The regular June meeting of the Board of Education of Carroll County was held on June 11, 1963, at 9:30 A. M. President DeVries R. Hering presided and all members were present except Mr. Roland Pickett who is confined to his home because of illness.

The Board approved the minutes of the May meeting and gave approval to the current financial transactions.

The Board approved the request for retirement of Edgar T. Weigle after service of 36 years in the schools of the county.

The Board acted on miscellaneous communications and requests for assistance and heard brief reports regarding progress on school buildings and ground improvement projects in the Westminster High School, Oakland Mills, Sandymount and Freedom locations.

The Board was given advice regarding numbers of pupils requesting transfers to schools in accordance with existing policy and approved all transfer requests.

The Board acted to make appointments to District Tuition Scholarships to Western Maryland College using information supplied by the schools and all other information related to applicants.

A Mission Study

Final plans have been completed for the mission study on juvenile delinquency, entitled "Who Cares?", to be presented June 19 at Trinity Lutheran Church, Taneytown, at 7:30 P. M. by the Lutheran Church Women.

The major part of the evening's two-hour program will be conducted by a panel comprised of Miss Margaret Frederick, superintendent of the Montrose School for Girls, Baltimore; the Honorable James E. Boylan, Jr., Chief Judge of the Circuit Court, Westminster; Dr. William Gene Miller, chairman of the Psychology Department, Western Maryland College; and Mr. Reuben Jessop, director of Lutheran Social Services, Baltimore.

Miss Frederick is a native Carroll County, educated in the public schools of Hampstead and Western Maryland College. She also attended Drexel Institute of Technology, Johns Hopkins University, and Loyola College. Her experiences include those as a teacher, dietitian, and training school administrator. Miss Frederick is an active member of the National Conference of Superintendents of Correctional Institutions for Girls and Women.

Dr. Miller, a native of Romney, W. Va., is a graduate of West Virginia Wesleyan College, the Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C., and of Boston University Graduate School, where he obtained his doctorate in psychology. He has served as a pastor in the West Virginia and Baltimore Conferences of the Methodist Church and as pastor of the Winthrop, Mass., United Church of Christ. His interests include human relations, the psychology of religion and the psychology of middle-age.

A layman of the American Lutheran Church, Mr. Jessop holds degrees from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., and the School of Social Work, University of Minnesota. From 1958 to 1961 he was associated with the Wilder Child Guidance Clinic of St. Paul, Minn., as a clinical therapist. Mr. Jessop has participated in parish activities and is a leader in the Lutheran Student Associations at the University of Minnesota and the local Lutheran Church. He has held his position as executive director of the Lutheran Social Services of Maryland, Inc., for the past year and a half.

COUNCILMAN NAYLOR'S REPORT TO THE PEOPLE

The 15th annual Conference of the Maryland Municipal League met at the Commander Hotel in Ocean City, Md., from June 9 through June 11, 1963. Delegates in attendance from Taneytown were Mayor Perry and Councilman George Naylor, Jr.

The Maryland Municipal League consists of 136 towns throughout the state of Maryland. At these conferences all types of problems which confront town governments are discussed and experts in their field are in charge of the technical sessions and lead the open discussions afterward. Much is to be gained by attending these conferences through learning how other cities and towns have solved problems which confront our own local government or which might face our town in the future. These meetings are very educational and informative. The following is a report of this conference.

On Sunday afternoon the Conference opened at 2:30 P. M. with Mr. Alan Beals, Executive Secretary of the Maryland Municipal League, speaking on "Municipal Home Rule." This talk centered around the relationship between the city and the state. He stressed the importance of mayors and city councilmen running their own town governments and staying away from state involvement as much as possible. This, of course, means that much more responsibility rests upon the mayors and city councilmen under this form of government.

At 3:30 P. M. Mr. John Shriver, Director, State Fiscal Research Bureau, spoke on "Financing Municipal Government." He spoke on State Shared Funds and the formula used for the returning of these funds to local government. The methods for the returning of these funds are as follows: (1) State Shared Income Tax—As you know the State taxes every individual 3% on ordinary income and 5% on investment income when you file your State Income Tax at the end of every year. Of the 3% on ordinary income the State keeps 2.32% and sends 34% to the County and 34% to Taneytown, the town in which you live.

Of the 5% on investment income 3.3% goes to the State with .85% going to the County and .85% going to Taneytown. If you do not live in Taneytown the County gets the full .68% return on Ordinary Income and the full 1.7% of Investment Income. This shows how important it is to fill in that portion of your tax return stating that you live within the corporate limits of Taneytown on your State Tax Return each year.

(2) Auto License—On the average \$15 auto license, \$10 goes to the State, \$2.50 to the County and \$2.50 to Taneytown. Again, you must state on your form each year that you live in Taneytown or the full \$5 goes to the County. If you live in town and give an RFD number the town does not get its share of this tax.

(3) Admissions Tax—The entire proceeds from this source goes to the town where admission is charged for admittance. (4) Business Franchise Tax—50% goes to the County and 50% comes to Taneytown. If your business is outside the town the County gets the full 100% of this tax. (5) Business License Fee—This entire tax goes to the town if your business is in town or to the County if it is outside the town limits.

(6) Racing Money—This is based on population. 50% of the Racing Revenue goes to the State; the other 50% goes to the counties based on percentage of population of all counties. Then each county distributes its share of revenue to the towns on the same percentage of population of each town to its county population.

(7) Motor Vehicle Fines and Gasoline Tax—50% goes to the State for the construction of State roads. 30% goes to Baltimore City. 20% goes to the counties based on the percentage of miles of roads in each county to the percent of roads in the State. Each county distributes its share based on the percent of miles of roads within each town to the total number of miles of roads in the county. At the present, the width of streets and alleys within a town has no bearing on this return but is based on length only.

Monday morning, June 10, the Conference opened with the invocation by the Rev. Richard S. Gibson of the Atlantic Methodist Church and a Welcome Address by the Mayor of Ocean City, Hugh Cropper. Talks by Warren Phelan, Regional Administrator of Housing and Home Finance, Philadelphia, on "Federal Aid Urban Renewal" and a talk by Russell Nontey, City Planner, Rockville, on "Renewal in Central Business Districts" were given. Since these do not concern Taneytown too much I shall not comment on them in this report. However, statements were made that Maryland is growing very rapidly and much intelligent planning is needed by each community of the state for the future in the areas of housing, town governments, the keeping and restoring of historic buildings, etc.

On Monday afternoon at the 1:30 session, Robert Hajzyk, Chief, Division of Planning and Programming, State Roads Commission, spoke on (Continued on Page 5)

FATHERS ARE NECESSARY!
"I did not have the opportunity when I was young," Fathers say, "but I made up my mind that my Johnny will!"

I recall when I was in my teens when my Beloved Dad was ill and I ventured to shave him daily and succeeded and would curl his moustache up and he appeared handsome and with a loving kiss and hugging him tightly, I would say to my Precious Mother, "Just look how handsome he is, Mama!" Then, when he had to hurry to make a call which was unexpected, I would place water with ammonia in a bowl and with a whisk broom sweep and sweep his trousers and then press with a dry cloth while they were still damp so the creases would be permanent. Those days there were not the number of cleaning establishments as there are now. One day, he walked the way home to purchase a beautiful doll that he saw in a store window that he thought would be very special for me! I recall my Minister stating, "Such sweet love from a daughter which I always desired!"

What is home without a Father? Many widows marry again just to give the children a Father. Did you ever see the expression on a child's face when he states that either his father is dead or his parents are divorced? One grown man, who is the son of my friend and is now 40 years of age, talks about his parents being divorced and that he never really had the love of a Father!

There is so much more to write about that wonderful man in your house! Love him and appreciate him for FATHERS ARE REALLY NECESSARY!

THE SHORT END

The Seattle, Washington, Post-Intelligencer editorializes on a truism that deserves more public understanding on the part of the man in the street than it enjoys: "The basic difficulty, inherent in any socialized welfare service, is that once the system takes root, the administrative overhead becomes so extensive and expensive that the public necessarily gets the short end of the stick."

It uses the Social Security System as an example. It was established in 1937 on the theory that it would provide benefits superior to those available under private plans. See what has happened: "..... consider the case of a worker today who at 21 begins paying his Social Security taxes. By the time he is 65, he will have contributed, between his own and his employers' payments, over \$18,000.

"If that same money were banked at 4 1/4 per cent compounded quarterly, he would accumulate about \$50,000 at retirement age. This money continued at 4 1/4 per cent would bring in an income of about \$2,125 yearly. On the other hand, S. S. provides only \$1,524."

It can be added that S. S. terminates on death, save for very small benefits to widows. No cash reserve is built up.



COUNCILMAN'S REPORT

(Continued from first page) the methods used in determining the needs of State Highways, the costs of building new roads, maintaining our present roads and the new four-year program for the future.

Also at this same session, John Shriver, Director, State, Fiscal Research Bureau, spoke on the seriousness of getting revenues to meet the very pressing needs of State government let alone getting enough funds to cover the things that should be done.

At 2:30 P. M. Walter Scheiber, City Manager of Rockville, Md., spoke on "Effective Annexation Policies." This came at a very opportune time in that Taneytown is in the midst of annexation procedures. He spoke of many flaws in the annexation laws, many of which will very likely be passed during the next session of the state legislature.

General Rinaldo Van Brunt, Director, Maryland Civil Defense Agency, spoke on "New Developments in Civil Defense." Quite an elaborate plan is being passed along to counties and towns on building fall-out shelters in public places to protect the population after a missile attack from fall-out. Many communities have either forgotten about or have failed to do anything along the lines of protecting their people from this danger. On Tuesday morning at the 10 A. M. session several delegates to the 1963 General Assembly of Maryland spoke on various bills that were passed. Acting Speaker Marvin Mansdel, Fifth District, Baltimore, told of the Planning Commission that was set up to investigate and study all problems of the Metropolitan Area of Baltimore. This also includes Carroll County. Areas to be studied include water, land, roads, recreation, zoning; in fact, all facets of living.

Delegate Raymond McDonough of Prince George's County told of one bill that will enable municipal employees to withdraw from the State Retirement Fund and another that will enable municipalities to set up special taxing districts. Delegate Goodloe Byrnon of Frederick County told of the State Sanitary Facility Fund that enables municipalities to borrow money from the State to finance water and sewer projects. Interest on this money would only cost 2.5% but only 25% of the cost of

any project could be borrowed from this fund. Delegate E. Homer White, Jr., of Wicomico County spoke on Maryland Traffic Safety and the educational program that must be undertaken to make everyone safety conscious. Carl Everstine, Director, Department of Legislative Reference, spoke on the new fiscal year period for counties (July 1 to June 31), the revision of the condemnation laws and tax exemptions for the elderly. At 11 A. M. Mayor Theodore McKeldin of Baltimore spoke on "The Life and Health of our Largest City — Baltimore." The annual luncheon was held at 12 noon with the Honorable Brooks Hays, Special Assistant to President John F. Kennedy, bringing the address. His message dealt with Federal and State Relations. Mr. Hays was outstanding and everyone thoroughly enjoyed his address. The Conference adjourned at 2 P. M.



Justice

Lesson for June 16, 1963

Bible Material: Psalms 11: 72; 82; 106; Amos 5: 8. Devotional Reading: Psalm 67.

PEOPLE who talk about the separation of church and state often do not know just what they are talking about. As the founding fathers of America saw it, there is a danger in the possibility of the state's supporting one church or one form of religion against all others. The framers of the constitution had seen some examples of state religions and they did not want to make the same mistake here. However, it was not their intention to rule religion out of public life. These were the same people who started the custom of inaugurating presidents and other high officials with religious oaths and public prayer. These were the same people who adopted the motto "In God We Trust."

Justice is demanded

In the view of the Bible, justice is not optional. When the prophets spoke of justice, they were speaking of it as a requirement, not optional but demanded. The prophet Micah speaks of justice as one of the three great requirements of religion along with mercy and humility before God. Justice is woven into the Ten Commandments and into American ideals. A man dare not fancy himself religious, he dare not fancy that he can please God, if he is not just in all his dealings, so far as he is able. All forms of Christianity have this (and much else, to be sure) in common with one another and with the religion of the Jews: Religion and right conduct go hand in hand. Religion that is genuine calls for a life devoted to justice. This does not mean that every man is called to be a lawyer or a judge. It does mean that every day every person is faced with some decision, perhaps many, in which he is tempted to be unjust.

Justice is defense

There is one very interesting feature of the Bible's interest in justice. It is hardly ever defined as simple fairness; it is more often seen as taking sides. It is the notion of some people, though how they can think so is a puzzle to any who know a bit of history, — a notion that justice so to speak is automatic. There is something in the nature of things that works toward justice — so this idea supposes — so that we do not have to try hard, much less fight, for justice. Everything will come out right in the end if you will just leave everything alone! Of course, it does not. Whenever injustice, in any form, has passed away or become less, it has because some one was bold enough and strong enough, not only to speak up for the victims of injustice, but to stand up for them. Justice, mentioned in the Old Testament so often, means taking sides when one side is unfair to the other; "the poor," "the needy," the oppressed" these words are common. The Ten Commandments begin with an introduction to God, "I am a just God." Rather, "I am the Lord thy God who brought thee out of the house of bondage." God is the kind of God who is everywhere and always on the side of the oppressed and against those who do the oppressing. Justice, if you believe in it, often demands that you fight for it. Justice is defense.

Justice is divine

Unjust people seldom think of themselves as unjust. Every one knows in his heart of hearts that injustice is wrong. Every one resents injustice fast enough if he is the victim; very few people can see injustice being done when they are the oppressors, not the oppressed. Injustice has many evil consequences, but itself is rooted in selfishness. In the days when society was organized in the feudal pattern, nobody thought it wrong that the serfs, at the bottom of the ladder, were cruelly treated. "Noblemen" would resent, at sword's point, the kind of treatment they gave the serfs every day. If you asked a nobleman about this, he would have said it was no injustice, he was so much superior that he deserved superior treatment. In every age those who battle for justice have the equivalent of the feudal so-called noblemen against them. There is one comfort for the fighter for justice: He may be sure that the God who hates injustice is on his side.






