

Robert F. Kennedy, Chief Counsel of the Senate Rackets Committee, writes in Look magazine: "The worst elements of the American labor movements are creating an unroly alliance that could dominate the United States within three to five years. It is an alliance of transportation unions that could stop trucks from East to West, tie up on all three coasts and embargo all goods on trains and planes".

Between 1948 and 1957, the Department of Agriculture finds, expenditures for food per person rose 18 per cent. By way of comparison, per capita disposable income increased more than twice as much-38 per cent -in the same period.



There are two rules that every one should be taught: In a smoke filled building crawl along the floor for close to the floor there is the hoor for close to the hoor there is generally enough oxygen to permit one to live long enough to escape. The second rule is to wet a piece of cloth and breathe through it. A wet cloth filters the irritating qualities of smoke. These two rules, drilled into school children would in emergency save lots of lives. 



#### "To Be Sent Out"

Dreaming is easier than doing. Plans can be made with less effort than production. If Jesus had appointed his apostles simply to be with him, and nothing further, he would have founded what Buddha did, an order of monks. Now there have been monks in Christendom, even "contemplative" monasteries from which no monk ever emerges into the world again. But the leaders of Christianity, from Jesus on, have never supposed that contemplation is the first and last word for Christians in this world. One of the last things Jesus said in the Upper Room, was, "I appointed you that you should go and bear fruit . . ." The very last thing that Matthew records Jesus as saying was a sentence beginning with the word "Go!" Now if a Christian has really been with Jesus, if he has absorbed his spirit and accepted his truth, he will in a real way take Jesus with him wherever he goes. (More correctly, Christ takes him.) Our Lord multiplies himself through these dedicated lives.

#### The Call Today

All that has been said is true for all Christians. But just as, in those days, some men, the apostles, were chosen as set-apart men with their whole energies given to the Christian witness, so in these days, God calls some Christians to some form of special full-time, set-apart service. Some are called to be evangelists, some pastors and teachers as Paul said. But young people do not always realize that ministers are not the only kind of full-timers there are. Most churches have a variety of places open for Christians of many different kinds of talents. If you will write to your denominations headquarters and ask what openings there are now, here and abroad, for full-time Christian service, you will be surprised-and very likely challenged -by the human needs which are crying, right now, for the help which the church is prepared to give . . . if they can find the dedicated people.
