President Glenn O. Reever conducted this regular meeting of Taneytown Lions Club, Murray M. Baumgardner asked divine guidance for the club's endeavors, and Harry I. News for the Farmer

In a recent interview with Grover C. Zimmerman, Soil Conservationist for Carroll County, Zimmerman stated that the meeting of the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin, held on October 6-7 at Frederick Maryland was to discuss the sediment problem of the Potomac River. Conservationists have said that the Monocacy is the greatest offender.

Many small streams that form this river originate in Carroll County. Our average rainfall for Carroll County is 44 inches. Of this, 26 inches evaporates, 9 inches is taken up by ground water replenishment, with 9 inches running off the land. It's this 9 inches that conservationists worry about, the other 35 inches is already being used beneficially.

The Carroll Soil Conservation District, operating for the sole purpose of conserving water and soil are recommending that farmers should on a voluntary basis, practice some or all of the following. Contour farming, longer rotations, more long term hay, better pastures, better woodland management, better wildlife, more tree plantings, farm ponds, grass waterways, diversions and more lime and fertilizers. When these practices are applied to the land, more ground water will be replenished, which in turn, will decrease run off and increase the flow of our springs and wells.

In 1900 with a population of 76 million, we used 40 billion gallons of water. In 1950 with 150 million people, we used 203 billion gallons of water. In these 10 years our population doubled, while the use of water increased 5 times. This use rate is expected to continue, thus, by 1975, our population is estimated at 228 million and the water consumption at 453 billion gallons.

In addition to good conservation measures used, the necessity of storage dams is a must. The Soil Conservation Service has estimated that several hundred good sites are available in the Monocacy river watershed and studies are being made at the present time in Carroll County so that our people may understand the problem and be prepared to help in the establishment of these conservation measures at the proper time.

AMENDMENTS EXPLAINED

This is the third in a series of articles regarding the proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted upon on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8, 1950, by the voters of Carroll County.

Question No. 5—Urban Renewal Projects: This Amendment proposes to add a new Section 61 to Article 3, Constitution of Maryland, providing that the General Assembly of Maryland by a public local law may authorize any county and any municipal corporation, other than Baltimore City, to carry out urban renewal projects.

These projects are limited to slum clearance or blighted areas and the redevelopment or the rehabilitation of slum or blighted areas. This includes the acquisition of land, property and property interests by any legal means available for this purpose. This would also carry with it the power for any county or municipal corporation so authorized to convey or dispose of all property so acquired. The Legislature also would be empowered to grant by local law to any county or municipal corporation any and all additional power and authority necessary or proper to carry these specific powers into effect. In addition, the Legislature could establish or authorize the establishment of a public body or agency to undertake and carry out these activities with all the necessary powers except that of taxation.

This amendment was proposed by Chapter 444 of the Acts of the Maryland General Assembly of 1950.

Question No. 6—People's Court of Baltimore City: This amendment is Section 41 A of Article 4 of the Constitution. It is intended to change the procedure for the election of Judges to the People's Court of Baltimore City. These Judges hold 8-year terms and their officers are elective except that vacancies are filled by appointment by the Governor.

The Constitution now provides that no person other than an incumbent is eligible for election. Thus, an incumbent who is running against another candidate. He simply runs to ascertain whether he is or is not to serve another term.

The proposal is that any qualified person, including an incumbent, be eligible to run in an election for Judge of the People's Court of Baltimore City. This will allow for opposition to the re-election of any incumbent who runs again for office.

There is an exception for those Judges presently holding office. These incumbents will be permitted to be re-elected with no opposing candidate. The voters, in these cases, will cast their votes for or against his continuance in office in accordance with the present practice.

This amendment was proposed by Chapter 575 of the Acts of the Maryland General Assembly of 1950.

Next week we will discuss Condemnation for Roads in Montgomery County and Judges of Circuit Courts; Extra Judges in Prince Georges County.


