#### Local Firemen Give **Christmas Safety Tips**

The Taneytown Volunteer Fire Department wishes each and every one a very Merry Christmas and a Hap-py and Prosperous New Year! The spirit of Christmas is the spirit of giving, sharing and working for our fellowmen. It is our sincere hope that you are aware of the potential dan-gers surrounding your preparations for this festive season. Let us hope that no tragic fire will occur due to lack of care when your decorations are placed.

For a fire-safe Christmas in your home, follow these rules: TREES: For a natural evergreen

tree, pick a firm-needled, fresh looking one no bigger than you need the bigger the tree the greater the hazard. Saw off at an angle an inch or more above the original cut. Stand the tree in water until it is brought into the house — keep it in water un-til it goes out. Don't rely on chemical coatings or solutions to "flame-proof" your tree; none is truly effect. ive. Support it well. Locate it away from radiators or fireplace, and never where it might block your escape in case of a fire. Take it out of the house just as soon as possible after Christmas.

Metal trees, for all practical pur-poses, won't burn but they conduct electricity. So use indirect lighting; lighting strings on the tree may cre-ate a dangerous shock hazard.

Plastic and metalized plastic trees will burn; use only ones clearly marked as made of slow-burning materials. Those with built-in electrical systems should carry the Under-writers' Laboratories (UL) label to show they have been tested for electrical safety. LIGHTS: Check lighting sets for

frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Never use wax candles on or near the tree. Make sure dies on or near the tree. Make sure tree and other inside decorative lights are turned off before retiring or leaving the house. For outdoor light-ing, use only sets listed for outdoor use by the Underwriters' Laborator-ies. When setting up or adjusting keep power off to avoid shock haz-ard.

ard DECORATIONS: Use noncombustible decorating materials (metal, bustible decorating materials (metal, glass, asbestos, etc.) where possible. If combustible — like flocking — be sure they are "flameproofed." Un-treated cotton batting, polystyrene foam and paper ignite easily, burn intensely. Don't use polystyrene foam for capile holders or for the intensely. Don't use polystyrene foam for candle holders or for table or mantle decorations where wax canare also used.

WRAPPINGS: Dispose of gift wrappings promptly. Don't burn them in the fireplace.

Be careful when shoveling snow from your sidewalk not to obstruct access to fire plugs!

#### CHRISTMAS SEALS HISTORY EXPLAINED BY MRS. PAUL H. SMITH

Christmas Seals dating back to 1907, when the movement first began in this Country, are on display in the window of the Carroll County Na-tional Bank, 39 W. Main Street, Westminster, Md. The window was decorated by Eltinge Reifsnider for the Carroll Co. Tuberculosis Associ-ation in conjunction with the Chait ation in conjunction with the Christmas Seal Campaign which began November 13.

The collection, with the exception of a few years, was presented to the Association by a former president, Rev. Frederick Seibel. The board of directors commissioned John E. Myers to mount and frame the collection which is of great philatelic value today. It hangs throughout the year in the office of the Carroll County TB Association, Times Bldg., and has proved very interesting to visitors.

Einar Holboell, a Danish postmas-ter, first thought of the seal to raise funds for Tuberculosis children in Denmark in 1903. In 1907, a few doctors in Wilmington, Del., ran out of money while trying to cure eight charity patients. Emily Bissell, a cousin of one of the doctors, thought if Denmark could open its heart to help, America would. Instead of \$300 she expected, Emily Bissell raised \$3,000.

**Ordinance No. 187** 

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING SUB-SECTION 1 b, OF SECTION II OF ORDINANCE NO. 178 (ENACTED FEBRUARY 2, 1959 AND APPROVED FEBRUARY 16, 1959) AND RE-ENACTING THE SAME, WITH AMENDMENTS, TO INCLUDE OCCUPANTS OF APART-MENTS AND HOUSE TRAILERS WITHIN THE DEFINITION OF "CUSTOMER."

BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland, that Sub-section 1 b of Section II of Ordinance No. 178 be, and the same is hereby repealed and reenacted, with amendments, to read as follows: SECTION II



1. DEFINITIONS

b. The word "Customer" shall mean the user of service receiving water at one household, apartment, house trailer or place of business

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED AND ORDAINED that this Ordinance shall be and become effective on the first day of January, 1963.

# Ordinance No.

ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RE-ENACT ORDINANCE NO. 166 RELATING TO THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE PARK BOARD OF TANEYTOWN MEMORIAL PARK AND PERTAINING TO THE USE AND MAINTENANCE THEREOF.

Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland, that Ordinance No. 166 be and the same is hereby repealed and reenacted to read as follows:

SECTION 1: Be it enacted by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland, that Taneytown Memorial Park shall be dedicated to those from this community who have served their Country in war.

SECTION 2: Be it further enacted and ordained that Taneytown Memorial Park shall be operated and managed by a Park Board composed of eight (8) members, namely (1) the Mayor, (2) a City Councilman, (3) one member of the Chamber of Commerce, (4) one member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, (5) one member of the Lion's Club, (6) one member of the Kiwanis Club, (7) one member of the Fire Department and (8) one member of the American Legion. The Mayor shall be a member ex officio and each of the other members shall serve at the will of the body or organization which he may represent

SECTION 3: Be it further enacted and ordained that it shall be the duty of said Park Board to promote all types of athletics, sports and recreation and to encourage the use of Taneytown Memorial Park for wholesome community purposes. Said Park Board shall be authorized to raise and promote funds by subscription or by other lawful means, shall expend such funds for improvement of and equipment for Taneytown Memorial Park, and shall authorize and permit any using club or organization to improve or equip said Park, or any portion thereof, within such limits as may be prescribed by said Park Board. Maintenance of said Park shall be and remain the obligation and responsibility of the Mayor and City Council. All actions of said Park Board shall be subject to review by the Mayor and City Council.

SECTION 4: Be it further enacted and ordained that said Park Board shall submit to the Mayor and City Council an annual report of the financial transactions and standing of said Board as of the fiscal year ending June 30 of each and every year, said reports to be submitted no later than July 15 following such year.

SECTION 5: Be it further enacted and ordained that this ordinance shall be effective from and after the day and date of its passage.




