MEETING OF LIONS CLUB

Ministers from Taneytown and Community Entertained

A nice program recognizing men of the cloth in and about Taneytown — and paying honor to the church — was provided last Tuesday evening by Lion the Rev. Edmund P. Welker, who arranged for the Rev. Dr. Nevin E. Smith, Hanover, Emmanuel pastor, to address the club.

President John T. Hottinger conducted the usual opening ceremonies, calling on Rev. Welker for the invocation, while Delmont E. Koons led group singing and gained some advanced experience for the job he will be doing when he assumes the office of Lion tamer July 1. The piano accompaniment to "My Old Kentucky Home" and "When You and I Were Young, Maggie" was ably executed by Harry I. Reindollar, and sure enough, Fred B. Garner, the ubiquitous Tail twister, was seen to scurry about, hovering solicitously over each victim, mercilessly extorting his intellectual demands in the name of that office.

Two visitors from Thurmont were cordially greeted by the president when Taney Inn's delicious meal had been fully enjoyed — Lions Roland Seidel and Nelson Trout. The Rev. Welker opened his program with the presenting of Rodney Helwig, baritone soloist from St. Benjamin's church, Westminster, who, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Welker, sang "He" by Richard Mullain and "My Task" by E. The Rev. Dr. Nevin E. Smith began his ministry in Evans City, Pennsylvania, moving from there to St. Paul's, Westminster, before being called to his present charge, Emmanuel United Church of Christ, Hanover. In inimitable fashion he warmed to his subject with several stories of a lighter vein, thereupon predicating his remarks on the statement, "The church is an instrumentality through which we can give expression to our service to the community. We as individuals, however, must do these things first — early in my ministry I learned how much better it was to say, 'You help me do it' rather than 'You do this and so'."

One must avoid the temptation to feel that where big things are to be done, one can't do it, but if it is a nickel or a dime that is needed, then one can. Quite the contrary, the population is made up of individuals, the church body is a communion of souls bound together with a common faith, and great oaks from little acorns grow. The whole is equal to the sum of all its parts, and the design of the fabric is incomplete if a portion is left blank or in disharmony with the whole.

What is wrong with us when we expect things to be better than right here? To wake some morning and see the cherry blossoms white as some snow-crowned head, the grass green with spring freshness, a cardinal showing off his scarlet coat, to hear the robin's song, to walk down to the church on two good legs — what would not a blind man give to look upon that scene, or a deaf woman hear the shouts of children rend the cool morning air? Each has so much with which to do his bit to alleviate the misery that is in the world. Remember the United Appeal poster depicting one lad shouldering another? — "He's not heavy, he's my brother!"

A government student from Saigon, South Viet Nam, stubbornly critical through his stay among American hosts right here in nearby Hanover, broke down before he embarked for London en route home. He begged for missionaries, for some assistance, for foreign aid that would give his countrymen the power to change their way of living so that his wife at thirty might not expect to grow old, broken, spent before her time — when half the age of those stately women he saw at a Rotary ladies night two days before.

Frederick Wilson Wright, a very adept surgeon, did all he could do — for 6 1/2 hours — to eradicate the cancer from his patient before saying, "Now we will pray." Albert Schweitzer felt he could not spare even the time to be honored at a banquet — he who could have been fabulously wealthy or greatly revered in fields of medicine, music, or mathematics — because his people at Lambarene were sick and needed him, were calling to him from the interior of Africa.

"By giving ourselves to causes out of appreciation for the opportunities and privileges we have, we are going to see that those who need it have a little more than they have been having. That is your job as Lions. It is not only your task, or mine — it is ours. We will help them to find their way to salvation."
