Campaigning For Safety

WOMEN'S CLUBS in search of a "cause" can do the community a service by organizing a pedestrian traffic safety program.

A five-point program, suggested by the AAA, makes it simple.

With the mayor's permission, title the committee "The Mayor's Pedestrian Protection Committee" and staff it with key citizens such as the mayor, city traffic engineer, police chief and high school superintendent.



Then get the facts on your city's pedestrian problems — locations where accidents most frequently occur, age of victims, time of day — and pinpoint your statistics with spot maps. Obtain police permission and cooperation to erect "dangerous-corner" signs at these locations.

Urge enforcement of pedestrian laws which, when violated, are most often linked with accidents.

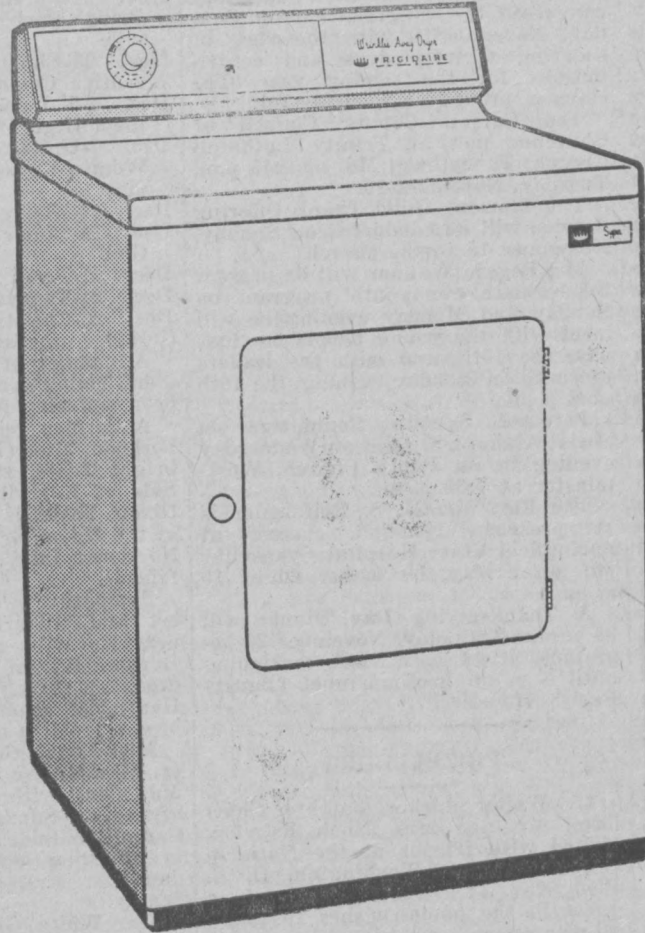
Campaign for engineering improvements — marked crosswalks, chain barriers to keep pedestrians from crossing at unsafe places, etc.

Conduct public education activities with such devices as a sound truck, literature, sidewalk signs, leaflets, posters, films, and newspaper, radio and TV publicity.

You'll find the press and other media usually help such a "cause" with enthusiasm.

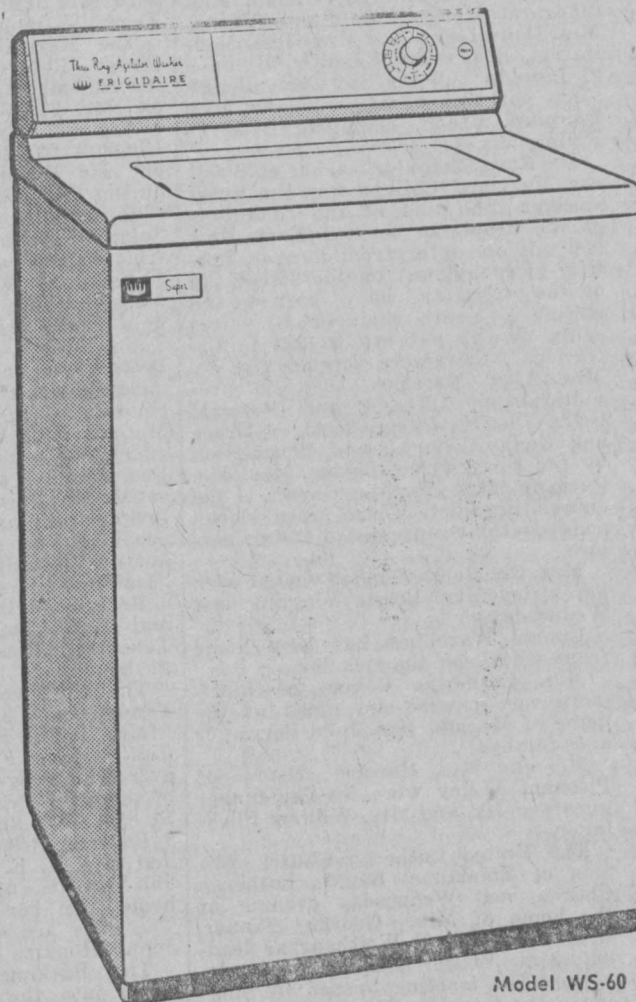

Sweet cooking chocolate is used in the creamy filling and to coat the toasted coconut twigs that decorate the whipped cream frosting. Whether served as an afternoon refreshment or as a dessert, this sweet chocolate roll is certain to win the plaudits of one and all.

Chocolate Torte Filling

- 1 baked cake roll
- 1 package (1/4 pound) sweet cooking chocolate
- 3 tablespoons water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup whipping cream
- Whipped cream
- Coconut Twigs

Place chocolate and water in saucepan over low heat. Stir until chocolate is melted. Cool until thickened. Then add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Whip cream. Fold chocolate mixture into whipped cream. Fill cake roll. Garnish with whipped cream and Coconut Twigs. Chill about 2 hours before serving.

To Make Coconut Twigs: Heat 1 package (1/4 pound) sweet cooking chocolate over boiling water until partly melted. Remove from boiling water and stir rapidly until entirely melted. Add one cup toasted flaked coconut and mix well. Drop from spoon on waxed paper. Cool until firm. Makes 18 pieces.

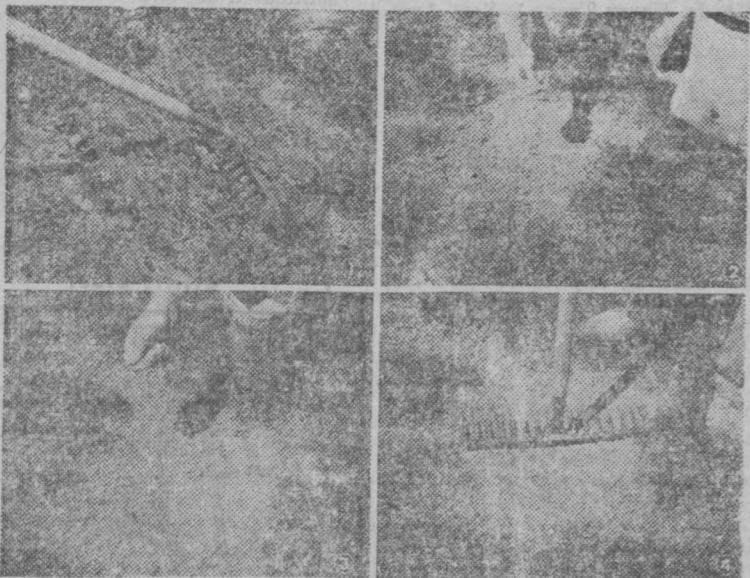

How to Reseed Bare Spots in Your Lawn



To repair bald spots in your lawn, and restore its original greenery, follow these steps:

1. Work up the soil, 3 to 4 inches deep. Remove stones and other debris.
2. Apply lime and fertilizer. Work them into the soil.
3. Scatter lawn seed evenly.
4. Cover seed by tamping or light raking and rolling.

You'd follow the same basic steps if you wanted to seed a whole lawn. For more details, ask your county agent for University of Maryland Extension Service Bulletin 171, "Lawn Care."

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Bible Material: Acts 8.
Devotional Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:14-20.

The Good News

Lesson for November 22, 1959

IT CANNOT be said too often: Christianity is not an organization, it is not a creed, it is not a set of good resolutions, it is not a special kind of philosophy, it is not a dogma. It produces all these, but it does not begin with any of them. It begins with good news. We have a first-class case in the story before us in Acts 8. At the turning-point in that story, we are told that Philip opened his mouth and . . . told him the good news of Jesus."

It is not said that Philip opened his mouth and gave the stranger good advice, or condemned his sins, or urged him to turn over a new leaf, or offered him a book to read, or urged him to join a church. He just told the good news about Jesus.

Evangelism Is Good-News-ism

The church today has a technical-sounding big word which many Christians do not understand. It is "Evangelism." When we hear the word, we think of sawdust trails, of mass meetings, of Billy Graham and the Salvation Army and special services at the church on the corner. We think of trained choirs and TV and teams. Like typical Americans we want our "evangelism" as we want everything else, on a grand scale and organized to the last inch. Actually, evangelism (as Billy Graham or any good minister can tell you) is a simple thing. As a famous Christian leader from Ceylon, D. T. Niles, has said, "Evangelism is one beggar telling another beggar where he can find bread."

Some Christian people say they do not believe in evangelism. Push the question with them, and you may find one or the other of two things to be true: either they don't understand what evangelism is, or else they don't really believe in Christ after all—they have no good news to tell. There is a good and a bad way to run a newspaper. A critic may not like the way a particular paper is run, but that doesn't mean that newspaper business is bad business.

Philip told his good news effectively, so much so that the name "evangelist" stuck to him. What made him so good at it? He probably never took a "course in evangelism" all his life. For one thing, he was a man sensitive and responsive to the leading of the Holy Spirit. We first hear of him when the church at Jerusalem is looking for men to appoint on a committee (Acts 6). Qualifications mentioned were that the men should be "men of good repute, full of the Holy Spirit and of wisdom." (It would seem that being full of the Spirit and of wisdom were not thought of as being the very same thing.) At any rate, by the time the Spirit said to Philip, "Go join this chariot," Philip knew the Spirit's voice. It is not necessary to suppose that the Holy Spirit always speaks, or spoke to Philip then, in a voice you could catch on a tape recorder. The point is that the Spirit's will was made known in Phillip's mind, and Phillip knew the difference between God's direction and a notion of his own. How did this man become so sensitive to the voice of God? No doubt because he had been obedient before.

We Know His Bible

Another reason for Philip's success is his knowledge of his Bible. It was a "rash" thing to do, maybe, for this dusty pedestrian to speak to this Very Important Personage in his chariot. But Philip felt he had the right to speak. When he heard that official reading aloud (for that is what the Greek word in verse 28 means), in his dull treasurer's-report voice, that sublime passage from Isaiah 53, Philip could not hold in. Do you understand what you are reading? he cried. The distinguished stranger was too much astonished to be offended. Here he was, a man of wealth, distinction, power; but this poor hiker had something he did not have: he knew what the Bible has to say, he knew what it means. God used this man, who had the one thing needful, to convert a man who had everything but what he needed. God can always use those who know and love his Word.

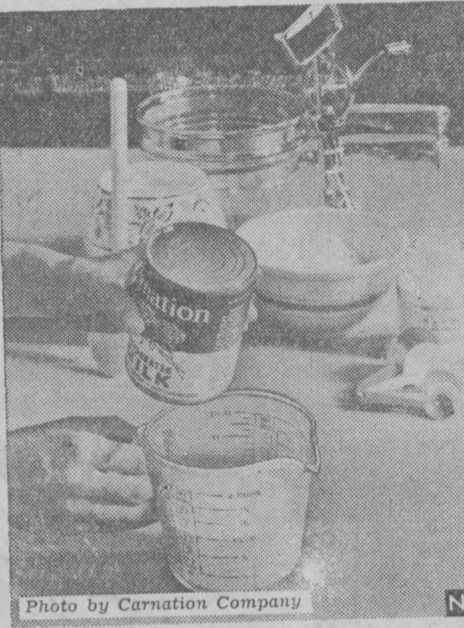
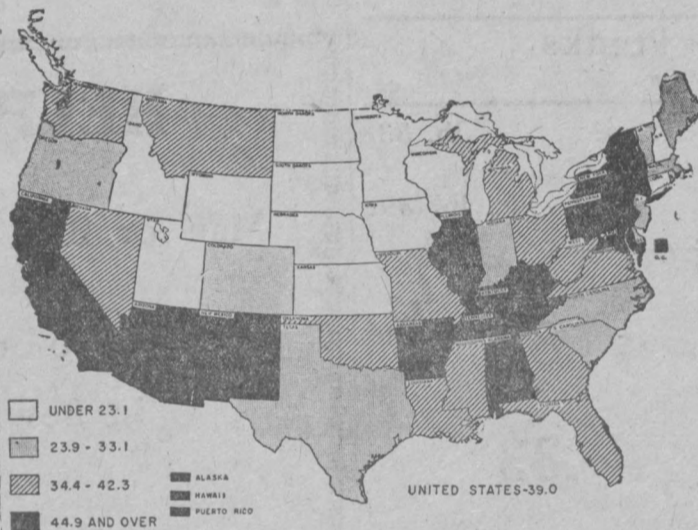

SOFT EGG CUSTARD (Makes 6 servings)

- 1 cup undiluted evaporated milk
 - 1 cup water
 - 4 eggs, beaten
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Combine evaporated milk and water and heat to boiling point. Combine eggs, sugar and salt; mix well. Pour milk slowly over egg mixture, stirring constantly. Return mixture to saucepan and cook over hot (not boiling) water 5-6 minutes, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Cool.

Active TB Cases in U. S.



That tuberculosis may hit some areas harder than others but still recognizes no boundaries is indicated by the map shown above. States shown in white report up to 23.1 active cases per 100,000 population; those in grey, 23.9 to 33.1; diagonal stripes, 34.4 to 42.3, and those in black, 44.9 and up. Christmas Seal funds help local tuberculosis associations reduce these figures—which average 39 cases per 100,000 on a nationwide basis.

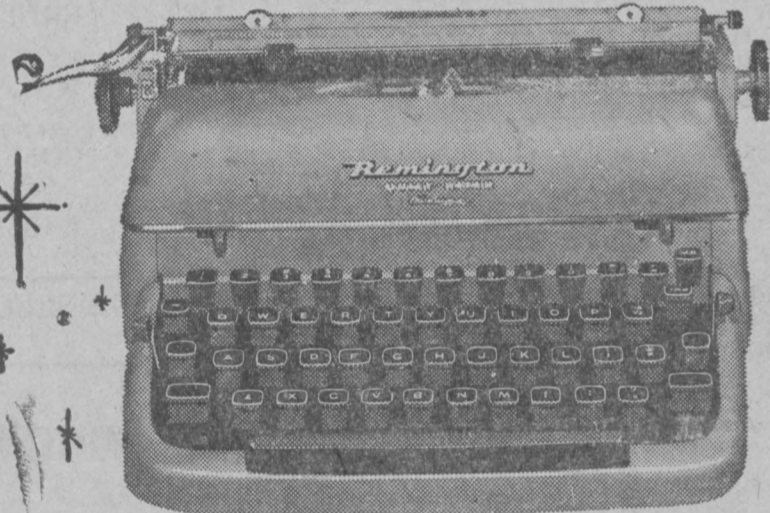

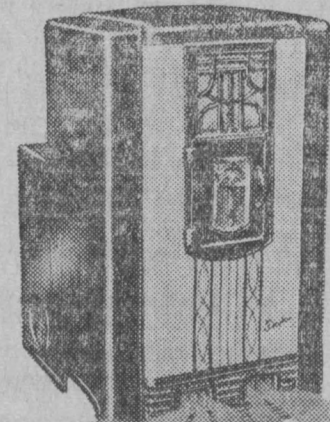
