EMMITSBURG, Md. – Hundreds of people gathered at the Emmitsburg Community Park to take in the sighes and tastes of a true old-fashioned big top circus. Visitors had a chance to take a pony ride, look at a giant snake, pet an elephant, ride a camel or simply chow down on classic circus food before the big event.

At three o'clock everyone gathered under the big top to watch a 90-minute performance filled with feats of human strength, talent and animal tricks. An elegant trapeze routine, dazzling contortion act and amusing canine revue mystified wide-eyed children, as did many other acts.

Crystal Darr, 12, said she enjoyed the circus and couldn't simply pick one act out as a favorite.

Nor could Taylor Wiles, 5, who simply said she enjoyed "everything."

But by far, the act that was the talk of the town was the Ponderous Pachyderms act. Libby, Nina and Viola, three elephants, drew loud applause for their performance packed full of balancing tricks and choreographed moves.

But the attention surrounding Libby, Nina and Viola was not strictly confined to the tent. Outside the gates of the circus, Lena Fiore was calling attention to the elephants as well.

Instead of taking in the performance, Fiore, an animal rights activist, spent her time being the "voice of the voiceless," handing out fliers containing information about animal abuse. A staunch supporter of animal rights for 12 years, Fiore said the elephants in the circus were being treated cruelly and she wanted to let the public know the truth about the circus.

"I feel that they suffer greatly," Fiore said. "I'm trying to educate the public against cruelty to animals, especially elephants."

Fiore said that the she simply wanted circus goers to be informed about what goes on behind the scenes of the circus, that the elephants performance was a product of cruelty imposed by whips and chains.

But according to Tammi Stocker, an officer with the Fred-

Emmitsburg Community Day coming

EMMITSBURG, Md. – For 25 years now, residents of Emmitsburg have gathered to celebrate their community with fun, food and fireworks. This year, the 25th Annual Emmitsburg Community Day will be on June 30 with activities scheduled throughout the day.

"Our theme this year is service and while its our 25th year of doing this, we are trying to highlight, focus on and showcase the other organizations that have given so much to the community," said Emmitsburg Lions Club President Joe Ritz.

To get the town in the mood for the celebration, the Emmitsburg Community Chorus will sing patriotic songs and songs of yesteryear at a free performance at the new Community Park bandstand. The concert will be Friday, June 29 from 7-9 p.m.

Community Day begins June 30 with a 6:30 a.m. breakfast at the Vigilant Hose Company Fire Hall on West Main Street. Company members will serve sausage, bacon, cream chipped beef, pancakes, eggs, home fries, coffee and juice for \$6. Children 5-10 are \$3 and those under 5 eat free.

The games begin at 10 a.m. behind the Community Center on South Seton Avenue. The Yellow Springs Concert Band will provide music from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. the band is known for its patriotic tunes, marches and polkas.

Adults can compete in a closest-to-the-pin golf competition from 2-4 p.m. and horseshoes



AFTER

100 Years Ago "In this place" From The Emmitsburg Chronicle

This column offers a regular look back at Emmitsburg through the eyes of The Emmitsburg Chronicle which first appeared on June 14, 1879, published by Samuel Motter. In 1909 the paper became known as The Weekly Chronicle. It continued regular publication, allowing for a 5-year hiatus during World War II, until February 9, 1977.

June 1907

CASE OF RABIES

Last Saturday a cow belonging to Mr. Robert Stultz, of Liberty Township, died of rabies. The case was reported by Dr. J.W. Reigle of this place, to Dr. M. Moriarty, of Gettysburg, who, acting for the State Life Stock Sanitary Board of Pennsylvania, placed the cattle and dogs of Mr. Stultz under quarantine for one hundred days. The cattle, eleven head, and dogs are now penned up in Mr. Stultz's barn and will be kept there until the quarantine is lifted.

Room Used By The Young People For A Dance

The addition to the factory building of the Emmitsburg Improvement Company on Green Street which was completed sometime ago has been accepted by the company. The new building is 25 by 40 feet and is built of the best material. The work room is amply lighted and is finished in natural wood and plastered with hard coating plaster.

The contractor, Mr. C.G. Walter, as usual, finished long before the time specified in the contract had expired. On the occasion of the visit of the inspecting committee the contractor entertained them and other visitors with a light lunch. Mr. Walter desires to thank the building committee for the help they extended him and the good will shown throughout the construction and completion of the building.

On Friday night the young people took advantage of the large floor space afforded by this building and gave a dance. The affair was a delightful one and much enjoyed by all who attended.

ERRATIC **TEMPERATURES**

The spring of 1881 was unseasonable cold. In the first week of April snow fell in the Middle States, and frost nipped Mississippi. In the middle of April lake navigation was blocked by ice. May opened with the thermometer uncomfortable low, and railway traffic obstructed; it was wet and cold in the middle of the month. June began with severe and widespread storms, low temperatures, and frost in the North West; on June 24 commercial reviews reported weather "much too cold for the season."

With July 1 an extraordinary change occurred throughout the United States. Intense dry heat began; a week later dispatches from interior cities reported so violent a hot spell that business in many cities was necessarily suspended. August opened with a continuance of the drought; September began with prostrating heat, culmination in the famous "yellow day" when the smoke of the forest fires in Maine

swept over New England.

Precedent is neither proof nor prediction; therefore, the wellknown crop results that year, the corners in staple products, and the disturbed financial markets are no more than interesting analogy. Still the reminiscence is the point; perhaps the more so in that the records show no parallel in the period between 1881 and 1907.

THEY BOTH TOOK TO THE DITCH

On Friday night about ten o'clock, while Messrs. Jacob and George Winegardner were returning from Frederick, in Mr. Jacob Winegardner's automobile, near the Catoctin Furnace a piece of the mechanism that controls the steering gear of the machine broke. The night was extremely dark and when the accident happened they were not going at a very high speed but as soon as the driver lost control the automobile jumped the road and went down the eighteen foot embankment. By a strange good fortune the men were in nowise injured but the machine was wrecked. The gentlemen telephone to Thurmont for assistance and Dr. Birely responded to their call in his automobile. On Saturday morning the broken machine was drawn to Thurmont and the gentlemen reached Emmitsburg on that day.

HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Tuesday night Samuel Woodyard imbibed more "short cut" liquid than was good for him and proceeded to let the town know that he was present. In this he succeeded very well, but towards morning, in the neighborhood of two o'clock, he wandered into Mr. Geo. Clutz's ice cream factory - through the window it would seem, judging from the amount of broken glass found on the scene soon afterwards - and began playing tag with the freezers, upsetting several of them during the game.

It would reflect on this midnight artist to say that he took no account of time for in some mysterious way a certain alarm clock, afterwards identified by the owner, kept pace with him as he bade good bye to the ice cream tubs and wandered into the alley to chant a few

Under normal conditions Sam has a sweet voice, but he "short cut" made inroads on its cadence during the early part of the evening and naught but volume remained. Somehow or other Sam must have been trying for a diploma in a cussing university the way he filled the air with choice expressions, and the effect was like unto a short fuse dynamite bomb mixed up in a mining camp poker conversation.

Well, Sam was apprehended and tried before Squire Stokes and committed to the Frederick jail to await the action of the grand jury which meets in September.

erick County Animal Control, there was nothing of the sort going on at the circus.

"Everything looks good," Stocker said, "I've done an inspection and it is all okay."

Stocker said that the circus had all of the necessary papers

and that there was no evidence of animal cruelty.


Considering the controversy surrounding the circus, Mayor Hoover said he was glad that animal control had showed up and found no evidence of animal cruelty.

Hoover, who rode in on an elephant at the beginning of both shows, said that he had no issues with the protest to the circus and Fiore's presence, but felt that it was "inappropriate to protest just because they can" and "inappropriate for someone to spoil someone else's fun."

But despite the protest and opposition, Hoover thought the circus was a success.

'From what I can see everyone is having fun... I enjoyed it," Hoover said, smiling.

The Kelly Miller Circus entertained visitors for two shows on June 10. The circus featured a variety of human and animal entertainers who performed tricks and spectacles. It was the first time that a circus has performed in Emmitsburg for at least 25 years, according to Mayor James Hoover.

ral disasters, terrorist threats and other emergencies.

"The Fire Corps is open to people from teenagers to 100 years old," said John Hoyle with Vigilant Hose. "Even if a person likes to build bird houses or make quilts we'd like them in the Fire Corps because we can use these things as raffle items."

Since September 11, 2001, fire and ambulance service departments across the nation have been struggling with increased demands for service coupled with reduced funding. In order to respond to these increasing demands and provide more services to the community, Vigilant Hose Company and Emmitsburg Ambulance Company has worked for the past two years to establish their Fire/EMS Corps and registered it with the U.S. Citizens Corps.

Mary Lou Little, spokesperson for Emmitsburg Ambulance Company said, "These units will be a great help to both departments and a benefit to improved

community service and safety."

The Fire/EMS Corps will debut during Emmitsburg Community Day with a float in the parade.

"After that, it's up to each individual organization to recruit and administer their own program," Hoyle said.

Fire Corps, a component of the Department of Homeland Security Citizens Corps program, is a national grassroots effort to increase the capacity of volunteer and career fire and EMS departments through the use of community volunteers in non-emergency support roles.



Citizens stage protest against circus

The day before the Kelly Miller Circus performed in Emmitsburg, a group of about 10 people, including Town Commissioner William O'Neil, Jr. and Planning Commissioner Catherine Forrence, protested the circus saying it was cruel to animals.

EMMITSBURG, Md. - Not everyone was pleased to see the Kelly Miller Circus come to town on June 10. About 10 people, most of them Emmitsburg citizens, protested against the circus on June 9 on the town square.

"When parents take their children to the circus, they are in effect teaching them that it's okay to make some animals do some incredibly unnatural and painful

things -against their will-purely for our entertainment," protest organizer Catherine Forrence wrote in a letter to the editor in The Frederick News-Post.

The protesters held up posters that called circuses of being cruel to their animals, particularly elephants. To emphasize the point, Forrence wore elephant ears, an elephant trunk and chains around her neck during the protest.

Forrence says that the Kelly Miller Circus has a long list of animal care violations. The most-recent was in 2005 when the circus was cited for not provid-

ing adequate veterinary care to two of its elephants.

She also protested the circus on the grounds that town tax dollars were being spent on something that she didn't ap-

"There are many families whose tax dollars are being spent for an event they can't enjoy because they can't afford the ticket price. Then, there are also folks, like me, who oppose public money being allocated to support the inhumane treatment of animals," Forrence wrote in a letter to the commissioners protesting the

Besides arguing that the circus is cruel to animals, Forrence asked that commissioners do the following things to protect the animals and the attendees:

· Kelly Miller employee-list provided to Sheriff's Deputies for an employee background check prior to cir-

List of elephant handlers and recordcheck that the elephants have had annual testing for tuberculosis to prevent the spread of the disease among captive elephants.

· Tent inspection by the fire marshal ensuring it meets code requirements (stability, inflammability) and exit signs are properly lit and marked.

· Inspection of trailers to ensure structural stability and compliance with Maryland commercial vehicle laws.

• Permit and proper health inspection to include hand washing facilities and bathroom facilities for circus employees and

 Compile anticipated budget impact: portable bathrooms, on-site fire and police service, waste disposal, water allocation, legal and insurance fees.

· Trained animal inspector on hand during the unloading, set-up, throughout the day, and loading.

· Review of required AWA reports upon arrival of the circus.





Protecting your home while you're on vacation

The school year has ended and now the fun begins. As families plan their summer vacations, so too, are criminals planning their summer events. In the U.S., a property crime occurs every three seconds, robberies every 60 seconds, and burglaries every 15 seconds. With this in mind, let's plan a safe summer for our

Before we head off to the beach, visiting far away family members, or taking a weekend away, let's think about making our homes less tempting for a burglar or more difficult to enter. If gaining entry into your house is hard, the burglar may simply bypass it. If too much effort is required, or more skills and tools are needed than they have on hand, this, too, may lead them elsewhere.

Good entry doors are the most important thing for deterring a burglar. The best exterior doors are ones that use a solid core or are made of metal. The doors to the garage or rear of the house afford a burglar good concealment. They generally are not as strong, but because of this, should be made up of this similar construction. The exterior doors should also have a quality, heavy-duty, deadbolt lock with a one-inch throw bolt. The strike plate should have four screws that are at least 3 inches long. The screws need to be this long to penetrate the wooden frame for the best strength. Having good locks on the doors and windows is a must; however, the most important aspect of having good locks is using them. Several burglaries have occurred in town and it was found that the doors or windows were left unlocked. The goal for home security is to make entry difficult. Make sure to lock the garage or storage shed doors and windows as well.

Never leave a spare set of keys to your house hidden outside. Ask a trusted neighbor to watch your house while you are gone. It is a good idea to give your vacation address and telephone number to your neighbor so you can be reached in case of an emergency. Ask your neighbor to report any suspicious people or activity around your

Stop all deliveries of mail, newspapers or packages, or arrange for your neighbor to pick them up. Newspapers gathering on the front step announce your absence. Leave your blinds, shades or curtains in a normal position. If you have these closed 24 hours a day, it may announce to a burglar that you are gone. It is a good idea to install motion detector lights around the rear of the house and detached garages or sheds. The last thing a burglar wants is a spotlight on his actions.

Ask your neighbor to park in your driveway occasionally. This will help to create an appearance that someone is at home. If you plan on being gone for several weeks, make arrangements to have the lawn mowed or any other outside weekly maintenance completed. Also, put away any bicycles or any outside items you do not want stolen. If a vehicle is being left in the driveway, make sure to lock it and remove any valuables from inside.

Last but not least, contact the Sheriff's Office and request a patrol check of your house while you are on vacation. This will inform the deputies that are assigned to Emmitsburg or your patrol area, that you are gone. If you contact the Sheriff's Office and request a check of your house, your house will be put on a patrol check sheet that deputies will get.

Remember, plan ahead and give your house and your valuables the best protection possible. Have a safe summer!

Catoctin High School graduates 246

EMMITSBURG, Md. – "This is the turning point," said Catoctin High School senior Kristyn Bradshaw to her 245 classmates at graduation ceremonies held at Mount St. Mary's University on June 6, 2007. Now they all would begin to answer the question "what do we want to be when we grow up?" The class included nine sets of twins, an occurrence which drew attention from newspapers and television stations around the county and state.

In his remarks, Principal Jack Newkirk II spoke of the directions members of the class of 2007 were taking toward their goals. Sixty-five percent of the class is going on to post-secondary education; cumulatively they have been awarded over \$1.2 million in scholarships. Six students have enlisted for military service. He praised the class for their character, compassion, and willingness to help others. They had, he said, 'raised over \$10,000 on more than one occasion to benefit others,' most recently toward the medical expenses of their classmate, Casey Bly, who has been undergoing chemotherapy. Bly was the first student to receive his diploma, accompanied by a standing ovation from his class, faculty members, and the graduation audience.

"You look awesome in your Catoctin blue!" was Frederick County Schools Superintendent Dr. Linda Burgee's opening greeting. She went on to speak of the many changes the students had witnessed in their schools and the world over thirteen years of education. They had begun their school years, she said, using black-and-white composition books for their school journals, and now they express themselves through weblogs, text messages, and MySpace. "From here forward, the book is blank, the screen is blank...Have dreams [and] have plans for how to reach them...it will take courage, character, determination, and [the right] attitude."

Sarah Foster, president of the Student Government Association, announced the 2007 Teacher of the Year award. Class members each nominated a member of the faculty, and the nominees were narrowed to four: Steven Cree, David Gadra, Mark Kimbrell, and Doug Williams. Cree, who teaches psychology and sociology, received the award. Class members Bethany Lillard and Scott Gautney presented the musical selection "You Raise Me Up."

Honored guests included Frederick County Board of Education members Donna Crook, Jean Smith, and Katherine Groth, Director of High Schools Ann Bonitatibus, Maryland Delegate Paul Stull, Mayors James Hoover and Martin Burns and commissioners from both Emmitsburg and Thurmont, principals and representatives from each of the Catoctin feeder schools, and PTA/PTSA officers.

Earlier in the week, at the Senior Awards Convocation held at CHS, class members received colored cords, medallions, ribbons, hoods, and sashes denoting academic honors and membership in special organizations and governing bodies. They wore the emblems with their caps and gowns at graduation. Winners of numerous local scholarships were announced. Five students received the Principal's Award from Newkirk: Christopher Forrence, Scott Gautney, Amber Kline, Ryan Lenhart, and Lauren Wildasin.

Mount student athletes excel academically


EMMITSBURG, - Thirteen of Mount St. Mary's 18 sports ranked above the national average with four teams ranked in the 80-90th percentile, according to the NCAA's latest Academic Progress Rate scores for 800 Division I teams. The NCAA honored the Mount's women's golf and tennis teams for their perfect scores. These two team posted multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports.

"We are proud of our Division I athletic program," Mount President Thomas Powell said, "not only for the athletic accomplishments of our student athletes, but particularly for their academic achievements."

Four Mount teams ranked in the 80-90th percentile. Those teams are men's basketball, men's soccer, softball, and baseball. Because APR scores are based on a sport-by-sport basis, the baseball's APR score of 975 is not comparable to the men's basketball's APR of 967.

The average APR for all Division I student athletes is 960, according to the latest data, which for most teams is based on three years of academic performance. The average APR for male student athletes is 950 while the average for female student athletes is 970.

When Tichy came into a small inheritance, she was able to put a down payment on the center and purchase it. Now she has visitors coming from all over the region to spend time


in peace, and sometimes, solitude.



TO BE OR NOT TO BE... WHAT WAS THE QUESTION?

The phoebe that has always nested in the old haunted house next door was in good voice, and from the woods behind the house came the songs of wood thrushes, pewees, a towhee and a red-bellied woodpecker. Off in the distance I heard common crows, killdeer and geese. As I started back inside, I was almost run over by a Carolina wren that came careening around the corner and deposited a mouthful of straw among the petunias in the hanging planter by the swing.

I went in and reported, "There are lots of birds out there, and everything seems normal I heard at

As I went out with the garbage bag I couldn't help noticing that the wrens had resumed hauling nesting material into the sopping wet construction site. Over the next several days the conversation was repeated with minor variations, until they finally gave up and moved into a multiflora rose bush in the field west of the house.
