

## Budget for the School Year 1955-56 Approved

A regular meeting of the Carroll County Board of Education was held on Tues., December 7, in the offices of the Board of Education in the City Hall in Westminster. President Paul R. Niswander was in charge of the

The Board approved the minutes of the meeting of November 9th.

Attention was called to several problems connected with traffic hazzards being faced by school children who must cross highways. A report was given to the Board regarding this problem with information as to what had been done toward a solution.

The Board was notified of the presentation of new flags to the Winfield School by the Winfield-Taylorsville Lions Club, as well as the purchase of

The Board was given information regarding the growth of school population in the State of Maryland and in Carroll County. Statistical reports were also given to them showing a total enrollment in the Carroll County schools during the month of November of 9,070 pupils and a county attendance average of 94.2%.

#### S-D DAY COULD JUST AS WELL BE S-W DAY

S.D means safe driving, but safe walking will be almost as important if traffic accidents are to be held to a minimum on S-D Day Wednesday, Dec. 15.

More than 1,000 pedestrians literally walked themselves to death during December last year, according to National Safety Council figures. December is always the peak month of the year for pedestrian fatalities.

However, on Dec. 15 the walkers as well as the drivers will have an opportunity to prove that accidents don't have to happen if- every individual makes a real effort to prevent them.

President Eisenhower has proclaimed Dec. 15 as the date for the nation to keep traffic accidents at an absolute minimum for a 24-hour period as proof that traffic accidents can be prevented by individual and community action. The nationwide cooperative program is sponsored by the President's Action Committee for Traffic Safety.

Children and older persons are most vulnerable as pedestrians. Of the 8,600 pedestrians killed last year about

were over 65.

Most pedestrian victims are nondrivers who do not understand the mechanics or limitations of driving, safety experts say. Elderly men are most apt to be pedestrian victims.

Early evening hours are especially hazardous for pedestrians. More than a third of the victims were killed between 5 and 8 o'clock in the evening from October to March. About 41 per cent were crossing streets between intersections, 25 per cent were killed at intersections, and 11 per cent were walking in the roadway.

Three easy rules can help make S-D Day-and every day-a safe walking day for pedestrians. To avoid that 'run down" feeling:

1. Cross only at intersections and wait for the green light-and watch out for turning traffic.

2. Wear something light or carry a flashlight if you must walk on a roadway at night.

3. Make sure packages, umbrellas or newspapers do not block your view of approaching traffic.

## (A Voice from Carroll)

Boiling a kettle full of apple butter ese to be a yearly event on every farm, but rare indeed is the farm family that can spare the time for cooking apple butter today. It takes eight hours of precise cooking before apple butter is ready to be popped into jars or crocks and before the cooking stage it takes hours and hours of peeling apples by many pairs of hands. For those who may be interested in trying this disappearing art here is how you go about it. First, locate a large copper kettle. If you can't borrow one, don't try to buy one for they cost a small fortune at an antique shop and you could buy a en years supply of apple butter with the money. Having located a kettle, put into it two gallon of cider and boil for ten minutes. Now you are ready to add the apples already peeled, a basket at a time. Be sure to keep count of the baskets by putting one apple off to the side for every basketful in the pot. You add a stick of wood to the open fire every time a oasket of apples goes into the kettle. This keeps the fire just right-not oo hot or the butter will scorch. All this time some one is constantly stirring the pot. Fifteen minutes at the putter paddle is all one person can lo at a stretch, so a good many reruits are necessary. As the butter rooks and thickens the stirring becomes more tiresome. When the apbutter begins to "plop"-after about eight hours of constant stirring, you add the brown sugar and spices But it in jars while it is still hot. The Pennsylvania Dutch drop shiny coins into the kettle to keep the butter from sticking. Its a lot of work . making apple butter but if one an collect a dozen friends to help ts also a lot of fun, and oh—h— what wonderful eating!

## Mayor Perry Announces S-D Day

Mayor Raymond J. Perry today proclaimed Wednesday, December 15th as "S-D Day"—or "Safe Driving Day"—and pledged the full support of the city government in making the project a success. He urged all citizens to do their utmost to keep Taneytown entirely free of accidents on December 15th. "S-D Day" is sponsored by the President's Action Committee for Traffic Safety in cooperation with various national organizations, and State and local officials. It is day to demonstrate that traffic accidents can be reduced may

officials. It is day to demonstrate that traffic accidents can be reduced materially when all motorists and pedestrians do their part. Following is the Mayor's proclamation:
"Whereas the President of the United States has asked all Americans to
unite in a Nation-wide demonstration that traffic accidents can be avoided if

all motorists and pedestrians do their part; and "Whereas, the Governor of our State has asked all of the communities in Maryland to support this worthy effort;

"Now, therefore, as Mayor of the City of Taneytown, I hereby proclaim December 15th, as 'S-D Day' in this community, and ask all citizens to drive and walk on this day so as to keep the entire 24-hour period free of traffic

In pledging support for the program, Mayor Perry said: "This is an opporunity for every citizen to join in a common effort against a common enemy: the traffic accident toll. He can help as an individual, and as a member of groups with which he is associated: his church, his PTA, his club or fraternal society, his union, his association—any and all individuals

and organizations can and should participate actively.

"Most of us are not aware how serious the traffic accident problem has become, or how much it concerns everyone of us. Yet, there probably is not a man or woman in this community who does not have a neighbor, a friend, or a member of his family who has been injured in a traffic accident at some

time.
"It may sound unbelievable, but it is true, that last year there was an injury in traffic in the United States every 24 seconds. A total of 1,350,000 persons were injured to the point where they were disabled beyond the day of the accident. The price we paid for these accidents, in terms of medical

expense, property damage and other costs was roughly \$4 billion.

"A problem that takes a toll of these proportions is one that we simply cannot let go unchallenged. That is one of the reasons for 'S-D Day'. This day is designed to make unchallenged. day is designed to make us realize, among other things, that the place to attack the traffic problem is right here in our own community. And, the responsibility rests upon each individual-not 'the other fellow', but you

The Mayor pointed out that experts from all over the country have been studying the traffic problem for many years, and they have worked out certain basic steps which can bring about safety on our streets and highways.

"But", Mayor Perry commented, "none of these proven methods can be successful unless there is public support for them. So, I am hopeful that 'S-D' Day,' and the activities which lead up to it, will help us all to realize that traffic safety is something which we must strive for continually.

## The Living God

Lesson for December 12, 1954

DO ALL men "yearn for God"? Plainly, they do not. Many ignore him, many wish they could be sure he did not exist, some even spend a good deal of effort trying to show that there is no God. Many even so-called religious peo-

ple, church members of the more lukewarm sort. cannot by any stretch of the imagination be said "yearn" for God. Some people are so flabby by temperament that



they never yearn for anything or Dr. Foreman anyone in their whole lives. Like oysters, they take what comes their way and think as little as possible. Nevertheless and for all that, the longing for God is the deepest longing of which the human heart is capable. Those who have known this desire know that there is no other which is so in-

#### **Only the Living God Satisfies**

Men do cry out for the living God, as the Psalmist said. Men do not really care for dead gods. A deity who is only a name, a definition in a catechism, an article in a creed, a hypothesis in a philosopher's mind, a concept, an idea; a god who is spun like cobweb out of a thinker's brain, a god who is another name for a Wish, a god who is no more than a mirage, a reflection of a man's own ego on the blank curtain of empty eternity,— such a god no one wants. It is only the living God who satisfies. Indeed, the great saints have always believed that only the living God could inspire in men this deep desire for himself. But what is meant by the "living" God? First of all it means the weaver of destiny. A God who made the universe and threw it out to whir! forever untended and forgotter, might be a majestic deity but not the living God for whom the saints have yearned. The living God is one

who is here, now, weaving at his loom of time and space, living in the hearts and minds of his children, controlling by his providence the course of history, "preserving and governing all his creatures" as an old creed expresses it. To such a God we dare to pray; of such a God we may expect concern, a hand stretched out to lift the falling.

## **God the Friend**

"God is my friend" is the most stirring thought a man can have. A God who could not be a friend but only a creator, a judge, would not be the living God of the psalmists' prayers. Yet when we speak of God as a friend, we have to avoid two mistakes. One is to think that he is a friend to all alike, that it makes no difference at all to him what we do, he is for us no matter what, that whatever we pray for he is bound to do for us. No: as we were thinking last week, God can be against men. He will not say "Yes" to foolish or wicked prayers. He is for good and against evil, and he plays no favorites. Another mistake is to think of him like some buman friends, persons who wish us well but can't do anything else about it. Human friendship is often no more than weak and helpless sympathy. The friendship of God comes from the heart of reality itself. In spite of our human friends we may be destroyed; but as St. Paul put it, If God be for us, who can be (successfully) against us?

## The Unchanging God

Both in the Bible (as in Psalm 102) and out (as in Christian theology) we hear about the unchanging or the unchangeable, God. We have to be careful to think of this as the Bible shows us, and not to make a caricature out of the idea. God is the living God; let us keep that in mind at all times. He is not unchanging as a statue is. A doll is made smiling; cuddle the doll or leave it in the rain, and the doll smiles on. But God is no doll! God is not unchanging as a formula is in mathematics. Any mathematical law, any law of physics or astronomy for instance, is unchangeable; but it is not a living thing; it knows nothing, it cares for nothing, it can be used by evil men and good. God on the contrary is the divine person, not a what, not a thing, but infinite, personal, loving,-our Father. His unchangingness is not the sameness of a doll, not the inflexibility of a formula. It is the changelessness of a fatherly love on which his children can now and always
