County Officials Take Step to Develop Water Resources

The Board of County Commissioners of Carroll County in cooperation with the Commissioners of Frederick in Pleasant Valley Cemetery. County and the Soil Conservation Districts of each county have in recent weeks made surveys of Big and Little Pipe Creeks and have submit-ted to the State Soil Conservation Committee a request for the development of a watershed project under Public Law 566.

The application was presented to the State Soil Conservation Committee on Friday, December 4th and approval was granted for further

planning assistance.

At the presentation before the State Committee, headed by Gordon M. Girns, officials of Carroll and Frederick Counties insisted that the preservation of the two watersheds was vital to the economy of both counties. Little Pipe Creek contains 18,000 acres in Frederick County and 41,000 acres in Carroll County. Big Pipe Creek contains 73,00 acres which lies entirely within Carroll County. A total of 960 farms are presently

encompassed by the two watersheds.

was made by Horace S. Brauning,

Board of Commissioners; George A.

Grier Planning Director. Grier, Planning Director and Administrative Assistant to the Commissioners; Wm. O. Boothe, Carroll County Conservationist; Robert L. Jones, County Agent; Randall G. Spoerlein, Chairman of the Carroll County Soil Communication of the Carroll County Soil Conservation Board and Supervisors, Landon C. Burns, Sterling J. Leister and Carroll M. Wilhide also attended the College Park

meeting.

The Baltimore Colts are pushing quarterback Johnny Unitas for player-of-the-year and fullback Tony Lorick for rookie-of-the-year in the National Football League. Both face stiff competition in their bids for

But there is one Baltimore player who should have no trouble winning an award. He is halfback LENNY MOORE. He should be an overwhelming choice as comeback playerof-the-year.

Last season was Moore's worst in the NFL. The four-time All-Pro speedster gained only 136 yards rushing, 288 yards on pass receptions, and scored only four touchdowns. Moore blamed his sudden decline on injuries. He missed three exhibition Sunday, sermon: "God's Word For A games because of damaged ribs. After returning to the lineup, he was sidelined two days before the regular season opened by an emergency appendectomy. Surprisingly, Moore was back in action by the third game. But in his fifth game, he suffered a

> year and at the start of this season, put him up for trade. Reportedly, six teams could have had him, but they didn't want him because they figured he had stopped trying.
> So, Moore remained with the Colts

and opened the season as a substitute flanker back, the first time he had ever been relegated to a second-string role. On the suggestion of Unitas, Moore was restored to his running back spot in the second game and now is one of the main reasons why the Colts have won the Western Con-

ference championship.

Moore has scored 18 touchdowns in the Colts' 13 games this season and leads the league with 108 points. Including last year, Lenny has scored at least one touchdown in his last 16 games, an NFL record. He could equal the single-season touchdown record of 19 by scoring once next week in the final regular game against Washington, or break it with

two TD's.
Whatever he does, one thing is certain—the Colts won't be looking to trade Lenny Moore after this

Ever since YOGI BERRA started playing professional baseball, he has been laughing his way to the bank. Since the New York Yankees signed him to a \$90 contract with their Norfolk, Virginia, farm team in 1942, it has been estimated that Berra has earned over one-half million dollars as a player, despite three years in military service.

However, the roly-poly, fun-loving Berra denies that he is exceptionally wealthy. At a news conference the other day announcing his signing as a coach with the New York Mets,

"I wish I had the kind of money people say I have."

Of course, none of the sports broadcasters or writers attending the conference volunteered to take up a collection for Berra. He certainly doesn't need it. The Yanks and the Mets have given him ample security

Berra probably will be the highest paid coach in history next season. The Mets are giving him a reported \$40,000, and, in addition, he will receive \$25,000 from the Yanks for a total of \$65,000. 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
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
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

Three Friends Lesson for December 13, 1964

Background Scripture: Philemon. Devotional Reading: Galatians 3:23-29.

WHO KNOWS how to find the book of Philemon in the Bible? It is one of the shortest "books," less than a page long. Who can name two Bible books that are shorter? Without looking



about? Well, it's about three men and their strange friendship. Strange because as most people would look at it, they didn't have much in com-

mon. One was a Dr. Foreman slave, one a prisoner (on false charges; the prison was real enough), and one a free man. What was it these three men had in common?

The Thief and the Victim

One of these three was a man of property. He was at least rich enough to own a slave. The rich man was named Philemon, the slave Onesimus. The name was a kind of joke, perhaps, for the word Onesimus in Greek means useful or beneficial. Perhaps Philemon hoped Onesimus lived up to his name. Perhaps he thought - like a modern man who has gone to the wrong usedcar dealer - that he had been gypped in the used-slave deal and been stuck with a slave who would never in the world be of any real use. Anyhow, this Onesimus had decided to go to Rome. Naturally he did not consult his master about this. Rome was a long way from Colossae where he lived, so he borrowed the money (again without mentioning it to Philemon). So he became a wanted man; wanted as a runaway slave, wanted as a runaway thief. Somehow or other he got into jail at Rome, probably because he had committed some other illegal act. But in jail, besides all the usual jailbirds, he met a most unusual man named Paul, who "by chance" knew Philemon and perhaps had seen Onesimus loafing about the house. Now the strange thing here is that Paul and the thief Onesimus actually became friends. No less than Paul tried to bring together and reconcile the thief and his victim. What was it that made Paul think he could possibly persuade the two

Take another look at those three men. One of them, to judge from Paul's attitude to him, lived well within the law. You would have been surprised to hear of Philemon in jail. Onesimus was another sort of bird. Finding him in jail was a shock to nobody. He lived outside the law. Neither Philemon nor Onesimus, when you come to think of it, paid much attention to the law. Philemon didn't because he didn't need to. He was already a better man than the law re-

men to live together as brothers?

Above the law?

Christ is the answer

At the risk of insulting the readers' intelligence, let us suggest the answer — it is all the same one — to the questions that have been asked. What did these three men have in common? At first, perhaps little. In the end, Christ. They were all three slaves (as Paul would put it) of Christ, they were Christ's men. He is the answer to the question: how can we get over the barriers between man and man, class and class? Again, what made Paul think he could reconcile a thief and his victim? The answer is, Christ had come into the life of Onesimus. He intended to live up to his name. Christ had made a new man of him. Or again: what law is higher than the highest human court of justice? It is the law of Christ, which means the law of love. In this short letter Paul mentions Onesimus about four times, but Christ eleven times. Our human problems would not be wiped out, but we would be on the way to solving them, if Christ were invited into every tense and angry situation.
