These are generally not wanted and should be broken off as soon as they appear. This will be a lively month with insects. The curculio attacks the plums soon after the fruit is set. Jarring the trees and catching the fallen insects upon sheets spread upon the ground is the only effective remedy. Plantlice often appear in great numbers at the ends of the brances of cherry, pear and other fruit trees. If these can be bent down and dipped into strong soap-suds, the insects may be killed. If out of reach, syringe them with kerosene emulsion. 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
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
