Attention Rural Patrons:

Postmaster George Fream again reminds rural patrons that their mail boxes must be kept clear of obstruction in order to permit the rural car-rier to serve the box without dis-mounting from his vehicle. Each time the carrier needs to dismount from his vehicle, it increases the risk

of serious accident and also blocks traffic which is contrary to the law concerning delivery of mail.

In cases where the carrier cannot approach the mail box with his vehicle the mail will be returned to the serious contrary. post office where it can be called for by the patron or it will be taken out the following day for attempted de-livery in the hope the approach to

the box will be clear.

Patrons encountering difficulty in keeping their approaches clear after a snow storm may notify the Post Office to hold their mail to call, or meet the rural carrier at the box, fix a temporary receptacle in the snow bank which is accessable to the carrier until approaches can be

LETTER FROM ANNAPOLIS

The Budget Bill was passed by the Senate this past week. However, before this matter was acted on by the members of the Senate it received a cut of some \$1,460,094. The largest cut in the Department of Health, in the amount of \$608,000. A cut of \$425,000 was made in the Department of Public Welfare, \$300,000 from Aid to Dependent Children and 125,-000 from General Public Assistance. The University of Maryland Budget received a cut of \$211,534.00. While these figures sound like large sums of money, they appear insignificant in light of the total budget of over \$500,-

Another attempt was made to abolish the death penalty in the State of Maryland and to substitute life imprisonment. This proposal has been submitted to the Legislature every year for the past few years but has always failed to gain the necessary backing for passage. Along this same line an attempt was made to require persons sentenced to life imprisonment to serve at least 20 years be-fore being eligible for parole. At the present time it is required that these persons must serve at least 15 years before parole can be considered.

Numerous measures were passed by the Senate covering the Civil Defense status of the State. They provide for emergency powers and set up pro-visions for Civil authorities to take over State and local governments in the event of the destruction or in-capacitation of the regular authorities. These bills are an effort to provide for continuous civil government in the case of an emergency rather than making it necessary for the establishment of military government.

bill to amend the unsatisfied Judgment Law to provide for an appeal from the decision of the Circuit Court, which appeal is not allowed under the present law. The provision, which has passed the Senate, also allow a one year period for giving notice of infund. At present this period is 6

Why Be Truthful? Lesson for March 11, 1962

S OME people can't "see" Christianity at all. Others can see some parts of it. Hot arguments go on among the experts: Is the Christian religion something so



Dr. Foreman . Probably the Ten Commanaments appeal to more "non-religious" persons than some other parts of Christianity. One of them we have for consid eration this week, as we have had others recently: Thou shalt not bear false witness. Or-turning it around as we can and must,-Thou shalt be truthful. Who cannot understand this? Who wants a liar for a friend? Who wants to do business with a man who can't be trusted? Who wants to marry a person whose word means

Nothing that is not true

The main difference between the ordinary understanding of truth and the Christian understanding of it, is in the very thorough-going understanding of what truth means, which highgrade Christians have. We shall look at only a few points. First, we believe that truth is not truth when it is mixed with falsehood. It's like passing a glass of mixed water and carbolic acid to a visitor and telling him, "Have a glass of water." It is water, true enough; but not all of it. The word "water" is a true word for half of what is in the glass, a fatally false word for the rest of it Perhaps the most dangerous form of untruth is a mixture of truth and falsehood; for the parttruth makes people think the whole thing is truth. They will take the lie-and-truth much more easily than a lie alone.

Not everything that is true

Second, while it is not ever right to tell a lie (unless, some would say, there is no other way to save a life), it is not by any means always right to tell all the truth. At a funeral, if some kind words are being said about the deceased, it would be the height of ungraciousness to dredge up all the sins and failings on his record If you have to write a recommendation it is only right to be perfectly truthful in giving your opinion of the applicant for the job. To recommend a person (however kind your motive) about whom you have some serious doubt, is no real help to any one. On the other hand if you know of some discreditable incident which has nothing whatever to do with Mr. X's fitness for this particular job, it is hardly right to tell it just because it happens to be the truth.

Not just because it's true

If it's true, then tell it, is a poor rule. That's what is wrong with gossip even when the gossip is factually true. Truth can be told with bad intentions, with malice and resentment. There is an "eleventh commandment" alongside the famous ten: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. "Is it true?" is by all means one question to ask about anything you want to say. If it isn't true, don't by any means tell it. But if it is true, there are other tests: Is it kind? Is it helpful? Is it the kind of thing you would want others to say and spread around about

In the image of God

The Christian motive for truthfulness is unique. Not that other motives are wrong. It is good to tell the truth because people depend on you if you do. It is good to tell the truth for its own sake. It is good to tell the truth because that way you never get caught in a network of lies it is hard to wriggle out of. Yes, yes. But the high Christian reason for being truthful is that we are sons and daughters of the God of truth. Two things we should always remember. One is that when God forgives sins, he "remembers them no more;" and when we forgive others, we should do the same, never dragging out of the past what we claim to have forgiven. The other thing is that we simply cannot deceive God. We can put on a false front for other people, but never for God. The God of truth knows the whole truth-


