PRESIDENT WINS ROUND AGAINST INDUSTRY

U. S. Steel Corporation raised its prices. The President, at a press conference, made a tirade against the Company's officials. Among other things, he accused them of contempt for the welfare of the people. The response was instantaneous. The Justice Department, headed by one of the President's brothers, Robert, swung into action. So did the Federal Trade Commission. So did the Secretary of Defense, with remarks about Defense purchases. " Investigations" were threatened. Then came the night riders. At 3:00 A.M. 5:00 A. M., 6:30 A. M. - all through the night and early morning hours, Government agents, without warrants - only orders from Attorney General Kennedy - knocked on doors and roused people out of bed to find out what testimony they could give about the conduct of U. S. Steel Corporation officials. Next day, one of these officials felt forced to stand up to a battery of microphones and news cameras to defend himself. All through the day, U. S. Steel Corporation officials were subjected to attack. Threats of punishment for steel companies in general were mingled with promises of reward for those who without question would do the President's bidding. This is a technique common in iron handed dictatorships elsewhere in the world - I never expected to see it used here.

The technique is irresistible, of course. The steel company had to r. had to call off its price in-



crease. There was jubilation at the White House. The President had won a victory. He had proved that political power, ruthlessly used, could smash any private citizen or company who got in its way - and those who hate private enterprise and industry and love Big Government were made happy.

But before we join the unrestrained dancing in the streets, let us have a sobering thought about what this may mean for freedom and for the legal rights of citizens. Let us pause to reflect that nothing like this has happened before - the launching of a government attack against a particular industry because it refused to follow a course of action dictated not by law but by the whims of economic theorists.

The steel company tried to justify its attempt to raise its prices by calling attention to increasing production costs, including four wage increases since its last price increase four years ago. But in this piece I'm not trying to justify the price increase. That's beside the point. It is conceivable that one could approve a denunciation of a price increase and at the same time refuse to countenance the use of punitive force of the Government with its powerful farflung Justice Department to coerce anybody who was making an economic decision when there was no evidence that there had been violation of law. Here, I believe, is a threat to the foundations of our institutions. Let me add right here that, from an economic standpoint, the consumer's interest and that of the nation lie with the healthy functioning of a

free economy. The question remains with us: Is the price of steel hereafter to be determined by bargaining in the market place between makers and buyers, in the traditional free-enterprise

way, or is it to be decided and enforced by the Government? -U. S. Senator J. Glenn Beall.
