Your local newspaper offers one of the best bargains you're likely to find today: the chance to express your views to hundreds or thousands of readers for four cents, the cost of a stamp on a letter to the editor. Nearly every newspaper carries a letters column, and surveys show it's a wellread feature.

Next time you feel like sounding off on a topic of current interest, why not put it in writing? In a letter to the editor your thoughts will be read and given consideration, and you might gain the satisfaction of helping to mold public opinion. Here's how:

1. If possible, type your letter. If of the paper.

2. Express yourself clearly, in simple words and short sentences. Confine yourself to one topic. Try to keep your letter under 250 words

3. Write a rough draft first, then polish until you're sure your letter says what you want it to say.

4. Don't just criticize; be constructive. If you feel strongly on the issue you're writing about, keep your emoons (and your language) under con-

trol. Try to persuade, not antagonize. 5. If you can, back up controversial statements with facts or reference to an authority other than yourself.

6. Sign your name and give your address. If you don't want your name used say so, but sign the letter. Most newspapers won't print letters that aren't signed.

7. Don't expect the editor to publish every letter you write. Often he receives more letters than he has space for, or too many letters on the same subject. Write when you have something significant to say and chances are most of your letters will be printed.

ORDINANCE NO. 182

AN ORDINANCE, entitled an Ordinance for levying and collecting taxes for the carrying into effect the By-Laws and Ordinances of the Corporation of Taneytown, to pay current debts and expenses for the ensuing year ending June 30, 1961.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland, that a tax of eighty-five cents (85c) on every hundred dollars of assessable property within the Corporate limits of Taneytown, Maryland, according to the valuation thereof returned by assessors duly qualified and appointed by law, and upon such modification thereof as may be made by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland is hereby directed to be levied for and during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, the same to be collected by law according to the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland pertaining thereto, said tax being levied for current expenses, improvements, repairs, etc., and for the payment of principal and interest upon the Sewer Bords of 1954 as directed by Character 1954. upon the Sewer Bonds of 1954 as directed by Chapter 281, Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, 1953, and for such other lawful purposes as may be authorized or required.

Section 2. And be it enacted and ordained, etc., that according to the provisions of an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland at its January 1927 Session, the Clerk and Treasurer, Henry I. Reindollar, Jr., is thereby directed to collect the levy imposed by this ordinance.

Section 3. And be it enacted and ordained that the levy upon the assessment imposed by this ordinance shall be collected promptly by said Henry I. Reindollar, Jr., and deposited with such other monies as may come into the possession and subject to the order of the Mayor and City Council and the full amount shall be collected on or before November 15, 1960.

Section 4. And be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council that this ordinance shall take effect the day and date of its passage.

With Cuba constantly in the news and our naval base situated in the southeast tip of Cuba, 495 miles from Miami, Florida, it might be interesting to know why one payal base in ng to know why our naval base is here and how we got there in the first place. Americans took Guantanamo Bay in 1898 in the war with Spain that liberated Cuba from Spanish rule. In 1903 the new Republic of Cuba formally leased the base con taining 19,625 acres of land and 9,196 acres of water, to the United States under an executive agreement signed by President Theodore Roose-velt. In 1934 a new treaty reaffirmed the agreement giving the U.S. a perpetual lease and providing that the lease can be ended only by mutual agreement by the U.S. and Cuba or if the U. S. gives up the site. The base is important to the United States because its harbor can hold 50 of the largest warships we have and is an all-year training center for the Atlantic fleet. It is also a submarine base and a part of area 3100 U. S. sailors and 200 marines are stationed along with 2,000 American civilian workers and service wives and one thousand children. U. S. has invested 76 million dollars in the base invested 76 million dollars in the base and it costs 10 million dollars in the base and it costs 10 million yearly to keep it up. Cuba is paid 3,386 dollars a year rent for this important piece of real estate. A very small sum considering the importance of the base and how wealthy the U.S. is compared to Cuba pared to Cuba.



The term of each Judge of the Court of Appeals shall begin on the date of his qualification except that each of the Judges of the Court of Appeals in office at the time this amendment to the Constitution takes effect shall continue to hold office for the balance of the term for which he was elected or appointed or until he shall have attained the age of seventy years, whichever may first happen. One of the Judges of the Court of Appeals shall be coextensive with the limits of the State and such as now is or may hereafter be prescribed by law. It shall from time to time by rule prescribe. Its sessions in the City of Annapolis at such time or times as it shall from time to time by rule prescribe. Its session or sessions shall continue not less than ten months in each year, if the business before it shall so require, and it shall be competent for the judges temporarily to transfer their sittings elsewhere upon sufficient cause. The salary of each Judge of the Court of Appeals shall be that now or hereafter prescribed by the General Assembly and shall not be diminished during his continuance in office. [Three of the Judges shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of a majority of a quorum shall be sufficient for the decision of any cause, AND AN EQUAL DIVISION OF THOSE SITTING IN A CASE HAS THE EFFECT OF AFFIRMING THE DECISION APPEALED FROM IF THERE IS NO APPLICATION FOR REARGUMENT AS HEREINAFTER PROVIDED. 

Facing My Sin

Lesson for November 6, 1960

 I^{T} IS NOT necessary to be "fit" before being in touch with God. God is always in touch with all he has made. The trouble is, being in touch with God may not be a happy experience at all.

Consider the case of the poet who wrote the 32nd Psalm. He be-

gins his poem by rejoicing in the happiness of a man who has had his sins forgiven. The forgiving touch of God does indeed bring joy to the heart. But the sense of God's presence had not

perience, not some other person's.)

He writes: "Day and night thy (God's) hand was heavy upon me." He suffered not only spiritual depression, but he had been physically worn-down too. Doctors today will tell you about "psychosomatic" ailments; that is, troubles which begin in the mind but which affect muscles and nerves and bones. Every hospital has patients who would not need to be there if they could come to terms with themselves and their problems. Ministers and hospital chaplains and psychiatrists know that often the only cure for an illness is not miracle-pills or an operation, but (so to speak) an operation on the soul. This is a modern re-discovery of what the Psalmist knew long ago, that a guilty conscience can actually bring on a fever and make a man lose weight and strength. God is in touch with sinners; but his touch is not to them a tender one.

Turning-point

The turning-point in that poet's experience came at the point where he "declared his sin,"-when he

broke down and confessed. There is no mention here of any "Confessor" who stood in the place of God. The sinner faced his God directly. He made his confession at first hand.

Much is said about a forgiving God. He is even thought of as a kind of gigantic forgiving-machine, ons rolling out like newspapers from a printing-press. Not at all. God's forgiveness is never in the Bible said to be automatic. There are conditions. The main condition is certainly not to get a great deal better, or even a little better, before God will consent to do anything for you. That's hardly possible. The condition is that you face your self, your actual sinful selfish mean self, get a good look and be ashamed. The condition is that you realize you cannot forgive yourself, you don't need to and it will do you no good. What you need is forgiveness from a higher source, nothing short of God.

After God has forgiven, then what? Do I sit down happily and contemplate his grace? Do I take up my time with hallelujahs? Do I spend the rest of my life writing songs about God's forgiving love.? Not so. It is true, the experience of relief, release and rejoicing, that overwhelms one who has repented and confessed, has inspired many another forgiven sinner, and not only the author of Psalm 32, to write poetr; describing his great experience. But most of life is not poem-writing. Life for the forgiven man is like a road, it stretches out into the future, and it is not always clear daylight on that highway. Confusing shadows lie across it, a man needs guidance. That is the point of verses 8 and 9 of Psalm 32. The forgiven man is in touch with God in a new way: the Lord is his guide. He had been like a fractious mule, pulling away from God all the time, and feeling sore from the bit pulled tight. Now God tells him to be a man, not a mule any longer, a man, not a beast, a man who can follow directions, a man who has his ear and mind open to the wise counsel of God. There is something more than wisdom on the way of God; there is love. A less than loving God is not going to be a forgiving God. And so the forgiven man looks back and realizes that God's once heavy hand lay on him not to destroy him but to draw him into God's true way.


