RAY'S COUNTRY STORE MUSEUM OPEN FOR HOSPITAL BENEFIT

The Taneytown District of the Carroll Co. Hospital Auxiliary are busy completing their plans to open Ray's Country Store Museum for the benefit of the Children's Room on Oct. 27, 28, 29. Friday and Saturday 11:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Taneytown, Md. 1/2 block east of square. There will be a small admission fee of 25 cents.

You will be taking a nostalgic look at the good old days. You'll be able to buy old fashioned candies, cookies, crackers, home made preserves and pickles, get the mail at the post office, guess on what is its and gab with the neighbors, just like old times. You might even get into a good old fashioned checker game.

Stepping into Ray's Country Store Museum you will be back in 1900 when the general store carried everything from horse medicine and rubber boots to ladies straw hats and rat cheese. You'll see doll carriages and chamber pots on the shelves along with baking powder and bluing sticks. There's a post office, a hat section, a meat department, an ice cream booth with fly fan, and a model 1900 kitchen complete with range and dry sink.

The collection belongs to Mrs. Marcia Ray who began gathering up a few items "just for fun" about a year ago when she was checking the availability of old store stuff in antique shops for her column in Spinning Wheel magazine. In the first shop she visited she found some Aunt Lydia's thread boxes, a herring keg, and a buggy whip holder, she's still looking for buggy whips to fill it. Then came a coffee bin and some men's celluloid collars. After she'd added a post office of the 1900 vintage, the collection turned serious, and she began to concentrate on items of the 1900 to 1910 date. Some are older, of course, like the cash register from 1889, and a few, like glass peanut jars which are no longer being made, are later. When the collection began overflowing the attic space she'd allowed it, and she found herself storing a molasses pump under the guest room bed, she decided to set up in larger quarters. Ray's Country Store Museum is the result.

CARROLL COUNTY TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION MEETS

The need for continuing evaluation of our Case Finding techniques is especially important if we are to have an effective Case Finding program, says Dr. Daniel Welliver at the meeting of the Carroll County T. B. Association on Monday night. The meeting was well attended by the Board of Directors and Mr. Raymond Seward, field Representative of the Maryland T. B. Association, Baltimore, Md.

Mr. Edwin W. Shauck, President of the Carroll County T. B. Ass'n reported that the Association is cooperating with the Carroll County Health Dept. in carrying out the best method to detect and control Tuberculosis in Carroll County.

Other communities reporting at this meeting were Health Education by Miss Maxine Garvin, Volunteers by Mrs. Paul Lawyer, Budget by Mr. Willard Uhler and the Seal Campaign by the chairman, Mrs. Paul H. Smith. Mrs. Ethel Cook, Executive Secretary gave a report on the activities of the Association.

Appeal for Taneytown High School

This is a plea from Taneytown High School students to save our school. We, the students, can do very little to save the place which has grown dear to each one of our hearts so we must call on you — the citizens of Taneytown.

Far too long this town has been asleep. We do what the Board of Education dictates but this consolidation is the last straw. Far too long the honorable clubs in Taneytown have concerned themselves with trivial matters but it is time to wake up and take action — fast.

We elected a town council and I, as a student, do not know of one important thing that they have done besides spread mosquito repellent and remove the snow from the main street last winter. That was quite nice of them but they can really shine in the next few months if they will back Taneytown in keeping our school.

Some of our citizens are blinded by tales of T.H.S. They say "Well, my little Billy flunked out of college — it's all that dum school's fault." I'm sure you have heard that because I know I have. It is an utterly ridiculous viewpoint. Look at all the students from Taneytown who are making a success at college. In a recent edition of this paper there were over thirty students who had gone to college and are getting through. Those who flunk have caused it themselves by having too much social life. The thirty students represents what a good faculty T.H.S. has.

What about our faculty? FSK (Francis Scott Key) students say they have the BEST faculty in the COUNTY. I have just heard that one of their math teachers was asked to leave. The teachers at THS are very good. They show a sincere interest in the students and although ALL schools have a few bad teachers, Taneytown, on the whole, presents a neat program of studies. Taneytown is mainly an academic school but our sports also play an important part of our life.

Since this is an article which we all hope will spur you into action, I will take this opportunity to look inside the THS building. There you find a well-rounded program. In FSK you do not find the music dept. putting on operettas and parts of well-known operas. Our senior and junior classes right now are preparing CARMEN and THE STUDENT PRINCE. In FSK they do not even put on a traditional Class Night and their Jr.-Sr. Proms cannot even look Taneytown's in the face. We have clubs, sports, yearbooks, newspapers, and a literary magazine published by the English Dept. We pride ourselves in having a strong Student Council which takes action on all problems in the school. We have had a lot of improvements in the past few years and now we have two laboratories—one for chemistry and one for physics. Can you imagine little Jr. high students working in those labs? The social life cannot be left out of any school system and Taneytown is no exception. We have dances, pep rallies, sports, programs and on special holidays we have special assemblies. Our rules for the school are strict; in fact we are about the most law-abiding school in the county. At FSK they are allowed to smoke on school ground (A violation of state law). This just cheapens the school and, I dare say, there has been hatred shown to FSK from ALL the schools in Carroll County ever since it has come into existence.

If you would visit THS now, you would find a bitter, challenging student body. Everyone of us refuse to go to FSK. Most of the students are thinking about going to Westminster High. Since I am a senior this does not effect me but I cannot stand the thought that I will have graduated from a school that will not exist any more. The eleventh grade is the hardest struck class. Can you imagine working for eleven years to build up a good reputation in the school and then in your 12th year you are moved to a school, out in the middle of nowhere, where you will be nothing—not even on the yearbook staff! It is a horrifying thought and it just cannot be done. Besides that—the road over to FSK is sickening. On a Sunday drive, take time to ride over to FSK and just see all the curves and hills in that road. Then think of your child when snow is lying on that road. If this consolidation goes through, it will be a bitter fight between the FSK and the THS kids next year. We have never gotten along with FSK and it is degrading to think that our students have to go over to that place in no man's land.

And what about our social life at FSK. It could not be possible to stay after school for sports or for anything unless each child had a car. If there was a dance we would have to trot in the middle of the night to that wilderness. And then if we were not sixteen, you, the parents, would have to get up at eleven o'clock and get your children. Now, I ask you, is this the kind of life you want for you and your children?

We have the best band in the county and this is not said out of prejudice. Our band has beaten Westminster, Gettysburg, Littlestown and bands all over this section of the country. And what about our THS uniforms? You, the people, worked hard to give us those uniforms and now they will be thrown in the gutter, so to speak.

Please, dear citizens, help us. My class does not want to be the last class to march away from T.H.S. This is a growing town of over 2000 citizens. We need a school — and the school needs you right now. You pay higher taxes than Union Bridge and Uniontown (FSK area) put together. This is your town — handle as if it WERE your town. Get out and fight for your rights and more important — for your children's rights for a good education.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Mayor and City Council was held in the Firemen's Building on October 2, 1961, at 7:30 p.m. All members of the Council were present.

Officer Hahn reported a total of 77 violations, 5 funerals, 1 field fire and 1 house fire.

The Town Clerk reported a balance of \$7591.94 in the General Expense Account and \$5192.56 in the Parking Meter Fund.

The Council will advertise in the Carroll Record for men who might avail themselves for a part time work whenever miscellaneous odd jobs arise around our town.

A delegation from the Taney Annex Improvement Association came before the Council seeking more information about the services that Taney desire to become a part of Taneytown.

A delegation from the Fire Department appeared also to clarify an agreement between the town and the Fire Department relative to alterations to the Municipal Building Annex.

Bids have been asked for the following street projects in the town.

1. A permanent base for the other half of the street leading from Taney Drive to the John Chenoweth - Glenn Bollinger properties.
2. A permanent base for Taney Drive stopping at Baumgardner avenue.
3. A permanent base for the alley behind the Lutheran Parsonage and the Reformed Church down to the Taneytown Recreation Park.

The short piece of alley leading off of Broad Street in behind the Luther Luckenbaugh - Ted Jester properties be tarred and chipped to the curve in the alley.

These bids are to be submitted by October 16, 1961 and it is hoped that these projects can be completed before winter, provided the budgeted funds will permit.

On Monday evening, October 9, the Mayor and City Council along with representatives of other organizations of town will meet with a representative of the State Planning Commission regarding information about phases of urban renewal aids and the applications for their use in a particular locality. Urban Renewal comes under the Housing and Home Finance Agency which was authorized in the Housing Act of 1954. These meetings are a continuation of the Councils quest for guidance in adopting and carrying out an Urban Renewal Program for Taneytown.

The Mayor and Town Councilmen have been invited to be the guests of the Kiwanis Club on Wednesday evening, October 11, 1961.

Also on October 12, 1961, they will be guests of the Jaycees at which time Mr. George Grier will be the guest speaker.

After an evening of much business, several delegations and lengthy discussions, the Council adjourned at 11:55 p.m.
