GRASS ROOTS OPINIONS

ANAHEIM, CAL., BULLETIN:

The Federal gasoline tax has gone up another cent from three to four cents per gallon in order to keep the Federal highway program going. But the increase is only for a 22-month period. After that the tax will drop back again to three cents. However, the odds are 10 to 1 that 22 months from now, and even 22 years from now, motorists will still be paying that additional one cent tax. If you have any doubt about it just consider the fact that Federal gas tax was first imposed during World War II strictly as a temporary war measure. But was it dropped after the conflict? No, indeed. Instead it was increased and now is being increased again. It all adds up to the fact that there is no such thing as a temporary tax—at least, not as far as Uncle Sam is concerned.

ANTIGO, WISC., JOURNAL: "Although the committee on national education policies originally rejected a resolution advocating the use of force, when needed, to maintain classroom discipline, the American Federation of Teachers has now given its approval. The teachers said, however, that force was not a desirable thing in itself. They said it just sometimes could not be avoided."

EL DORADO, KANS., TIMES: "About a half a century ago, it was necessary for the government to put clamps upon arrogant heads of business. It has now come to pass where public sentiment is reaching the conclusion that the same sort of clamps will have to be applied to labor bosses who practice high-handed tactics."

CARLSBAD, N. M., CURRENT-ARGUS: "A North Carolina editor says about the only difference an ordinary bum and one of those so-called beatniks is that the ordinary bum is either ashamed of his status or is indifferent. The beatnik, on the other hand, is proud of his low spot on the totem pole of human society."

ALICE, TEXAS, NEWS: "In Tupelo, Mississippi, one of the first towns to get TVA electricity, the Tupelo Journal had this to say: 'The time has come for TVA to back up and admit that the fastest growth in the South has taken place outside the TVA area and we who live within its borders are still as a whole just about the poorest people in America.' 'So the tax supported TVA, which we in Texas have helped to the tune of over hundreds of million dollars, as our share has not helped the people keep pace with the rest of the South. 'It seems this business is a losing proposition. I would like to sell my share.'"

LOUISBURG, N. C., TIMES: "The petroleum industry spends more than \$300 million a year on research, and more than \$6 billion a year in capital development and modernization. Looking ahead, it has been estimated that oil will spend another \$77 billion between 1958-67 to guarantee expansion and facilities for tomorrow's increased demands."

MUSKOGEE, OKLAHOMA, INDEPENDENT: "Someone has said that freedom is like a handful of sand. The second you relax any of your fingers, it starts slipping away from you. We've relaxed our grip on freedom for a handout—for 'security.' The only people who have 'security' are the inmates of institutions: three

hats a day and a place to flop. The government can't give you security without making you an inmate. And if you are an inmate of the Welfare State you still haven't really got security because the state itself will surely decay and be destroyed. They always have."

ROSEBURG, ORE., NEWS-REVIEW: "For years we've been led into the belief that everything must emanate from Washington. States rights have been invaded. More and more controls have been placed over the public. Gradually we're transferring power into the hands of government at all levels. We're giving up independence and putting on the harness of regimentation."

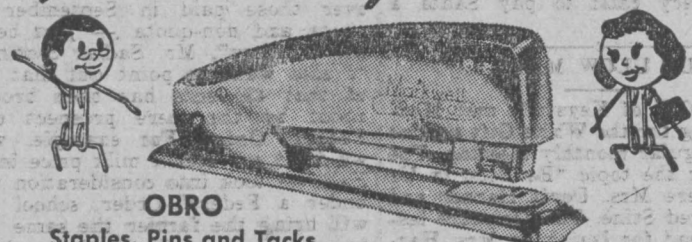

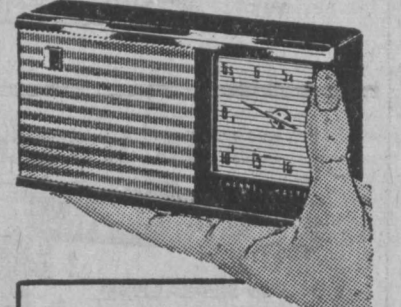

Sometimes the calls that aren't made (because they aren't needed) add as much to living as those we like to make. Perhaps that's what makes a phone worth so much more than it costs.

Not Impossible

Lesson for December 13, 1959

EVERY CHURCH that is really alive is actively looking for new members. These members can be gained in two ways, one bad, one good. The bad way is sometimes called "sheep-stealing;" a dictionary word for it is "proselyting." The church that practices this never goes after non-Christians, it is not truly evangelistic; it gets its members from existing churches, chiefly by slander, assuring these people that the church to which they belong is not really Christian.



One such Dr. Foreman church recently had the light turned on it. Of its more than 100 members, every one had been proselyted from other denominations; and in a year's time not one new member had been actually won to Christ.

The truly evangelistic church, on the contrary, while it does, like all churches, welcome people from other denominations, nevertheless puts its main drive into winning people who have not been Christians before.

Possibles and Impossibles

The evangelistic church, in short, is interested in conversion, first of all. But for many such churches, even good ones, the list of prospects is a list of "possibles." There are persons in the community who are impossible, so far as that church is concerned.

Now if the Bible teaches anything it teaches that there are no really impossible cases. To be more precise about it, there are no cases which we as Christians have a right to label "impossible." The book of Acts tells a number of stories about conversions which we today would think very unlikely. The story of the Roman army officer named Cornelius is a case in point.

Enemy's Man

It took a vision from heaven to convince Simon Peter that God wanted him even to speak with this Cornelius. Certainly under normal circumstances Peter would have crossed the street to avoid him. For Cornelius was an officer in the Roman army of occupation. All during the time covered by the Gospels and Acts, Palestine was an occupied country. The underground was active, and eventually broke loose in a ruinous rebellion. The Romans had to keep an army and permanent military installations all over the place, to hold down rioters and restless people. Christian congregations (as we now call them) at that time were made up entirely of Jewish converts, and you may be sure no such congregation would have regarded an officer of the Army of Occupation as a likely prospect.

A Despised Race

Worse than this, the more religious a Jew was, the more he looked down on all non-Jews. We have race prejudice in America, but it is hardly anything compared to the prejudice the ancient Jew had against the non-Jewish races. It made no difference how important or wealthy the foreigner might be. The mere fact that he was foreign marked him as unapproachable. There are many churches in America today, one-race churches like those in early days, who would definitely cross off from their list of prospects a person of another race.

A Good Man

Furthermore, if any member of the Jerusalem church had got near enough to this Roman officer to know something about him personally, it would have come out that he was already a very good man. Possibly even better than some of the Christians. He was a charitable, prayerful man, quite unlike the run-of-mine Roman soldier. It might have been said, "Here is a good citizen, he doesn't need us. Let's concentrate on real sinners. Talking to a man like Cornelius about 'salvation' would get nowhere." But God saw otherwise. The man Cornelius was good; but no human goodness is good enough to earn God's grace. What Simon Peter had, Cornelius needed: Christ the Savior, and the Holy Spirit, Cornelius brought much with him; but God gave him much more.

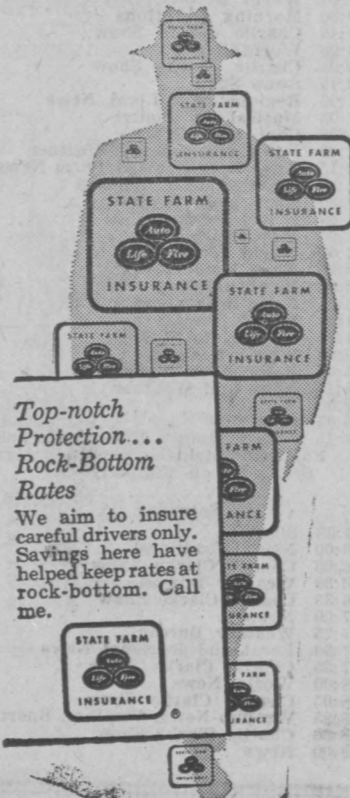

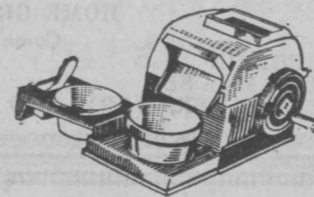

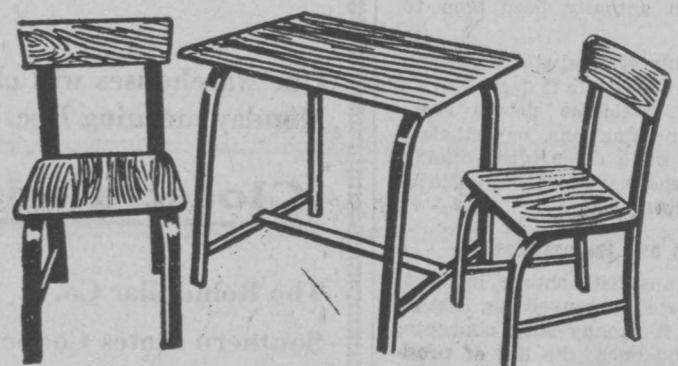
