## HIGH SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Jim Zester, safety engineer for Nationwide Insurance, gave proof Friday morning, April 6th, that you can't "stop on a dime." He let students at Taneytown High School drive the demonstration car to see how quickly they could stop at 20 miles per hour. The three revolvers on the bumper fired to mark the pavement when the driver (1) sees the stop signal, (2) slams on the brakes, and (3) brings the car to a dead stop.

Students at Taneytown High School had front row seats Friday morning, when some of their classmates learned the facts of life-on-the-highways. The event was in the nature of a test-demonstration, designed to disprove the old notion that a car can be "stopped on a dime."

Two students, a faculty member and a policeman took turns at the wheel of a specially equipped car—bringing it to an emergency stop while traveling at 20, 30, and 40 miles an hour, while other students checked the results.

The car is equipped so that distances can be measured accurately. An emergency signal light is mounted on the front of the car and three pistols are fastened on the front bumper. Aimed straight at the pavement, the pistols fire bullets of yellow paint which mark points at which the driver (1) sees the signal, (2) slams on the brakes, and (3) stops the car.

The automobile is supplied by Nationwide Insurance. A safety engineer for the firm rides beside the driver and operates the equipment. Nationwide engineers have staged similar Traffic Safety Education programs before more than 5,000 student groups in eastern United States.

Friday's demonstration was preceded by an assembly during which students were briefed on the program and heard an illustrated talk on the importance of driver attitudes.

**WITHHOLDING ON INTEREST AND DIVIDENDS? NO!**

The tax bill which was passed by the House of Representatives and is now under consideration in the Senate, presently in the Finance Committee, has objectionable features, among which is the provision for withholding taxes on interest and dividends. This provision would spawn an administrative monstrosity. Any procedure for withholding on interest and dividends would result not only in administrative chaos, but in massive over-withholding — for in the broad withholding provision there could be no recognition of individual exemptions and deductions.

Withholding taxes on interest and dividends has been likened to withholding taxes on salaries and wages, but they are not similar. In the case of withholding on salaries and wages, there is only one employer-employee relationship at any one time and, furthermore, the rate of withholding takes into account normal deductions and allowances for exemptions. Even with these exclusions, the Treasury processes annually more than 40,000,000 refund claims resulting from over-withholding on salaries and wages. Think what the refund job would be if we had withholding on interest and dividends!

For millions of small depositors, investors, cooperative patrons, and receivers of interest on small Federal savings bonds or dividends on insurance policies, any withholding means over-withholding. The number of interest and dividend accounts which would be affected by withholding would be astronomical; at the very least, there would be 500,000,000 accounts. The handling of such a number of accounts could be an overwhelming problem, and the cost of the administrative monstrosity would be stupendous.

The American tax system has produced more revenue than any other revenue system in history, and has done this on a voluntary basis, notwithstanding excessively high rates. Indeed, our tax system has derived its strength from the principle of voluntary self-assessment. The withholding provision would tend to destroy this.

It remains to be seen what the Senate Finance Committee will do in the reshaping of the tax bill, and what further changes may be adopted on the Floor of the Senate, and what will later emerge from the inevitable conference between the Two Houses of Congress. I hope a bill will evolve which I can support, for improvement in our income tax structure is needed. As cost of government continues to rise, with more spending, more "gimme, gimme", more "Federal aid", it becomes increasingly essential that the burden of taxes be distributed equitably.

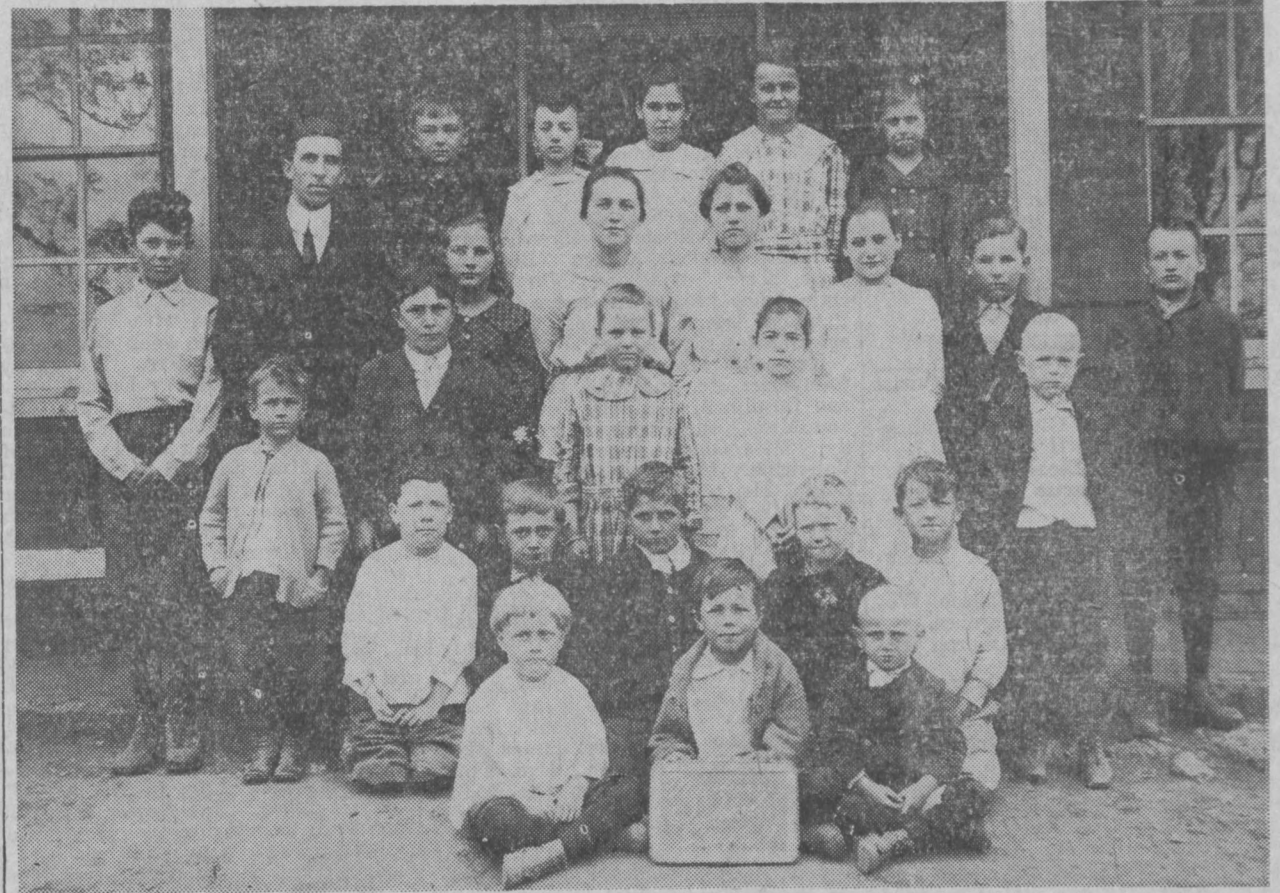

bert E. Thomas, Robert W. Feeser (for part of one term and all of another), Singleton E. Remsburg, Harry B. Dougherty, Homer Y. Myers, Wilbur O. Thomas, Raymond J. Perry, J. Alfred Heltbride, Ralph W. Stonesifer, Frank T. Dunham, Delmar E. Riffle, and Glenn O. Reeve. He then introduced Atty. Malcolm B. Tebbis, friend and neighbor of many, who chose to make some remarks on "Wills and their Administration," an absorbing subject. The making of a will is like keeping one's house in order, he said; it is the only sure way of exercising any control over one's possessions from the grave. He began by relating the story of one wealthy man who directed that his Cadillac be sold and the proceeds be given to his secretary. The man, however, reckoned without his wife, whom he had named as executrix, for what did she do but advertise said valuable piece of property for sale at the ridiculous price of \$60! The proper procedure is to have an idea of how one wishes to dispose of his property, take it to a lawyer to be drawn up, but above all to request two witnesses to hear it and to sign it attesting to its authenticity.

While they may be written in other ways and still be valid under certain circumstances, and while in all such legal matters there are exceptions, it is important, not to stick it into a drawer or safe deposit box, but to take it to the Register of Wills, who will surrender it only to the testator (in the event he wishes later to change it or add a codicil) or to his executor when it is established who is the executor.

As in most States, Maryland has laws which in effect write your will for you should you leave none, and even when you make one, the law does not permit you to defeat the right of the surviving spouse to his minimum legal share. In some cases e.g./where there are no survivors as far as the fifth degree, the proceeds escheat to the State and are used for such purposes as education.

The speaker also dealt with methods of conveying property in a will by deed to a "straw man" or by means of a savings account, as well as avoiding excessive taxation, one chief means being to set up a trust, appointing a bank as trustee (especially where an estate amounts to more than \$60,000). In any event, witnesses, preferably younger ones, likely to outlive the grantor, are important to prevent fraud.

The topic held the interest of all, and there were many questions. Nominations from the floor were solicited by President Hottinger to supplement the Nominating committee's report last meeting. REPUBLICAN WOMEN'S MEETING

More than sixty Republican Women and guests gathered at the Taneytown Rod and Gun Club on Tuesday, April 3, to hear Mrs. Marjorie M. Smith, editor-publisher of the Spinning Wheel, speak on the proposed increases in postal rates now in study by Senate Committee, and to meet some of the candidates whose names will appear on the ballot at the May primaries.

In discussing the second and third class mail increases which will bear the brunt of the proposed increases, Mrs. Smith cited the 80 or more magazines, both large and small, which have folded in the past 10 years, unable to meet the Second Class Postal increases put into effect during that time, and pointed out, in addition to the cultural loss to the country, the resulting unemployment through all the trades associated with publishing — writers, artists, printers, engravers, etc. Even the Postal Service itself could suffer — a local example being Spinning Wheel's shipment of over twenty tons of mail, in various classes which pass through our local post office annually.

In defense of third class mail — the "junk mail" about which there seems to be most misunderstanding — she illustrated graphically the business helps, garden and seed offers, book and educational opportunities, fashion and gift catalogues which bring us, through this 3rd class mail, information which would not otherwise be available to us. Thousands of mail order firms, book publishers, and manufacturers could be priced out of business by added increases, and our own outlook on what is new in cultural opportunities and mail order buying would be lost to us. The threat to a free press and to free enterprise was emphasized, and a resume given of suggestions that experts have proposed for clearing the so-called post office deficit in other ways.

Guests introduced were Mayor Raymond Perry, and candidates for offices in the May primaries: Mr. Reese Starmer, for Register of Wills for Carroll County; Jacob Yingling, for the Maryland House of Delegates; Eric McIntire, for States Attorney; Alvie Spencer and Frank Gearty, for the State Central Committee; George Arrowsmith, for Congressman from the 2nd Congressional District, and Fife Symington, also for Congressman from our district. At the coffee hour following an opportunity was afforded for club members to meet their guests and candidates and discuss various aspects of the coming elections.

At the business meeting, Mrs. Geo. Harmon presiding, it was announced that the 2nd Congressional District Republican Women's Conference and Luncheon will be held May 9th at the Turf Valley Country Club near Ellicott City. 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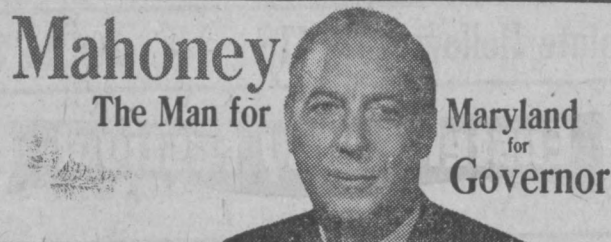

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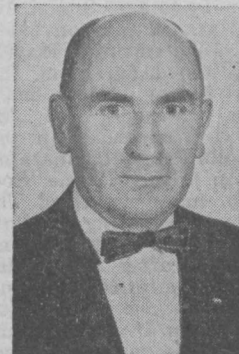

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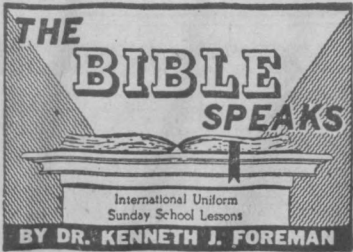

**The Cross Calls**  
Lesson for April 15, 1962

WE do not always talk the whole time of what lies closest to our hearts. A man may take some things for granted even when his friends do not know it.



For that great Christian Saint Paul, the Cross of Christ was the central thing in life, not his own life only, but that of all men. The Cross "reconciles all things," he wrote to the Colossians (Col. 1:20). Those who knew Paul knew this; so when he writes to his friends he does not mention the Cross in every paragraph. In the letter he writes to Titus, for example, an observant reader can find some fervent and grateful references to the cross of Christ; but most of the letter is (apparently) on other matters. Yet the Cross is always there, in Paul's thought. It was in his life, to begin with, of course.

**The cross calls**  
Without trying to go into the details of this short letter to Titus, we may take it as a kind of sample, or background, to indicate how a man who found the cross of Christ central in his life, acted and thought—and wished his friends to do likewise. Including everything else, we might say that the Cross calls. The death, not less than the life and teachings of Christ, has a THEREFORE that comes with it. The Cross is not something one can take seriously and go on living as if it had not happened. Paul has seen into the meaning of it. "He it is who sacrificed himself for us, to set us free from all wickedness and to make us . . . eager to do good" (Titus 2:14, New English Bible). God had a purpose in the Cross; do we share it? Is the crucifixion just something that happened, or is it something that happens to me? Is the crucifixion just another horror-story in a tragic world, or is it God calling us away from evil to be his very own? Among the other things which Paul here says about the Christian life, one is specially intriguing. Speaking to slaves especially, people at the very bottom of the human pyramid, Paul calls on them to "adorn the doctrine of God." Truth about God is beautiful; but unless it is "adorned" by the lives of those who believe it, even the most important truths remain only dry propositions.

**The cross compels**  
Some who read Titus for the first time are not attracted to it. There is a kind of hardness about the letter. It is full of such expressions as "must," "should," "see to it," "insist." It is full of imperatives. As translated in the New English Bible, Paul says that by the grace of God we are (—what do you expect him to say?—enlightened, comforted, edified, enraptured, made happy and bold? No, not any of these!)—we are disciplined. "We"—Paul and Titus, Paul and Titus and Christians today, put your own name in if you will—are disciplined by the grace of God, which (Paul makes clear) comes to us through the cross of Christ's sacrifice.

Before we complain too much about that being a harsh way to think of the grace of God, we might remember some of the things being said today about the general flabbiness of easy-living Americans, and how we all need to become more hard (i.e. more fit) than we are.

**The cross consoles**  
The sadness of the world is great, has always been great. Does the Cross deepen the shadows? It was a terrible event. Even supposing Christ to have been no more than a man, it is tragic that a young prophet, the teacher who gave us the Sermon on the Mount, was murdered—for it was essentially a "legal murder"—by his own people. But supposing Christ to have been the Lord of Glory, the Son of God, the tragedy is made infinitely worse. For this means that the goodness of God himself was rejected in hate. The crucifixion, whoever Jesus was, stands out as inhuman; but if this was truly the Son of God, then to crucify him was a deed for demons. No other tragic event in history witnesses to worse than this. And yet, from the beginning, Christians have been declaring, as Paul does often, that the death of Christ, so far from deepening the shadows, brings to the world its only consolation: that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

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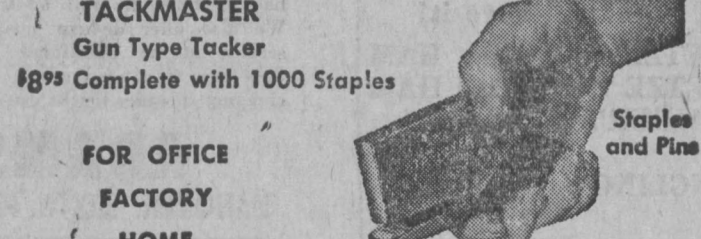
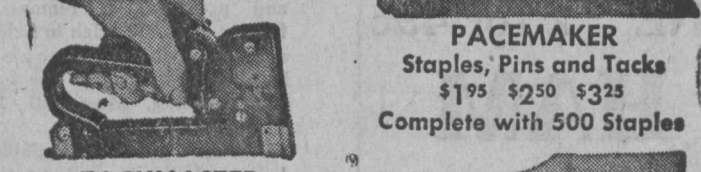
