral and spiritual truth. The man who says he would believe if he could only see God perform a miracle is only evading the issue. Verse 31 says that the man who rejects God's Word does so because he wants to, not because he needs to be convinced by a miracle.

The self-kicking machine was erected July 27, 1937, on Highway 70, often called "North Carolina's Broadway." Thousands of persons have used the machine since.

Several hundred of these who have been kicked belong to "the Self-Kicking Club of America." The members are scattered in every state of the Union and in some foreign countries.

The machine is still going strong after three years, although Haywood has had to install a new belt, and a third set of new shoes will have to

be added in a few weeks. To use the self-kicking machine you just stand before it and work a gadget and the shoes revolve on the belt and kick you in the favorite place for all kicks.

Haywood says one reason for his machine's increasing popularity is but let him tell it:

"Some of us who have been kicking previously about America and our form of government are now kicking ourselves after seeing the condition of other countries. We are finding that we are the ones that should be kicked, not our American government.'

As a matter of fact, acidum tannicum, which is what most people mean when they speak of tannin in tea, is at least 25 times stronger as an acid than tea tannin and both these acidities are weak when compared with normal stomach juice.

Because good tea properly prepared is a stimulant that picks you up and does not let you down, it is beneficial to anyone in search of a sense of well-being. It is included in the diets of invalids when other beverages are excluded and it is served freely at some of our best

training tables. Experiments in American offices bear out the impression that tea and the pause that accompanies it are beneficial to employer and employee alike, increasing efficiency and eliminating many of the mistakes that formerly characterized the sluggish period between 4 and

# Inventors Aim For Easier Life

Sham Fireplace and Vocal Mittens Among Latest Patents Issued.

WASHINGTON.—The patent office announces that it has issued certificate number 2,219,507 on a new boon to the householder-a feature that may be especially appreciated by the small-apartment dweller.

The new invention, patented by Charles W. Apgar and Abraham L. Rosenfeld of Philadelphia, is in effect a phony fireplace, completely collapsible and easy to store away in the nearest closet when not in

Not only is it decorative—the trick gadget also is useful. Lift up the attached mantelpiece, and you find the back of the fireplace is hollow, forming a convenient storage space for old photographs or fishing tackle. Yet the whole thing can be taken down and hidden away if unexpected guests arrive and the space is needed.

The fireplace has only one inconvenience, and that a minor one. It doesn't give out any heat.

New Cherry-Pit Remover.

For those who like cherries and hate cherry pits, George W. Ashlock Jr. of Oakland, Calif., has just the thing. It's a fairly large machine, and it has approximately 100 parts, but it takes the cherry stones out smoothly and rapidly.

The latest prize for the most puzzling invention goes to John S. Anderson of Chicago. His original idea is a seven-bladed hand scraper that is, a scraper for the hands. Judging from the drawings accompanying the patent application, the Anderson gadget is designed for rubbing over the palm of the hand in case there's anything there you want to get rid of. You cannot slip and cut yourself—the sides, he says, are "suitably kurled to prevent such a mishap.

Samuel H. Krasno of Milwaukee, Wis., may have the answer to "why aren't you the life of the party? His offering is a voice attachment for mittens. Krasno was awarded patent number 2,219,103 for this tricky little apparatus, which should prove a boon for unskilled ventriloquists. The voice-producing device is hidden in the center of the mitten and is operated by opening and closing the hand.

#### Hard Winter Indicated.

He neglects to state the exact purposes of the noise-maker. But one thing is certain. Krasno is expecting a hard winter in Milwaukee-the drawing accompanying the patent claim shows a mitten covered liberally with fur.

Another unusual invention is a double-barreled pipe, invented by Charles P. Nash Jr., Charlottesville, Va. Into the main bowl Nash says, you stuff your tobacco and light it. The second, or auxiliary, bowl, is left unlighted. Result—the smoke cooled and diluted by pure air. The great feature of the pipe is that, by compressing the tobacco in the second bowl, the smoker can but down the supply of air to suit his taste.

Other recent inventions include a solid baseball cap for players susceptible to bean-balls, invented by Victor Brunzell of Long Island City, N. Y., and a process for producing imitation tree-bark, patented by William H. Burke of Superior, Wis., who may live in the heart of the lumber belt, but isn't satisfied with the real thing.

# Use 'Rainbow' Type Bridge at Niagara

960-Foot, \$3,500,000 Arch Is of Rare Design.

NIAGARA FALLS.—The 960-foot span of the new \$3,500,000 bridge being built across the Niagara river gorge besides being one of the longest of its type also must be literally self-supporting.

Unlike bridges built over shallow water, where engineers can set up false work or pillars to support the arch, the "Rainbow" bridge will span water whose depth is undetermined, but known to be at least 160

Hence, when installation of the steelwork begins, the contractors will resort to the seldom-used tie-

back device. The entire bridge, replacing the so-called "Honeymoon" bridge destroyed by ice in January, 1938, will have to be "tied back" with heavy steel cables—480 feet of steel, weighing approximately 3,750 tons, being anchored on each side of the river marking the boundary between the United States and Canada.

The first step will be the erection at the end of each approach of a 140-foot tower. "Dead men," or anchorages, will be sunk in the ground 250 feet behind the towers. The anchorages will be 30 feet be-

low the surface and cemented in sol-The cables will be strong enough to carry three or four times the

actual weight of the bridge. The arch girders, 12 feet high, are being made in the Bethlehem Steel corporation's Pennsylvania mills, but must be split in half to fit into a railroad car for transportation. They will be spliced at the center of the bridge, where Canadian and United States laborers, working at their respective ends of the span with materials manufactured in their respective countries, will join forces for the final job.

#### Indian 'Sacrifice Rock' Found in Pennsylvania

FINLEYVILLE, PA.—An Indian 'sacrifice rock," pocked with holes apparently used as containers for blood, has been discovered near Saltsburg, along the Kiskiminetas river, by Chief George S. Fisher, of Union Valley, member of the Pennsylvania Indian research. Chief Fisher said the rock meas-

ured eight feet across by 12 inches in thickness and has 76 holes, each of them capable of holding about a quart of blood. He reported also finding in the

same vicinity a huge mortar weighing about 60 pounds. The Pennsylvania Indian research

has planned a pilgrimage to the site of the find and will take a cast of the rock.



Miss Custenborder's service report

We began our year with 47 children under care. Since then 25 children have been reported as being either neglected, dependent, or delinquent. 6 of this number were committed to the CAS by the magistrate and one was accepted on the parents' request; 4 were referred to other agencies and 14 are still in their own homes where social case work is being done in order to adjust the problems that exist. Broken homes have been the underlying of many of these children becoming neglected or delinquent. Physically and mentally handicapped children also often become behavior problems in school or at home. A great deal of time is spent in trying to find suitable homes with kind and understanding foster parents who may be able to help these unfortunate children devel-

op into good citizens.

The CAS concentrated its efforts on the physical needs of its children this year with the result that every child now under care has received a physical and mental examination, dental corrections have been made, tonsils removed and glasses provided when recommended.

During the year 9 children were passed from care, one having attained majority, and two were returned to their own homes; three were given temporary care until admitted to an orphanage, and three were committed to the State Training Schools after failure to adjust in foster homes. We closed the year with 46 children under care and placed as follows: 3 with relatives, 3 in wage homes, 12 in free homes, and 28 in boarding homes.

In the family department, 51 families received assistance with their domestic problems or with temporary relief: 220 pairs of shoes and 1500 articles of clothing and bedding were distributed during the year. In three homes milk was furnished for undernourished children; 4 mothers were taken to the hospital for treatment and operations and plans were made for their families during their ab-

Eleven investigations were made for out-of county agencies involving fifteen children, eight of whom has run away from their homes to seek adventure, and seven who have relatives living in this county who might give a temporary home or other assistance because of some problem in the children's own home.

The several committees have been very helpful with their projects such as sewing, visiting, children, and taking them to clinics. The Society appreciates the co-operation of the Red Cross, Needlework Guild, Service Clubs, church groups, and individuals who have contributed in so many ways to make it possible to carry on the work. filing of income tax returns. Individuals under the following circumstances are required to file returns

Married individuals living together having a combined gross income of

The net income is no longer to be used in determining the liability for the filing of a Federal income tax return. The liability of a citizen or resident of the United States to file a return is dependent upon his status as a married or single person, and the amount of his gross income. Therefore, every citizen or resident of the United States will be required to file a return for the taxable year 1940 if his gross income in 1940, regard-less of the amount of his net income, less of the amount of his net income, comes within the amount specified above for his particular status. A return must be filed even though, by reasons of allowable deductions from gross income and of allowable credits against net income, it develops that no tax is due.

Form 1040A should be used for gross income of not more than \$5,000 derived from salaries, wages, interest, dividends, and annuities. Form 1040 should be used for gross income from salaries, wages, interest, dividends, and annuities of more than \$5,000; or if any part of your income is derived from other than salaries, wages, interest, dividends, or annunities, Form 1040 should be used regardless of the amount of your income. While returns must be filed on or before March 15, 1941, with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which you reside, it is urged that they be filed as soon as possible after January 1 possible after January 1.

If in doubt as to your liability for the filing of a return and if your employer has no blank return forms available, make request of the collector of internal revenue for the district in which you reside, or of any deputy collector stationed in your vi-cinity, for the 1940 individual income tax return and the printed instruc-
