The Legislature we should think can readily comprehend that, to perfect the Organic . Law is vastly more important, than to spend time in expanding the body of our gencut. eral and local laws, already so overgrown as to make them useless and impracticable by reason of their immense proportions.

Laws proposed by the Legislature to be voted on by the people, will in the course of their preparation and subsequent discussion undergo such thorough investigation, as to make their purport well nigh unmistakable, and in voting on them, there will be the fullest light for coming to a decision.

But the questions of such amendments should be determined, as nearly as may be, apart from and independent of mere party considerations. Parties change, and the policies of one year may be inapone; but constitutions should be spectators fled in all directions. plicable to the necessities of another framed with a view to their permanence through long periods of time. Whatever may be done in this connection, we trust will be ratified or condemned on the grounds of meeting, or being repugnant to, as the case may be, the enlightened will of the people.


