Color Gives Tracts Lift In California

More courage in the use of exterior color is helping California's big home developers build attractive communities today instead of the faceless tracts of yesterday.

These builders are guided in bold, tasteful uses of color by skilled color stylists such as Miss Margaret Hargreaves, of South Pasadena.

"Builders came to color stylists for help," Miss Hargreaves says, "after they learned that varying architectural styles, elevations, curving streets, and the like weren't enough.

"If the siding color is sharp," she says, "I prefer to use a subdued accent color. I like a deep tone in the asphalt shingles, a stronger color in the siding, and a lot of white on the trim.

"The roof color is selected first because the roof is the common denominator in color styling a single home or an entire development," Miss Hargreaves points out.

"This is because the roof is the largest visible area, whether seen on a single house or as part of the entire development from a moving car.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CARROLL COUNTY PROVIDING FOR THE LICENSING AND REGULATION OF THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION AND LOCATION OF TRAILER CAMPS OR PARKS IN CARROLL COUNTY

Notice is hereby given, in accordance with the requirements of paragraph (i) of Section 3 of Article 25 of the Annotated Code of Maryland, that the following resolution has been proposed for adoption by the County Commissioners of Carroll County:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Commissioners of Carroll County, under the authority vested in them by Sections 2 and 3 of Article 25 of the Annotated Code of Maryland, as follows:

1. That before any person, firm or corporation shall construct or begin the operation of a trailer camp or park within the limits of Carroll County, but outside the limits of incorporated towns and cities of Carroll County, for the purpose of renting parking space therein, with or without utilities, for mobile homes or trailers for residential occupancy and use, he, they or it shall give appropriate notice to the said County Commissioners of the intention to construct or operate such trailer camp or park indicating therein the exact location thereof, the trade name to be used, if any, the approximate size of the area to be occupied, and the number of units that will be accommodated.

2. That any person, firm or corporation that operates any such trailer camp or park within the limits of Carroll County, but outside the limits of incorporated towns or cities of Carroll County, shall obtain a license for such operation from the County Commissioners of Carroll County, on a form to be provided by them, and for which the annual license fee shall be as follows:

(a) For camps or parks with a maximum capacity of ten (10) units, the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

(b) For camps or parks with a maximum capacity of twenty-five (25) units, the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00).

(c) For camps or parks with a maximum capacity in excess of twenty-five (25) units, an additional license fee of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for each ten (10) units, or fraction thereof, in excess of twenty-five (25) units.

(b) That the owner or operator of any such trailer camp or park shall report in writing to the County Commissioners of Carroll County twice annually, on or before June 15 and on or before December 15, in each year, the number of trailer spaces or units then occupied in such camp or park, with a description of the trailers or other vehicles so occupying such units, with the names and addresses of the several owners thereof, such reports to be made on forms to be provided by the said Commissioners.

3. That upon the failure or refusal of any such owner or operator, to secure a license as herein provided, or to make the reports herein required, and if such failure or refusal shall continue for a period of one month, such owner or operator shall be liable to have his license or privileges for the operation of such camp or park revoked, and any sum of money due the County as the result of the operation of such camp or park without the requisite license, shall be recoverable in an action by the County Commissioners against such person, firm or corporation.

4. That this resolution shall be effective July 1, 1959, and the license fees herein provided for any camp or park then in operation in said Carroll County, outside the limits of the incorporated towns and cities of Carroll County, shall then be due and payable, and if not so paid, shall be collectible by the said Commissioners by appropriate legal action at any time after the first day of August, 1959; and thereafter such licenses shall be renewable from year to year from the first day of July in each year; provided, however, that for any camp or park beginning operations after the first day of January in any year, the license fee collectible for the remainder of the licensing year subsequent to the date of beginning of such operation shall be one-half the fees herein provided.

5. That any person violating any of the foregoing rules and regulations for the construction and/or operation of a trailer camp or park within the limits of Carroll County, outside the limits of incorporated towns and cities of Carroll County, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for any such violation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the matter of said proposed resolution be set for hearing at the Office of the County Commissioners of Carroll County, in Westminster, on Tuesday, June 23, 1959, at ten o'clock a.m., provided a copy of said proposed resolution be published in one or more newspapers of general circulation in said County at least once a week for three weeks, at which time and place any person shall have the opportunity to appear and be heard thereon.

NOTICE TO TRAILER OWNERS  
IN CARROLL COUNTY

New Section 323A, Article 7, Code of Public Laws, Acts of 1959

323A. All persons, firms or corporations owning any house trailer or house trailers which trailer or trailers are located in Carroll County for a period of more than ten days at any one time shall, upon the expiration of said ten-day period, immediately notify the Supervisor of Assessments of Carroll County, in writing, of the location of such trailer or trailers in Carroll County. Failure to comply with the provisions of this section shall result in a penalty of ten per cent (10%) of the tax due for each month that the owner shall fail to notify the Supervisor of Assessments. This law effective as of June 1, 1959.

**RANGE:** Several species; found through all of Maryland excepting westernmost part; some species also found throughout New Jersey, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio and part of Pennsylvania.

**DESCRIPTION:** Length about 9 inches including tail; well developed cheek pouches which it uses for carrying food; series of black stripes along back, usually 5 in number—3 dark and two buffy; the back is brown or dark gray; the rump is a rich chestnut; throat white.

**BREEDING:** The young born about 32 days after mating, generally 4 or 5 to litter, possibly two litters annually.

**HABITS:** Feeds on plant and animal life including insects, young birds, nuts, vegetables, flower bulbs; an interesting little animal but can be injurious to gardens and nesting birds; becomes very tame; they hibernate in some sections. Generally range over an area of 4 or 5 acres; likes cultivated lands, wood lots, and rocks.

**MANAGEMENT:** None; they seem to thrive and increase without help; they become a nuisance by destroying gardens and such, when they must be controlled; however they are bright, pretty, attractive little animals, and thus pay back for what little damage they may do.

**VALUE:** None, except it is a pleasure to see the bright little animals going about their business, moving with great rapidity with their pouches full of roots, nuts or what have you, to be stored in den for future use.

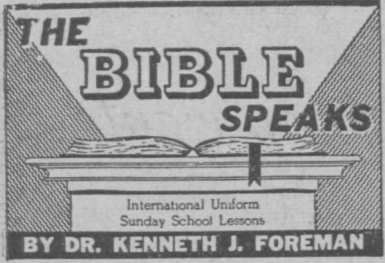

IS THERE one sin from which all other sins come? Many theologians think there must be; but they do not all agree on what sin is the root-sin of all the rest.

There is a first-class example of how the lust for power can run away with a man, an example of how other sins are spawned by this one, in the Bible story of King Ahab and the private citizen named Naboth.

Property for use or for Power? History is filled with examples of men who have been so mad for power that like Ahab they paid no attention to laws that would have held them back from what they wanted.

But there is another thing about the lust for power. Why is it that many persons seem unable to stop acquiring property? Long after they can no longer use it, long after they have enough, they keep on going, they never feel up to the game, they want more and more. The thing becomes almost a disease.

One wise thinker of our times believes that this sort of thing, the sort of thing Ahab did, is a case of wanting security overmuch. A man wants to feel safe, so he piles up wealth and property around him like walls to shut out misfortune.

My Rights and my Reach One thing is certain: the prophet Elijah, being God's man and not the king's, saw no good in what Ahab had done.

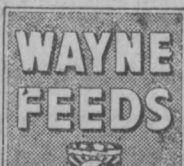

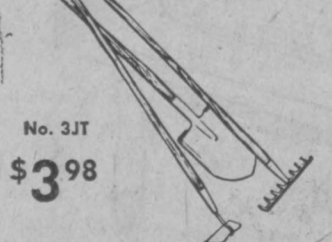
