Annual Membership Meeting of Southern States Coopera-

The future of farming as a business is tided tightly to the growth of this country. As a result, farm markets will grow rather than shrink. This fact was brought out by Robert Bryan, Southern States Cooperative representative, at the Southern States

representative, at the Southern States area annual membership meeting at Taneytown, Md., on August 25, 1960. By 1975, according to George E. Blair, USDA reports that this country will have 230,000,000 people who will need 35% more poultry, 63% more red meats, 38% more milk, 31% more eggs and 57% more fruits and vegetables.

As a result, Mr. Robert, Bryan

As a result, Mr. Robert Bryan pointed out, Southern States Cooper-ative must 'concern itself more and more in the years ahead to increasing farmers' bargaining power through helping them control more of the phases of 'agribusiness'."

In order to do this, Mr. Bryan said,

the cooperative must "keep up-to-date with respect to facilities, financing, member relations and utili-

A step in this direction was the recent reorganization program that Southern States Cooperative put into effect on July. Under this system the five-state operating territory of the organization was divided into 10 regions. Each region has its own regional headquarters and staff headed by a regional manager. The old system had 40 operation districts with a district manager in change of

"Stockholder members have an obligation, too, to make their cooperative more effective, operation to continued. This is largely dependent upon how completely they use the services of the organization and whether they do so on a constant and voluntary basis.

In conclusion Mr. Bryan added that "it is only through an organization like Southern States Cooperative which farmers own and control-that they have the opportunity to have a voice in determining and improving their own economic status".

CHAMBER'S TRIP DESCRIBED

Taneytown Men on Annual Outing last Thursday

Last Thursday about 75 members of the Taneytown Chamber of Commerce attended the Baltimore-Detroit ball game at Municipal Stadium, Baltimore. The temperature was a wee bit on the cool side but not uncomfortable for the fans.

The game was a good one, that is, until the 8th inning and then it was all over. The Orioles had ten men at bat that inning and scored 6 runs. Detroit pitcher Lary was really in trouble with no outs and the bases loaded. His troubles were soon over when Gus Triandos homered and four

runs were in.
Some of the fans were saying that
Lary should have been lifted. Who knows? Ball games are not won or

lost on speculations by the fans.
Estrada, pitching for Baltimore, struck out twelve players. But between times, he had his troubles, too.
That was in the fourth inning when Kaline homered with one aboard to lie the score of twe all tie the score at two all. Only ten men faced him the first three innings and five of them struck out. The program during the day was a trip to the Aberdeen Proving Grounds. About fifty men on two buses left Taneytown in the morning and arrived at the PG about 10:20. The day was cool and pleasant and therefore

ideal for such a trip.

At the PG, one group visited the Balistics Research Lab while the other group visited the Wind Tunnel. At the Balistic Research Lab. the guide described the working of the "brain" called Edivac. Certain facts are fed into the machine, which was supposed to remember al lthese things. Sounds like a good gadget to have along! After we come out of this demonstration, we discovered that no one seemed to know what kind of facts were fed into the brain or why they should be remembered! Tying a string on your finger is just as effective.
At the wind tunnels, of which there

were three, a TV-like machine showed the turbulent action of the wind in the tunnel, showing the directions the wind would take when struck by the

rocket or plane.

The wind tunnel is a space between two large pieces of glass (or perhaps plexiglas) about three or three and a half feet in diameter. The model plane is suspended between these two pieces of glass. Behind the tunnel was a bright light, much like an arc light. This light was directed thru the tunnel and cast the image of the plane on a prabolic mirror which in turn reflected the image into a small camera attached to the TV-like machine. The activity of the wind was not visible in

the tunnel. The attendant said that the small est tunnel represented one and a half Mach and the largest, six Mach. A Mach represents the speed of sound. Lunch was served in the Officers'

Mess. (But it wasn't a mess really, for everything was as nice and neat and clean as could be.) Then came a visit to the Museum. Here are many weapons and vehicles of combat. A number of tanks captured from the enemy are on display. It was interesting to note that some of the tanks carried spare sections of tracks and spare wheels. There were also many small arms, machine guns, mortars and such like. General Pershing's Locomobile of World War I use was

One interesting item was a V2 Rocket which Germany used to bombard England in World War II. There was a replica of a rocket used by the British in firing on Fort McHenry in the War of 1812. It was about fifteen inches long by three inches in diameter, mounted on a pole about twelve feet long. We were reminded that one of the lines in Francis Scott Key's "Star Spangled Banner" is "the rocket's red glare".

Then came a tour of the Proving Grounds, over which every combat vehicle must be tested. All sorts of terrain are simulated. Perhaps the stiffest test comes in climbing grades. One grade is sixty percent. The vehicle must be able to climb this grade, came to a dead stop about in the middle, and then proceed on up

and over the top.

Really, you will have to go to see all these things for yourself.

Supper (or dinner, if you prefer) was served at Haussner's Restaurant. Here is good food, in generous por-tions served in a dining room loaded with all sorts of pieces of art such as pictures, vases, etc.

The group arrived back in Taneytown at about midnight, thanks to the Detroit Tigers allowing the Orioles to finish the game in nine in-

Next year we'll try it again. Now a question-How to get seventy-five men out at the regular meetings of the Chamber of Commerce? Have a ball game?

Tips on Touring

Three Tips For Tois

Smart mothers have discovered that motoring with youngsters can be a breeze instead of a tornado. The trick is to keep the children especially the very young-busy and

happy. Here are three of my travel-tested tips: the mystery box, the wiggle platform and the shoe-bag filing



The mystery box is a hatbox or fruitcake tin. Before leaving home, secretly decorate it, and fill it with secretly decorate it, and fill it with inexpensive toys, wrapped separately in festive paper. Then, on the trip, when the youngsters show signs of restlessness or boredom, pull out the mystery box and let 'em dig—for one toy. Budget foys and digs to the length of the trip. Note: select soft toys, wooden models, drawing books—things that won't hurt the child or distract the driver.

The wiggle platform is a rest or play area in the back of the car. To make one, stack luggage on the floor until it's level with the back seat. Over this, place a crib or air mat-

Over this, place a crib or air mat-tress, cover with a quilt. Take a pillow for each child.

The shoe bag is hung over the back of the front seat. Secure it with two bicycle clamps or metal headbands. Use some pockets for clean-up items: paper toweling, a plastic bottle of liquid cleanser, soap leaves, disposable washcloths. Other pockets make a filing cabinet for dark glasses, camera, toys, reading or drawing materials.

God in History

Lesson for September 4, 1960

GOD IN HISTORY can be seen only with the eyes of faith. There is no demonstrating either that God exists or that he is doing any particular thing. Nevertheless, once seen with the insight of faith, God is unmistakably there everywhere in the story of the universe

and of man. God s does not, so to speak, burst into the story like some one late to a meeting. He does not come in and out like a light out of order. He does not play a minor role on the



God's Will in History

What are God's intentions? Does he know what he wants and is he trying to get it? Does he know what he wants done and is he finding men who will do it? Such questions haunt the mind of one who has not yet become sure about God. They would haunt the mind of a believing man too, if the Bible did not help him with some answers. The prophets of "olden times" lived in a pretty modern era, after all. It was a time like ours in many ways. Nations were armed to the teeth, national wealth was being spent on defense, the common man was taxed right out of his sandals, the whole nation was morally weak and growing flabbier all the time.

At such a time arose prophets, men of God with insight into the mind of God. They did not know all God's "secret counsels" but they were quite certain on some points. First of all, they declared that God does have a purpose-a great all-embracing Purpose that includes every nation in the world. Translated into terms of our time, this means God has a purpose regarding Russia, China, Afghanistan, Canada, the State of Mississippi . . . there is not a territory

so obscure, there is not an empire so great, as to be outside God's purposes. Does this mean that every "people and tongue and nation" and every subdivision thereof always does God's will? How about Russia? we would ask. How about Assyria? the ancient Hebrew would ask. Are they in line with God's high intention? 9

This was a bitter question when Assyria was invading Judah, and Isaiah, speaking for God, gives the answer of chapter 10. Judah, the nation, has sinned, and God is about to punish her. But he does not punish the nation by means of avenging angels swinging thunderbolts. He punishes the nation with a rod: and the name of the rod is Assyria. It is a wicked nation to be sure; nations defeated by Assyria have a tragic fate in store. But when God has sufficiently punished Israel with this "rod of anger", he will cast the rod aside. Where is God's hand in history? At that time, His hand held the rod called Assyria. Since then there have been other nations which like Assyria carried out God's will without being aware of it or of Him. The reader no doubt can name some of these.

God's Character in History

The prophets saw something more than a powerful hand guiding the course of nations. They could see what kind of God this is. To the eye and mind of faith, the whole course of history, the rise and fall of nations, the chains of cause and effect in all ages, strongly speak of a God who loves justice and mercy, a God who is concerned about the helpless and the depressed peoples of the world. Nations as well as individuals that defy God's laws are just digging their own graves. In a real sense of the word, every nation that has fallen into the pit (and the mortality among nations, to date, is 100%) has dug that pit for itself. God's throne of justice is not set on some remote star, it is here on the flying earth. "Though with patience he stands waiting, with exactness grinds he all." The judgments of God are not swift but they are sure. From them there is no appeal. His judgments are not arbitrary, they come right out of the sin itself, the punishment fits the crime. For God is no intruder into history, he is Lord of History. In fulfilling his will is the Good, for all men.


